

"Oh No, Not That Again!"



We were just on the verge of welching on our promise not to publish any more amateur weather reports in The Tribune until it rained at least an inch—when the nice one-inch shower came Saturday afternoon.

That clears the way for further reckless forecasting, and from all indications, there are quite a few people wanting to know what the score is, believe it or not.

The wife and writer have a young Hopalong Cassidy on their hands. The Wallings down the street were kind enough to loan us a wooden "rocky horse" and the youngun really goes to it—hours at a time.

In fact, we bet that we have the only bowlegged 16-month-old kid in town.

We thought we were through with county politics, but in came Ben Foster yesterday wanting to run a thank-you to the voters for their support in the primary.

We had intended to say, but didn't, that it was not possible for us to contact all the candidates three weeks ago, and so some of them were not included in the list of acknowledgements we ran recently.

Raymond Young, a former Farwell boy, was in recently to run a classified ad. He said he was pulling out of this part of the country. He's on his way to Idaho, in the Snake River Valley area where there has been such a recent development of irrigation.

"We know most everyone has some things that are taking up storage space," says an Auxiliary spokesman, "and we would appreciate any articles that are given."

No Storage Shortage Seen for '54 Sorghum

Area elevators, with already a cumulative storage capacity to stagger the imagination, are flexing their muscles with still more storage to accommodate the grain of this area and the nation.

In Parmer County alone, there are 180,000 acres of grain sorghums under irrigation this year, which could result in a yield of over 7,000,000 bushels of grain.

Another 50,000 acres of dryland grain is not even being figured in at the present time, as it seems very unlikely that much of this year's dryland feed crop will bear the expense of harvest.

How do these stupendous prospects compare with storage that will be available within another month or two when the rush of harvest begins?

A roundup of storage for 14 elevators in the Texico-Farwell and Parmer County area indicate that over 6,000,000 bushels of storage will be in readiness when the grain starts to roll.

In addition, another 3,000,000-plus is now under construction or proposed to be built before the year's end. The present total capacity of the 14 elevators (which includes milo or wheat now in storage) is about equal with the space that will be available for harvest. This is because a large part of the expansion now underway will be finished in time.

Elevator Breakdown At Black, Tri-County Elevator has a capacity of 100,000 bushels now, says Pete Braxton, and 500,000 bushels of concrete storage will be added, "but not in time for this year's crop," he says.

Also at Black, D. C. McWhorter of Black Grain Company has 225,000 bushels of storage going up now, which will be completed "within thirty days," which will give the company a whopping 725,000-bushel capacity. "Most of this," he says, "will be available this fall." Black Grain, like many other area elevators, is in the process of shipping government-stored milo out now.

Friona Wheat Growers, with a total of 1,300,000 bushels, has 700,000 bushels of government milo on

hand that is expected to be shipped out before harvest. Arthur Drake says this will leave 300,000 bushels of wheat still in storage, but if the milo is shipped in time, they will have about a million bushels of storage available.

Preach Cranfill at Continental Grain in Friona reports a total capacity of 720,000 bushels. The firm has gotten shipping orders on nearly all of the government-stored grain, he says, and they "probably will be empty by fall."

Parmer County farmers will vote on 10 names from each community, the top five of which will be elected to office.

Schools Are Readied For Return of Students

The wheels of knowledge will begin turning the latter part of this month in this area, as preparations for the opening of school are nearing completion in all localities.

Texico Schools have the earliest opening date, with classes to begin August 23 for students of that school. The faculty is complete, and plans are finished for the beginning term, Paul Frederick, principal, says. Faculty was given in last week's paper.

Both Lazbuddie and Farwell Schools have set August 30 as the first day of classes. Further information on the plans for Lazbuddie were not available this week, except that buses will run on the 30th.

Friona officially opens the doors to students on September 1, with the elementary grades enrolling on that day, the preliminary enrollment for high school boys and girls is planned the previous week. High school seniors register August 23; juniors, August 24; sophomores, August 25; freshmen, August 26. Further details are found on the Friona page.

Official opening date for Bovina is September 6, when the buses will run. The cafeteria will be open the following day. The Bovina school was destroyed by fire last year, and a new building is now under construction, but will not be ready for this coming semester. Classes are to be held in the same buildings as were used last fall. The faculty is complete, W. H. Willoughby, superintendent, says.

Mrs. Katherine Owens Lockhart will be school nurse for Farwell, Bovina and Lazbuddie, Judge A. D. Smith announces.

Farwell Classes Begin Students will arrive at Farwell Schools August 30 at 9 o'clock, and will have the first day of classes after an assembly at 10

o'clock that morning. The program for the morning is to be presented by former students.

Buses will run on the opening day, and students take up their studies at 9 o'clock each day. Parents are reminded that students are not to come to school before 8:30 each day. Jack Williams, superintendent, says that hour periods will be set up for classes this year, as recommended by the accreditation agency of Texas Education Agency.

Enrollment for juniors and seniors is planned at 1:30 August 27

and freshmen and sophomores will enroll at 9:30 in the morning on August 28. Orientation of faculty members is scheduled August 26 at 1:30 in the afternoon.

Faculty for the new year is complete with three new teachers to be a part of the local system for the first time. Rev. Vance Zinn, Oklahoma Lane Baptist pastor, has accepted a part-time position as an English and speech instructor. Rev. Zinn is a graduate of Wayland College in Plainview. (Continued on last page)

Thirty-Eight Entries Already Listed for Beauty Contest

With the deadline for entrants still a week away, the number of young ladies of Parmer County, who are seeking the Farm Bureau queen title, is continuing to mount, making a total of 38.

As of Tuesday of this week, 22 Friona girls were entered in the contest, with 11 participants from Bovina and five from Farwell. The names of the Lazbuddie girls had not been turned in early this week. Deadline for entry into the contest is August 21. Mrs. Melba Miller is in charge of the contest.

The Parmer County queen will receive \$100 to buy a costume to compete in the district contest in September. Each district winner will be a guest of the Texas Farm Bureau at the state convention in November, and is entitled to a week's stay at the Crazy Hotel, Mineral Wells. The state winner will be given \$500 to take her to the American Farm Bureau meeting in New York City in December.

Candidates must be: a daughter or sister of a Farm Bureau member, single, 16 by September 1, and not over 22 on that date, and must talk 1 1/2 minutes on "Why I Am Glad My Family Is in Farm Bureau."

Clothing for the contest will be street wear, preferably cotton. Judging by out-of-town judges will be on appearance, personality, poise, and the statements made by the girls.

The contest will be August 27 in the Friona auditorium, at 8:30 in the evening.

Raymond Euler, Parmer County Farm Bureau service representative, states that he believes Parmer County has a larger number of entries this year than any other county in the state.

Gym Construction To Start Soon

Final contract for a new gymnasium and music hall for Farwell Schools was let to Wilson-Crump-Haynes Construction Co. of Lubbock in the amount of \$86,371, Tuesday night, when the school board met to discuss the proposal.

The steel contract was let to Robberson Steel of Oklahoma City, Okla., in the amount of \$11,500; and the bleacher contract was let to W. C. Hixson Co. of Dallas for Medart seats in the amount of \$7850.

Construction on the project is to begin within 10 days, school officials say.

THE TRIBUNE'S EDITORIAL COMMENT

Shivers Still the Best Man In Governor's Race

Preceding the primary election of July 24, The Tribune editorially supported the candidacy of Gov. Allan Shivers for re-election. He, we firmly believed, was easily the best choice for the head of the state administration and the Texas Democratic party. This is still true, in spite of daily charges to the contrary from his opposition, and we again support him for the run-off August 28.

The reasons for our convictions are unchanged from a month or six weeks ago, although there are new and interesting highlights brought into focus as a result of the first primary.

One of these is the enlightening effect of election returns from several precinct boxes. We have always thought that if your neighbors and "home town folks" didn't like you, there must be some reason for it. With that thought in mind, we would like for someone to explain to us how Ralph Yarborough managed to lose his own neighborhood vote by a thumping 3-to-1 margin.

Surely these people of this particular area of Austin in which Ralph Yarborough has lived for several years have come to know Ralph Yarborough for what he really is. If he is the patron saint of the Texas Democratic party, and if he will restore to Texas "decency in government," and if he will bring to pass all the things he is promising the voting public, then why did not his own neighbors vote for him? This is something that cannot be explained away by digressing into the alleged misconduct of Gov. Shivers' administration. Such a glaring reversal as this one cannot be hid behind a smokescreen of counter charges designed to throw the voting public off the scent.

Another thing: The promises made by Ralph Yarborough could not be made realities without unearthing incredible new sources of tax income. This candidate has promised, among other things, a bonus to veterans, a big system of dams in the state, a vastly expanded highway system, and huge increases in expenditures for public welfare.

Now, the fiscal budget required to run the entire State of Texas is something like one-half billion dollars a year. With a little calculation, it can be shown that Ralph Yarborough's promises would cost three and one-half billion dollars! Where does he think all of this money is coming from?

A sales tax? No, he says. A state income tax? No, he says. Where then? Why, he proposes to place a tax on gas pipelines. Well, that sounds good enough to most voters, not very many of whom happen to own or have an interest in gas pipelines. But the joker in this deck is that such a tax has already been declared unconstitutional! That was tried several months ago as one possible means of getting more money for Texas teachers.

No, this Santa Claus from Austin cannot give us the moon. He cannot give us a state government scott free from any outside pressure group, such as the CIO-PAC. By re-electing Allan Shivers we

We contacted Mrs. Lee Jones this week for her favorite recipe and she said she had several recipes for cookies, cakes and refrigerator rolls that they were partial to, but she thought that since it is canning season, we might appreciate her favorite for green tomato relish. She said it was a new version of the old "chow-chow" relish. We think Mrs. Jones has the right idea and we want to thank her not only for the following recipe, but for her gracious cooperation.

Green Tomato Relish

- 1 gal. green tomatoes
- 6 sweet green peppers
- 2 hot red peppers
- 12 medium onions
- 1 bunch celery
- 1 head cabbage
- 1/2 c. lemon juice
- 4 c. sugar
- 1/2 c. salt
- 2 tsp. powdered tumeric
- 1 tsp. all spice
- 1 tsp. cinnamon
- 1 tsp. mustard seed
- 1/4 quart vinegar

Chop tomatoes through coarse blade of chopper. Remove seed from pepper. Chop peppers, onions, celery, cabbage, using medium blade. Mix together and drain. Mix spices and salt with sugar and add to first mixture. Add vinegar and lemon juice. Bring to boil in large kettle. Boil 10 minutes stirring frequently. Pack in hot jars and seal.

Mrs. Jones gives us this secret to watch—Boil only 10 minutes, as it can be easily overcooked.

Patrons May Take High School Work

Plans have now been completed by the Education Committee of the Muleshoe Chamber of Commerce and the School Administration of our Independent School District to offer a schedule of classes for adult education.

These courses are of a high school level and have been scheduled to meet many requests of people desiring to complete their high school education and receive a diploma. Courses will be taught by members of the faculty of our Independent School district and any person desiring credit will receive 1/2 unit per semester for each course subscribed to. Classes will be held one night per week and will be of two hours duration beginning at 8:00 p.m. and closing at 10:00 p.m.

First classes will be held on September 15. The tuition for these classes will be \$25.00 per semester and a minimum of 15 enrollees per class will be necessary with the exception of Woodworking in which there will be a maximum of 10 enrollees for each period. Tuition for Woodworking will be \$35.00 per semester because of

the necessary decrease in enrollment.

The following classes will be available if the minimum enrollment of 15 is realized for each:

Vocational Agriculture, Woodworking, Home Economics (Vocational), Texas or United States History, Bookkeeping, Economics, Typewriting, Shorthand, English, Mathematics, and Spanish.

Application cards may be obtained at the following locations: Muleshoe Chamber of Commerce; Ladd Pontiac; Superintendent of Schools; Holt's Panhandle Service.

Tuitions must be paid on or before the first scheduled class. All checks should be mailed or presented to the Chamber of Commerce, P. O. Box 846, Muleshoe, Texas.

It is with a great deal of interest and enthusiasm that the School Administration and the Education Committee of the Chamber of Commerce has planned this program. Many hours have been spent working out the details for this service that the people of Muleshoe may have the advantage of an education that will be invaluable to them in their daily living habits.

Yarborough said in one speech that "this is the first time in five years that we're going to elect a Democratic governor."

He said he was receiving pledges every day from voters who either opposed him in the first primary or thought his cause was hopeless.

Yarborough scored what he called the "Republican press" for supporting Shivers and accused his opponent of a long list of misdeeds, including the circulation of false charges.

Wants Water Board
Yarborough has called for the creation of a Texas Water Board, patterned after the Railroad Commission, with members elected by the people.

He said that if elected, he would recommend to the Legislature in January that such a board be established.

Continuing on the water and drouth theme, Yarborough proposed the construction of 25 dams over the state, "comparable to those built by the Lower Colorado River Authority."

These dams, he said, should be planned and constructed under the supervision of the water board, and be financed like those built by the LCRA—by bonds which "in 30 or 40 years would pay themselves out by the sale of water alone."

It is Yarborough's contention that "industries are refusing to build in Texas, and some already here are pulling out because of the water shortage."

What the Cost?
Shivers' supporters got their scratch pads and tried to figure out what it would cost to carry out the campaign pledges made by Yarborough, including a veteran's bonus, an elaborate tracery of dams on Texas rivers, vastly expanded highways and huge increases in expenditures for public welfare.

Shivers' calculators contended that the cost amounted to something like \$3.5 billion per year in state taxes.

They pointed out that the present total cost of state government is \$0.5 billion per year, or one-seventh of the other figure. Yarborough said he wanted the

money to come from a tax on gas pipelines.

Shivers' backers pointed out that such a tax already has been declared unconstitutional.

Warning System Coming
Texas soon will have a modern storm warning system to spot danger miles away by radar, Governor Shivers announced.

Shivers said that completion of the system, called the most-up-to-date in the world, will come in the next six weeks.

Already functioning as part of the radar chain are units in 11 cities. The radar net ties into the Department of Public Safety system, giving it Weather Bureau radar reports within two minutes after a warning is issued.

Texas Building Booms
Construction in Texas spiraled toward a record high in June, according to the University of Texas Bureau of Business Research.

Reported by the bureau was a predominance of commercial, industrial, highway, church, school, and government building.

Building permits issued throughout the state during the first half of 1954 exceeded totals for the same period last year by six per cent, the reports showed.

Liquor Revenue Up
Texas liquor revenue in June showed a \$41,000 increase over the total for the same month last year, the monthly report of the Texas Liquor Control Board reveals.

June revenue this year was \$1,425,179.13 with the largest part of the amount derived from beer and whiskey taxes.

The board also noted an apparent increase of moonshining over the state, with seizure of 11 illicit stills and arrest of six on moonshining charges.

FBI Agent Speaks
Two forms of crime are on the increase; car thefts and swindling-bad check passing.

So said Vernon H. Bailey, special agent of the FBI in San Antonio, in an Austin speech.

Car thefts inconvenience more people and cause a greater loss of property than any other form of crime, the agent said.

Short Snorts
Americans no longer believe that things are good only if they

come from Europe, said Dr. Lewis U. Hanke, University of Texas professor—now you can break the law by driving too slow. The rule of 40 miles per hour minimum applies on a stretch of the Austin Expressway—heroes and heroines of Texas education will be selected by a panel, announced A. Garland Alair of Austin, director of the Texas Heritage Foundation. Selections will be announced on School Centennial Day at the State Fair of Texas.

Dibble Here—Dabble There Mark Shower Pattern

Widely fluctuating amounts of moisture were recorded over the Texico-Farwell and Parmer County area during the past weekend, with most points reporting a nice shower Saturday afternoon.

For the first time this year, a shower totaling over one inch fell in and around this community. From an inch to an inch and a quarter was the general report. It came down in a swift torrent Saturday afternoon.

Elsewhere, not so much fell. "About a quarter" was the report at Bovina, and several measurements, ranging from a sprinkle to just under a half, were recorded around the Friona area.

Generally speaking, nobody got very excited as this was hardly a wet spell of beneficial proportions, but city dwellers and farmers alike seemed relieved that the heavy heat which has hung on for over a month was broken at least temporarily.

Most crops under irrigation continue to hold up well, despite the dry weather, although feed is hurting some because wells have proved inadequate for the needs of the field without supporting amounts of natural moisture, which has not been forthcoming.

Cotton, on the other hand, has seldom, if ever, looked better. It seems to be "lapping up" the hot weather. The bug situation is improved, also, farmers report, although most by now have been out of the expense of an aerial spraying.

Dryland feed and cotton is about given up for lost, and there is no non-irrigated pasture at all in the area.

Three County People Seek Degrees At WT

One person from Farwell and two from Bovina are among the 249 candidates for degrees who expect to participate in summer commencement exercises at West Texas State College on Aug. 20. Two-thirds, or 160 of those expecting to complete degree requirements, are seeking the masters degree.

Dr. Henry H. Hill, president of the George Peabody College for Teachers, Nashville, Tenn., will be the commencement speaker, according to Dr. James P. Cornette, president of WTSC. Graduation activities for the candidates begin Aug. 18 at 8 p. m., when Dr. and Mrs. Cornette honor students at a reception at their home. Graduation exercises will be held Aug. 20 at 8 p. m. in the main auditorium.

for Lariat Grain, but adds that "terminal storage has been arranged for."

The Sherley-Anderson holdings in Lariat total 340,000 bushels, and of this 200,000 is expected to be ready for harvest.

Sherley is also busy in Farwell, where a complete new 800,000-bushel concrete elevator is going up. The company is hoping for a completion date by Oct. 10, but Penrod Anderson at Bovina said "We're sort of sweating this one out."

Biggest expansion program in the county is now taking place at Worley Mills, where 24 steel tanks totaling 560,000 bushels will be ready this fall, says Manager Herbert Potts. A flat-storage warehouse north of the railroad tracks is also in the works, and it may possibly be completed before harvest is ended, although Worley is not counting on it. The warehouse would provide another 580,000 bushels. Also, another eight tanks are figured to go up this year, making a combined addition of 1,328,000 bushels. The present capacity is 34,000.

Lone Star on the state line has 290,000, and all of this will be ready for the fall sorghum harvest.

Roberts Elevator in Texico has a total capacity of 500,000 bushels, according to M. C. Roberts, and he reports that he has made arrangements to have 200,000 bushels available.


Once or twice, in conversation with elevator owners or managers, The Tribune's reporter encountered cautious comment like "We all wonder if we're sort of overdoing it." They referred, of course, to the tremendous expansion programs underway.

What will happen in a few years is anybody's guess, apparently. Two things elevator men wonder about are:

1. How much grain will continue to be grown locally?
2. Will a nation-wide surplus of wheat continue, which will make it possible for us to store in these elevators wheat produced in other parts of the country?

Referring to point No. 2, in the past, as in the present, a large amount of out-of-state (usually Kansas) wheat has been brought in by Commodity Credit for storage in this area.

With the large increase in terminal storage between here and Kansas, grain men wonder how long this type storage will continue.


