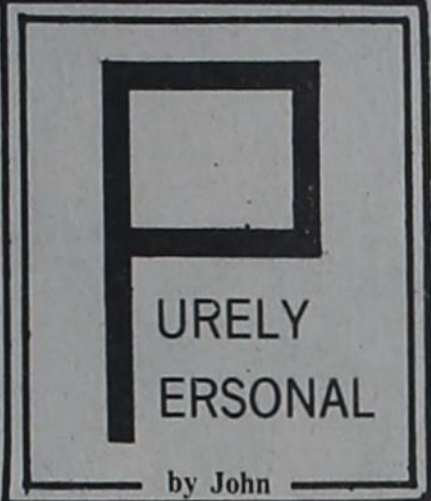

For years we have been intrigued with the Texas Highway Department's propensity to excise any blade of grass or spot of greenery from the shoulders of the highways. In some areas it appears as if a prize is awarded to the highway crew that maintains the most barren right of way. In this country where vegetation is at a premium, this practice has seemed to us to be absurd.

Now comes the Parmer County Commissioners Court making a valiant run for the booby prize when it comes to uprooting trees. It has been determined that the courthouse needs more parking space, both for the people who must go there to conduct business and for the expanding list of employees. This we agree with. More parking space is necessary.

However, we are amazed and saddened at the summary uprooting of another ten trees around this area. If you have not spent a summer around the courthouse, don't discount the value of shade provided by the trees surrounding the building. Trees anywhere are an asset to the Southwest, and especially to a city park.

It has been mentioned to us by several observers that the dandelion and plantain weed infested area between the medical clinic and the law enforcement center could well have been used for additional parking, particularly for employees.

A layer of asphalt over the eyesore would have been a decided improvement for all concerned - and gratitude from our local squirrel population.

Three weeks from this coming Tuesday, on June 24, we will vote on the Farwell Hospital District and on a bond issue for the nursing home complex. These are very important issues for all citizens in the Farwell Independent School District except those who reside in Bailey County. This election will give us the opportunity to accomplish several desirable results. One will be the creation of our own hospital district, a district that will provide concern for the people in this local area. You know that we could wind up someday being part of someone else's district and have to pay taxes for a facility not in our own area. Another will be the passing of the bond issue for the nursing home and special hospital.

The present plans will provide Farwell with one of the most up to date nursing home facilities in the state of Texas. It will meet a long standing need of the more elderly people right here at home.

It will certainly add to the economic well-being of the community by providing employment for 20 to 30 persons with a wide range of skills and talents. It will be a strong drawing card for young physicians who are considering a rural practice. Goodness knows we need a doctor.

And all of these benefits can be enjoyed by the community with little or no additional taxation on anybody. There are very few "goodies" that come to a town that don't cost additional taxes. Here is one that, by the efforts of the Farwell Industrial Commission, will be virtually tax free to the area.

This, of course, will be accomplished by a long term lease agreement with Convalescent Homes, Inc., a corporation which operates nursing homes. This lease will be in an annual amount sufficient to defray bond payments and interest. The lease agreement will be an accomplished fact before the bonds are offered for sale and any bonded indebtedness is incurred.

This is a step in the Farwell planning that has apparently escaped some of our weekly readers in other parts of the county. The planning for the Farwell nursing home has been almost two years in the making. It is not a "hurried up" proposal in a community attempt to play "catch up" - and this lease proposal has always been central to the thinking of those charged with the project.

Would that other taxing bodies were as cautious with the public money as our local leaders in their long range thinking!

## Truck Driver Death Is Apparent Suicide

A Fort Morgan, Colo., man, Charles Schreiner, 36, was found shot to death, apparently the victim of a self-inflicted gunshot wound, at approximately 10:30 a.m. Tuesday, May 27, in the sleeper of his truck which was parked at Worley Mills, Inc. in Farwell.

At an unknown hour Monday night or Tuesday morning, Schreiner drove his tractor-trailer rig, belonging to Kula Grain Company of Ft. Morgan, onto the lot at Worley.

According to a spokesman for the local grain company, it is not unusual for drivers, after long hours on the road, to park their rig at their destination, crawl into the sleeper and sleep until awakened by someone.

Grain company employees arrived at the elevator at about 7:40 Tuesday morning for work and noticed the rig on the lot. An attempt was made to rouse the driver by knocking on the window but no response was received.

It is reported that employees of the company tried at intervals to waken the driver and finally determined that he was not in the truck. It is a policy of workers not to try to gain entry to a cab or sleeper compartment of a rig.

At approximately 10:30, Myrne Marshall of Brush, Colo., also an employee of Kula Grain Co., arrived at Worley. Both Schreiner and Marshall were to load their trucks in Farwell and transport the grain to Phoenix, Ariz.

After learning that local personnel were unable to get a response from inside the rig, Marshall opened the door to the sleeper compartment and discovered Schreiner's body.

Parmer County Sheriff Charlie Lovelace and Deputy Tom Atkins were called to the scene to investigate the incident. Texas Department of Public Safety officer Royce Keck was also present. Justice of the Peace Ray Mears pronounced Schreiner dead at the scene and ruled that death was an apparent suicide.

In making his report, Sheriff Lovelace commented that Schreiner had been shot through the right temple with a .32 calibre pistol. The weapon was still in the victim's hand when he was discovered.

Schreiner's body was removed from the sleeper and taken to Parsons-Ellis Funeral Home in Friona. Following notification of the victim's family, the body was transferred to Ft. Morgan.

## Farwell Chamber Discusses Hospital District, Housing

During a regular session of the Farwell Chamber of Commerce conducted Tuesday, May 27, the main item of business was the hospital district and the upcoming election.

Chamber member Don Williams led the discussion on the hospital district and began by stating that an election has been scheduled for June 24 to create the district and to vote

on a bond election to construct the nursing home for Farwell.

He further related that an oral lease agreement has been approved with Don Brewer, president of Convalescent Homes, Inc. in Austin. Brewer has agreed to leasing the local facility on a 20-year basis during which the corporation will be operating the nursing home. The 20-year lease to the organization will serve to pay off any

indebtedness incurred with the sale of bonds for the home.

A question and answer period was conducted with the Chamber members raising several questions including an inquiry as to whether the 20-year lease will be a binding lease or one which has an out if the facility is run improperly.

Williams stated that he did not feel as if the district will have the problem of the

facility being run improperly. He explained that the temporary board of directors for the district feels that the lease should be "as binding as possible to a point in the event that something should arise as to the actual operating of the nursing home."

In regard to maintenance of

the home, it was explained that Brewer and his personnel will have complete responsibility in this area.

A question was raised as to other reasons for the hospital district beyond building the nursing home. "We figure that at some future date we (the district's residents) may be in

a hospital district and will be taxed for a hospital which is not in our area. The hospital district will be for our own protection."

It was pointed out that if the hospital district is formed, something must be done. "To form a district alone is not sufficient."

McMillan has lived in Lubbock for the past 20 years but will be moving to Farwell as

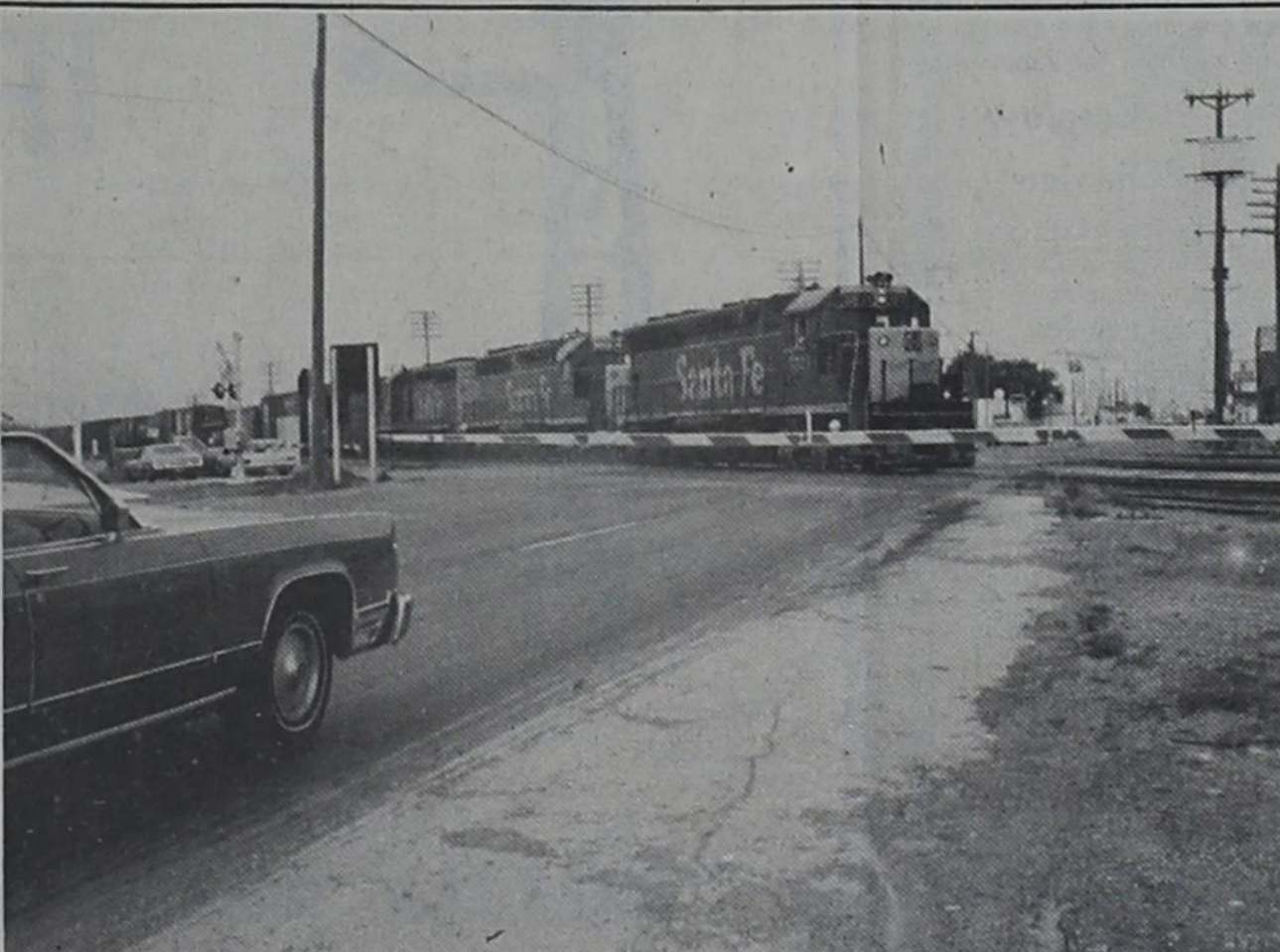
Sandra, also very active in her church, is going to Mis-

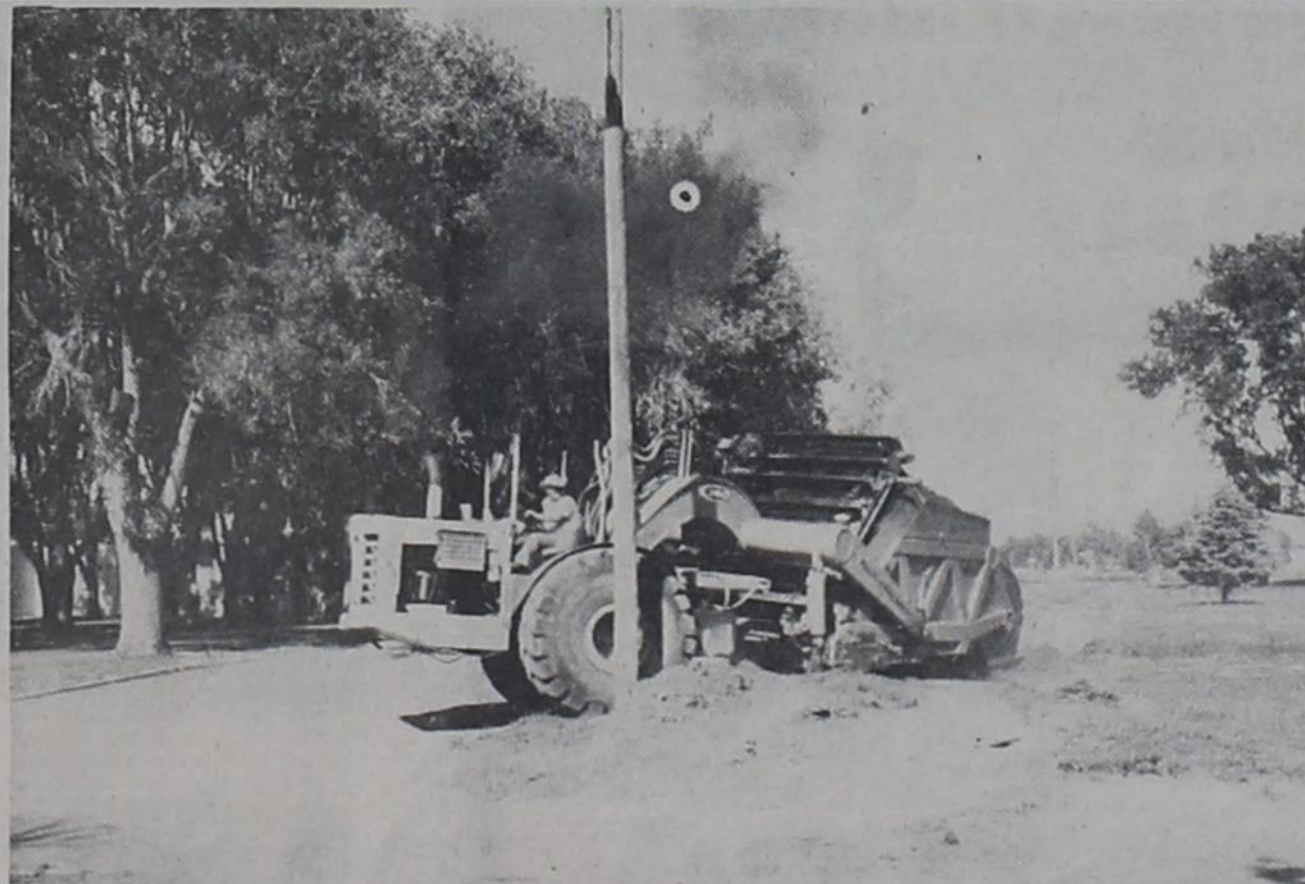
Melinda attended kindergarten this past year and is looking forward to beginning school as a first grader this fall.

# Border Town Days Activities Slated

Members of the Border Town Days Committee met Thursday, May 22, to plan and discuss upcoming activities for the July 24, 25 and 26 celebration.

It was reported that tickets are expected to be on sale today (Friday), May 30. According to a spokesman for the committee, tickets were ordered last week and were to be printed this week.

Advance tickets are to be sold for \$5 for adults and \$3.50 for

children when combination tickets are purchased. The combination ticket will include admission to the three scheduled rodeo performances and the annual barbecue. Single tickets for the rodeo are to be priced at \$2 for adults and \$1 for children for each of the three performances. Children age seven years or under will be admitted free of charge.

Single barbecue tickets will be priced at \$2 for adults and \$1 for children 12 and under.

Anyone wishing to purchase advance tickets may do so by contacting any member of any service club in the Twin Cities.

The following clubs and organizations in Texico and Farwell are each responsible for the sale of 50 tickets: Farwell Arena Association, Texico-Farwell Rotary Club, Farwell Chamber of Commerce, Texico Woman's Club, Farwell Study Club, Texico Fire Department, Farwell Fire Department, Texico Chamber of Commerce, Texico Riding Club, Texico-Farwell Lions Club, Epsilon Sigma Alpha and the Texico Kiwanis Club.

A proposed schedule for Thursday, July 24, kick-off day for the 1975 Border Town Days celebration, was discussed and approved by those present.

The schedule includes plans for the annual parade to begin at 2 p.m. CDT with the barbecue set at 4:30 and the first performance of the AJRA-sanctioned rodeo will begin at 8 p.m.

According to committee member Tommie Snodgrass, times for the July 24 events have been set up from previous years to allow those attending the various Thursday functions to view the parade, eat at the barbecue and attend the first performance of the rodeo without "being pressed for time."

It was reported that there is no deadline as yet for entries in the parade. All civic clubs and organizations, business firms and individuals are urged to submit an entry in the parade to make it bigger and better than all previous parades.

The parade will follow the same route as it has in the past and will be led by 1975 Parade Marshal Fred Chandler. Three parade trophies will be awarded by judges as will a trophy to the club or organization selling the greatest number of tickets for the scheduled activities.

Those persons attending the barbecue, which will be conducted at the Farwell City Park, will be able to enjoy a meal of barbecued beef, potato salad, red beans, fruit, bread, tea or coffee. The meal is to be served under the supervision of

vice can be used to send EKG information to heart specialists in Lubbock.

According to Chamber members, as soon as a doctor is available for Farwell, the machine will then be made ready for use by the doctor and in the clinic or hospital.

It was pointed out that the nursing home in Farwell will create jobs for both residents and persons interested in moving to the city. The creation of jobs will also spur the need for the creation of adequate housing facilities in Farwell.

efficient. We must have something to show for our active work," stated an attendant of the meeting, who questioned, "how long will we (the district) have to do something to remain a district?"

Williams responded that with the clinic in Farwell the district will be within the law. It was further explained that although Farwell already has a clinic the idea of creating the hospital district is not to just sit. "When the district is created, it will be created for a purpose. And that purpose is to give medical aid to residents of the district," Williams said.

It was stated that the temporary board of directors will "hopefully" have a completed lease agreement with Brewer prior to the June 24 election to give residents within the district an idea as to the financial and operational arrangements proposed.

"Why build a 98-bed nursing home?" was the next question put before Williams. He responded that the district is working with an expert in the matter. "Brewer feels that a 60-bed unit will not pay off and a 98-bed unit will." The building of a 98-bed unit was further clarified when it was related that Brewer has said he wants a 98-bed facility and is willing to pay for it and take the responsibility of it.

We invested 55 minutes of our time in obtaining the picture of the new gate crossing - and then two trains, one from each direction, came through at the same moment.

While we were waiting, Joe Blair stopped to tell us that his daddy had to open a wire gate in 1903 to get from Texas into New Mexico near this same crossing. Seventy-two years later, the gates are up again.

A plan is open to residents of the area to secure a doctor for Farwell through National Health Service Corps. It was reported that Sam Harris of Dallas, who is in charge of NHSC, feels that approval would be given for a NHSC clinic in Farwell.

Under the arrangements of the clinic, two physicians and one dentist can be brought to Farwell. Harris commented that Parmer County is an area in critical need of a dentist.

NHSC is a program designed to encourage physicians to stay in small towns. In conducting the program, NHSC helps students through medical school. After the student graduates, he is then indebted to NHSC for two years of work. The organization then places the accredited physicians in towns needing their services.

Proceeds from the clinic or hospital are used to pay the doctors with a portion of the remaining proceeds going back to the community. The community then uses this money for additional equipment, facilities and support of its facility.

After a doctor's "debt" has been paid to NHSC, and if they elect to leave the area, another doctor is automatically assigned to fill the vacancy without the community having to re-apply for a doctor.

Should Farwell apply to NHSC, the community would be responsible for furnishing the major portion of equipment and personnel used.

The NHSC arrangement is to be discussed with the hospital district directors during their next meeting. It was voted that the Chamber will pursue the issue and complete several required forms to obtain further information from NHSC.

Agriculture has moved to New York. Right into Wall Street. Stock exchange members, investment counselors and stock brokers are talking about wheat. That's right, not commodity brokers but stock brokers. Specific nature of this conversation is taking the form of advice to their favorite investors. Advice about watching the big seed companies to see which of them breaks through with a super-hybrid wheat. So far the 200 bushel per acre hybrid has proved elusive for developers but it's difficult now to review a current agri-business corporate report without reading of the possibilities.

Many of the Green Revolution's observers say the 200 bushel per acre target is still out of sight and probably cannot be developed until interim hybrid varieties are completed and stabilized. Implications are nearly staggering since potential production for the United States alone could approach nine billion bushels.

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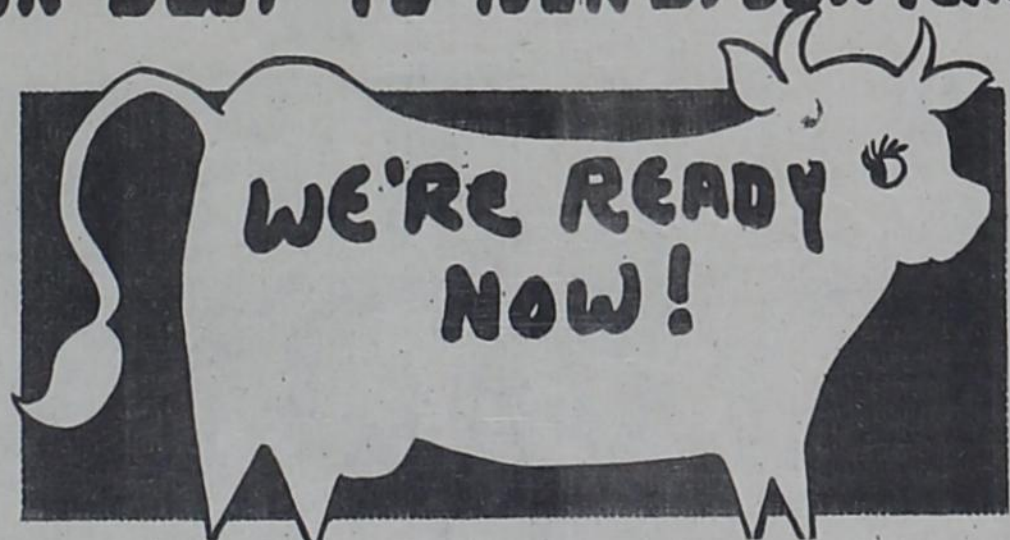

# Street Lighting Contract Renewed By City Trustees

The Farwell City Commission renewed its 10-year street lighting contract with Southwestern Public Service Company during its regular meeting held at city hall Tuesday, May 27.

Otis Huggins, representing Southwestern Public Service Co., presented the contract for the commission's consideration. He pointed out that the new rate would be \$249.70 per month while the previous rate was in the amount of \$217.50 per month. The new rate schedule shows an increase of 14.8 percent and includes a fuel cost adjustment. The new rate goes into effect on June 24, 1975.

Under the contract which was approved by the city dads and signed by Mayor Gil Patschke, Southwestern Public Service Co. will take care of replacement of lamps, normal maintenance of the fixtures, wires, transformers and all other component parts of the street lighting system. There are a total of 96 lamps in the city of Farwell. Seventy-nine are in the residential area and 17 placed up and down the main street.

Under the agreements of the contract, either party, the city of Farwell or Southwestern Public Service Co., can renegotiate the new contract after a period of three years, upon written notice, six months prior to the action.

Mayor Patschke requested a resolution be drawn up appointing Fred Chandler as a representative to the Panhandle Regional Planning Commission. Representatives to the PRPC must be elected officials of the city they represent. Patschke and Chandler will represent Farwell.

Much discussion followed concerning the water main located on Block 19 in the city of Farwell. This is the block tentatively proposed for the new nursing home. The discussion centered around whether or not it would cost the city less to move the water main from the center of the block to one side, or block it off and put in a new line at the location needed. No action was taken, but it was suggested that the matter be looked into further, before any decision is made.

A 20-year-old pump that is apparently fixing to go out was also the topic of discussion during the meeting Tuesday. It was pointed out that the pump would have to be pulled whether it is repaired or replaced and the city dads would need to know just what repairs would be necessary and have a cost estimate before any decision can be made in this matter.

City Marshal Ronald Mitchell was on hand to discuss the possibility of PRPC participation for uniform traffic signing for the city of Farwell. After Marshal Mitchell pointed out what has recently been done in the city of Bovina in the way of signing, the marshal was asked to contact the PRPC authorities for more information. Marshal Mitchell pointed out that under the

PRPC program there are certain height regulations for the traffic signs and that the material from which they are constructed is a much better grade than the signs presently in the city.

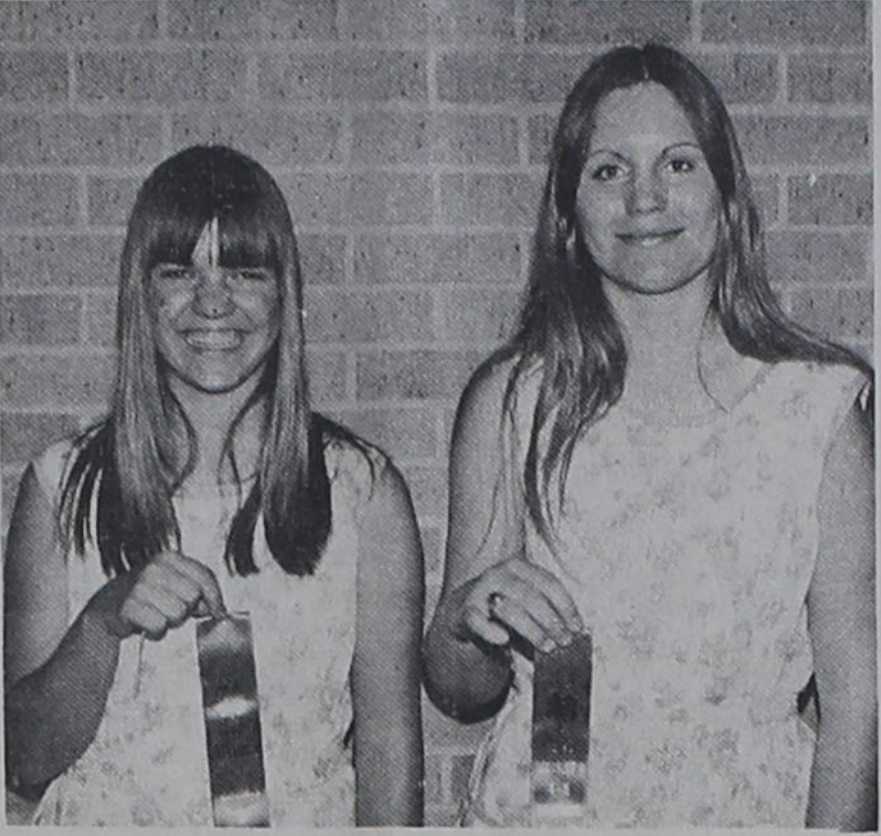
It was also noted during the discussion about the signing, that there were some places within the city that pose a traffic hazard because trees and other vegetation prevent motorists from seeing stop signs at some intersections. It was suggested that Marshal Mitchell and D.E. Hammit tour the city and determine at what height vegetation near street corners should be so as not to cause such a hazard.

City Attorney Charles Aycock gave a paving report, stating the city was in "pretty good shape", with only a few delinquent paving liens not

collected as yet. He was authorized by the city dads to file suit against one Farwell citizen if his paving lien is not paid by July 5.

Mayor Patschke was asked to instruct the city secretary to contact pest control companies so the termite problem at city hall could be taken care of.

At the conclusion of the meeting, Marshal Mitchell was urged to talk with persons who have abandoned refrigerators on their property, asking them to either remove the locks or the doors to prevent them from becoming a death trap for some unsuspecting youngster. Mayor Patschke pointed out that every year one hears of some youngster who had suffocated after playfully climbing into a refrigerator or freezer and is unable to get out.

## Renew Insurance - - Co. Commissioners Approve Summer Work Program

Members of the Parmer County Commissioners Court convened for a regular session Tuesday, May 27, during which routine business was conducted and an employment resolution adopted.

A discussion was held concerning the summer employment program and Carol Bavousette. It had been noted by the Court that Carol is interested in law and plans to study law in college.

After visitation with the county attorney, Commissioners decided the applicant's abilities can be utilized by the attorney, the county judge and possibly the county clerk in the summer employment program. It was pointed out that cost to the county will be approximately 20 percent of her salary.

Commissioners then voted that Parmer County will be the employing station for Carol Bavousette for the summer work program and that the portion of her salary required of the county be paid.

Commissioners gave their approval of the Revenue Sharing Planned Use Report and the report was forwarded to the office of Revenue Sharing.

During the session, Commissioners Jimmy Briggs and Cecil Atchley were designated as official representatives to the Panhandle Regional Planning Commission.

The county officials decided that the county will be responsible for paying the expenses of Jana Pronger and gasoline bills for all vehicles necessary to transport county 4-H'ers to the State 4-H Roundup next week at College Station.

Bicentennial coins and the construction of a historical display case were then discussed by the Court. It was agreed that Hugh Moseley be authorized to have a historical display case constructed over the closed door to the county clerk's office. Cost of the construction was set at \$250.

County hospitalization policies with Blue Cross/Blue Shield were reviewed. Larry

Berry, BC/BS representative, presented a proposed increase in monthly rates and explained to the Court that due to the payouts being so great, even more than the intakes, it is felt that an increase in rates is necessary.

Following much discussion, Commissioners voted that the rates presented by BC/BS be approved and that coverage offered with the company be continued.

The possibility of Charles Cerf sub-leasing certain portions of Parmer County school land in Gaines County from the Magnolia company was dis-

cussed. These lands are currently covered by a certain lease dated in early 1953 from Parmer County to Ben Harwit.

Cerf proposes to drill on certain portions of this land, hoping for production, and he requested that the Court ratify the lease. After much discussion it was mutually agreed that any decision would be made at the next meeting of the Court.

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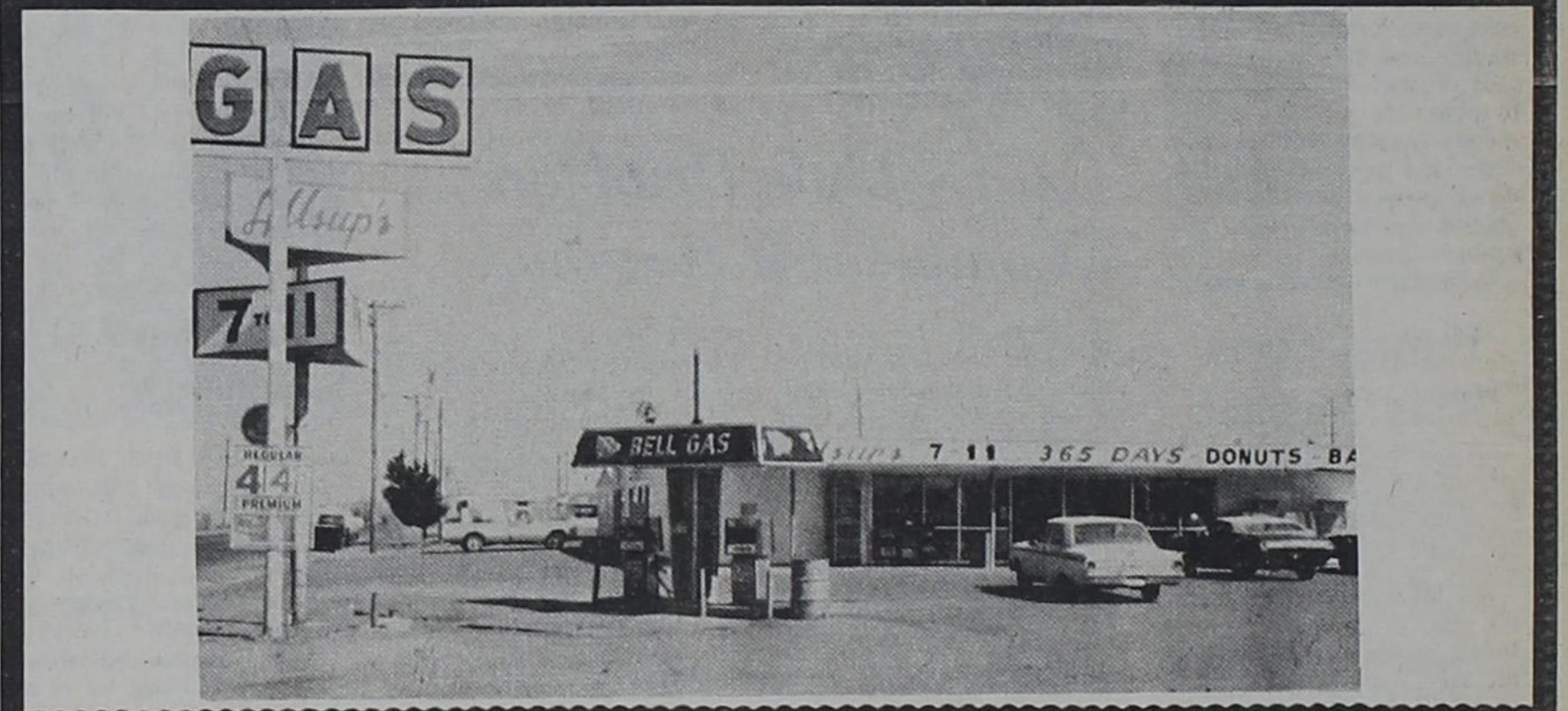

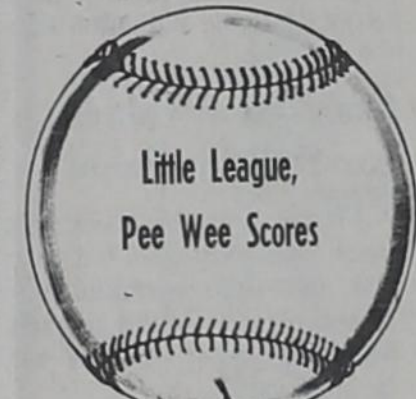

ORDER FOR ELECTION FOR CREATION OF HOSPITAL DISTRICT AND THE ISSUANCE OF BONDS

THE STATE OF TEXAS COUNTY OF PARMER

WHEREAS, under the provisions of S.B. No. 235, Acts of the 64th Legislature, Regular Session, 1975, provision is made for an election to be held within the area of the proposed FARWELL HOSPITAL DISTRICT upon the question of whether the FARWELL HOSPITAL DISTRICT shall be created and established with authority to levy annual taxes, and whether said District (in the event same is created) shall be authorized to issue bonds for the purpose hereinafter set forth, and, in accordance with said law, it has been and is hereby determined that such election should be ordered; therefore,

BE IT ORDERED BY THE TEMPORARY BOARD OF DIRECTORS OF THE FARWELL HOSPITAL DISTRICT: SECTION 1: That an election be held on the 24th day of June, 1975, which date is not less than thirty-five (35) nor more than sixty (60) days from the date of this order, at which election there shall be submitted to the resident qualified electors of the area of the proposed Hospital District, the following propositions:

PROPOSITION NUMBER 1 "SHALL THE FARWELL HOSPITAL DISTRICT (with boundaries encompassing all territory in Parmer County which is situated in the Farwell Independent School District - as such boundaries existed on January 1, 1975) be created and established with authority to levy taxes at a rate not to exceed 75 cents on each \$100 valuation of all taxable property within such District subject to hospital district taxation for the purpose of meeting the requirements of the District's indebtedness and its maintenance and operating expenses?"

PROPOSITION NUMBER 2 "THE ISSUANCE OF \$750,000 BONDS"

PROPOSITION NUMBER 2

"SHALL the Board of Directors of the FARWELL HOSPITAL DISTRICT (in the event the District is created) be authorized and empowered to issue the bonds of said District to the amount of SEVEN HUNDRED FIFTY THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$750,000) for the purchase, construction, acquisition, repair, or renovation of buildings and improvements and equipping the same for hospital purposes, and for any or all of such purposes, and shall there be levied, assessed and collected annually ad valorem taxes on all taxable property in the District, subject to Hospital District taxation, sufficient to pay the principal of and interest on said bonds as the same become due (providing such tax, together with all other taxes of the District shall not exceed in any one year the rate of 75 cents on each \$100 valuation), said bonds to be issued in one or more series or issues to mature serially or otherwise not more than FORTY (40) years from their date, and to bear interest at such rate or rates as in its discretion the Board of Directors shall determine?"

SECTION 2: That the official ballots for said election shall be prepared in accordance with V.A.T.S. Election Code, so as to permit the electors to vote "FOR" or "AGAINST" the aforesaid propositions which shall be set forth in substantially the following form:

PROPOSITION NUMBER 1 "THE CREATION OF FARWELL HOSPITAL DISTRICT, PROVIDING FOR THE LEVY OF A TAX NOT TO EXCEED 75 CENTS ON EACH \$100 VALUATION FOR ALL HOSPITAL DISTRICT PURPOSES."

PROPOSITION NUMBER 2 "THE ISSUANCE OF \$750,000 BONDS"

The word "FOR" and beneath it the word "AGAINST" shall be made to appear on the left of each of the propositions. A square shall be printed on the left of each of the words "FOR" and "AGAINST", and each elector shall place an "X" in the square beside the statement indicating the way he wishes to vote.

SECTION 3: That said election shall be held on the 24th day of June, 1975, in the County Courtroom of the County Courthouse in Farwell, Texas, and the entire District shall constitute one election precinct for said election.

SECTION 4: That the following named persons are hereby appointed officers of the election:

If the regularly appointed Presiding Judge is unable to serve at the election, the Alternate Presiding Judge therefor shall serve as Presiding Judge. The Presiding Judge shall appoint at least six (6) Clerks (one of whom shall be the Alternate Presiding Judge if the election is conducted by the regularly appointed Presiding Judge) and not more than six (6) additional Clerks, as he deems necessary for the proper conduct of the election.

On election day the polls shall be open from 8:00 A.M. to 7:00 P.M.

JANIE BOWERY is hereby appointed as the Clerk for absentee voting for said election, and the City Hall, Farwell, Texas, in said District, is hereby designated as the place at which absentee voting shall be conducted for said election. For the period absentee voting is permitted by law, the hours designated for absentee voting shall be from 8:00 A.M. to 5:00 P.M. on each day except Saturdays, Sundays and official State holidays.

The Secretary of this Board shall cause notice of the election to be given in accordance with this order.

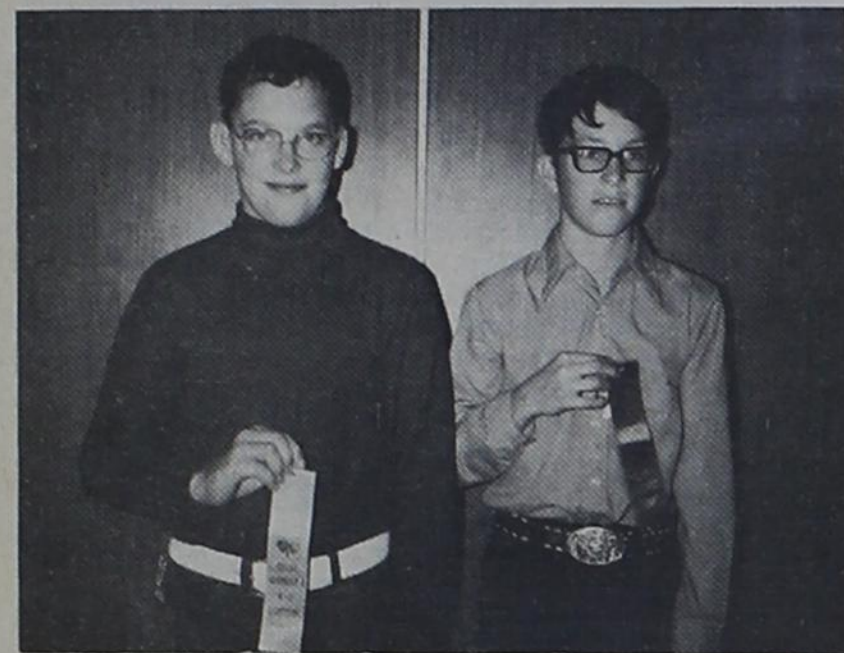

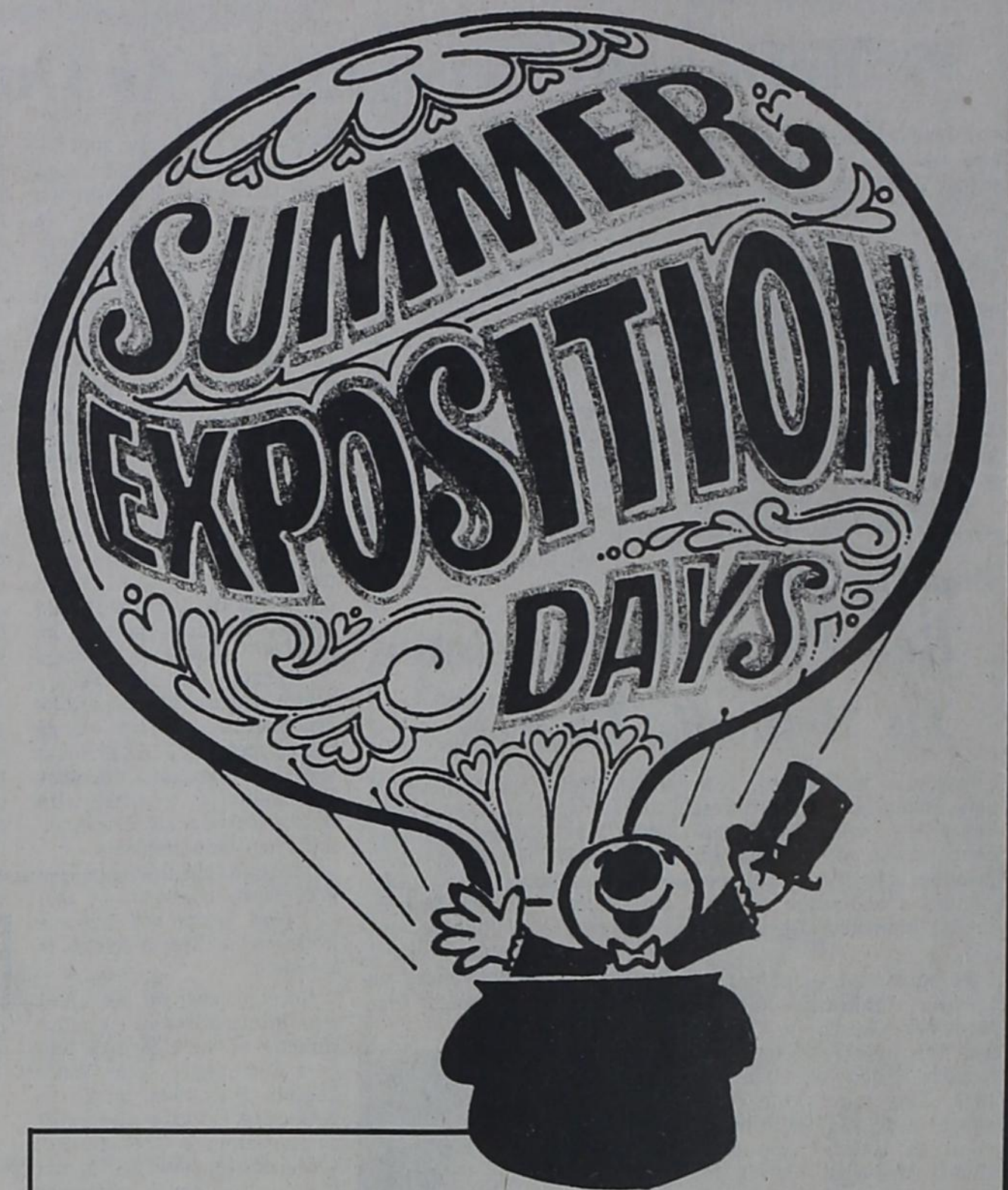

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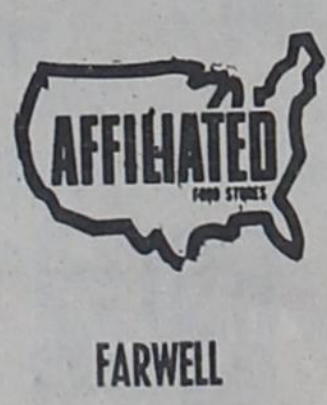
