Sunrise Services In Park - -

Area Churches Plan Easter Observances

Several area churches are planning special services during the next week to commemorate Holy Week and Easter Sunday.

Hamlin Memorial United Methodist Church will begin Holy Week Services this Sunday, at which Rev. Loyd A. Cain, a former graduate of Farwell High School and pastor of the Trinity United Methodist Church in Albuquerque, will be guest speaker.

At the Sunday morning worship services, Pastor Bob Ditterline will bring the Palm Sunday message "The Day Jesus Rode the Donkey." Rev. Cain will speak at the services Sunday evening and each night through Wednesday at 7:30 CST.

Following the Sunday night service, a reception will be held in honor of Rev. Cain in the church fellowship hall.

Along with the special services each night, the United Methodist Men are sponsoring a church-wide pancake breakfast at 7 o'clock Monday morning, and the United Methodist Women are planning a salad luncheon at 12:15 on Tuesday. Rev. Cain will bring a devotional at both gatherings which will be held in the fellowship hall.

Prior to the Wednesday evening services, the evangelism committee will sponsor a church-wide covered-dish supper, scheduled to begin at 6:30. Rev. Ditterline will bring the

Maudy Thursday Communion Service at 7:30 p.m., as well as the Good Friday service the following night at 7:30.

On Easter Sunday, a community Sunrise Service will be presented jointly by the Methodist Church and the First Baptist Church of Farwell at 6 a.m. CST in the Farwell City Park. Rev. Ditterline will bring the message, and the First Baptist Church will provide the music.

Families in the community and surrounding area are invited to attend the services. Chairs will be provided, but those who wish may view the program from their cars.

Coffee and donuts will be served at the Baptist Church in the fellowship hall immediately following the services.

The Methodist Church will have Sunday School and morn-

ing worship service at the regular time.

In addition to participation in the Sunrise Services, the Farwell Baptist Church will have special services during the 11 a.m. worship hour. During the morning worship service and again at 3 o'clock that afternoon, the Youth Department and the Adult Choir will present the musical drama "The Singer" by Calvin Miller. Because of the afternoon presentation, no Sunday evening services are scheduled.

Pleasant Hill Baptist Church has also scheduled a Sunrise Service Easter morning. The service will begin at 5 a.m. MST and will be held at the church. Special music will be provided for the service, and the message will be brought by interim pastor, Bro. Jesse Shaver of

Clovis. Sunday School will immediately follow the sunrise service.

First Baptist Church of Texico will have a special passover service at 6:30 p.m. MST on Monday, April 16, and will also present an Easter cantata, "The Day He Wore My Crown" during Easter Sunday morning worship service at 10:45 MST. Regular evening services will begin at 6:30 MST.

San Jose Catholic Church in Texico will celebrate the Mass of the Lord's Supper on Maundy Thursday at 7 p.m. MST, and will also observe the Passion and Death of the Lord on Good Friday at 7 p.m. The Mass of the Resurrection will be observed Sunday morning at 9 MST.

We drive some 20,000 local miles each year in pursuit of our business activities. We drive an additional 10,000 miles that takes us well beyond the immediate area. We are always constantly amazed at the number of accidents that take place. No, not how many, but actually how few.

It is a study in human nature to observe the change that takes place in a normal, kind, and considerate person when they slide behind the wheel of their car. It almost seems as if they lose all sense of courtesy, caution, and judgement. And, this just the time they need to display more of each of these qualities.

Several times recently we have narrowly missed an accident on the highway in Farwell. The highway department has created a center turning lane down the middle of the road. This is where you should be in that turning lane well before turning.

Twice, recently, we have been in that lane and the vehicle on the inside of the two traffic lanes has swung across directly in our path and turned in front of us.

We haven't had a collision yet but have lost rubber and temper, both of which we have very little left.

If you turn on the TV for the evening news, you can't help but get a generous dose of political poppycock. While this is pure twaddle, it scares us to realize that millions of people swallow it hook, line, and sinker.

A shot of a candidate addressing a rally showed a great storm of applause over the statement that the arms race was insane. Did that audience applaud the idea that striving to protect the United States from Russian aggression was madness. If so they are insane.

All three of the major candidates have condemned the current administration for military spending and have advocated "negotiation" as a means of limiting our arms expenditures. They have condemned the current political leaders for refusal to negotiate. This leads to some interesting speculation about what would be their basis of negotiation.

Soviet Russia has an unbroken record of lying, cheating, and otherwise circumventing every treaty that they have ever signed. How do you trust an inveterate liar and cheat? Obviously only by demanding and receiving hard and fast rules of direct observation. This the Russian government has adamantly refused.

So, if you negotiate, as is currently being suggested, do you give away your certainty of inspection for the word of a known liar and cheat. Only a naive idiot would do. Yet, in the name of politics it is possible that this would be the action of any one of the three who are currently battling for the Presidency.

This same willingness to forego the certainty of inspection for the uncertainty of a Russian promise seems to enjoy widespread support among the American public.

Incumbents Win Elections In Average Voter Turnout

In what was termed an average turnout, 157 voters went to the polls to cast their ballots in Saturday's Farwell School Board election, and 132 persons voted in the Farwell Hospital District Board election. Incumbents in both races were re-elected by a large margin.

In the school board race, re-elected to three-year terms as

school trustees, were incumbents Joe Hughes with 112 votes and Edward Corn with 109 votes. Others on the ballot were Lee Hutchins who received 46 votes, and Stanley Austin, 29 votes. There were nine write-in votes for Ralph Gates, and four write-in votes for Tom Nichols.

In the hospital district board race, re-elected to two-year

terms, were incumbents Troy Christian with 132 votes, Bert Williams with 131 votes, and Tom Nichols with 129 votes. Also elected to the hospital board for a two-year term was Frances Kube with 128 votes. Receiving write-in votes were Pudge Rose two, Chris Bristow one, Ed Corn one, and D.W. Pierson one.

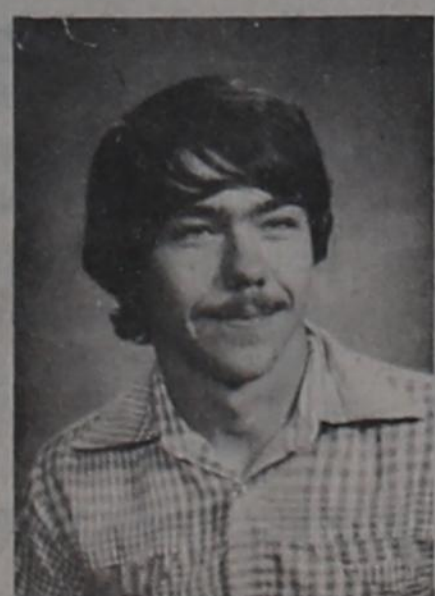

Gerald Curtis Services Held Tuesday Afternoon

Funeral services for Gerald Curtis, 50, of Farwell were conducted Tuesday afternoon, April 10, from Sunset Terrace Memorial Cemetery in Farwell, with Dr. Steve Eckstein officiating. Steed-Todd Funeral Home was in charge of arrangements.

Mr. Curtis died Sunday, April 8, at his home. He was born July 4, 1933 in Farwell, where he resided all of his life.

He was a realtor and a member of the Church of Christ Bible Chair in Portales. He was active

in the Farwell Snakehunter's Club, and he did volunteer work at the Farwell Convalescent Center. He was married to Martha Smith on November 5, 1959, in Clovis.

Survivors include his wife, Martha, of the home in Farwell; a daughter and son-in-law, Toby and Chad Smith of Clovis; a daughter, Lari Curtis of Portales; two brothers, H.W. (Penn) Curtis of Farwell and Duane Curtis of Big Fork, Mont.; a sister, Pearl Holbrook of Boonesville, Ark.; and several nieces and nephews.

Commissioners Court Okays Joining PRPC

Parmer County Commissioners Court voted unanimously to join the Panhandle Regional Planning Commission in its regular meeting Tuesday morning.

Vicki Jacobs of the PRPC met with the Court to explain the service which the group provides in connection with the Agricultural Development Act of 1983.

This act provides that bonds may be issued and sold to finance the processing or marketing of farm products. Several Panhandle Commissioners Courts have elected to band together to form a board of directors for the issuance of these bonds.

Jerry D. Hinkle of Friona was appointed as Parmer County's

representative on the board of directors of the group.

More discussion was held concerning Bravo Pipeline Company's requested easement across the county roads. The Commissioners Court had asked a \$500 fee for crossing each of the nine county roads proposed on the company's construction map.

A company representative had called Judge Porter Roberts stating that he had talked to all counties which would be crossed with the pipeline and that Parmer County was the only one requiring crossing charge or any other payment.

"This was not exactly true," reported the Court, and the commissioners voted unanimously to hold to its original figure and not change its attitude at this

time.

An indigent citizen was in need of transportation from the Parmer County Community Hospital in Friona to the Veterans Administration Hospital in Amarillo. Since this person did not qualify as an ambulance patient, he was transported by a citizen in his private automobile. The Court agreed to reimburse this citizen for mileage in the amount of \$35.

Boarding care bills on the county foster children for March 1984 in the amount of \$2,139.00 was approved for payment. The amount will be reimbursed to the County.

The County Treasurer's quarterly report was accepted and approved that it be published in the three County newspapers.

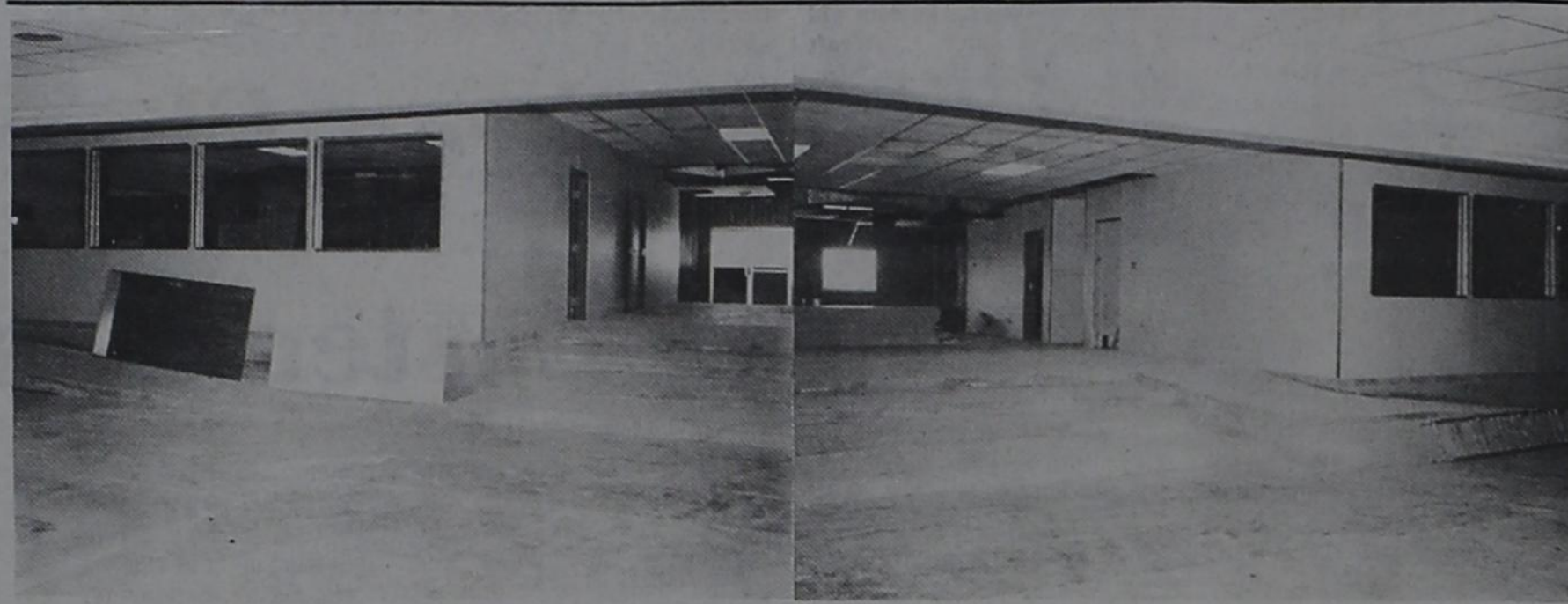
In preparation for the Primary Election to be held on May 5, the Court approved the dates of April 19 and April 25 and 26 for absentee voting at Friona.

Alternate Buck Gaddis is a member of the Texico high school band, FFA, and is running for the office of Student Council president. He has been selected to Who's Who in Music for 1982-83, and is listed on the honor roll.

Purpose of the Boys and Girls State is to inform high school juniors of their rights, duties, privileges, and responsibilities as American citizens so that they will be well prepared to participate in government as adults. The sessions will pro-

vide them with citizenship training and will teach them how to live together as self-governing citizens.

As Boys and Girls State representatives, Doug, Danny, and Karen will have the opportunity to participate in forming a mythical 51st state, and to elect their own officials, make and enforce their own laws, set up their own form of government, and argue causes before a senate. The entire program is strictly non-partisan and the political parties are purely mythical.

Although Boys and Girls State is sponsored by the Clovis American Legion and Auxiliary, several area clubs and organizations contribute financially to the support of the delegates.

Hughes Re-Elected Prexy Of Farwell School Board

Farwell School Board in its meeting Monday night canvassed the returns of the Trustee Election held on April 7, and declared that Joe Hughes and Edward Corn were re-elected with 112 votes and 109 votes, respectively. Lee Hutchins received 46 votes, Stanley Austin received 29 votes, Ralph Gates nine votes, and Tom Nichols four votes.

On the reorganization of the Board, Joe Hughes was re-elected president, Wilbert Kalbas was re-elected as vice-president, and Edward Corn was re-elected as secretary.

The Board approved the annual Evaluation Report on the Chapter I and Migrant programs presented by Pat Owen, and also approved the list of transfer students presented.

Board members voted to give the Army surplus gas grill, which is no longer used in the

kitchen, to the Farwell Community Center.

Also approved was the athletic budget of \$35,500 plus the net gate receipts, and it was agreed to let the administration trade the weight machine for solid weights, if all the coaches concur.

The Board considered its position on proposals of the Select Committee on Public Education, and voted in favor of the following: an elected State Board of Education, an independent UIL, teacher evaluation as a shared responsibility between the teachers and administrators, annual achievement tests, full day kindergarten, and the current funding formula.

The Board opposed mandating board member training, no state funding for vocational education, competency testing for all professional personnel, pre-kindergarten education for children age 4, the extended school day, an extended school year, a common calendar, and Texas Education Agency responsibility for determining consolidation.

In other action, the Board

approved that the salary of Lacy Langan, junior high custodian, be increased to \$4.06 per hour, and also agreed to raise the salaries of non-professional employees by \$3.30 per hour, effective September 1, 1984.

The Board also approved the hiring of Mrs. Murlene Hill as math teacher for the 1984-85 school term at \$875 per year above the state salary schedule.

In final action, the Board accepted the financial reports and approved the payment of bills.

Board members present were Wilbert Kalbas, Maxine Williams, Floyd Coates, Steve Pierson, Edward Corn, and Joe Hughes. Absent was Richard Haseloff.

Also present were W.M. Roberts, Lynn Burton, Jerry Owen, James Craig, Frances Boling, Pat Owen, Edith Martin, and Angie Charlson.

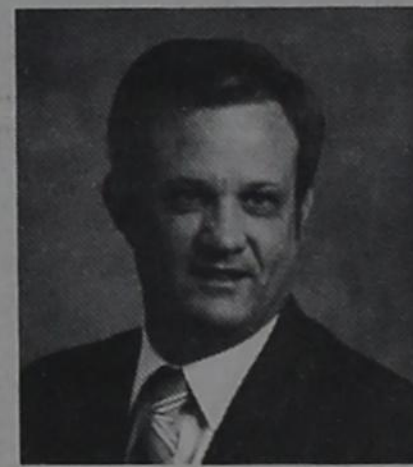

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Fire Departments - -

Sirens To Warn Of Tornadoes

At this time of year, it is difficult to tell, when we see dark clouds forming on the horizon, whether we are about to experience one of winter's final farewell snows or blessed with one of spring's welcome rains.

One thing's for sure, however, along with the passing of winter snows and the arrival of spring rains come the inevitable thunderstorms and possible tornadoes that plague this area each spring and summer.

To remind area residents, and especially to inform newcomers to the area, the Tribune reviews the Twin Cities tornado warning systems and tips on what to do in case of a tornado.

A person is usually alerted to threatening weather conditions through local television and radio stations.

Should a tornado "watch" be declared for this area by these stations, this means that weather conditions are such that a bad storm or tornado could develop, and we should keep an eye on the weather outside.

If a tornado "warning" is issued, this means that we

should seek shelter immediately until all danger has passed.

If a tornado is sighted near by, or a warning issued for this area, the Texico and Farwell volunteer fire departments will alert the community through use of the fire sirens.

Texico's siren will blow for two complete cycles with no pause in between. Each cycle will consist of one continuous blast.

The Farwell siren will sound for two complete cycles consisting of five blasts each.

Because members of both fire departments are equipped with pagers that they use in case of fire or medical emergencies, the sirens will be sounded only for Thursday night fire meetings, or as a tornado warning.

Should the siren blow during threatening weather, Twin Cities residents are advised to seek shelter immediately in the nearest basement or suitable shelter.

Persons in mobile homes are advised to leave their homes and take shelter elsewhere in a safe place.

If driving during a warning, a person is advised to drive away from the tornado at a right angle, or stop the car and seek shelter in the nearest ditch or ravine.

Farwell City Council Hears Cable Report

Farwell City Council heard a report from representatives of Midwest Video Monday night when it met in regular session at the city hall.

Lynell Skarda and Gordon Smith met with the council members to report on the Midwest Video cable system and to request a renewal of its franchise which expires in July.

The representatives explained that they now have 20 channels on the cable, plus three paid channels, and that the monthly rate for the cable will increase to \$10.50 from the current \$7.50 per month rate. Charges for the paid channels, including the HBO channel, will be \$10 each per month.

The city will receive three percent of the gross under the renewal franchise, instead of the two percent now received. The city fathers did not act on the renewal at its Monday night meeting.

Council members approved the publishing of a notice to bidders on the seal coat for

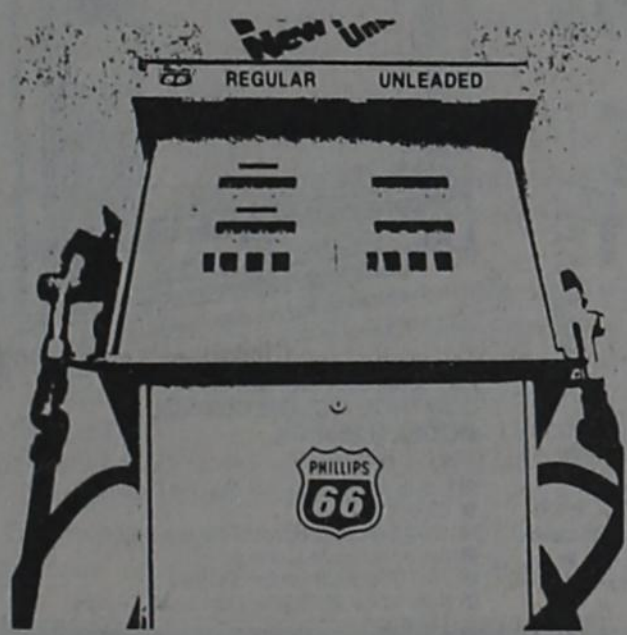

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Estellene Billington Tours Australia And New Zealand

Estellene Billington of Farwell recently returned from a three-week tour of Australia and New Zealand. Estellene and a friend, Lillian Hamilton from Earth, made the trip with a tour group from Southland Travel Agency in San Francisco, Calif. According to Mrs. Billington, 31 of the travelers in the group were from Texas.

After a brief tour of San Francisco, the tour group left by plane for Australia. Following a brief stop over in Honolulu, Hawaii, they arrived in Melbourne, Australia, on February 22.

While in Melbourne, the group visited the Royal Horticultural Society of Victoria and viewed the gardens in Mt. Dandenong. They also viewed the National Rhododendron Gardens at Olinda and traveled to Phillip Island to see the miniature fairy penguins. These birds were quite a sight, said Estellene, as they emerged from the sea to waddle across the dunes into their burrows.

Another stop on the tour was at the Royal Botanic Gardens, where the group toured 100 acres of Australia's native plants and trees.

From Melbourne, the group traveled over the vast farming and grazing country, across the water rich Goulburn Valley Region to take a look at the Brown Brothers Milowa Vineyard, before crossing over into the state of New South Wales.

While in the new state, the tour group joined a group of flower and garden enthusiasts to discuss flowers and gardening over dinner before proceeding to Wagga Wagga, the garden capitol of the Riverina region. After a brief tour here, the group once again headed across the vast farming country, through the historic town of Yass, to the federal capitol, Canberra.

In Canberra, they viewed several diplomatic residences and embassies, High Court, the national library, and the Botanic Gardens and slopes of the Blue Mountain.

The last stop in Australia was Sydney, where the group took a guided tour of the city's night life district of King's Cross. They also spent an evening at the Sydney Opera House, and attended a performance of the "Merry Widow."

The group visited Double Bay, Vancluse Watson's Bay, the Gap, and several beaches around Sydney, and lunched at a waterfront restaurant. From there, they took a harbor cruise from Pier #6, viewing Fort Denison, the Admiralty House, and the Opera House.

Before leaving Australia, the group took one final tour to see an old colonial mansion and sandstone building which was built during the convict days, and also to see what Estellene described as "the most wonderful collection of palms and flowers" at the Royal Botanic

Gardens.

The group then departed Australia, and traveled by plane to Christchurch, New Zealand, their first stop in that country.

On Saturday, March 3, the group joined a member of the Canterbury Horticultural Society, a Federated farmer who operates 1028 acres, with 4,000 sheep and beef cattle, and 400 acres of crops which included cereals and small seeds. Half of the farm is spray irrigated, explained Estellene.

The group also enjoyed a special luncheon hosted by the local farming community.

The group visited various parks and gardens in Christchurch, and according to Estellene, they especially enjoyed meandering slowly through the vast canopy of well established trees and flora which line the Avon River in the Botanical Gardens.

They visited Hagley Park and several sports playing fields, and took a trip down University Drive to see the gardens and stately homes of Pandalton, the ultra modern homes of Ilan and Avonhead.

They viewed the Cathedral, the Gothic University buildings, Christ College, the Town Hall, and the floral clock. During their stay in Christchurch, the members of the group were invited to several homes for dinner and relaxation by community hosts.

After leaving Christchurch, the group proceeded across the Canterbury Plains by way of Cran River, turning westward to Geraldine, and followed the Tasman River to Hermitage.

The group enjoyed visiting the Whakauwau Thermal Re-

serve where they saw steaming geysers, boiling mudpools, and a model Maori village, before continuing on to the Agrodome where they viewed a display of various breeds of New Zealand sheep, a champion sheepdog herding his sheep, and a champion sheep shearer hard at work.

Next the group visited the Rainbow Spring trout pools, and saw New Zealand's native bird, the Kiwi, in its natural surroundings, and they enjoyed a special Maori style "Hangi" meal, and a concert of songs and dances.

Next on the agenda was a visit to the famous Glow Worm Caves. Mrs. Billington said that after silently gliding into the caverns by boat, the pitch blackness inside the caverns appeared starry by the lights of the millions of tiny glow worms.

The final stop in New Zealand and the final stop of the entire tour was made in Auckland, where they gathered for a farewell dinner at Fisherman's Wharf. While there they visited several popular beaches and waterfronts at Waiteremata Harbour, and the Rose Gardens.

The tour group then boarded a plane and headed for "our great U.S.A." Mrs. Billington's final stop in her journey before reaching home was in Fort Worth where she visited with her son and daughter, Mike and Katherine, and her sister Loucile Foster.

Commenting on her trip, Estellene said that it was wonderful making new friends, but that it was even nicer to return to all her wonderful friends here at home.

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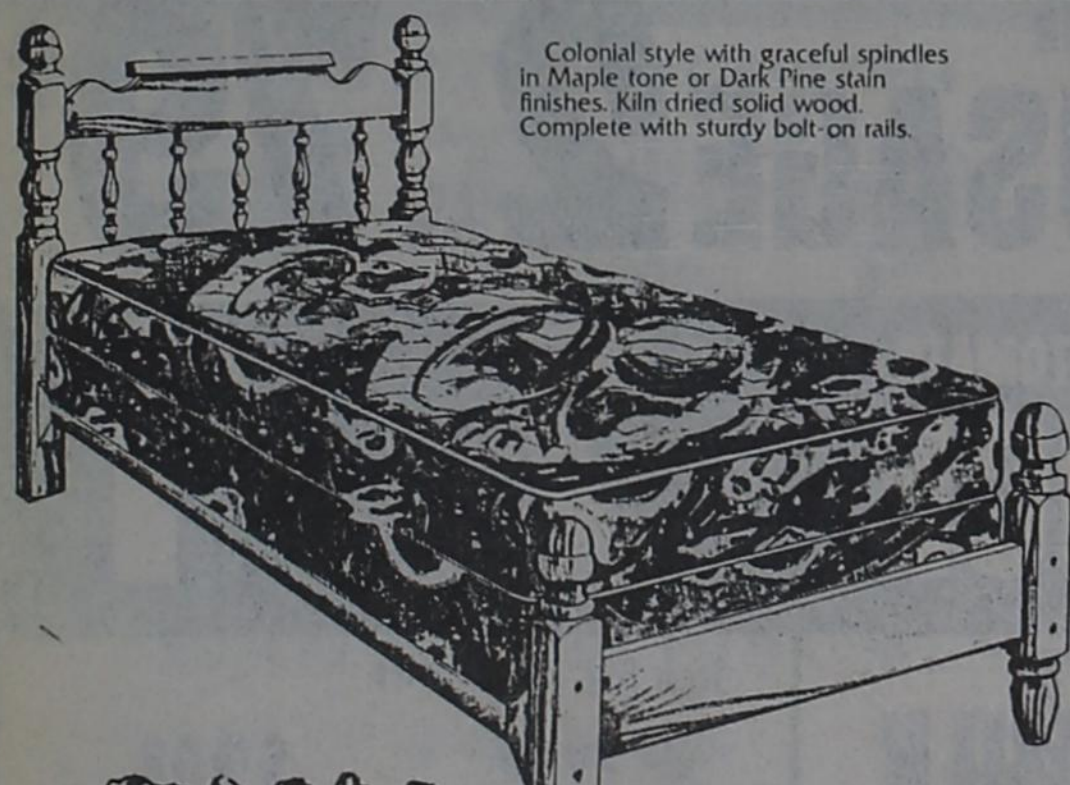
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Tisket, A Tasket: Edible Basket



An Easter basket to sink your teeth into! Just like the family's favorite straw baskets that are saved from year to year, this recipe for an Easter confection cake will appear again each year for the holiday table.

Developed by home economists for the National Confectioners Association, the cake is perked up with raspberry jelly candy and topped off with a red licorice stick handle. Jelly candies fill the basket to overflowing.

For year-round use of the recipe, remove the red licorice stick handle and add your favorite candies of the season - like a harvest basket for autumn candy or Christmas wreath with holiday peppermints.

Candy Basket Cake

- 1 (2-layer size) package white cake mix
- 1 (3-ounce) package raspberry gelatin
- 3/4 cup water
- 1/2 cup salad oil
- 4 eggs
- 4 ounces raspberry jelly candies, cut in half
- Assorted jelly beans and other candies
- 2 red licorice sticks

Drizzle Icing

- 1 1/2 cups sifted confectioners' sugar
- 2 to 3 tablespoons lemon juice or milk

In large bowl of electric mixer, combine cake mix, gelatin, water, oil and eggs. Beat at low speed until blended, about 1 minute. Scrape sides of bowl. Beat at medium speed for 3 minutes. By hand, stir in raspberry candies. Pour batter into a generously greased and floured Bundt pan or a 10-inch tube pan. Bake at 350° F for about 55 minutes, or until a wooden pick inserted in center comes out clean. Cool cake in pan on a rack for 10 minutes. Then remove cake from pan and cool completely. Fill center of cake with assorted candies. Insert wooden picks halfway into one end of each licorice stick, then stick other ends of picks into opposite sides of cake. Tie licorice sticks together over center of cake, with a ribbon, to form handle.

Make Drizzle Icing: In small bowl, blend confectioners' sugar with 1 tablespoon lemon juice until smooth. Gradually add additional lemon juice until icing is easy to drizzle from tip of a teaspoon. Drizzle icing over top and sides of cake.

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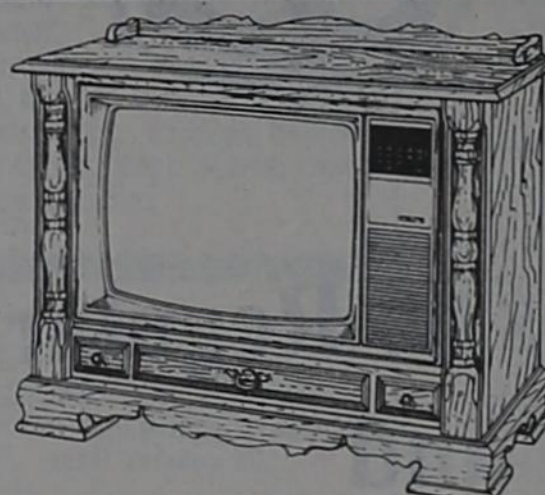
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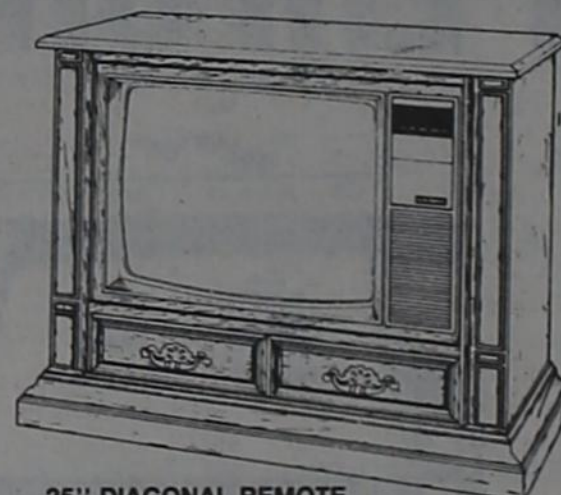

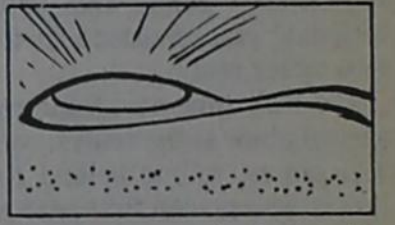
Farwell Elementary, Jr. High UIL Eliminations Underway

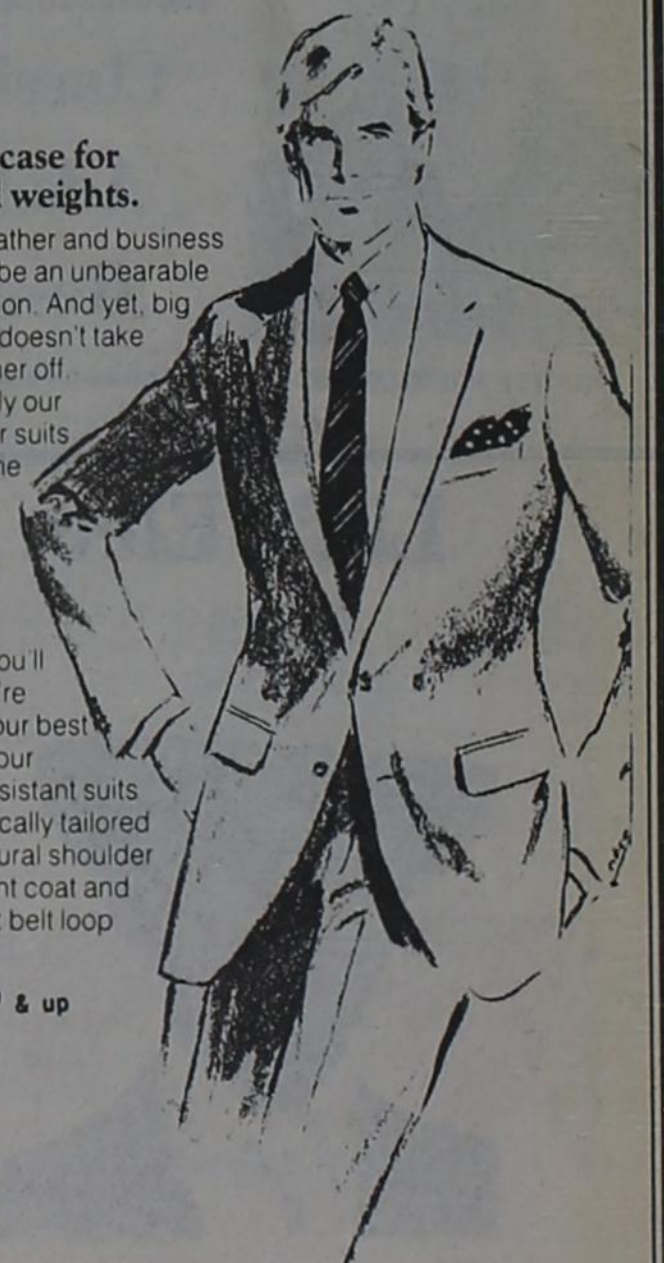

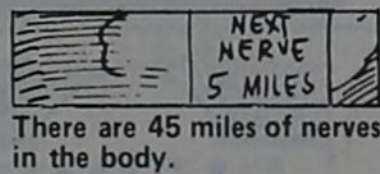

Special guest was Mrs. Mary Hargett, who accompanied Mr. Scott and told many interesting facts about him.

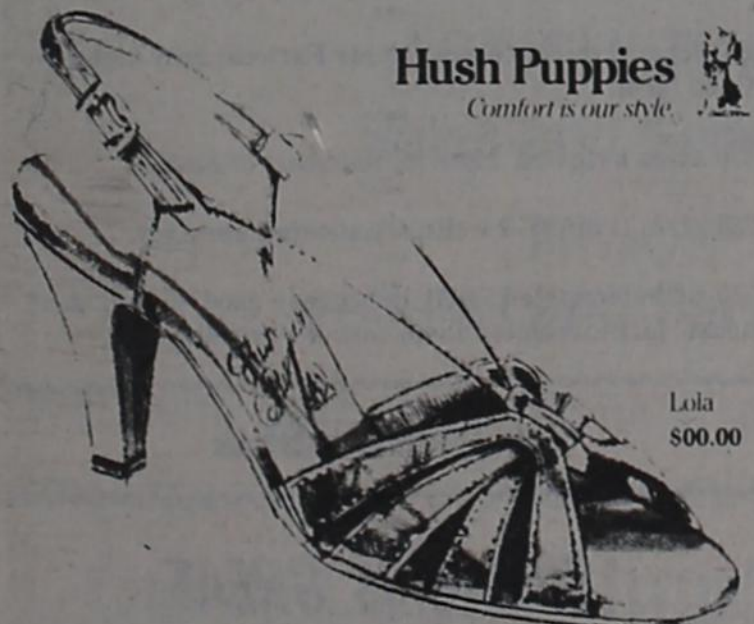

The junior high track teams also participated in the meet, but at press time, overall standings were not available.

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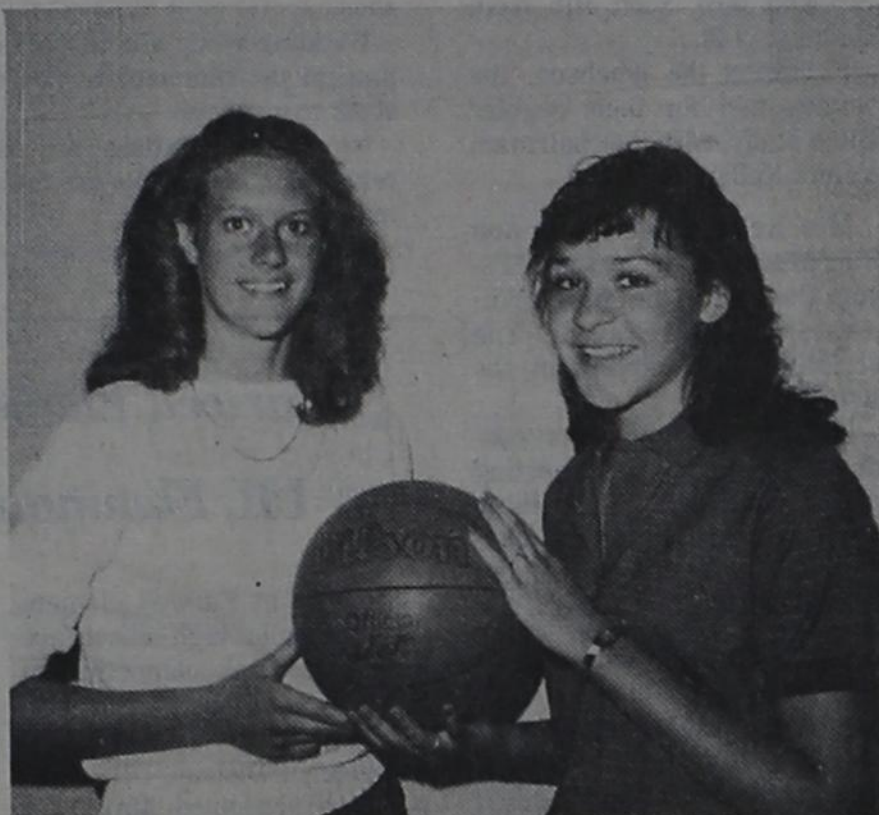

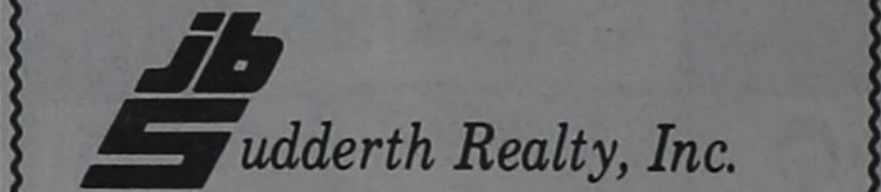

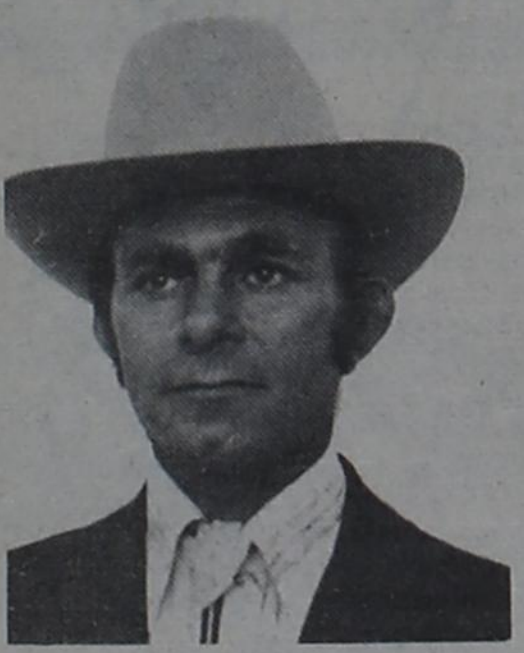
