This is a banner week in the Twin Cities. We start the annual fall "Merchants Madness" with the opening gun of the Merchants Football Contest. On the back page of this issue is an entry blank with ten games from which to pick the winners, plus a tiebreaker in which the score must be entered.

This seems like an easy thing to accomplish, but all too often "ole man upset" has a hand in the final outcomes. It is no secret that this column has supported the one cent levy, and we intend to go and do so with a vote Saturday.

Again let us emphasize that the additional tax will be collected on the same items and in the same manner that the present Texas tax operates.

Local merchants will not have any additional bookkeeping chores as the tax will be reported and remitted the same as the present Texas system. The State of Texas will deduct a very small fee for administration and remit the balance to the City each month. A simple and neat tax system for a change.

This additional revenue will help the City Dads in their fight to provide more city services without driving property taxes through the roof. Nobody likes to pay taxes but here is one tax everyone will help pay, not something saddled on the overburdened property owner.

Let's pass this tax without a dissenting vote and then we can put up a sign that says, "Farwell, the home of 1,500 friendly people and NO sore-heads."

Also this week, the two local high school games are to be played away from home. Texico Wolverines play in Hagerman and the Farwell Steers in Friona. There ought to be so many fans follow their teams that Marshals Willie and Ronnie will think that they are the only two people left around.

# Contest Is Underway

NFL, AFL, football's on the way. And so is the 17th Annual Area Merchants Football Contest which kicks off with this issue of the State Line Tribune.

Each week for the next 12 weeks three lucky persons will be awarded first, second and third place prize money for their efforts in the weekly competition with their eyes on the Grand Prize and Second Prize to be awarded at the end of the 12 weeks of the annual event.

Grand Prize will be two tickets to the Cotton Bowl

Game New Year's Day, 1976, and \$50 expense money. Second Prize consists of two tickets to the Sun Bowl in El Paso in December and \$25 in expense money. Weekly winners are to receive \$5 for first place, \$3 for second, and \$1 for third.

Ten high school, college or professional games are to be listed each week in the Tribune. All entrants must do is pick the team they believe will win in each game and circle or otherwise indicate their choice of the winner. A score must be selected for the

Game of the Week and placed in the appropriate blank on the entry form. Games of the Week, or tie-breakers, will be used to determine the weekly winners in case of a tie. This game does not count in the won-lost standing. The point spread method is to be used in calculations.

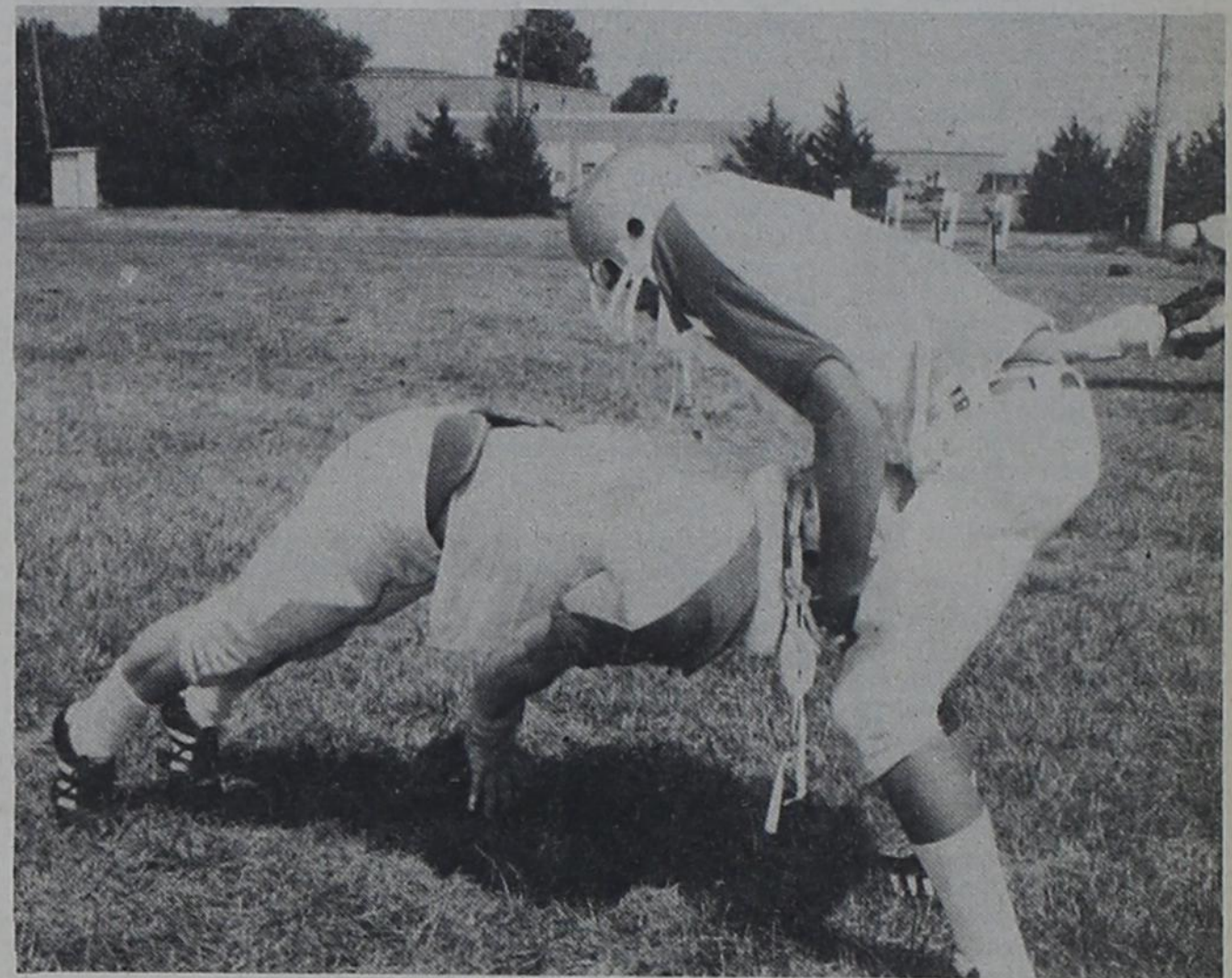
It is possible for the entrant to predict the winner of the Game of the Week incorrectly, but still win the weekly money by being closer in the point spread. Should a tie occur at the end of the contest, the point spread will be figured

for the entire 12 weeks and the entrant with the smallest point spread will be the winner.

In order to participate in the game, one must be 12 years of age or older. Entries must be brought to the Tribune office by 5 p.m. each Friday or, if mailed, the entries must bear a Friday postmark. Only one entry blank will be accepted from any individual each week. Tabulation will be kept all season and will be available for public inspection.

# City Sales Tax Election Tomorrow

Saturday, tomorrow Sept. 6, is the day Farwell voters will go to the poles to express their opinion on a one percent city sales tax.

During the July 28 meeting of the Farwell City Council,

Commissioners okayed an order calling for the tax election and set the dates for absentee balloting and the election.

The election will be held at City Hall in Farwell between the hours of 8 a.m. and 5 p.m.

tomorrow. Kay Hagler will serve as presiding judge with Wanda Walker serving as alternate judge.

It has been pointed out by Commissioners that unless the sales tax proposition passes

and the city derives revenue in this manner, the property tax rate may have to be raised in order to meet expenses.

The proposed tax is to be paid by all persons patronizing establishments within the city. In this manner, everyone will be responsible for contributing to city funds. The one percent sales tax will be levied in conformation with the state sales tax structure. Tax exemptions will also conform to state sales tax levying.

The additional revenue raised through the city sales tax will, in all probability, alleviate the burden of higher taxes on city property owners.

During the city sales and use tax election, voters may cast ballots on one of two propositions. The first proposition is "FOR adoption of a one percent local sales and use tax within the City" with the second proposition being "AGAINST adoption of a one percent local sales and use tax within the City."

Every eligible voter is encouraged to go to the polls and exercise his right to vote.

Big, strong and fast are the words used by Texico Head Coach Ray Manly in describing the Wolverines first opponents of the 1975-76 football season. The Wolverines will be traveling to Hagerman tonight (Friday), Sept. 5, where they will tangle with the Bobcats

with game time set for 7:30 p.m. MDT.

"The Bobcats have one player, Victor Morales, who does the 100 in 10 flat or 10:01 and is consistent with that time," stated Manly. "We know Morales is fast and will be watching him."

The coach commented that the Bobcats are a pretty sound team. "Their offensive and defensive line teams are veterans but their backfield is their weakest point. They will definitely be real tough competitors."

In noting advantages of the Wolverines over the Bobcats, Manly commented that Texico is looking at a "slightly quicker" advantage.

Hagerman was the State Class A Champion last year and Manly stated, "I think we can take the Bobcats if we play ball like we know we are capable of playing."

The coach commented that there are no major changes in the Wolverine line-up for tonight's game. "We're young and will have to go with being young. We'll just have to show them we're tougher than they are."

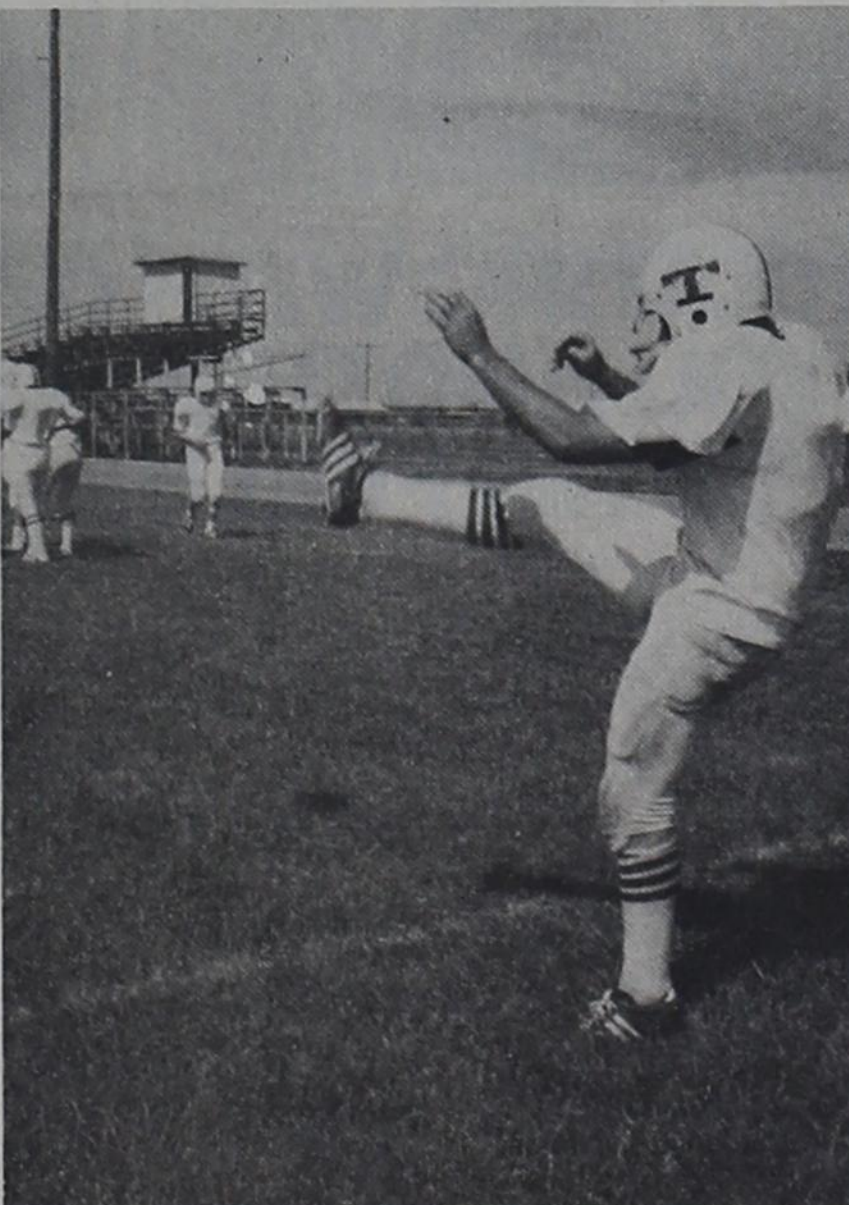
Coach Manly gave these comments on his returning lettermen and other players. Returning lettermen are as follows:

**JACKIE REID** - Junior, 125 lbs. playing quarterback right now and also defensive half-back. We look for a good year from Jackie.

**SPENCER TURNER** - Senior, weighing 150, and playing the position of runningback. We look forward to his ball carrying ability to help the team. Last year he was one of the defensive stalwarts and he has improved this year. We look for a good year from Spencer.

**TOMMY GALVAN** - Senior, 140 lbs., is playing halfback this year. In the two games last year, he had a rushing average of 110 yards per game until he got injured. We look

**ROBBIE BRADLEY** - Senior, 200 lbs., is bigger, stronger, and faster than last year. We expect a real fine year from Robbie, both offensively and defensively. He plays the position of center.

**LARRY ROLAN** - Junior, 175 lbs., moved from guard to tackle this year and he's doing a real fine job. He's a fine worker and puts forth a good effort.

**CHRIS ESHLEMAN** - Junior, weighing in at 140, is one of the quickest players off the line. He gives 100 percent whenever he plays, which is very important while playing the position of guard.

**RICHARD HADLEY** - Junior, 200 lbs., is a fine blocker and tackler. We expect a fine year out of him. He is an extremely good player.

**TED RICHARDSON** - Sophomore, 170, is coming off a back injury right now and is a little slow in progressing. But before the year is over, we expect Ted to do a real good job for us.

**MARK HOWARD** - Junior, weighs 160, plays the end position and is a fine blocker, pass receiver, and defensive player. His over-all hustle is much greater than last year.

**STEVE CHRISTIAN** - Junior, 175, is down sick right now and will not play for a while. He is a good pass receiver and has a fine set of hands.

Starters, who are not returning lettermen, include:

**STEVE TURNER** - Sophomore quarterback, weighing 165. We expect a good job from Steve. He's young and a little inexperienced, but has two good scrimmages under his belt and we think he'll do a good job before the year is over.

**JUSTIN GADDIS** - Sophomore, 185, started on defense as a cornerback and does a real fine job there.

**JOHN BURGETTE** - Junior, weighs 150, and is a real hard worker. He plays guard and tackle and puts forth a good effort all the time he's playing.

**BARRY LINDLEY** - Senior, 155, starting end and defensive gap man. Barry has two scrimmages to his credit and he did extremely well. We look for him to be a standout on defense.

**STEPHEN ASHLEY** - Senior, 150, a wide receiver with excellent hands and good speed. Has a real nose for the football.

**HOMER ASHLEY** - Sophomore, 150, is a backup quarterback with a tremendous throwing arm.

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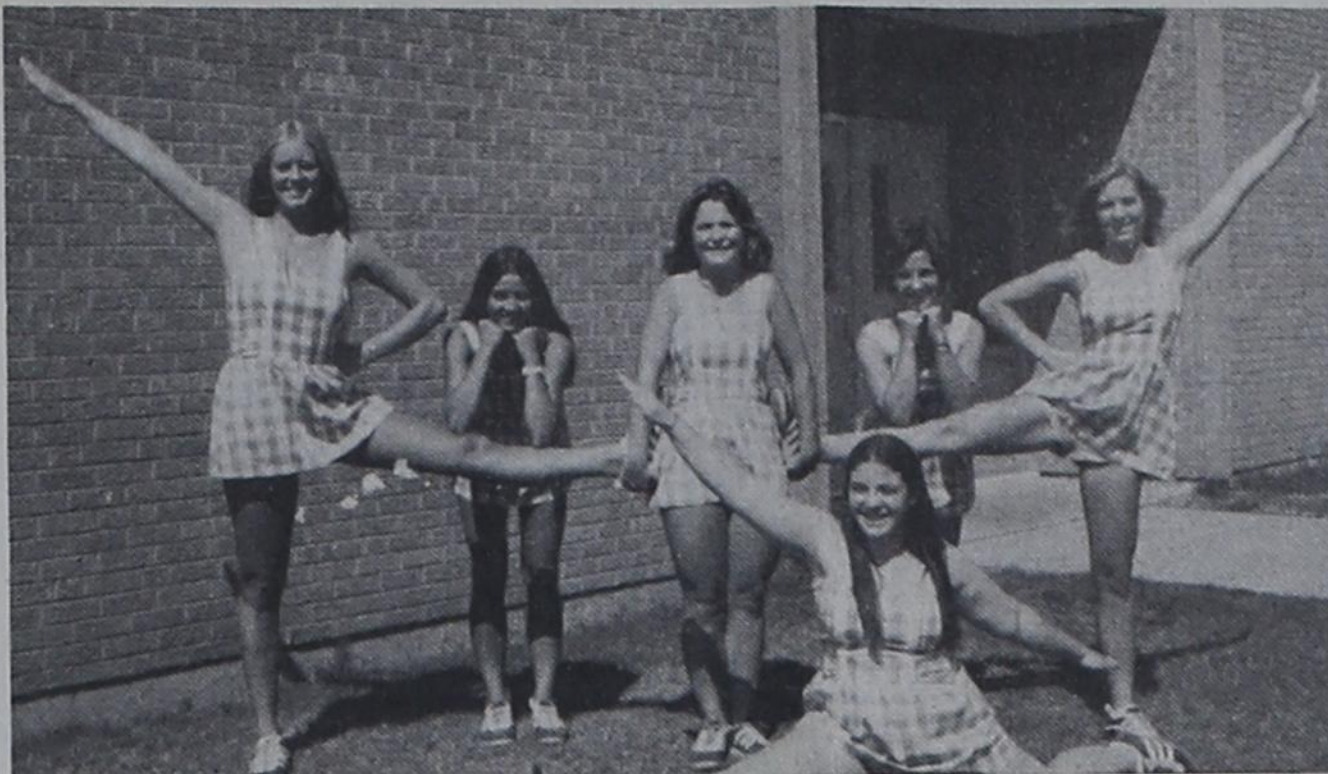

## Clayton To Meet With Residents

Bill Clayton, Speaker of the Texas House of Representatives, will be in Parmer County on Wednesday, Sept. 24, to discuss the proposed new Texas Constitution with area residents. The Speaker will meet from 5 to 5:45 p.m. in the Community Room of the Security State Bank of Farwell. Another meeting will be held with the Speaker in the Friona High School Cafeteria from 6:15 to 7 p.m.

Speaker Clayton, who is from Springlake, will comment on the proposed constitutional revisions and will answer any questions people might have on the new charter.

"I'm looking forward to talking with the people in my district about the effect the new constitution will have on us West Texans," said Speaker Clayton.

After a revised constitution failed to win majority approval by the 1974 Constitutional Convention, the 64th regular session of the legislature passed eight proposals last April completely revising the pres-

ent document. Under the leadership of Speaker Clayton and Lieutenant Governor Bill Hobby, the legislature built on the work of the Convention and agreed to give Texas voters the opportunity to vote yes or no on each of the revision proposals.

The election deciding the fate of the new constitution will be held November 4. This will be the first time since 1876 that Texas voters will have the opportunity to vote on a complete constitutional revision.

Citizens will be able to read and study the proposed constitution in full because every registered voter in the state will receive an information booklet on the constitutional revision. The booklet will contain the full text of the proposed constitution, background information, and an outline comparing the present and the proposed documents. It is being mailed the second week in September by the Secretary of State's office.



## On The Farm In Parmer County

The Annual Tri-County Beef Cattle meeting is being held in Friona on September 11 and 16. These meetings are sponsored by the program building committees in Parmer, Deaf Smith and Castro counties, Sub-area 5 PEP and the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. Two speakers will be featured each night.

On Thursday, Sept. 11, the meeting will be at the Friona High School Cafeteria starting at 8 p.m. Dr. Gene Cope, Extension Veterinarian will discuss stocker cattle health and the latest brucellosis situation. A representative of the Texas Cattle Feeders Assoc. will bring the cattle outlook before the group.

The second night will be on Tuesday, Sept. 16, at 8 p.m. in the Friona Community Center. Dr. Cal Parrott, Extension Beef Cattle Specialist, will discuss using implants on stocker cattle and stocker nutrition. The second speaker will be a stockbroker talking about cattle futures trade. These four speakers should be very interesting and bring a lot of useful information to the audience.

Screwworms! Screwworms! That's about all Texas livestock producers are hearing these days. And the situation will probably get worse in the coming weeks as peak fall build-ups occur.

The current year is shaping up as the worst in total number of confirmed screwworm cases since the disastrous 1972. Cases totaled 1,164 in June, 1,383 in July, and as of Aug. 10 the 1975 Texas total stood at 3,775. The seven-month total for 1975 was a monumental 35,428 cases.

New counties having their first 1975 screwworm cases confirmed within the past week were Burleson, Callahan, Coke, Crane, Ector, Houston, Kent, Reeves, Runnels, and Wichita, on the Texas-Oklahoma boundary.

With the sterile fly production program at the Screwworm Eradication Lab at Mission operation at maximum capacity, the main responsibility for keeping screwworm numbers under control rests on the shoulder of producers.

Herds should be checked regularly and worm samples from infested wounds should be sent in to the Mission Lab to confirm whether or not the pests are actually the flesh-eating screwworms. Once confirmation is made the area where the case was reported is bombarded with sterile flies that mate with the native screwworm flies. This result in sterile egg masses, and the screwworm's life cycle is broken.

Besides regular herd inspections, producers might postpone until cooler weather such animal surgery operations as dehorning, branding, castrating and ear-marking. The navels of newborn animals should be treated with a recommended protective smear as soon as possible, since they are the sources of a high percentage of confirmed cases.

Although this is not a severe problem for Parmer County, we had cases on native cattle confirmed in 1972. Containers are available in my office.

## Crop Irrigation Expected To Expand

Crop irrigation is expected to increase some 3 million acres in the next 15 years.

An estimated 40 million acres of cropland and pastures are now being irrigated in the western United States.

In the future, however, USDA economic researchers see irrigation coming into use for fruit and vegetable crops in Florida and for cotton and rice crops in the Mississippi Delta states.

# Georgia Joins Colonies In Resistance To British

Two hundred years ago this week the colony of Georgia joined the other 12 in the organized resistance to British authority. When Congress had recessed about a month earlier, the members decided to

reassemble on September 5, 1775.

During this interval the patriots of Georgia had worked long and hard to convince the leaders that reconciliation with Britain seemed almost impossible. Eventually, the colony

decided that it should be united with the others when and if an actual break came.

Therefore, on September 5, Georgia was fully represented for the first time at the Continental Congress even though several other colonies were late in arriving.

In fact, the Congress did not officially open until September 12 because so many delegates were late in arriving. E.C. Burnett, the most outstanding authority on the Continental Congress, says that the Congress became so chronic in lateness that effective government was sometimes difficult.

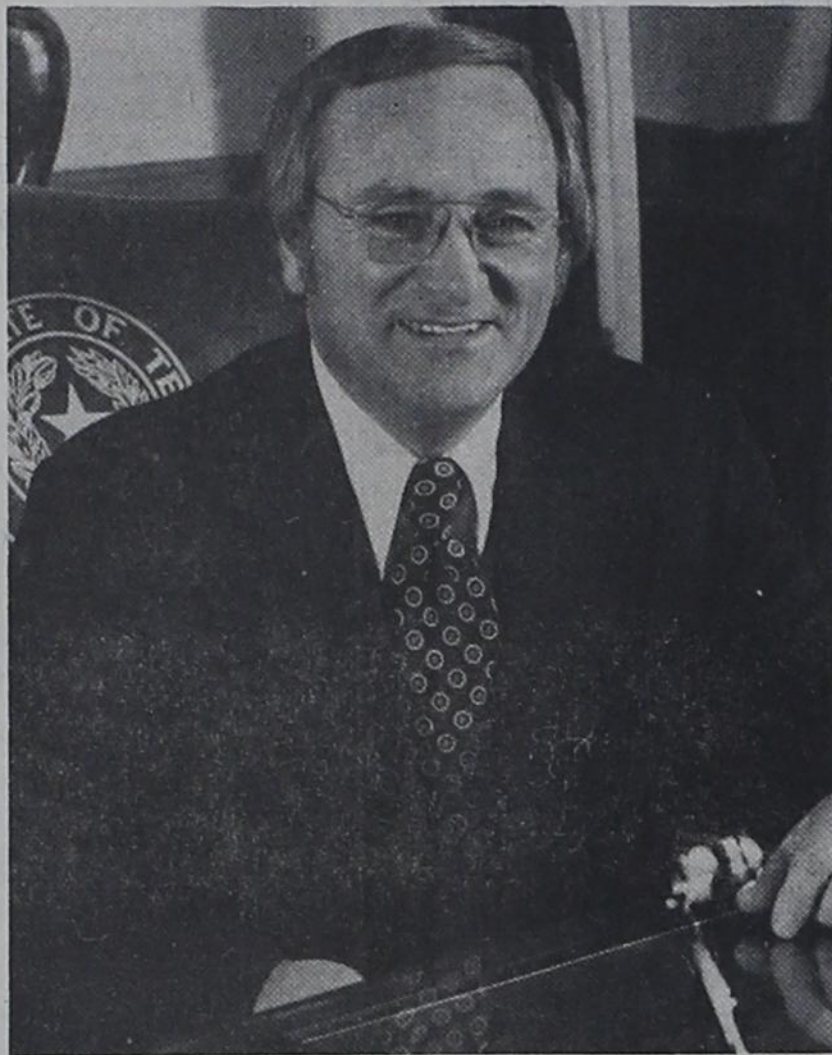
The problem of attendance at Congress was even more serious because of the rules governing representation. At that time each colony had equal representation, but each colony decided the number of members necessary for the state to vote.

For example, New Jersey sent five delegates and required that three had to be present to cast a vote. Numerous times when an important vote came up New Jersey was unable to cast a ballot because only one or two delegates were present. In fact, on many occasions Congress could not conduct its business because the minimum of nine colonies was not represented.

In the Spanish Southwest the Virginian John Peyton, a suspected French agent, and his friends were marched overland to Santa Fe. Having been captured on the Gulf coast of Texas, they were marched to Santa Fe by a group of Mexican horsemen who were given a reward for their capture. Therefore, their captors also acted as their defenders because they were valuable commodities.

Peyton later reported that they were exhibited at each village they passed through as if they were something less than human. He said that in some villages they would have been killed had it not been for their escorts when the residents discovered that they were Protestants.

Because of the reception received along the way, Peyton fully expected to be turned over to the inquisition in Santa Fe and then killed. Without doubt, they approached the New Mexican capital with much apprehension.

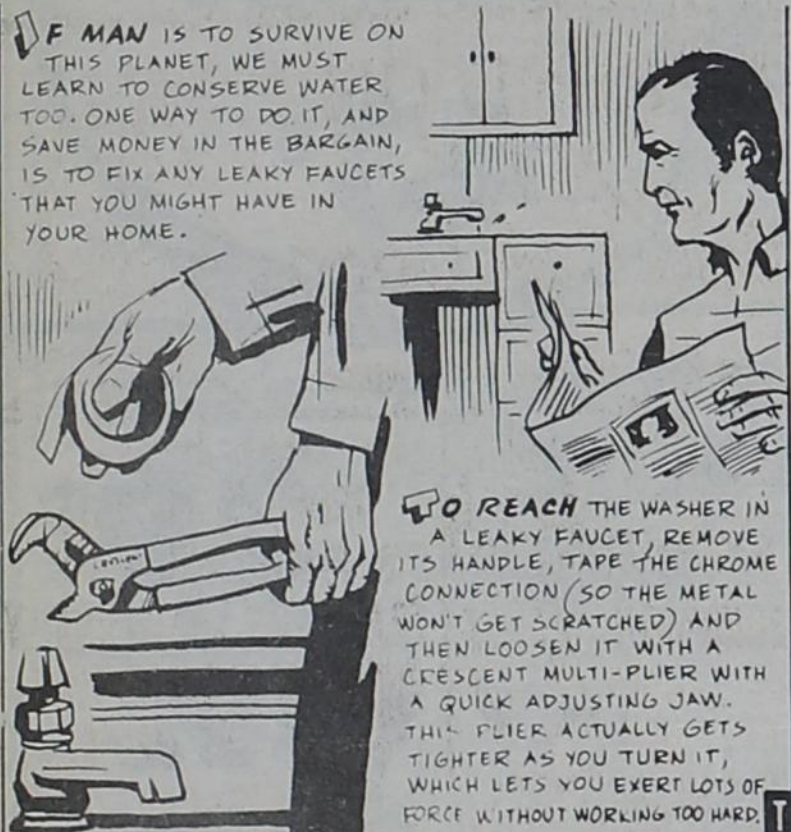

## New Warranty Law Affects Clothing

Consumers can look forward to more explicit warranties from fiber manufacturers who offer warranty programs on their products, Claudia Mitzel, consumer information-clothing and textiles specialist, reported this week.

The new law -- effective July 4, 1975 -- does not make warranties mandatory. It does set standards that manufacturers must follow if they offer warranties, the specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, the Texas A&M University System, said.

"For the consumer, clothing warranties are an excellent way of insuring a high standard of materials and workmanship. Warranties are found on many types of clothing and some household furnishings.

"If durability is important to the consumer, he should look for those items which carry warranties."

The specialist noted that one

major provision of the new law is to distinguish between "limited" and "full" warranties. A full warranty will cover all aspects of fiber, fabric and apparel performance -- whereas a limited warranty will not.

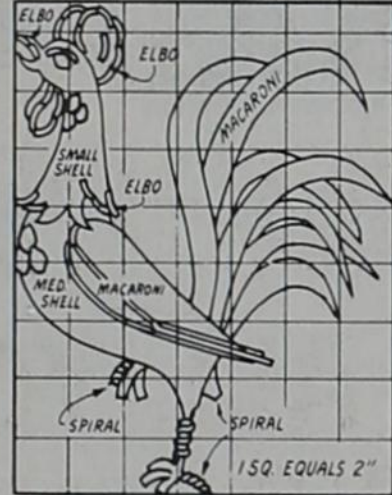
"Another requirement the law will effect is the use of the word 'guarantee.' This word will no longer appear by itself on any hangtags or advertisements. But it may be used if accompanied by the word 'warranty.'

"The tags will carry a mandatory printed warning stating 'Protect your warranty, keep this tag and your sales slip.'"

The specialist said that setting up procedures and regulations for this new law will take about a year.

## Scrap-Craft Fun with Edna

### Macaroni Rooster



To make this plaque, you may either glue the macaroni onto a heavy cardboard cutout of the rooster or onto a large piece of cardboard with the rooster drawn on it. In either case, shellac the cardboard before gluing to prevent warping. Then enlarge the drawing and trace the rooster onto the cardboard.

For the wing, cut an additional piece of cardboard, shellac and glue it in place.

Glue shell, elbo, straight macaroni (or spaghetti), and rotini (large spirals) on the rooster, as indicated in the drawing.

To make the curved tail, lay a piece of plastic over the pattern. Then soak a little macaroni at a time until it is soft and pliable. Arrange -- do not glue -- the macaroni on the plastic; the pieces will stick together as they dry.

Since the macaroni will shrink as it dries, add an extra row around the outer edges. Repeat for each feather. Let dry overnight. Then peel off the plastic and let the feathers dry on the underside for about 12 hours. If the tail portion tends to curl, dampen the back of the cardboard and dry, face down, to straighten it.

Glue the tail in place. Accent the rooster's wing and comb with extra macaroni; use a piece of shell macaroni for the eye. Paint the entire rooster in bright colors, using enamel or acrylics.

**MAJORITIES CAN BE WRONG**

When St. Paul was at Ephesus his proclamation of the gospel caused such a stir that the idol makers, who were losing money, protested until "the whole city was filled with confusion." Soon somebody started a chant: "Great is Diana of the Ephesians!" Others joined and the chorus swelled until "all with one voice, about the space of two hours, cried out, Great is Diana of the Ephesians!" (Acts 19:34) and the town clerk, referring to the religion which surrounded this pagan goddess, said confidently: "THESE THINGS CANNOT BE SPOKEN AGAINST" (Ver. 36).

But later at Rome, the apostle was informed, with reference to those who had accepted the truths he had been proclaiming: "As concerning this sect, we know that EVERYWHERE IT IS SPOKEN AGAINST" (Acts 28:22).

We wonder which side our readers would now prefer to be on: that of the superstitious multitude or that of the minority who place their faith in the Bible.

Millions worshipped the goddess Diana from a thousand years before Christ to two centuries after, but who knows her today? Where is the evidence of all the miracles she is supposed to have wrought? Her glory is little more than a memory and the religion which involved around her name is a thing of the past.

But the Bible, for all these centuries and more, has stood unchanged and unchangeable. It has weathered, not barely, but handsomely, all the storms of criticism and opposition and has proved to be indeed the Word of God. Read the Bible and especially the part meant for us today: the Epistles of Paul. Depend upon it, act upon it, and don't hesitate to stand for it, even when in the minority; for where the most vital truths are concerned, majorities have often been wrong.

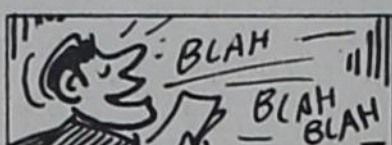

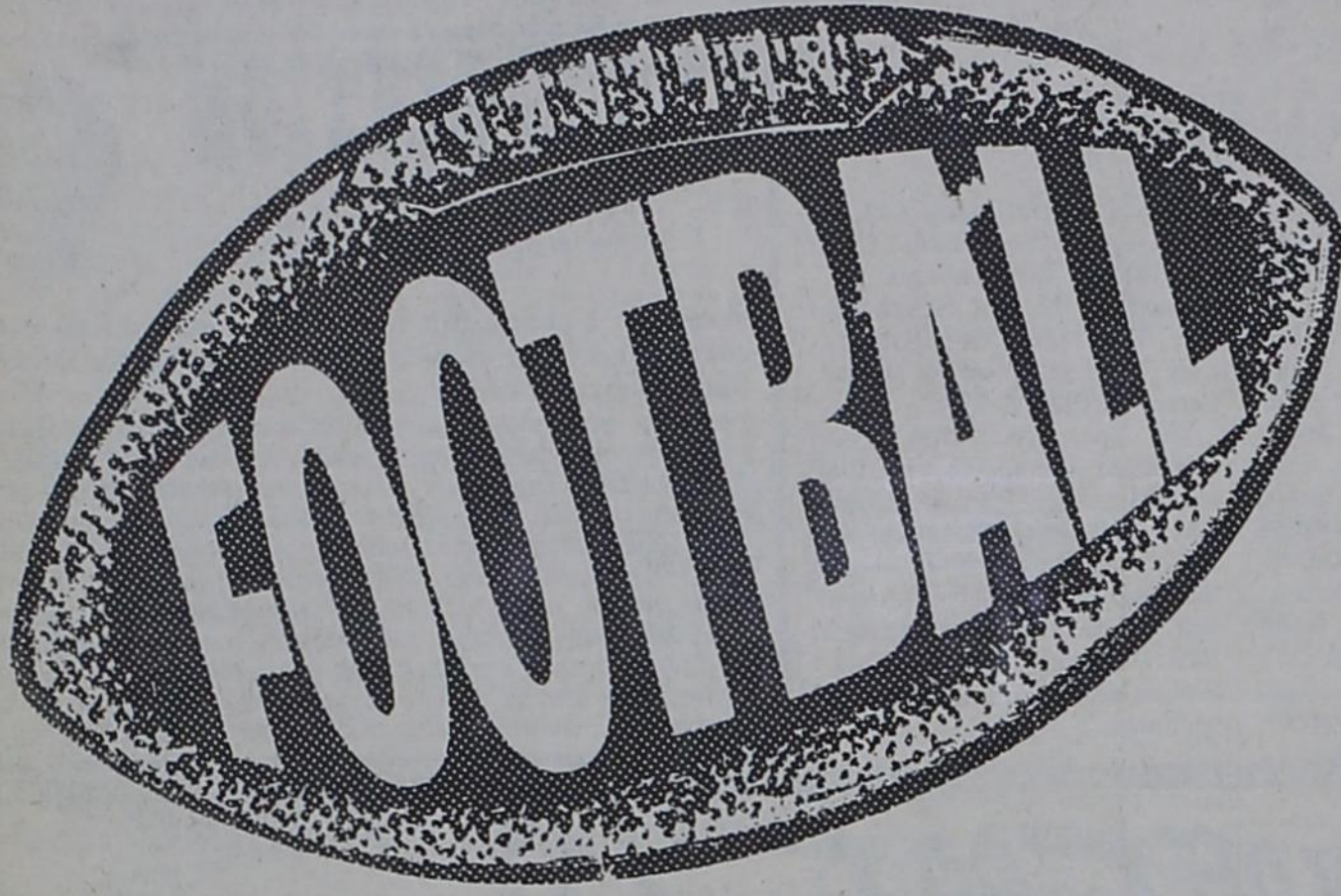

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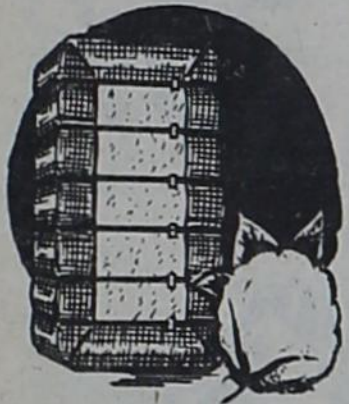
