

'We Begin Again' - -

Soil Stewardship Week Observance Set May 23-30

Leon Grissom, chairman of the Parmer County Soil and Water Conservation District announced the official dates of Soil Stewardship Week today. The nationally observed week begins Sunday, May 23, and concludes Sunday, May 30. Locally, the week is spon-

sored by the district. Material has been distributed to each church in Parmer County for use at its direction. When immigrants came to America they saw a land of milk and honey. They sincerely believed the resources of this vast new continent were un-

limited. When the United States became a nation two hundred years ago, the resources were just beginning to be developed. But, already land was being "worn out," so the westward movement began. It never occurred to most

people that there would ever be a shortage of land. They just used the land until it would not produce anymore and then they moved to more productive land. Those days are gone. People now realize all the productive land is being used. Practices

have had to change. Now is the time to re-evaluate the situation - the time to start over. This is the theme of Soil Stewardship Week this year - "We Begin Again." "Two thirds of the world will

go to bed hungry tonight. We must protect the land that is productive now and renew the land that has been abused. If we do not in a few years proud America may have hungry children," stated Grissom. The Parmer County SWCD challenges the people of Par-

mer County to take another look. Are you doing everything you can to preserve our national heritage as king of the food producers? If not the district is ready, willing, and able to help you inventory your resources. (Continued on Page 2)



What a thoroughly delightful time of the year. Cool and invigorating nights complimenting warm but not overly hot days. Of course we need moisture but needing rainfall is a condition prevailing most of the time on these High Plains. This is also the "green" season of the year. Almost everywhere you look it is green. The spring-planted crops are beginning to cover their fields with a green hue. The winter wheat is still green and all the spring grasses and weeds are a glowing green. In a few weeks this will change as the ripening wheat becomes a wavy golden hue and is then cut, returning that area to a natural brown. Weeds and grasses will also begin to react to a slowing growth and our naturally droughty conditions by losing their sharp clear color. All told, this "green" season lasts barely a few weeks on the High Plains but they are a beautiful few weeks of the year.

Well enough of appreciating Mother Nature and back to more mundane subjects. How about talking taxes for a while? We don't like to talk, or even think about taxes but like death, they are always with us. In this case, the city dads of Farwell are taking a big bite out of the budget and are preparing a tax raise for next year. In looking over the proposed budget figures there isn't much doubt that a tax raise is in the offing. At this point the proposed budget looks completely reasonable and one that cannot be reduced to any significant degree. We cannot run a growing city on the level of income of even a few years ago. Everything from wages to bolts and nuts has increased in price and these price increases, coupled with just a modest increase in city services being offered to the local residents, means that the tax level must rise to pay these steadily expanding municipal costs. For goodness sake, be thankful that we are in the Twin Cities where even with an occasional tax raise we still enjoy a low, low tax bite. After all, our past city governing bodies could have been spendthrift fatheads like those in New York and we could be seriously in debt, but we aren't. So let's take heart from the sound financial position our local communities are in and bear a needful tax raise with fortitude if not gratitude.

What a difference a coat of paint makes. We cannot get over the great difference in the looks of the "Clinic" building. It looks so much larger and imposing in its new habiliments. Also the paved parking area adds to the total effect of a big expansion program. We hope that the community's unrevealed benefactor is proud of the work so far. We feel that this gift has been wisely and well spent. Now the question is: Will this be of material help in attracting an occupant? Surely, surely if our facilities can be seen by a prospective man of medicine someone will want to come here for a rewarding career. Also, we understand the convalescent home is progressing ahead of the planned schedule. After the pain and travail of getting started it looks as if the law of averages is smoothing the construction way for a mid-summer gala opening. Ole!

At a time when pressures grow on the land, it is useful to remind ourselves of the origins and history of the Soil Stewardship observance. They stress the allegiance of all men to God and their dependence on His grace for all good things. Throughout the ages, men have offered humble thanks to their Creator for the priceless gifts of air, soil, water, and sunshine which make all living things possible.

The custom of setting aside special days -- Rogation Days -- for this purpose began more than 1,500 years ago in the neighborhood of Vienne, France. Bad weather and earthquakes had brought crop failures and widespread hunger. The Bishop of Vienne called for prayer and penance on the three days preceding Ascension Day. The people responded and implored God for help in their suffering and privation.

Word of what had happened in Vienne spread throughout France -- and then to other countries. The supplication filled a need in the hearts and minds of the people, and as the years went by, Rogation Days were widely observed as an annual custom. By the end of the eighth century, the Church formally adopted the custom. Now, the world over, people on Rogation Days beg the mercy of God and ask that He spare His children the evils of soul and body -- and give good increase to the plants of the field.

In our own land it has met an evident need of the people to set aside a week each year to acknowledge before God our gratitude for His gifts of soil and all the bountiful resources associated with it. The week has become a special time to remind all people that these gifts warrant their best in Christian stewardship.

In America, the soil Stewardship observance has always traced its origins to the Rogation Days. Throughout parts of the South, earlier in this century, churches and their congregations began to set aside the fifth Sunday after Easter as Soil and Soul Sunday.

Subsequently, this became Soil Stewardship Sunday when, in 1946, the publishers of Farm and Ranch magazine suggested to religious leaders in a few southern states that one Sunday be set aside each year to remind their congregations of man's duty to be a good steward of the land.

The response of clergymen and laymen was so warm and widespread that observance of Soil Stewardship Sunday spread steadily to additional states. In 1954, the publishers of the magazine suggested to the officers of the National Association of Conservation Districts that a still wider observance of Soil Stewardship Sunday could aid significantly in bringing about a national awakening and recognition of man's obligations to the Lord's earth. The publishers offered to relinquish their limited sponsorship of Soil Stewardship Sunday to the Association -- which represents some 3,000 local soil and water conservation district organizations throughout America.

The Association accepted, and beginning in 1955 undertook to encourage a nation-

wide observance -- a mission to which it has dedicated itself ever since, under the guidance of a special Soil Stewardship Advisory Committee of clergymen representing many of the country's religious denominations. In 1956, recognizing possible conflicts with the observance of Rural Life Sunday, which was on the calendar of many churches, Soil Stewardship Sunday was changed to Soil Stewardship Week -- beginning with the fifth Sunday after Easter and continuing through the sixth.

Public School Financing Hearing Planned May 24

The Special Committee on Alternatives to Public School Financing will conduct a public hearing Monday, May 24, in Canyon. It will be held in the ballroom of the Activity Center at West Texas State University beginning at 9 a.m. CDT.

The Committee is seeking testimony from interested citizens regarding alternatives to the tax on real property for public school funding. Purpose of the hearing is to discuss the problems of school financing and to transmit input and suggestions to this Committee to present to the next session of the Legislature on the method of financing public schools.

On Wednesday, May 19, a special meeting of the County School Board of Trustees, superintendents and the Boards of Trustees of the independent schools districts within the county and the County Commissioners Court was held to discuss the May 24 meeting and decide upon recommendation to be presented to the Special Committee.

Texico Council Plans To Further Clean-Up

Texico plans to further its clean-up campaign. This was decided during the regular City Council meeting Tuesday, May 11. The Environmental Improvement Agency in Clovis will be contacted in the future and a program will be decided upon.

Texico Chapter of Future Homemakers of America was given permission to paint the fire hydrants in the city red, white, and blue.

Police report of \$340 was approved and a discussion was held concerning the leak in the city hall building.

George Davis of Clovis was given a one-year contract to pick up garbage in Texico. It will be effective from July 1, 1976 to June 30, 1977. The new contract will require Texico residents to use covered trash containers. Trash will be picked up twice a week. Businesses will need dumpsters.

The city hopes to be able to purchase the containers at a reduced rate. If that happens Texico residents will be able to buy the necessary containers at the City Hall.

Sanitation rate increases effective July 1 are as follows: Residents and businesses which do not have dumpsters will have an increase from \$3 to \$4 a month; businesses with dumpsters will have an increase from \$15 to \$17 a month.

Ordinance 198 involving water rate increases was approved. City residents minimum rate will be \$6 for the first 4,000 gallons, 80 cents per \$1,000 for the next 2,000, and over 6,000 gallons will be 35 cents per 1,000 gallons.

Rates outside the city will be \$9 for the first 4,000 gallons. The rest of the rates are the same as for the city residents.

Sewage rates will increase \$1 for city residents and \$2 for residents outside the city limits.

Council members present were Mayor Manford Turnbough and Trustees Ruby Goforth, Vane Doshier and Marie Christian.

Farwell - - Zoning Ordinance Okayed

An ordinance zoning Ridgecrest Unit 1, Ridgecrest Unit 2 and blocks 4 and 5 of Ridgecrest 3 was unanimously passed by the Farwell City Council at its regular meeting Monday, May 17.

Ridgecrest is located south of the school and is one block wide and four blocks long.

The ordinance prohibits the construction or operation of any part of the area for business, mercantile, manufacture or vending purposes. It further prohibits the parking of mobile homes or the abandoning of vehicles.

The Council also proposed a tentative budget for the fiscal year July 1, 1976 to June 30, 1977 in the amount of \$136,514. Expenses included in the budget are: General Fund, \$77,100; Park Fund, \$1,400; and Paving, \$17,000. City Clerk Janie Bowery said that the cemetery was not included in the proposed budget because the city had just taken it over.

Mayor Gil Patschke said that as soon as the Council had time to study the operating expenses of the cemetery they would include it in the budget.

Income for the city other than taxes is \$84,803 leaving a balance of \$51,711 of the budget unprovided for. The present tax rate is 50 percent of evaluation at 80 cents per \$100 evaluation. The Council proposed an increase of 50 percent to 65 percent of evaluation.

After a lengthy discussion the Council decided that the easiest and least costly way to re-evaluate residential homes would be to send out questionnaires to all Farwell residents. Mayor Patschke said it would facilitate matters if the residents will promptly fill out and return the questionnaires as soon as they receive them.

Board Accepts Resignations

The Texico School Board accepted the resignations of three school personnel at its regular meeting Tuesday, May 11.

FAITH VERSUS PRESUMPTION

The Word of God declares in Hebrews 11:6 that "Without faith it is impossible to please Him."
 There is nothing that will haunt a man like the fear that God may be displeased with him, nor any joy comparable to the assurance that He is pleased. It is foolish however, to suppose that we can please God with the things we think He desires. We must give Him what He says He desires. Thank God, it is not difficult to determine this, for He tells us again and again in His Word that it is *faith* He desires most of all. He wants us to trust Him, to take Him at His Word.
 The Bible tells us at length how God loved us in spite of our sin and gave His blessed Son to die on Calvary's tree to clear our title to heaven, but alas, instead of taking Him at His Word, thousands turn away from His gracious offer, "going about to establish their own righteousness" (Rom. 10:3). They do "good works" and make great sacrifices, thinking that a God of love will surely accept their efforts and overlook their sins. But this is presumption, not faith. How can a just God overlook sin? We should thank Him that in His matchless love He Himself paid for our sins so that we might be free, and that salvation is "the gift of God," obtained by faith alone.
 Cain presumed that God would accept his attractive sacrifice instead of the prescribed one, but God refused both him and his offering. Pharaoh presumed that he could take his armies through the Red Sea as Moses had done, but he perished in the sea for presuming on God. Naaman, the leper, refused God's way of cleansing, saying "I thought..." but the great general remained a leper until he took God at His Word. Will you take God at His Word and trust Christ as your Savior?

Thomas is a member of an Amarillo law firm where he has been associated since his graduation.

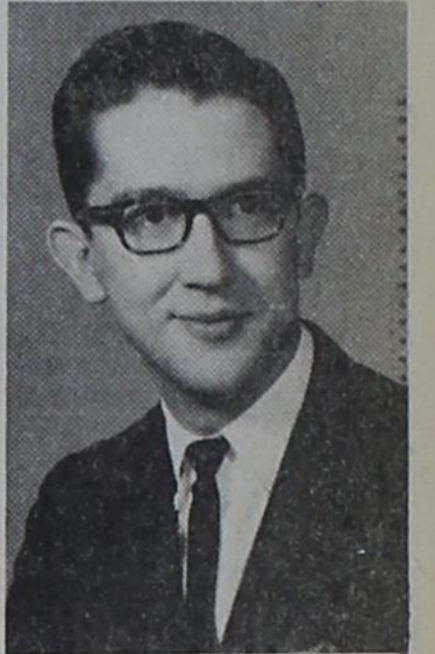
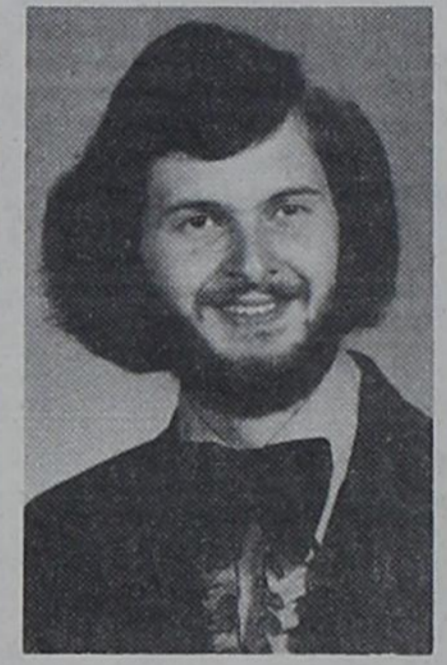

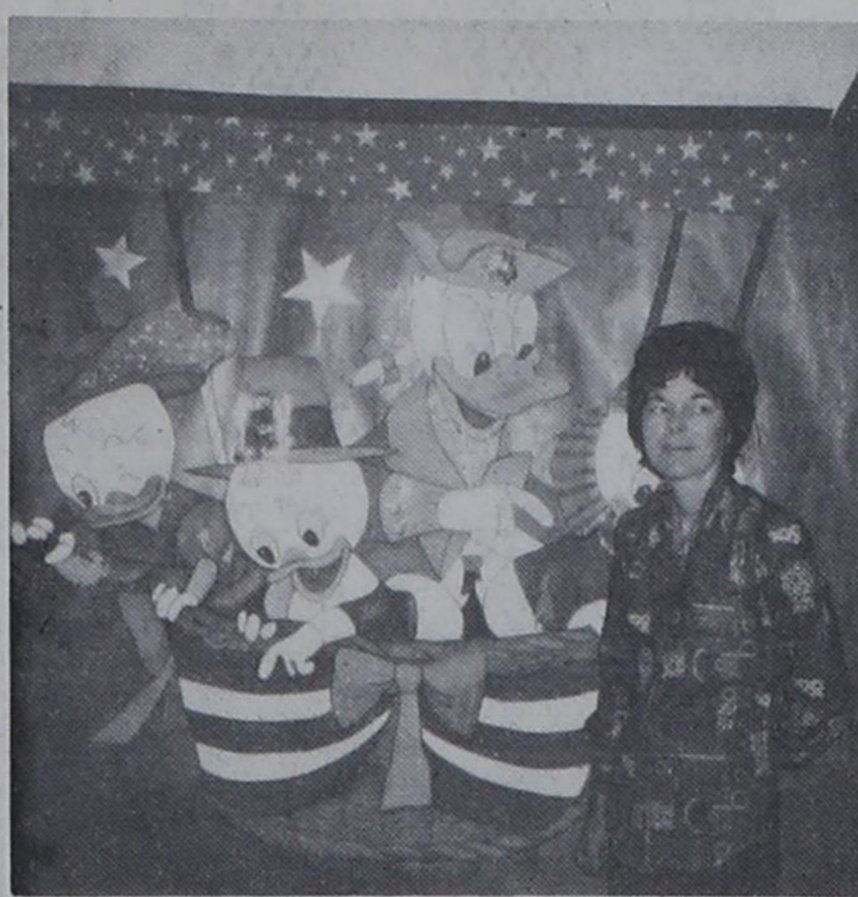

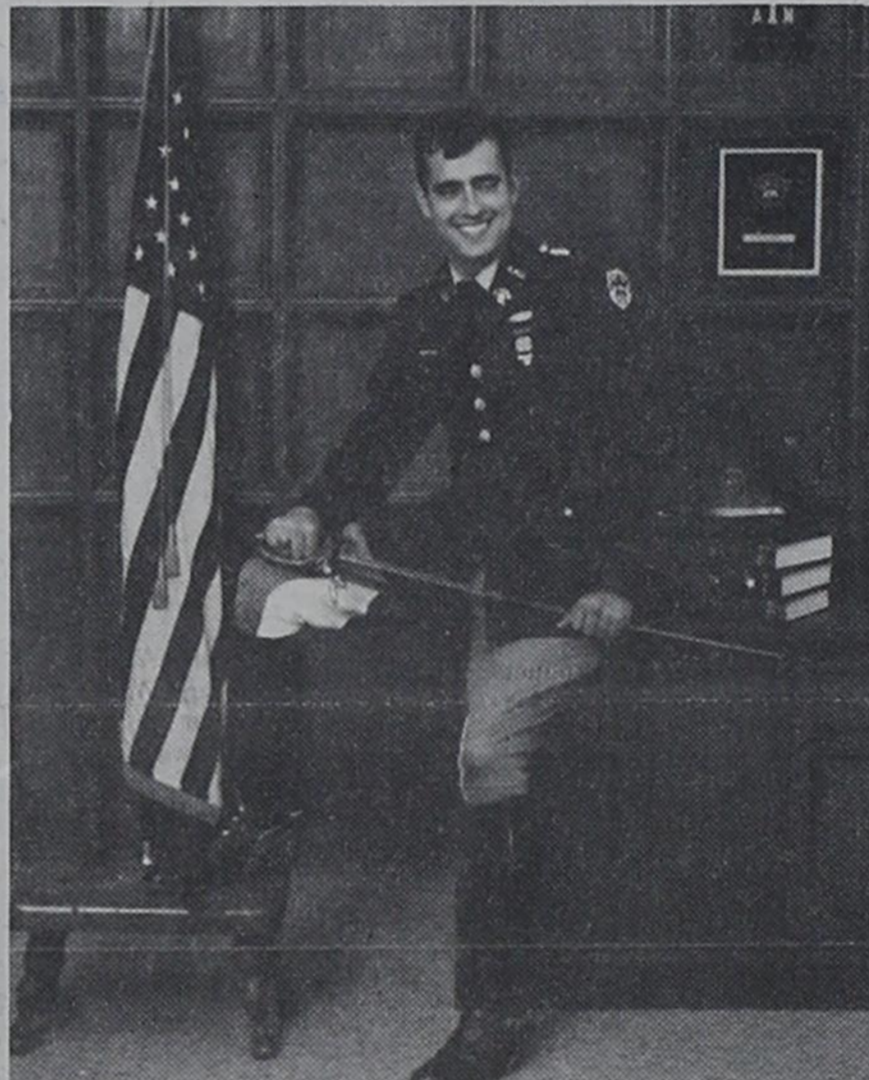
Hospital Notes

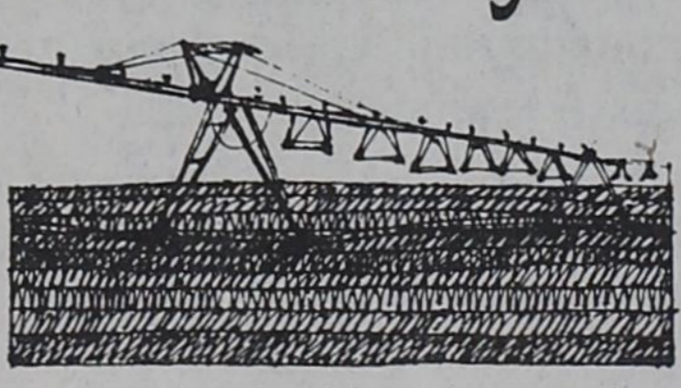

Delegates Elected At Democratic Convention

Four delegates and four alternates were named to the state convention at the Parmer County Democratic Convention held last Saturday at Bovina. Three resolutions were also approved.

The meeting at the First State Bank was attended by 25 delegates. They were elected

to represent their precincts at the May 1 precinct convention. There were 48 delegates eligible to attend.

Don Williams, Hollis Horton, Clarence Martin and Wendol Christian were elected as the county's delegates to the June 18, 19 convention in Houston and the September 17, 18 convention in Fort Worth.

Maxine Williams, Lunel Horton, Louise Christian and Wynona Martin were elected as alternates.

On Presidential election years there are two state Democratic conventions and the delegates will attend both meetings.

Three resolutions were adopted by the convention, and recommended to the state Democratic leadership. Two were sent from the Friona precinct convention.

The first resolution asked for continued support of the Texas Water Plan, for conservation of available water, and continued efforts for a water import plan to provide necessary water for domestic, industrial, and agricultural use in the area.

The second resolution urged the delegates elected by the county to support the party leadership of Governor Dolph

Briscoe.

A third resolution, worded and approved by the county delegates, put the Parmer delegation on record as endorsing the recent presidential primary voting system. It also recommended that the legislature take action to continue this type of vote, whereby every voter has a say in selecting the presidential nominee.

Convention president was Hollis Horton. Convention secretary was Bill Ellis.

Voting precincts represented at the meeting were Friona, Bovina, Farwell, Oklahoma Lane and Rhea.
