1952 WAS A BUSY YEAR FOR RESIDENTS OF HIGH PLAINS

(Editor's Note: Continued below is the remainder of the resume of 1952 happenings, which was begun in last week's paper.)

JULY

Rain came early in July to bring relief to the young crops that had begun to wither in the burning heat.

After the second mistrial, this time at Tulla, the Livesay murder trial was moved to Haskell.

Local wheat harvest ended in July, with approximately 300,000 bushels in county warehouses.

Rain came in July, bringing sad tidings for Jewell Castor. During a heavy thunder shower a bolt of lightning struck a pen of cattle...

Mr. and Mrs. G. D. Anderson and Snuffy attended the National Democratic Convention in Chicago, where Anderson served as a serfent-at-arms.

Jo Sondra Magerus won double honors in 4-H contests in July, when she won both first place and sweep-stake prizes in two Curry County contests.

Summer graduates of ENMU were Mrs. Shelby Jobes, who graduated with honors in music, and W. H. Graham Jr., who received his B. A. degree in journalism.

July 26 saw Parmer County residents going to the polls for the primary election, but since there was a scrap for only two offices, not too much excitement was produced.

D. D. Monroe of Clayton, New Mexico, spoke at the Farwell Chamber of Commerce banquet. In his address Monroe stated that "We must resell America."

AUGUST

Two and nine-tenths inches of rain fell on August 2, in Farwell, while the D. J. Brown farm, south of town measured from 7 to 8 inches.

Phyllis Tucker was crowned queen of the Girls' Auxillary of the Texico-Farwell Baptist church in August.

Another letter from Jane Gallagher was featured. This time she described the finish of the Olympic games in Helsinki, Finland.

Jones Predicts Irrigation Will Play Big Part In Parmer County Agriculture in Future

Irrigation continues to play a greater roll in Parmer County's agriculture, stated County Agent Jones in his annual report for the past year, 1952.

According to Jones, 850 wells are in the county and 1000 will more than likely be in operation by May 1 of this year.

The report states that about 85 percent of the farmers in the county are resident owners, and most of them are in good condition financially.

Wheat farmers seeded around 110,000 acres of wheat in the fall of 1951 for harvest in 1952, and of this, about 70,000 acres was harvested, producing around 900,000 bushels.

Sudan and alfalfa also added substantially to the income of a limited number of farmers, and castor beans were grown in the county, with 800 acres averaging around 700 pounds per acre.

Cotton increased about 100 percent over 1951, giving the county about 50,000 acres and producing around 30,000 bales, Jones continues.

Discussing briefly, the social and cultural provisions in the county, Jones listed four high schools, all of which have Homemaking and Agricultural departments.

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Beef Cattle

Beef cattle play an important part in the income for the county, Jones states, illustrating his point by explaining 160,000 acres of wheat furnish grazing, when moisture is available.

Dairying

Dairying plays an important part in the income of a limited number of county farmers, with around 30 Grade A dairies in operation in Parmer.

Swine

Swine, along with dairy and beef cattle, play a part in the economy of Parmer. "The chief problem facing the swine industry today seems to be the cost of feed in relation to the price of pork," the agent observes.

Wheat

Wheat production this year was small due to small acreage, the report says. About 110,000 acres were seeded and about 70,000 harvested.

The storage problem is about over, Jones says, until an extra large crop is produced everywhere, adding that the county has good elevators capable of handling the wheat crop most any year.

Grain Sorghum

Grain sorghum acreage ran near 240,000 acres, about 75,000 on irrigated land. Chief problems confronting the farmers growing grain sorghum, is lowering yields on irrigated lands, Jones concludes.

Cotton

Cotton acreage just about doubled the 1951 crop. Labor, insects, weather, soil erosion, soil fertility, were among problems, but they were worked out pretty well.

Legumes

The report emphasizes that legumes in Parmer County are relatively new, but are becoming more widespread. This past year, three seeders were purchased by Soil Conservation District to seed legumes between rows.

This year's price of alfalfa hay seems to have stimulated quite an interest in hay production," Jones says. New seedings were made the past fall and the agent predicts more

Last item in the agent's report was 4-H club work. Enrollment in the county is 208 boys, located at Bovina, Lazbuddy, Friona and Farwell.

During the past year, 4-H club boys exhibited livestock at Amarillo, Lubbock, Clovis, Plainview and the local show. In 1952, boys fed about 40 steers, 110 barrows, along with caring for about 40 dairy animals, and also beef breeding animals.

Walter Fangman Dies At Home Near Black

Funeral services were held Friday morning at nine o'clock at St. Anthony's Catholic church at Hereford for Walter C. Fangman, 42, who passed away Tuesday, following a heart attack on his farm near Black.

Mr. Fangman, a well-known Parmer County farmer, was found Tuesday afternoon, by a school bus driver. Fangman had been to inspect his irrigation well.

The deceased was born November 25, 1910 at Pilot's Point, Texas, and was married to Miss Helen Jesko in Hereford on April 10, 1934. They moved to their farm east of Friona in the Black community, where they have lived since that time.

Survivors include his wife; three sons, Arnold, Henry and Charles of Friona; his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Henry Fangman of Hereford; three brothers and four sisters.

Lee Finley who has recently leased Jim's Cafe in Texico, states that the business served 22 gallons of coffee, and 14 dozen doughnuts at their open house Saturday.

Finley states that the cafe is closed on Sunday to enable her and his employees to attend church services.

A precinct director and three county committeemen will be elected Tuesday in Parmer County, when the High Plains Water District hold an election.

Tom McFarland, manager of the water district of Lubbock, asked that all tax-paying voters participate in the election, since 1953 will be a year of important legislative decisions regarding water problems.

In a statement, McFarland commented there is much misinformation on the drilling permit regulation to go into effect Feb. 1. For example, he adds that cases have been cited of some well drillers charging five cents per foot premium for finishing wells before Feb. 1, and have made the claim that the farmer would pay more than that for permit fees.

"That is untrue," McFarland says. "There will be no charge for the drilling permits."

The manager explains that permits are issued to help farmers get maximum use of water under their land. Application forms may be obtained from pump companies, water well drillers, county committeemen, and possibly county agents.

Approval of only three of the five committeemen will be necessary for granting of the spacing permit. If the permit is denied, the farmer may appeal to the district committee, and an engineer would be employed to determine whether the permit should be granted. McFarland emphasized that "The plan is to keep the control on a local level."

McFarland urges a large turnout of voters because the county committeemen and district directors make many important decisions.

Willis A. Hawkins of Hart is candidate for district director from precinct 3, including Bailey, Castro and Parmer counties. To be voted on as county committeemen are: D. B. Ivy, Lazbuddy; C. V. Potts, Rhea; R. Sneed and Raymond Euler, Friona. Euler is a present director, whose term expires. Bruce Parr and Tom Caldwell are committeemen who have one more year to serve.

McFarland called attention to the fact that farmers voting will be privileged to use the write-in method if the candidate of their choice does not appear on the ballot.

Polling places in Parmer are the Friona Legion Hall, the Bovina Legion Hall, the Farwell County Court room and the Lazbuddy School house.

In Bailey County, boxes may be found at the Muleshoe Community house, Enoch Gin office, and the Three-Way School house.

Bailey nominees are W. T. Milleman, D. V. Terrell, Robert F. Byrd, and Loyd W. Stephens.

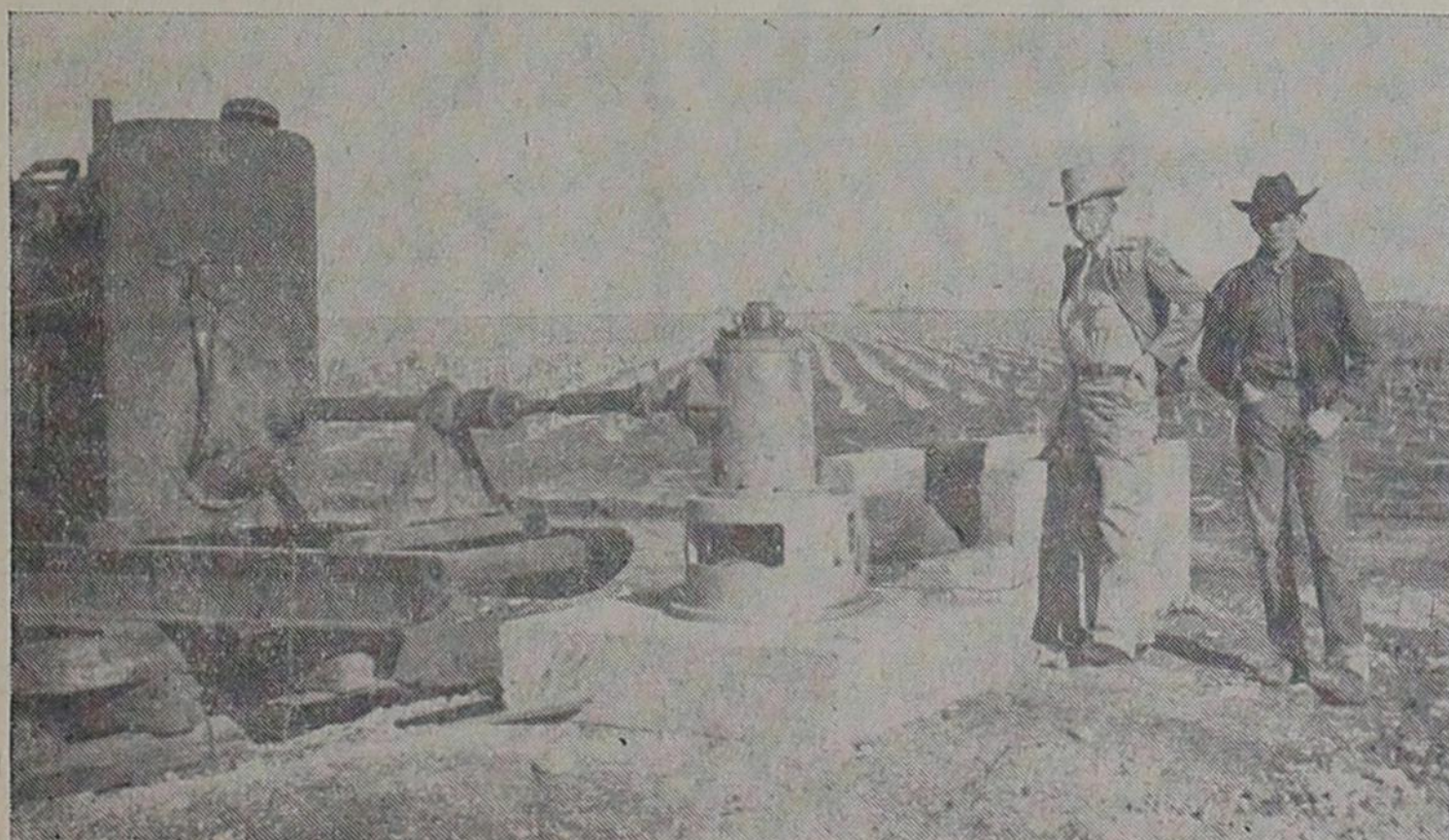
