The station will be at the Friona Woman's Club house.





Knowing that an abundant supply of water lies within 200 to 350 feet below the suruface of practically every farm in the county has certainly made the land bring more on the real estate market, and because it did, farmers were able to borrow heavily against their property. The man with whom we were talking put it this way: "We know that a good quarter-section of land with a well on it is worth anywhere between twenty and thirty thousand dollars."

That made loans up to ten thousand dollars practical for both farmer and creditor.

So here is our conclusion, for whatever it may be worth: Local businessmen must not be too upset by the general slackening off of volume in retail trade that has made itself felt over our territory.

Many local rumors have darted to and fro in the past several months since the introduction of an idea by a certain prominent farmer to erect a building to house aged persons. Estimates on this building range upwards of a quarter-million dollars, which is a figure with enough didgets to set many local tongues a-wagging.

The farmer of whom we are speaking, N. L. Tharp, now resides in Clovis. Headquarters for his farm is the former home of Jack Dunn north of here about four miles up the state line. For a time, it was rumored that the home was to be built at that location.

When the story first broke several months ago, it was given widespread publicity. A home for old folks on the farm north of town seemed to be a probability. However, time has drifted by and nothing has materialized.

Just two weeks ago, the stories began to circulate again. This time, so the rumor went, Mr. Tharp was considering a location in northern Farwell, just across Highway 60. Now it appears that this has fallen through as well.

Last weekend we heard reports of Texico being chosen as a site for the proposed building, and the publisher though it might be wise to have a representative of this newspaper seek an audience with Mr. Tharp to ascertain his intentions if possible.

The representative of this newspaper reports that he spent very little time with Mr. Tharp before it became evident that the farmer was not desirous of disclosing his plans to any publication such as a newspaper-regardless of its intentions.

He openly blamed publicity by this and other area newspapers for the collapse of the project on more than one occasion.
