# Swine Flu Shots To Be Given Today

Swine Flu inoculations will be administered to interested persons today (Friday) between 1 and 3 p.m. at the Farwell Medical Clinic, says Jeannie Norris, clinic administrator.

Everyone is encouraged to get the shots during the specified times today, Mrs. Norris says, adding that the vaccinations are to be given free of charge. Members of Theta Rho chapter of ESA will help administer the shots.

The clinic received the first shipment of the vaccine Oct-

ober 6, with additional supplies arriving the following week.

The flu vaccine comes in different types and Dr. Jerry Don Gregory of the clinic will explain to each person what type shot he needs for flu protection, depending on the age and condition of health of that person.

Plans to conduct the Swine Flu Clinic last week were terminated when the Canyon Health District, of which Parmer County is a member, temporarily called a halt to

the program pending an investigation into the deaths of three elderly people in Pennsylvania who died within hours of taking the shots.

According to reports, there is no evidence to link the Swine Flu shots to the deaths in Pennsylvania.

The "all clear" sign was issued by the Texas State Health Department Monday and inoculation programs in Texas are resuming their normal schedules.

Dr. Paul Spring of Friona, Parmer County Health Officer,

said the Friona hospital received 16,000 Swine Flu shots the first week in October. According to Dr. Spring, some 800 inoculations were administered in Friona before the temporary suspension of the program.

"We still feel that the inoculations are a good thing. But we were obligated to stop the vaccinations as a precautionary measure," stated Dr. Spring.

Swine Flu inoculations are underway again and are being administered at the hospital on Saturday mornings, and Monday and Wednesday afternoons, Dr. Spring said.

Dr. Spring said they will maintain this schedule for administering the injections until they run out. He added that they are supposed to receive additional supplies of the vaccine on a weekly basis. He said hospital staff members and auxiliary hospital staff members will assist with the vaccine program.

Dr. Spring said the shots are bivalent for persons 65 years of age and older, and those who suffer from chronic illnesses, and monovalent for persons ages 18-65.

He added that there will be no charge for the Swine Flu shots given at the Friona

hospital.

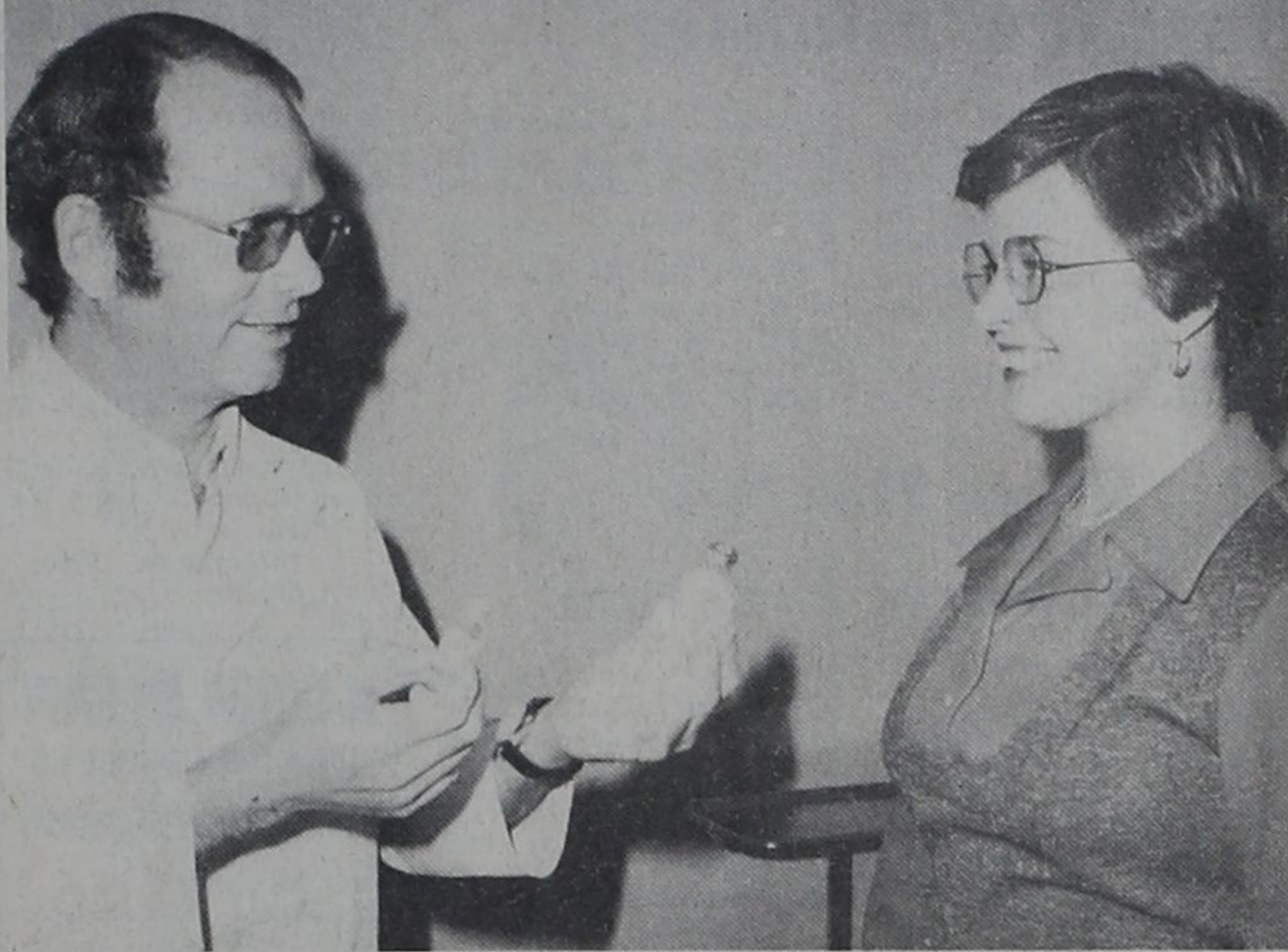
Dr. Spring said that it is safe to take the vaccine, explaining that although some persons may run a low grade temperature a few days following the shots, that should not prevent a person from getting the flu protection. He recommends that all area residents get the shots as it becomes available, adding that it may be awhile before there is enough vaccine to inoculate the entire population of Parmer County.

He added that it is even safe for pregnant women to get the flu shots, cautioning that the only ones who should not take

the vaccine are persons who are sensitive or allergic to eggs. He stressed that anyone having a cold, fever or infection should wait until those ailments are cured before having the flu shots.

Dr. Spring explained that the Texas State Health Department received the vaccine from the national government which in turn distributed the flu shots to the health districts in Texas. He added that Parmer County is in the Canyon Health District.

The Friona doctor said that the Panhandle area received 3.2 percent of the total Texas allotment of the shots.



Swine Flu Vaccine

After a week-long delay Farwell Medical Clinic will administer Swine Flu shots today (Friday) from 1 until 3 p.m. Dr. Jerry Don Gregory is showing vials of the vaccine to Clinic Administrator Jeannie Norris. The Swine Flu clinic originally scheduled for last Friday was temporarily suspended. The Texas State Health Department has now issued the "go-ahead" for the Swine Flu inoculation programs to resume throughout the state.

### Local Resident Dies In Light Plane Crash

Two men were killed Tuesday afternoon when their 2-passenger light plane crashed four miles south of Texico.

The two men were identified as James E. Parker of Farwell and Ben A. Smithson of Clovis.

Smithson was the chief instructor for Air Plains West which is based at the Clovis airport. The plane apparently crashed while Smithson was giving flying instructions to Parker.

According to reports there were no witnesses to the fatal crash. Area farmers said they did not hear the plane crash on the Jackie Roberts place, located about one and one-half miles from the Texas-New Mexico state line.

Roberts, a Clovis resident, reported that he was working on his irrigation sprinkler system when he noticed a white object in the field. Upon investigation he discovered the plane with the two men still inside. There was no fire.

According to Roberts, the plane was apparently flying from south to north when it crashed into his field. After the first impact the plane bounced about 100 feet, he

said. Roberts said he thought the craft hit the ground tail-first. Then it broke in two just behind the cockpit.

The location of the crash site is near Castor Feed Yard. Joe Thomas, medical investigator, pronounced both men dead at the scene.

The incident is being investigated by the New Mexico State Police and the Federal Aviation Administration office in Lubbock. The bodies of both men were taken to Albuquerque for autopsies.

Funeral services for Parker will be conducted today (Friday) at 10 a.m. MDT at the Steed-Todd Memorial Chapel in Clovis, with the Rev. Gowens, pastor of the Primitive Baptist Church of Clovis, officiating. Burial will be in Hale Center.

He was born in Lubbock July 8, 1943, and moved to Clovis from Lubbock in 1972. He and his family had lived in Farwell for a year and a half at 210 Second Street.

Parker was a 1965 graduate of Texas A&M University and was a member of Rotary International. He was also a

member and deacon of the Primitive Baptist Church.

Mr. Parker was owner and operator of the A & B Farm Supply in Clovis.

Survivors include his wife, Kay; and three children, Glenn, Thomas and Sandra, all of the home; one brother, Elvis of Perryton; two sisters, Mrs. Oneta Sinklea of West Monroe, La., and Mrs. Delores White of Pelzer, S.C., and his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Lesol Parker of Floydada.

He was preceded in death by two brothers and one sister.

## Smith Top Winner; Takes Contest Lead

In a somewhat unusual occurrence in the Merchants Football Contest, the person calling the most games correctly last week also emerged as first place contender in the overall standings.

What usually happens is that the leaders in the overall

guessing manage to have a good average each week and normally do not jump into weekly winnings very often.

But Eddie B. Smith, who has not guessed fewer than seven games correctly any week this year, called 10 right this time to move out of fourth place

In the third place spot are Dan Geuther, Ron Hancock, Leigh Ann Kirkland and Ellen Wurtser, all with 56 points. Having 54 points for fourth place contention are Gay Goettsch, Jack Kirkland, Sherman McCully, Thad Phillips, Tex Smith and Dorris White.

In sixth place with 53 points are Johnny Curtis, Susan Franse, Carolyn Herington, Russ Jones, Mrs. E.A. Key, Missy Taylor and Beulah Williams.

Mr. Meissner died Tuesday morning in his home of an apparent heart attack.

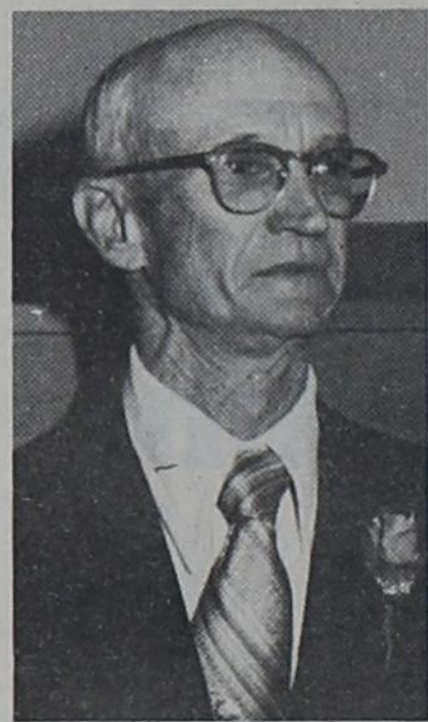

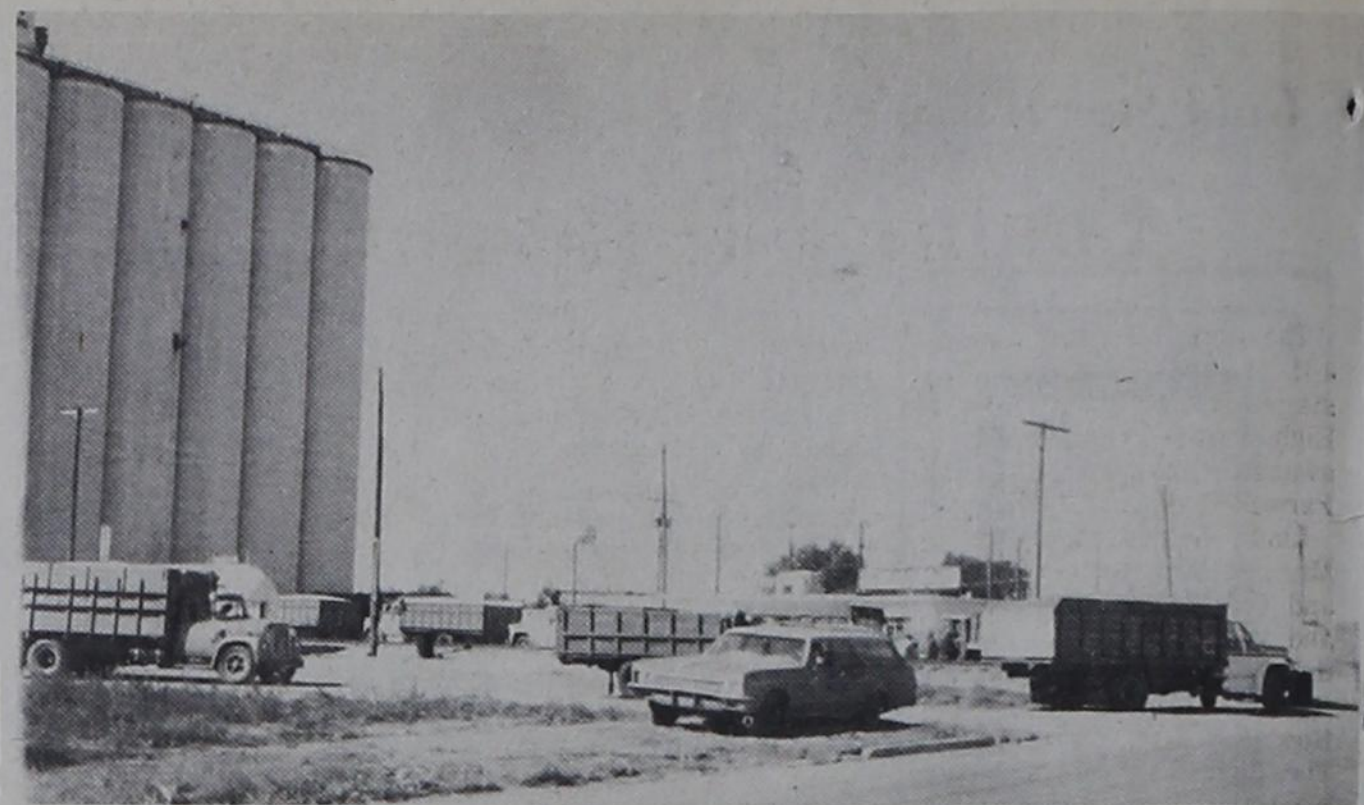
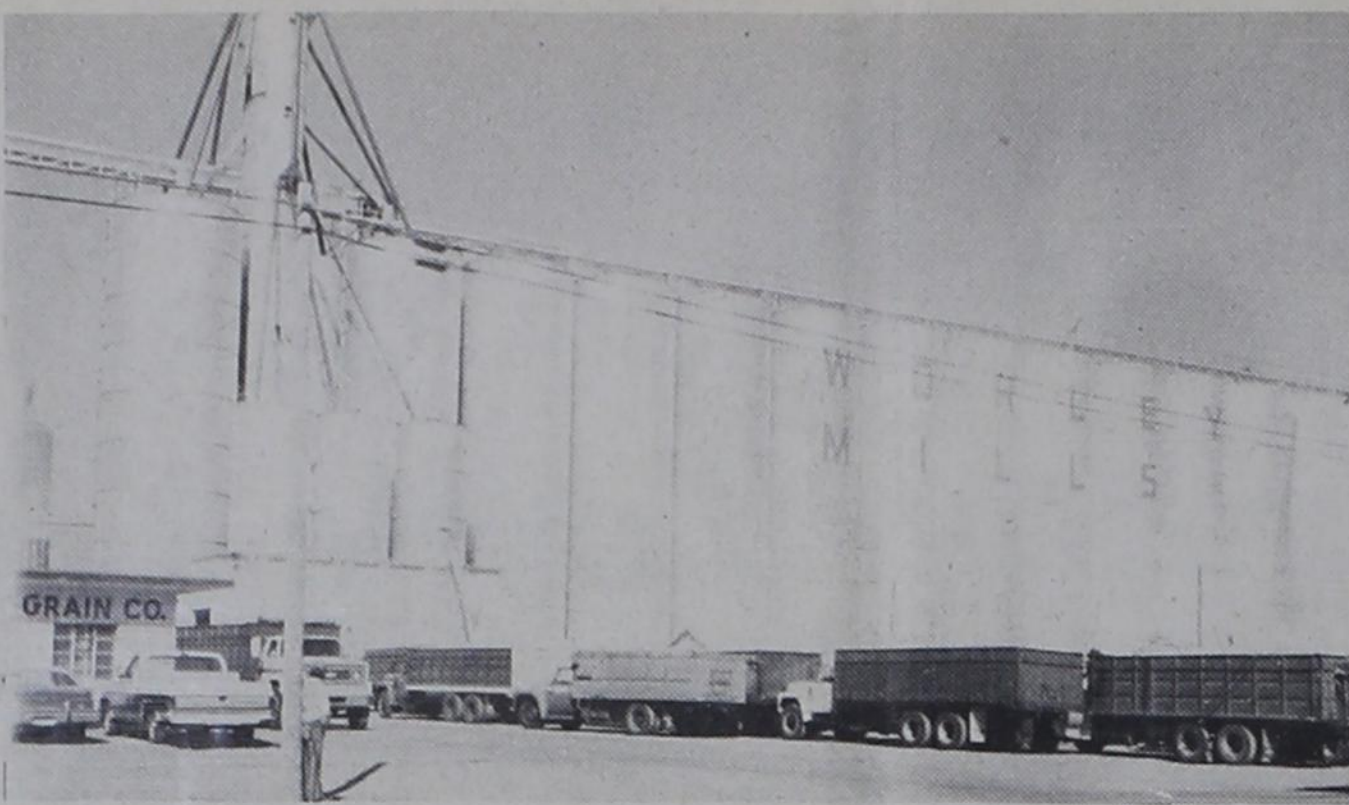

# Sheriff Reports Rash Of Thefts

A rash of thefts has been reported by Parmer County Sheriff Charlie Lovelace. A chain saw was taken from the Eugene Van Story place east of Lariat, reports the sheriff. Story lives in Morton and the house was vacant at the time of the theft. Six hundred gallons of diesel fuel were taken from the Gene Vasek place, two miles north of the Hub community. The fuel was kept in an underground tank, according to Sheriff Lovelace. Vasek lives in Hereford. A citizen's band radio was removed from a grain truck which was parked at Worley Mills, Inc. in Farwell. The truck belongs to Don Lovett. Another CB radio was taken from a pickup owned by Bill Hill of Lazbuddie. The theft occurred while the vehicle was parked at the Lazbuddie Schools Bus Barn where Hill is employed as a driver. Sheriff Lovelace also reported that a .22 caliber rifle valued at \$200 was taken from a pickup belonging to Monty Barrett of the Oklahoma Lane Community. Another case under investi-

gation by the sheriff's department involves furniture which was taken from the Jerry Fancher place southeast of Hub. Jesse Solis had been living in the home prior to the theft. Sheriff Lovelace said Solis returned home after an absence of three months and discovered that the furniture was missing. Another reported theft occurred at the Robert Zetsche place near Friona. Sheriff Lovelace said a "chain horse" had been taken. The sheriff reported that jewelry valued at \$300 was taken from the home of Mrs. Jessie Arias who lives in the Hub community. Other cases being investigated involve check forgeries and vandalism. Six forged checks, each written for the amount of \$20, have been passed in Friona. Charges were to be filed Wednesday, Sheriff Lovelace said. A vehicle parked at the True Bell residence in Farwell was vandalized, according to Sheriff Lovelace. The rear view mirror and the antenna were broken off.

## Committee Named For Jim Reese

A Parmer County committee for the election of Jim Reese for Congress has been named by Jimmy Briggs, chairman. The members are: Jack Hamil, Peggy Hamil, Frank Hinkson, John Getz, Vernon Estes, Linda Marshall and Lee Stevenson. Jim Reese is an outstanding young man, and his political philosophy is most conservative, reports Briggs. "When I am elected, I will work to get the government off our backs and out of our pockets! I will vote to cut back the number of Washington bureaucrats who are burying us in a sea of rules, regulations, and red tape," says Reese. George Mahon, his opponent, has been in Washington 42 of

his 76 years, and a recent study made by the Americans for Constitutional Action shows that Mr. Mahon no longer thinks or votes as a West Texan, according to Briggs. This study, said Briggs, shows he has voted as follows: 57% of the time against a sound dollar, 65% of the time against a private market and individual freedom of choice and for government price fixing and controls, 50% of the time against private ownership and for government ownership, and 49% of the time against a strong national defense. "We believe the political philosophy and beliefs of Jim Reese (see pd. ad.) are more that of the West Texan than those of his opponent," said Committee Chairman Briggs.

## Fall Harvest Scenes

While the harvest of corn and milo are in full swing in the area, truck drivers find the most time-consuming part of the harvest is the long wait to be dumped at local elevators. Corn with enough moisture content to be dried must be dumped in certain pits after it passes the scales. With some 30-40 trucks in line on the lots at all the local elevators, the wait to get a truck unloaded can sometimes take the greater

part of a morning or afternoon, thus slowing delivery of the harvested crop. Harvest of the estimated 215,800 acres of corn in the county started in late September and early October and is in high gear at this time. Reports are that this year's corn yield will equal or exceed that of last year's crop. Good yields are also being reported on area grain sorghum.

a survey of the Old Testament. These studies will be continued Wednesday night from 8:30 to 9:30 p.m. The Sunday night session held from 6 to 7 p.m. will begin a study of the Sermon on the Mount. Howell said he became a Christian when he was 15 years old. "Becoming a minister was natural for me. That is what I have always wanted to do," he said. ## Texico Has New Resource Program

The Texico Junior High has begun a new program for the remediation and development of visual and auditory perception and skills and of eye-hand coordination. Attention is also given to students' individual learning styles and verbal expressive skills, reports Mrs. Joann Edwards, Junior High Resource Room teacher. Junior High students are placed in this developmental program for one class period daily, for one nine weeks session usually from 2:30 to 3:00. Junior High students will serve as models or teachers for a group of elementary students, who also participate in the program. "Auditory and visual deficiencies and lack of reading and academic success are highly correlated, and involve essentially the same procedures." "It is hoped that improving and remediating deficiencies in these areas will increase

the student's ability for academic achievement. The younger the child, the more opportunity for success, and emphasis is being placed on the primary age child," says Mrs. Edwards.

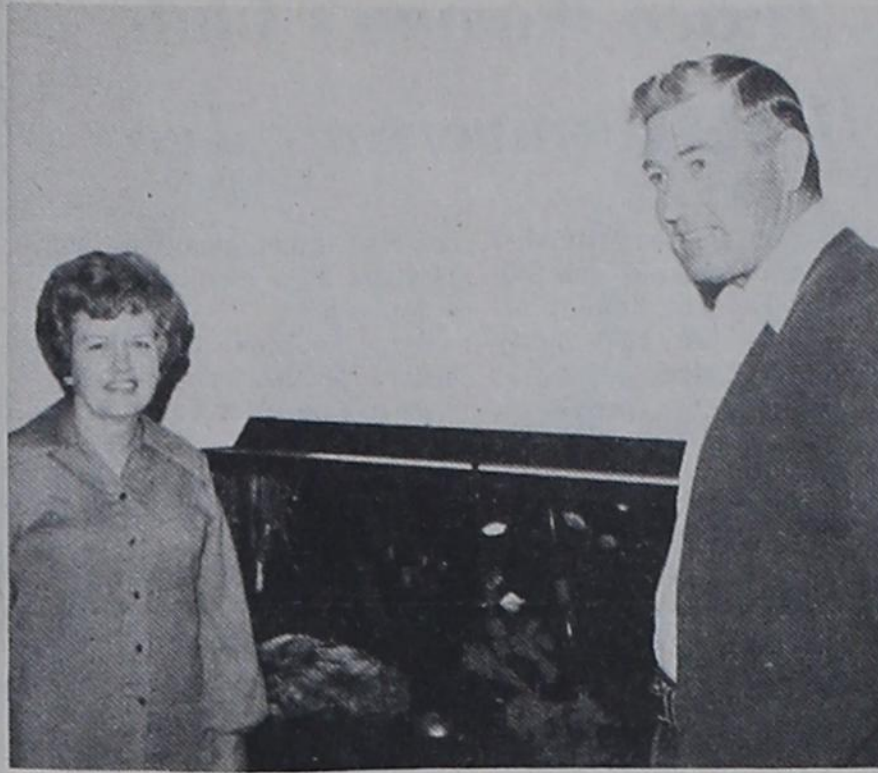

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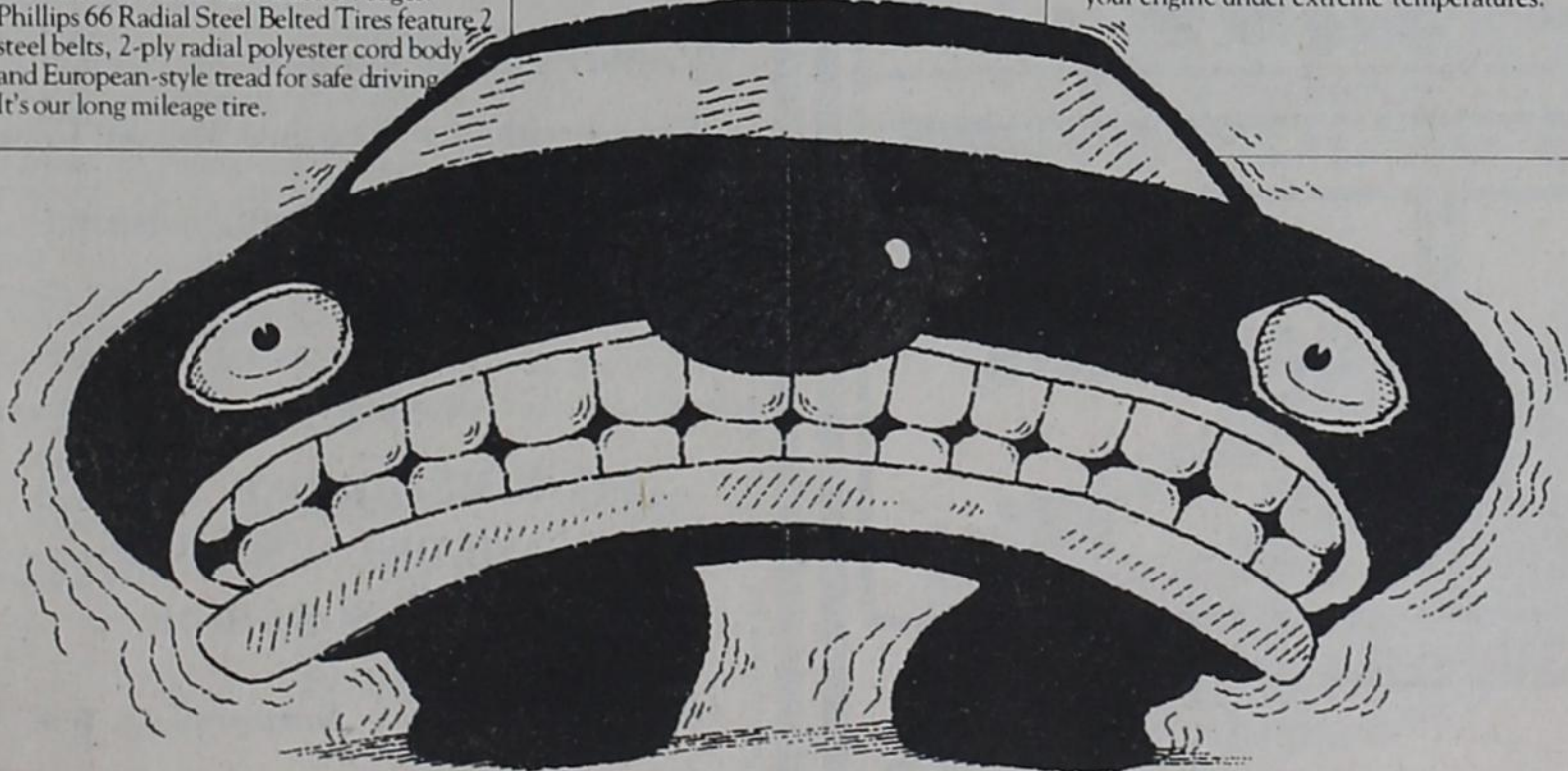
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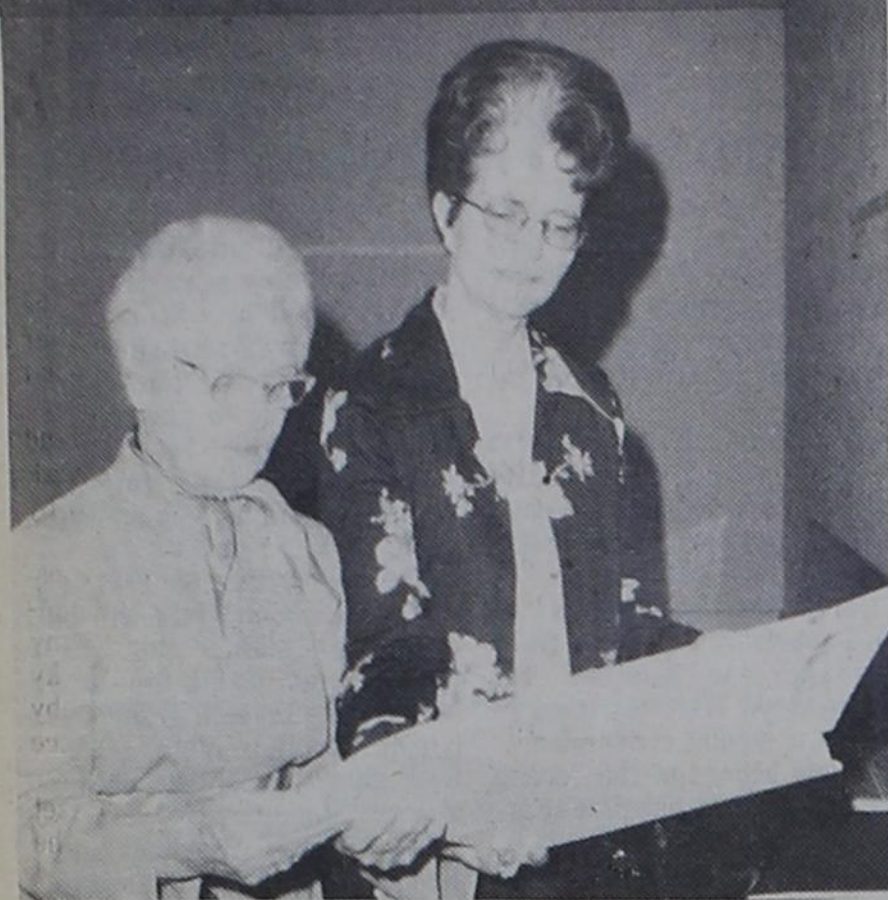

**'Right To Read' Tips For Parents**

**After Your Child**

**Starts School**

(Editor's Note: This is one of a series of articles prepared for publication by Pat Owen, Director of the Right To Read program at Farwell Schools.)

Parents can also help children learn to read after they start school. You should keep on doing many of the things already described in last week's article and add these:

1. ENCOURAGE YOUR CHILD TO READ TO YOU: Most children just learning to read, want, naturally, to demonstrate their newly-achieved ability to the people who mean most to them, namely their parents. So lend a willing ear when your child wants to read something to you.

2. HELP IF NECESSARY: If the child is just beginning to read, don't hesitate to help with words that cause diffi-

culty. Later, you can help your child figure out such words independently. Sometimes a child can decide what a word is by looking at the picture on the page. Or a child can skip over the unknown word and by reading the rest of the sentence can figure out the word from the sense of the sentence.

3. TEACH YOUR CHILD TO TAKE CARE OF BOOKS: Your example is the best teacher. Treat books with care, and your child will do the same.

4. GET YOUR CHILD A LIBRARY CARD: Help your child get a borrowing card at the public library. The power to borrow books of one's own choice independently will build self-esteem and also instill the idea of books as good sources of entertainment and information. And ask the librarian to suggest good books.

5. BUY BOOKS FOR YOUR CHILD: Birthdays and holidays are good times to buy your child books. The child who owns books is usually interested in reading them.

6. PLEASE YOUR CHILD: Learning to read is not as easy as the average adult reader thinks it ought to be. A child needs encouragement; so praise yours for any success, however limited. You should always assume that your child is working up to capacity.

7. BE PATIENT: Your child may miss the same word many times, even though you keep supplying it. Don't worry about that because it is not unusual. If you are patient, sooner or later your child will learn the word. If you find you are getting angry or impatient, stop and do something else. A child who is scared, upset, or under pressure is less likely to learn than a child who is calm and unworried.

Remember, learning can be fun! Relax, have fun with your child and don't criticize. Your child will learn better in a happy situation than in a tense one.

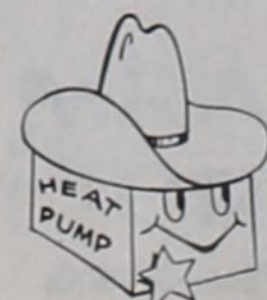

Bovina fumbled at the 48-yard line and Joe Haseloff recovered for the Blue and White. On the next play Travis Bibbs broke for a 53-yard run. Farwell now faced a first and goal situation at the four-yard line. Two plays later Mike Goettsch ran the ball in for the touchdown. The kick for the PAT failed and the Steers had a 6-0 lead.

Bovina returned the Farwell kickoff to the 33-yard line, but was unable to sustain a drive and punted.

With 35 seconds left in the first quarter of action Russ Jones scored on a quarterback keeper. The kick for the PAT was no good and the Steers went in front, 12-0.

Bovina received the ball in the opening minutes of the second stanza, but the Mustangs were unable to earn a first down. Carlos Lucio returned the Bovina punt. Goettsch ran for 14 yards and 20 yards on two successive plays. Tim Norton picked up four yards, but an illegal procedure penalty forced Farwell into a first and 15 situation. Bibbs was stopped for no gain on the next play.

Lucio caught a Jones pass for the first down on the 11-yard line. Farwell was unable to cross the goal line with the pigskin and a frustrated offense turned the ball over to Bovina on the three-yard line.

Momentarily the Mustang offense came alive as they marched 97 yards for their only touchdown of the night. Thirteen plays later Ruben Salazar went in for the score. The kick for the PAT was good and the Mustangs trailed Farwell 12-7.

With 3:13 remaining in the first half Bovina attempted an onside kick, but an alert Clay Roberts recovered for Farwell. The Blue and White took possession on their own 48 yard line. After three plays and one first down, the Steers fumbled at the 29-yard line. Bovina recovered with less than a minute and a half remaining in the half.

Bovina was unable to move the ball and the half ended

with Farwell holding on to its five point lead.

A "see-saw" battle marked the third stanza of play. Bovina kicked off to the Blue and White and Jones returned it to the 25-yard line. Goettsch earned five yards on two plays. Chip Craft drove for the first down, but an illegal procedure penalty made it a first and 15 situation.

Bibbs caught a Jones pass for the first down, but the Steers were unable to sustain their momentum, and punted to Bovina. Several plays later the Mustangs fumbled and Farwell recovered.

Billy White sprinted for 14 yards and the first down. Bibbs earned ten yards and another first down on three carries. Jones was thrown for a loss on the next play. A

## Cocher Whatley Sizes Up Farwell Steer Win

A combination of criticism and praise can best describe Steer head coach Van Whatley's mood following Farwell's 30-7 3-A conference win over Bovina Friday night in Steer Stadium.

"I am pleased that we won," said Whatley. "But we didn't play well and I think the kids realize it, too."

Whatley did not select an outstanding forcing unit man.

15-yard holding penalty forced the Steers into a third and 27. Jones' pass to Bibbs was incomplete and the Blue and White punted the ball away.

Bovina was unable to score and as the fourth quarter opened Farwell took possession of the pigskin and erupted for 18 points in this period.

Bibbs sprinted 70 yards for the first fourth quarter touchdown, but the kick for the extra point ruled no good, increasing Farwell's lead, 18-7.

Bovina took the Farwell kickoff to the 34-yard line, but was unable to sustain a drive. The Steers received the ball on their 49-yard line, but were unable to move the ball and punted to Bovina. Danny Harris fumbled and it was the Steers' ball again. Three plays later Jones scampered in for

six more points. The kick for the PAT was blocked and the score climbed to 24-7.

Gerald Shelby returned the kickoff, but on the first play Jones intercepted a Ronnie Cary pass to stifle the Mustangs' drive. With 53 seconds left in the game Bibbs caught the final touchdown pass, increasing Farwell's lead to 30-7. The PAT failed.

Bibbs kicked off to Bovina and Tim Norton stopped the return. The final seconds of the game ticked away before Bovina could put together a scoring drive.

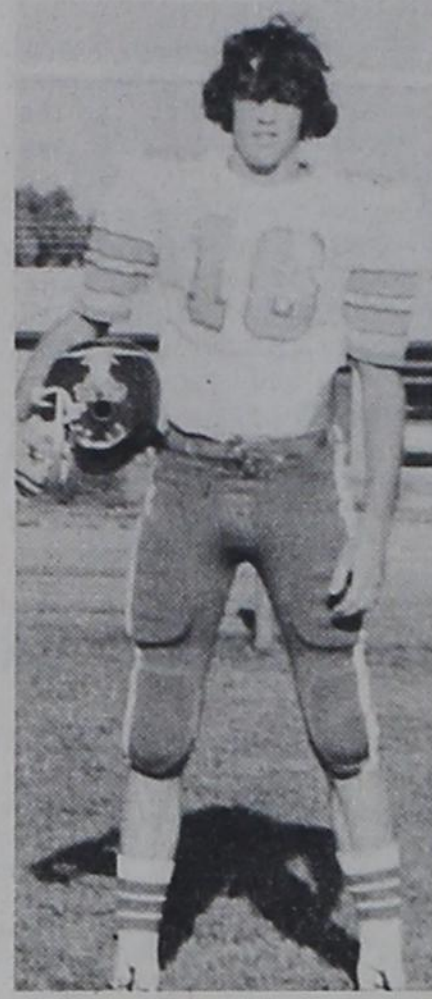

# High Flying Cardinals Whip Wolverines 40-8

The Cardinals flew away with the score in the Texico-Eunice game Friday, Oct. 15, defeating the Wolverines 40-8.

On the kickoff, Wolverine Robert Lacy returned it to the 20-yard line. Using a handoff, Texico lost three yards, but Hill took another handoff and gained three yards back. An incomplete pass on the next play forced the Wolves to punt.

Eunice returned the punt to the 47-yard line. The Cardinals gained eight yards on a hand-off followed by a five-yard gain on a Wolverine's offside penalty. John Burgett and Steve Turner came through to stop the Cards with a five-yard loss. Mike Williams and Mark Howard then moved in to give Eunice another five-yard loss. The Cardinals gained six yards and then 17 yards, but were unsuccessful in attaining a first down and the Wolverines took control of the ball.

The Green and White started out with a loss of four yards, but gained twice that back on the next play. Homer Ashley then connected on a pass to Turner for eight yards. Hill gained three yards up the middle. A lateral to Hill made another two yards and Ashley went through the middle for five yards. Texico then suffered a five-yard loss. A lateral to Hill gained only two yards.

After an incomplete pass, Texico punted and Eunice took the ball on their 15-yard line. They gained four yards on an end sweep followed by a five-yard and a one-yard gain. Burgett and Howard then forced them into a five-yard loss. But the Cardinals came back with gains of 10 and five yards. The first quarter ended scoreless.

Texico started the second quarter by giving the Cardinals a five-yard gain on an offside penalty. A Cardinal pass then gained 18 yards but the Cardinals were held to a six-yard gain "with a super play," as Coach Topliff commented at the time. Larry Rolan held Eunice to a one-yard gain, then Hadley stopped the runner after a 12-yard gain. The Cardinals then fumbled and recovered it for a one-yard loss. The Wolverines then forced a three-yard loss, and following an incomplete pass and a Eunice clipping infraction, Texico gained possession of the ball.

An end sweep gained 12 yards and a lateral to Hill gained six yards. They then had an incomplete pass and lost nine yards, causing them to punt. Hadley stopped the punt returner on the 30-yard line. The red team gained two yards but then lost five yards on a penalty. They then gained 11 yards, eight yards, and six yards before going across from the 15-yard line with 4:42 left in the half for the first score of the night. The extra point attempt was no good.

Hill returned the kickoff to the 29-yard line. He then gained a yard on a handoff but they lost five yards on the next play. A Cardinal penalty

gained that five yards back, but Texico then fumbled the ball and Eunice recovered. The Cardinals picked up a first down with gains of four and six yards. Three plays later they gained another first down, and with 48 seconds left in the half, the Cardinals scored on a one-yard plunge. The two-point conversion was good and the Cardinals went ahead 14-0.

Wolverine Loera returned the kickoff to the 25-yard line. Askew then gained six yards, Ashley picked up four yards, and a pass from Ashley to Turner gained 20 yards. The half ended before Texico could score and Eunice remained in command, 14-0.

Eunice returned the second half kickoff to their 37-yard line. The Cardinals had an offside penalty, but the next play saw a 15-yard gain and first down. They gained another four yards but lost 10 on a rule infraction. They gained three yards back and then lost a down instead of 15 yards when Texico declined a Eunice penalty. On a long pass the Cardinals gained 33 yards. Texico then held them to three yards on two carries, but another pass gave them 21 yards. Again the Wolverines held the red and white to a one-yard gain and a two-yard gain.

Then, with 7:49 left in the quarter, Howard Ziegler went across for the third Cardinal score. The PAT failed when Ashley blocked the kick.

Hill received the kick in the end zone and Texico took the ball on the 20-yard line. Going to the air, Ashley hit Turner for a 30-yard gain, but they lost 10 of these on a penalty. After an incomplete pass, Texico went back to short gains by Hill and Askew until, short of a first down, they were forced to punt. The punt accounted for Eunice again scoring as Ziegler ran it from his 20-yard line all the way down the sideline for the TD. Turner blocked the pass for the PAT.

Loera again returned the kickoff, this time to the 30-yard line. A handoff to Hill made two yards followed by a 15-yard loss on a Wolverine penalty. Again with an air shot, Ashley connected with Turner for 25 yards and a first down. The Wolverines then suffered a five-yard loss but another pass to Turner gained five yards back, plus 10 more yards on a Eunice penalty. Ashley then gained a yard followed by a three-yard gain by Hill on a handoff. Although Turner snared another pass for a good gain, a Wolverine penalty gave them a 15-yard loss. After an incomplete pass and a 12-yard loss, Eunice returned Texico's punt to the 44-yard line. A ground play gained the Cardinals seven yards, and a Texico penalty gave them five. After a five-yard gain, another Wolverine penalty gave them 10 yards. Then they gained eight yards, had an incomplete pass, and lost five yards on a Cardinal penalty. They had another incomplete pass and then gained five yards. As the buzzer sounded to end the

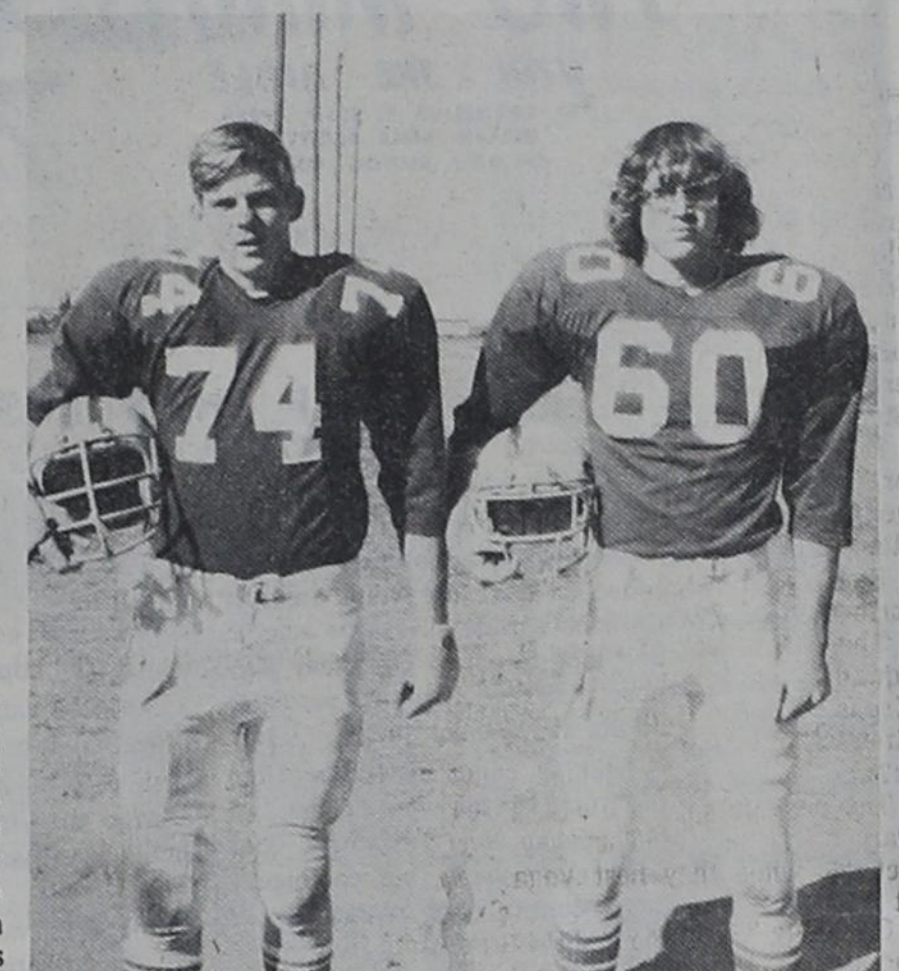
quarter Eunice again went across to score. A pass play gave then two more points on the PAT and the third quarter ended with Eunice ahead 34-0.

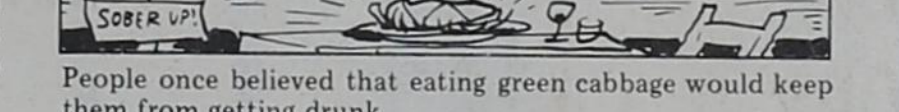

Topliff said the anticipation

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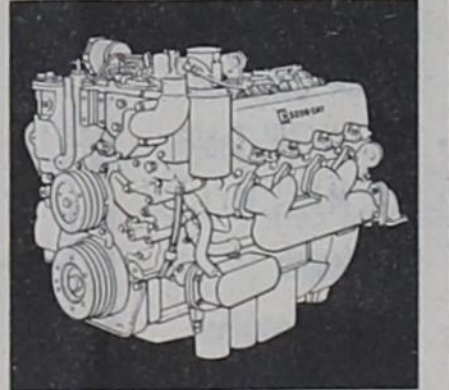

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**SOBER CHRISTIANS**

"Let us, who are of the day, be sober..." (1 Thes. 5:8).

Many people entertain the erroneous idea that truly spiritual Christians must always be solemn and long-faced. In fact, they suppose that such Scripture passages as the above teach this.

Nothing could be farther from the truth, for the word "sober," in our English New Testament does not mean solemn, but completely under-control. This is also true of the original Greek word from which the English word "sober" is translated.

Sobriety in Scripture, as in modern English, is the opposite of drunkenness.

This is brought out in the rest of the passage cited above. Along with its context, this passage reads as follows:

"For they that sleep, sleep in the night; and they that be drunken are drunken in the night."

"But let us, who are of the day, be sober, putting on the breastplate of faith and love; and for an helmet, the hope of salvation.

"For God hath not appointed us to wrath, but to obtain salvation by our Lord Jesus Christ,

"Who died for us that... we should live together with Him" (1 Thes. 5:7-10).

Thus those who are "of the day," and know Christ as their Savior, should not "sleep" on the one hand, or "be drunken" on the other, but should be awake and alert, their faculties completely under control, so that they might witness the more effectively to the saving grace of Christ.

If ever there was a time when true Christians should "watch and be sober," it is now.

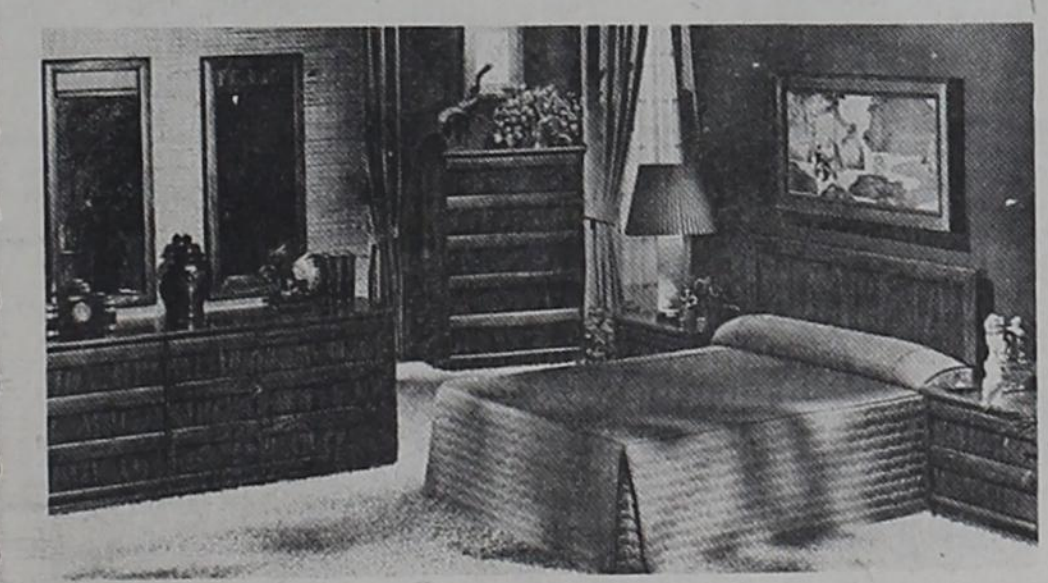
