# Cooperation Pays Off in Weed Fight



Proof that the new cooperative weed control project in Parmer County can and will work is shown in the above picture, where the State Highway Department and individual farmers are uniting to control the threat of bindweed. In the left panel is a farm hand of W. P. Elliott using a small applicator to treat a bindweed patch with Atlacide. The patch is next to the farm-to-market road south of Hub, and Elliott is sacrificing some of what he says is his "best feed" to kill the noxious weed. In the second panel employees of the State Highway Department

are shown as they spread salt on infested areas on the right-of-way adjacent the Elliott field. They made application at the rate of a pound per square foot, using a ton of salt in the process. R. D. Rogers, foreman, says this is the only cooperative weed control effort in this area. The Santa Fe Railroad has also indicated that it will participate in the all-out program to save expensive Parmer County land from bindweed encroachment. This work is an improvement project fostered by the Parmer County Farm Bureau.

# Demo Meet Is Smooth

Exponents of the conservative wing of the Texas Democratic Party were in control of the Parmer County convention at the courthouse in Farwell last Saturday.

Précinct delegates from Friona and Farwell were on hand to name delegates to the state convention in Mineral Wells, where control of the leadership of the Texas Democratic Party will be decided.

Gov. Allan Shivers obviously will have the backing of the Parmer County delegation. No opposition was heard from the Yarrowborough faction at the county convention; in fact, delegates unanimously adopted a resolution presented by the Friona group that read in part:

"It is the unanimous belief and conviction of said convention (the Friona précinct convention) that the Democratic Party of Texas should be governed and led by the conservative Democrats of this State, and that the Democratic Party of Texas should oppose any interference, and or encroachment upon our state government and state institutions by the federal government and its instrumentalities."

Of the eight political précincts in the county, only two are known

to have conducted conventions on July 24 and as a consequence only two précincts were represented at the county convention.

G. D. Anderson was elected chairman of the Parmer County Democratic Convention; W. H. Graham Jr. secretary.

Delegates named to attend the state convention included Bill Sheehan, Slean Osborn, Hugh Moseley, and Pete Buske, all of Friona; and R. W. Anderson, Caroline Anderson, and Sam Aldridges, all of Farwell.

Alternates include Nelson Welch, Joe Osborn, Eric Rushing, Bill Sherley, Roy Clements, George Trimble, and Dan Ethridge.

Sam Aldridge moved that this delegation be advised to vote for and support leaders at the state convention who will be in favor of uninstructed delegations. The motion carried unanimously.

Nelson Welch made a motion that the delegation going to Mineral Wells be governed by the "unit rule." This motion also carried without opposition.

Other business transacted at the convention was of a routine nature.

Loyde Brewer, county chapter chairman, and Raymond Euler, county campaign director for March of Dimes, attended a meeting at the Herring Hotel in Amarillo Friday where plans were discussed for an emergency drive for additional funds.

Because of the high incidence of polio cases and the additional costs incurred by vaccine tests, polio foundation funds have been exhausted. Parmer County still has around \$2000 on hand, but two or three cases of polio or one major case could deplete all county funds, according to Brewer.

After hearing the facts pointing to the desperate need for more money, Euler and Brewer came home ready to inaugurate a drive in Parmer County. No definite goal will be set. Parmer County citizens have been so cooperative at the regular January drive per- (Continued on last page).

## Texico Signs Up Engineer

Steps preparatory to obtaining a municipally-owned and operated water and sewer system for Texico were made by the Texico town council Monday night.

They hired the Hatfield Engineering Company of Albuquerque to plan and supervise the project. On hand at the meeting were representatives of this company, as well as the Cecil Hawks and Associates company of Lubbock, another engineering firm that was a bidder on the engineering work.

The council unanimously voted to accept the former's bid, however, which was approximately \$400 below the bid from Cecil Hawks.

Engineer Hitchcock, present at the meeting, indicated to Mayor Ira Levins that he would be back in Texico Monday of next week to begin making a "feasibility report" that will later be submitted to bond buyers for their consideration.

Factors such as present population, growth, potential, present needs, topographic details, economic conditions, and other matters that possibly could affect the operation of a water and sewer system will be assembled in the report.

The fee of the Hatfield group is 6 percent of the cost of construction, in addition to \$500 per month salary for a "resident engineer" who will oversee the construction work on the system.

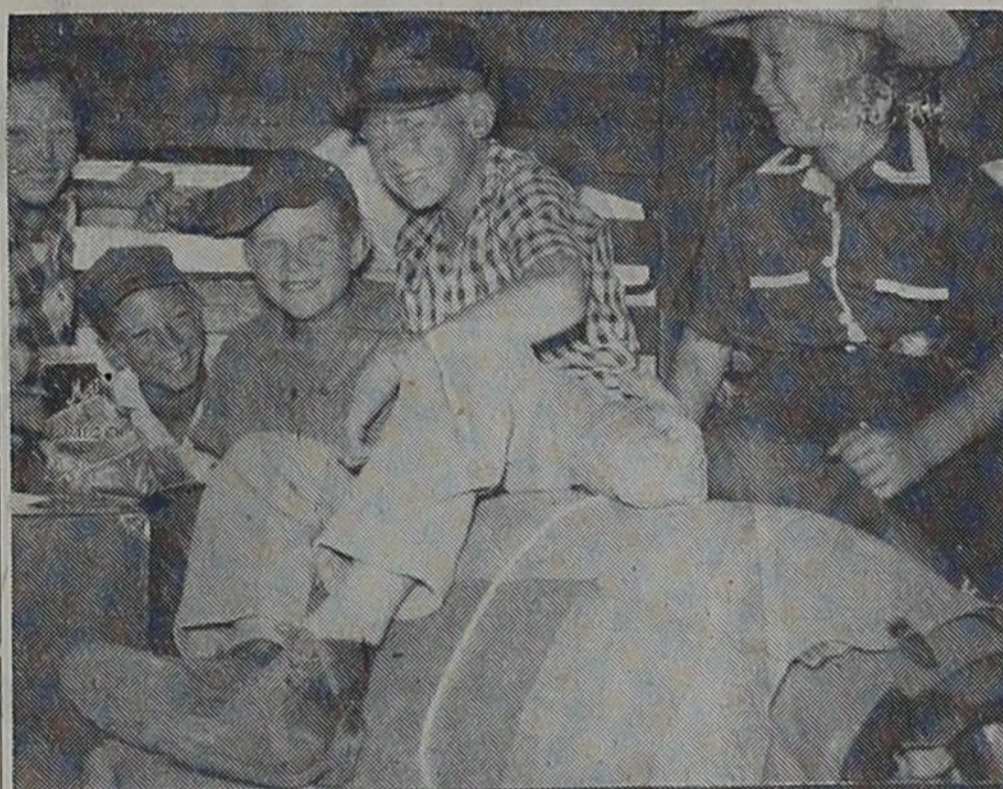
The estimated cost of the combined water and sewer system under consideration for Texico is "around \$60,000 to \$80,000." The City of Texico already owns the water distribution system, or lines.

The Hawks' bid on the work was 6 1/2 percent, plus \$90 weekly for a supervisory engineer. The report on the feasibility of the project is expected to be made within two or three weeks, and then bonds will be sold, and the contract let for construction.

City council members include J. E. Stone, Joe Helton, Russell Johnson, and Les Means.

## Segregation Plan at Farwell

Colored students of the Farwell district who last year attended Lincoln-Jackson colored school in Clovis under a special arrangement will this year attend classes on the Farwell campus, school officials announce.

The decision by the United States supreme court this summer setting out that segregation is unconstitutional upset the arrangement of the Clovis schools, resulting in an ending of segregation there.

Lincoln-Jackson is now a grade school, and students living in that portion of the city have the option of attending Lincoln-Jackson or LaCasting, also in western Clovis.

This ended the arrangement under which Farwell had been sending colored students to Lincoln-Jackson, because to accept the Farwell students would mean that the Clovis system would be participating in segregation, it was explained.

Supt. Jack Williams this week estimated that there are "around eighteen" students who will be enrolled at Farwell this year. In

actuality, Farwell schools will be divided similar to practices of segregation, as the state school board has decided that for this year at least, no changes in the segregation practices in Texas will be made.

The present lecture room in the vocational agriculture building on the southern part of the campus will be used for Negro schooling, said Williams, and a colored teacher will be procured for the students.

Schooling through the sixth grade will be offered under the new educational arrangement in Farwell, he said, adding that he (Continued on last page).

## Plans Continue On Clinic Here

Plans for a clinic to be built in the near future in or near Farwell continued this week, and Dr. M. F. Green of Muleshoe visited here to discuss the project with several Farwell men.

Dr. Green said that he wished to emphasize that there had been a misunderstanding in some people's minds as to the scope of the project, and he stressed that "It will be a clinic—not a hospital" for the time being at least.

The difference between a clinic and hospital, he went on to say, is considerable. A hospital is an around-the-clock operation with doctors and nurses on hand at all times. A clinic, on the other hand, will observe regular daytime hours, much in the same manner as the office of a physician in private practice. However, Dr. Green will be available for emergencies after hours.

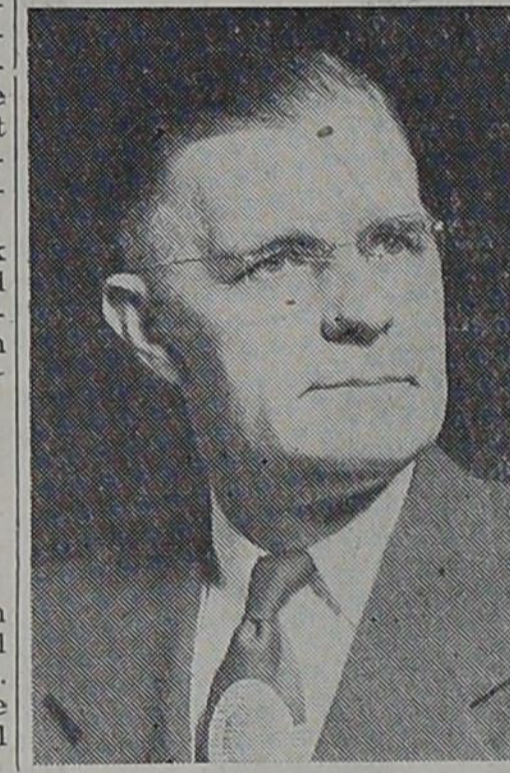

Modern kids are softies when it comes to camping out. We have just finished witnessing the exodus of the annual Parmer County 4-H encampment from the courthouse square. From a distance, it looked like a division of fully equipped, mechanized soldiers rolling out for an indefinite period in the field.

This group really "lives it up" in the mountains, where they enjoy the comforts of plenty of well prepared food, tents, sleeping bags, lights, all types of utensils, perhaps a portable radio, and what-not to duplicate as nearly as possible their luxuries of home.

Perhaps we are more jealous than critical of this feather-bed way of roughing it, because we can call to mind several camping expeditions of our own that were sheer tests of human endurance.

One that we remember with particular vividness took place about 1944, we would judge, when we were a freshman in high school. It was one of those infamous FFA trips, where any sponsor who dared volunteer to supervise such an expedition took his life in his hands.

About fifteen of us rode to the mountains of northern New Mexico in the back end of a bob-tail truck, which had no protective cover, and managed to get thoroughly sunburned by time we arrived at our destination.

A steady rain visited us a few minutes after establishing camp in the Cimarron canyon, and this beasily downpour ceased but only a few hours at a time during our three-day stay in the hills.

One boy, Herman Gerles, as we recall, was dispatched across the river with everyone's bedroll on his shoulders. We followed with the usual assortment of pots, pans, and canned beans.

Herman lost his footing on the wet log, and plunged into the river, everyone's bedding along with him. Herman drug himself out and we fished the bedclothes out a couple of hundred yards downstream at a bend of the river, but the damage had been done.

As it rained continuously and we had no chance to dry our things out, this proved to be the worst of the many misfortunes we suffered. We never once slept on dry bedding, and it still is a marvel that no one came down with pneumonia.

Everything we had mildewed, and the stench little helped the gloomy atmosphere that had settled upon our camp ere the first night ended.

The trout stream failed to yield trout, and as most boys are, we were restless to move on to what we hoped would be greener pastures. Our supervisor, the durable Prof Morton, surrendered to our demands and we pushed on over a high mountain pass into the Red River valley where we again pitched camp.

It was not raining in this new location, and we had great hopes of saving our trip. We even managed to fashion a tent out of some crude pieces of canvas and aspen poles.

The supply of food that did not require cooking was running seriously low, and since everything was pretty well soaked from the recent rains, we were unable to build a fire. That meant that our fare consisted of cold beans and cold corn for several meals, but we took it all bravely. The only meat available was Spam and if we ever have to look a Spam can in the eye again, we shall die.

Our enthusiasm for the new camp location on the Red River lessened the second afternoon there when it began to rain once more. We had pitched our tent on a lovely grass bank near the river's edge and about midnight we awakened to discover that the river had gone over its banks and was merrily washing away our tent.

To say that we were cold, miserable, and fed up with the whole trip would be an understatement of tremendous proportions.

This sad story unfolded in much the same fashion for the rest of the trip, but the details are too numerous to be mentioned here. We did manage to wreck the truck on the way home and it was necessary for a bus to be sent from Farwell to Santa Rosa to fetch us back.

The funny part about this story is that most of us showed up the next summer ready to try it again.

## Federal Tax Bill To Be

### More Palatable Next Year

There won't be any wholesale reduction in rates, but you as an "average" taxpaying American are likely to obtain substantial reductions in your federal tax returns next year.

This glad news will be a result of the re-writing of the federal tax laws—a process now underway in congress. It is almost a certainty that more liberal treatment will be given deductions. Some of them that will affect most of the people in this area are:

1. As a parent, you don't have to worry about your offspring making over \$600 to entitle you to a deduction. If he (or she) is under 19 or in school, and you still support him, you get the deduction.
2. As a widow, you can deduct the cost of hiring someone to take care of your children while you're on the job. Limited to \$600.
3. Working mothers get the same treatment, unless the combined family income exceeds \$4500. Allowances decline as income rises.
4. You can now deduct all medical expenses over 3 percent.
5. As a farmer, you can knock off each year your expenses for soil and water conservation.
6. As a businessman, you get more liberal treatment of depreciation allowances, permitting you to "write off" investments in shorter periods of time.

There are many, many other changes that are important to smaller groups of people, but these probably are the ones that are most outstanding for the readers of this newspaper. You, like we, probably will be delighted to join in with a conservative "hooray!"

## Parmer County Comes of Age

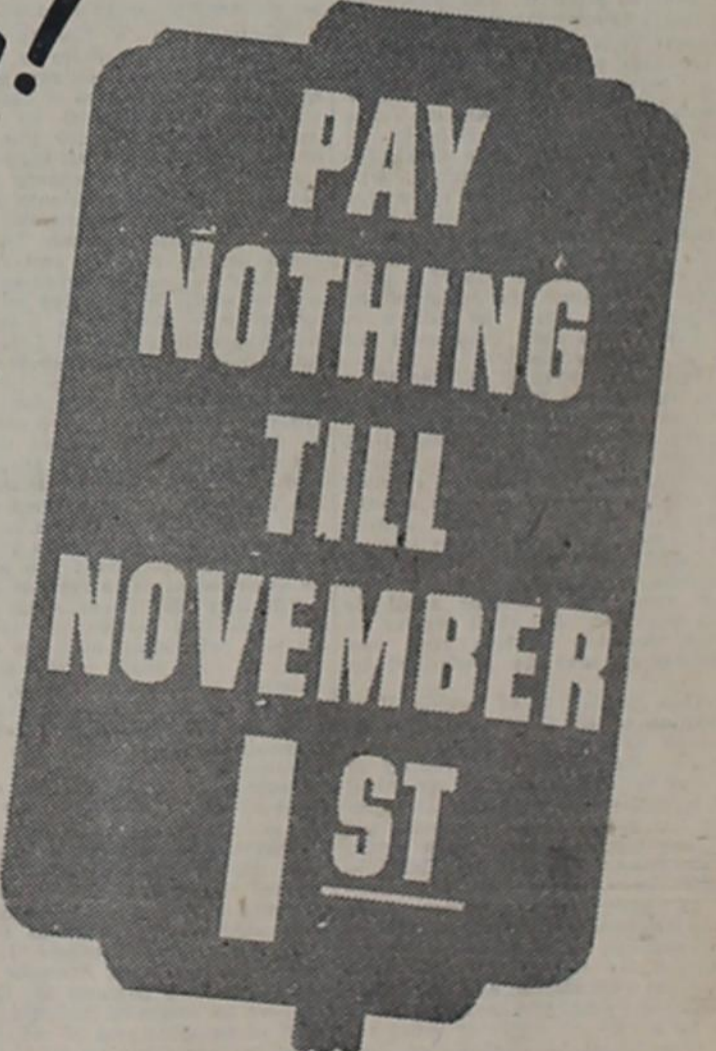
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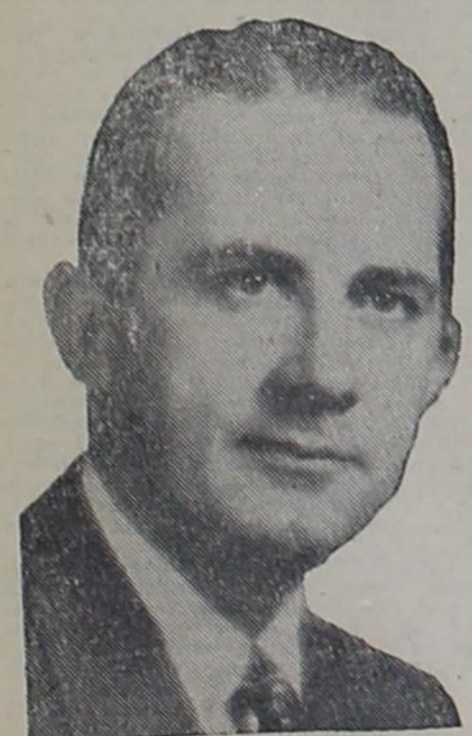

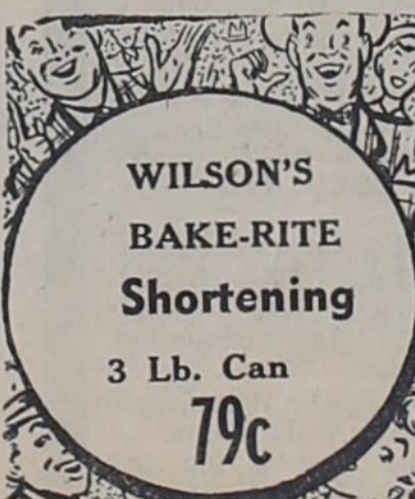

## ★ HIGHLIGHTS AND SIDELIGHTS

**AUSTIN**—State candidates in the runoff are now on the firing line, blasting away.

In the gubernatorial race, Governor Allan Shivers and Judge Ralph Yarborough have re-formed their lines and are in a showdown battle for the state's top job.

Both candidates for governor had reasons for failing to score a victory in the first primary.

Shivers said that his supporters were too confident and had not turned out at the polls in the expected number. He encouraged them to exercise their right to vote in the coming election.

Yarborough said that he would have won the first primary except for Texas Republicans who neglected their own primary to vote against him.

**Three Factors Decide**  
Capable of determining the August election were 400,000 Texans, eligible to vote, who stayed away from the polls July 24.

A smaller factor was the 36,000 who cast their votes for Davis and Holmes.

Also to be considered were the Republicans who voted in their own party primaries in July, but who are free to cast their ballots in the Democratic second primary. Most of these votes, it was generally conceded, would go for Shivers.

**Scott In Court Runoff**  
Austin Attorney Alfred Scott will be in the runoff with Judge Few Brewster, for Place 1 on the Supreme Court.

This race will gain more than a little attention, as will the campaign of Judges Alan Haley and Lloyd Davidson for the Court of Criminal Appeals.

**Fires Hit Area**  
Hardly had the embers of the political fires cooled when forest fires broke out both east and west of Austin.

Thousands of acres of woodlands, and three homes, now lie scorched, burned and bared as the result of fires around Volente (Dodd City) on Lake Travis west of Austin.

On the opposite side of the capitol city, the eastern portion of Bastrop State Park lost 7,000 acres of pine and live oak as the result of an eight-day brush and timber fire—squelched finally by sudden showers.

**Drouth Aid Arrives**  
Just as the hot sun has made easily flammable the forests in the area, so has the temperature and lack of rain taken its toll of the ranchlands.

Governor Shivers and Agricultural Commissioner John White have combined their efforts to obtain drouth relief in the form of a federal and state-backed hay pro-

gram. Ranchers in 23 Central and West Texas counties will be eligible.

Allocations for the aid, amounting to \$260,000, were provided largely by the federal government with a \$500,000 helping hand. The state will counter with the balance.

Titled "Operation Haylift," the program is the third since 1952 for state ranchers who now are weathering the worst drouth in their history. The programs will be almost identical to the other two and will allow ranchers to benefit from reduced transportation charges on hay.

Nine other state counties are also being considered for recommendation to the U. S. Agriculture Department.

Counties now receiving aid are Bastrop, Bell, Bexar, Blanco, Bosque, Brown, Burnet, Comal, Comanche, Coryell, Erath, Hamilton, Hays, Kendall, Lampasas, Lee, Llano, McCulloch, Mason, Mills, San Saba, Travis, and Williamson.

Governor Shivers, commenting on the program, said he felt it would ease the present situation, but that, "This drouth could get so bad we might have to call a special session to provide funds."

**Judge Re-rules**  
Operation of the Commercial Security Insurance Company of Houston, already once halted and continued, has been stopped again by District Judge J. Harris Gardner.

Gardner, who issued a previous order restraining the firm from business and a later one allowing it to continue, issued the latest ruling on grounds that the company had gone into business on borrowed capital, thus violating state law.

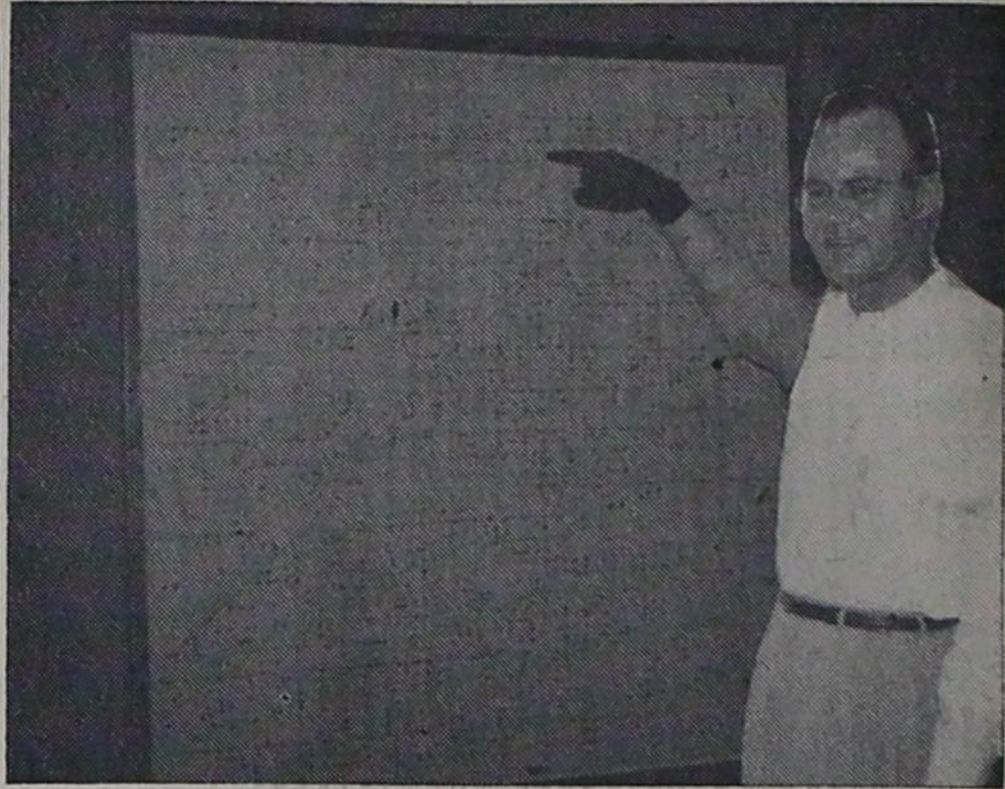
State action charging fraudulent organization against the \$250,000 fire and casualty firm was initiated July 15 by Attorney General John Ben Shepperd. He said he had asked the temporary restraining order at the request of the State Board of Insurance Commissioners.

The order was modified a few days later to allow continuance of the firm's liquidation.

J. D. Wheeler, liquidator for the insurance board, has been named by the court as receiver to supervise all affairs of the company. Ben H. High, company president, said shareholders would receive no loss if the receivership is handled properly.

## Map in Water District Office Shows Location of Parmer County's 1500 Wells

How many irrigation wells would you say are now producing in Parmer County? 900? 1000? 1500?

According to the map in the office of Raymond Euler, chairman of the Parmer County Committee of the High Plains Underground Water Conservation district, the last figure is correct. About four feet square, the map, which is maintained by the committee, has a pin for every well of which the Farm Bureau has a record.

Yellow pins mark the wells already drilled when the permit program was begun on Feb. 1, 1953, and there are 825 of them. Red pins indicate wells for which permits have been issued and number around 675.

Thus, some 1500 wells are now producing in Parmer County.

Abandoned wells are shown with black pins and there are approximately 100 on the map. Euler admits that there are probably many of which they have no record.

Except for this, however, the map is fairly accurate and its accuracy is growing all the time. Whenever a farmer applies for a well permit, he must locate every well that is within a half-mile radius of his proposed well, and should any of them not be pinned, they are added to the map immediately.

Early spring was formerly the season in which most wells were drilled, but a "well drilling season" has completely disappeared. Euler estimates that there have been 220 wells drilled since the first of this year and has counted 108 since April 26.

# jottin's from jeanne

Mrs. W. T. Magness is permitting us to use her recipe for brown sugar meringue cookies this week. Mrs. Magness, who only last week became a doting grandmother, hadn't let the turn of events get her so flustered that she has forgotten her cooking favorites. We wager that it won't be too many years until she will be keeping cookies on hand, just so that new granddaughter will know to look for the cookie jar.

**Brown Sugar Meringue Cookies**  
1/2 cup shortening  
1 cup sugar  
2 eggs (save one egg white for icing)  
1 teaspoon vanilla  
1 1/2 cup flour  
1/4 tablespoon salt  
1 teaspoon baking powder

Mix shortening, sugar and egg and vanilla together; sift dry ingredients, then combine two mixtures. Spread the stiff batter on a cookie sheet.

For topping: Beat 1 egg white stiff, add 1 cup brown sugar and 1/2 cup nut meats. Put over top of batter mixture. Bake 12 to 15 minutes about 350. Cut in bars while hot.



Parmer County cotton farmers this week were warned by the county ASC office that not remedying overplanted acreage can result in the loss of price supports for their crop, plus a marketing penalty of 17½ cents per pound on cotton produced on the overplanted acres.

Office Manager Joe Camp said that there were "about fifty or sixty farms" with excess acres, and that the owners had been advised that they had a 20-day period in which to destroy overplanted acres.

He urged that farmers not overlook the drastic penalties that could result from the practice of exceeding farm allotments.

iod that these workers wish to make it clear that pressure will not be used in any manner. Coin collectors will be set up, letters mailed to all residents, the facts presented and contributions accepted.

In the course of the Amarillo meeting, Dr. Bob Jerrett of Canyon asked some questions about the foundation recommendation for city wide administration of gamma globulin. When his questions had been answered, he immediately left the meeting and went to Canyon to prepare for just such a program. Three cases had been reported in that city in the last few days.

The same workers who assisted in placing the coin collectors in the January drive will be asked to help in this emergency, according to Euler.

The reduction of the death rate from polio, ironically increases the need for funds to treat and rehabilitate patients. The greatest hope being entertained now is that the preventive vaccine will prove effective enough to remove polio from the top crippling disease in the near future, possibly within the next two years.

Brewer and Euler say they are confident that people will want to give something when they understand the urgent need to carry on this work of mercy, completely financed by the American public on a voluntary basis.
