McGuire grew up in the Oklahoma Lane Community and was licensed to preach at the church there. Mrs. Zelda Donaldson Ellison of Dimmitt, former Oklahoma Lane resident, will sing

several selections. A morning message will be delivered by Rev. Vance Zinn of Bridgeport, Tex., director of missions. Rev. Zinn served as pastor of the church from 1953 until 1956.

Everyone is invited to attend the dinner which will be served at noon.

The afternoon session will

open with messages from other former pastors. A few of these will include Rev. Bob Roberts of Portales; Rev. J.J. Terry of Bovina, retired pastor; Rev. Charles Vick of Canyon and Rev. Carl Coffey of Sayer, Okla. Also on the program will be two former interim pastors, Dr. Fred Howard and Dr. Cecil Golden, who are both associated with

Wayland Baptist College in Plainview.

At 2 p.m. another featured speaker will be James Symcox of San Marcos, Tex., son of Mr. and Mrs. Vernon Symcox and grandson of the late Mrs. Addie Rundell, who was a charter member of the church.

Also during the afternoon session the recitation of the

history of the church will be completed. To conclude the anniversary celebration special guests and members of the congregation will sing hymns requested by the congregation. There will be no evening services.

How green is our valley? Don't know, 'cause we don't have any valleys out on the Golden Spread. We can say that the High Plains are as green as we have ever seen them. The combination of the winter wheat along with the spring planted crops that are now well up in the fields make us a very green country indeed. Let's enjoy it while we can, seeing as the wheat will very soon be turning to a golden hue and then our unrelieved emerald color will be spotted with the golden harvest we will reap in June.

As a passing thought, we need to be even more aware of the possibility of youngsters in the streets now that the summer school hiatus is with us. With the ubiquitous skate board, watching for the tads is even more important this summer.

Oh history, where are thy lessons? Apparently they are lost on many people, our President included. The lesson of Korea in the early 1950's is not being heeded by our government. We believe that General Singlaub is quite correct in thinking that the North Korean dictatorship will look upon any significant withdrawal of American arms from that peninsula as an open invitation to aggression.

The history of Vietnam is not going to be lost on the leadership of North Korea. Our massive internal disinclination to fight a war will make a Korean venture for the Communists very attractive. After all, they did win in Vietnam and even stand a fair chance now of the American government giving them foreign aid.

Singlaub was sacked for publicly disagreeing with the Administration. In the strict sense this was the correct procedure for the government to follow. Yet there is the nagging question of our roving United States Ambassador Andrew Young. He has caused our government embarrassment and our State Department to offer disclaiming statements. Yet he apparently enjoys the highest support from the same people who clamped down on General Singlaub.

While we recognize the great importance of South Korea to our friends in the Far East, in the long run the physical and political importance of Africa dwarfs the Korean issue. We can suffer loss in Korea, we cannot suffer the loss of the African continent to the Communist ideology.

If all the countries of Africa including South Africa come under the control of the Kremlin, then our industries will grind to a halt. We need African resources desperately. Yet even more important are our sea lanes from the Middle East that skirt Africa on the East and South. Were these areas under hostile control and we could not ship our oil supplies around the cape of Good Hope our economy would grind to a halt.

The strategic importance of Africa and especially of South Africa is too great to allow unwise racial feelings to jeopardize our very existence.

Other leaders and other governments have taken the lessons of history to heart. The question is, why can't ours?

For Referendum Vote - -

ASCS To Register Beef Producers

"The Parmer County Agriculture Stabilization and Conservation Service (ASCS) office will register beef producers June 6-17 to vote on the beef research and information order," said Prentice L. Mills, County Executive Director, adding, "Beef producers who fail to register cannot vote in the July referendum."

If over half of registered producers vote in the referendum and two-thirds of those voting approve the order, the Secretary of Agriculture will appoint a beef board, composed of not more than 68 beef producers, from names submitted by producer organizations. The board would collect assessments on sales of cattle and use the funds for beef research and information programs.

Registration may be in person or by mail. Those who wish to register by mail may request the ASCS county office to mail registration cards.

All persons who produced beef during calendar 1976 are eligible to register. This includes feedlot operators as well as dairymen. Each production entity -- such as family, partnership, or corporation -- is entitled to one vote. A 4-H or FFA member may register, provided he or she produced beef independent of the family operation.

From June 6 through 17, the ASCS county office will daily post a list of producers registered to vote. A final list will be posted June 22. Anyone may challenge the eligibility of any producer listed. Mills will resolve challenges.

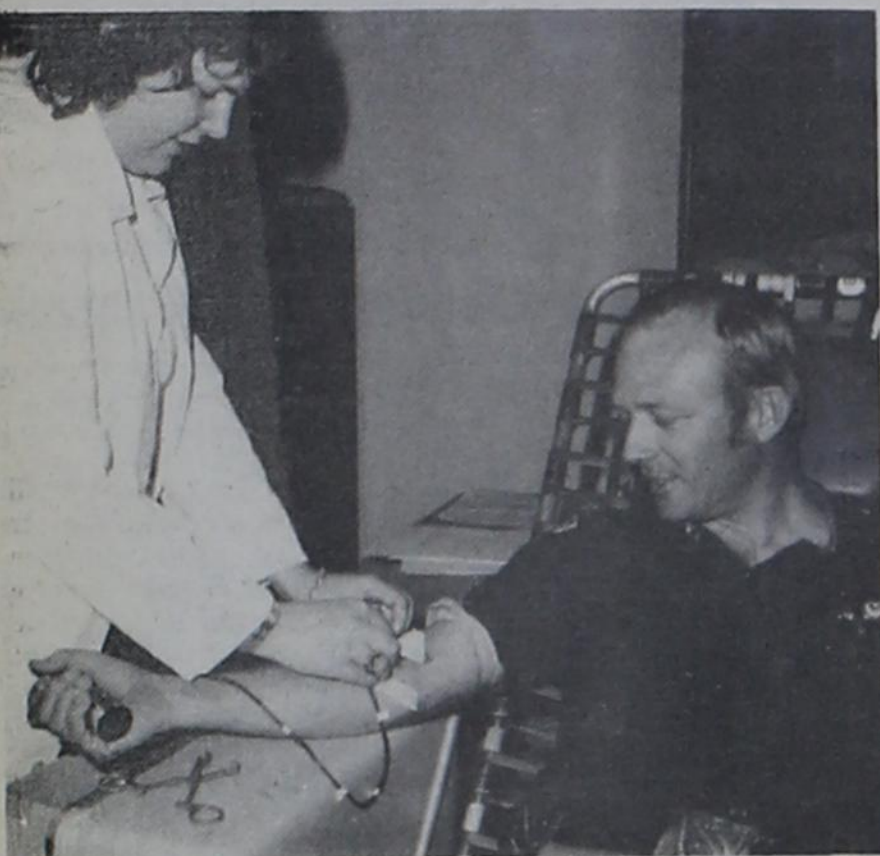
Recently hospitalized in the Clovis Memorial hospital was Doyal Laue of Texico. He was released last Saturday after surgery and says he is "doing real fine" now.

Sheriff's Report

Parmer County Sheriff's Department has investigated several incidents of vandalism since last week. Deputy Sheriff Bill Morgan reported that a car belonging to Ollie Carpenter of Farwell had the wiring "torn off it" while the vehicle was parked at her residence. Last weekend the tires were punctured on a four wheel drive pickup belonging to Lewis Tharp, six miles north

of Farwell. A truck owned by Parmer County Pump Co. in Friona was vandalized when the headlights, windshield and a tire were shot out.

Morgan reported that four 12-volt batteries were stolen from the J.A. Rushing place southwest of Bovina. A portable welder owned by Buck Gregory of Farwell was stolen from a trailer parked at the potato shed in Lariat.

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Texico City Council Approves New Budget

Texico City Council approved the 1977-78 budget at its Tuesday night meeting. The budget must now be submitted to government offices in Santa Fe, N.M., for final approval.

The Texico city budget for 1977-78 is as follows: Resources: \$81,598; Expenditures: \$81,598; Fire Department: \$15,937; Recreation Fund: \$1,140; Also, Revenue Sharing Fund: \$4,954; Solid Waste Disposal Fund: \$14,802; Water, Sewer, Utility Fund: \$31,346; and General Obligation Bond Fund: \$4,600.

City Attorney Harry Patton introduced Ordinance 204 which stipulates the process in which the \$23,000 bond issue will be

handled, including how it is to be paid and the legal aspects of the bond issue. It will be passed at the Council's first meeting in June.

The Council also agreed to have another city ordinance drawn up that would regulate the "big, unsightly billboards which are being put up in Texico."

In other business the Council decided to provide financial assistance for the concrete-pouring project at the swimming pool. Preliminary work was authorized on the community building as an air conditioner is expected to be installed on top of the building in the near future.

Commissioners Have Equalization Meeting

Parmer County Commissioners Court met in regular session Monday morning. The Court also convened as a Board of Equalization Monday afternoon. Many aspects of the tax structure and values were discussed at length by members of the Court and Hugh Moseley, county tax assessor-collector. No one appeared to discuss or protest any portion of the county tax structure.

During the regular morning business session the Court authorized County Judge Paul Fortenberry to borrow \$5,000 for the General Fund for a period of 30 days, to be repaid from current funds.

Bids will be considered at 11 a.m. June 27 for the lease of Labors 10, 11, 19, 20, 21 and 22

of League 317, Parmer County school land, in Gaines County. The office of Max Sherman reported that an amendment has been added to the school finance bill which would enable the schools in Parmer County to use money from the Available School Fund with no penalty from the state. The bill is expected to pass.

The Court also discussed the purchase of a new car for the county sheriff and agreed to make the necessary advertisements. The Court also agreed to pay travel and lodging expenses for Lawrence Widener who will accompany four county 4-H youths to the State 4-H Roundup at Texas A & M University.

Predicting is always a risky business. Weather's the worst. What other people will do is a close second. But one thing that's usually safe by this time is how we're going to come out in terms of world agricultural trade by the end of the year. It's usually safe because, in the first place, the year for measuring exports ends in September and secondly, most of the contracts are already signed and most of the commodities to be exported are on their way. Now to the prediction. Dollar value of the exports should equal or slightly exceed last year's record 22.8 billion dollars. Tonnage, however, will be down substantially. What really helped in terms of the dollar amount in comparison with last year is more cotton exported at higher prices and better prices for soybeans.

Erwin Bachmayer from Coupland, Tex., is getting Site #2 ready to seed. The site will be seeded to side oats grama, Blue grama, Buffalograss, Sand dropseed, and green sprangletop. Also other grasses will be furnished by SCS for experimental trials.

Bachmayer has a contract with Soil Conservation Service for preparing seedbed, mulching with prairie grass hay, and seeding of grass for this site.

In preparing seedbed, the site will be disced, fertilized, hay mulched, then seeded.

The size of the site to be seeded under this contract is 41.12 acres. This includes dam, slopes, spillways, areas distributed while construction was in force.

The main purpose of the book is to get young people to stop and think before taking some action which may scar

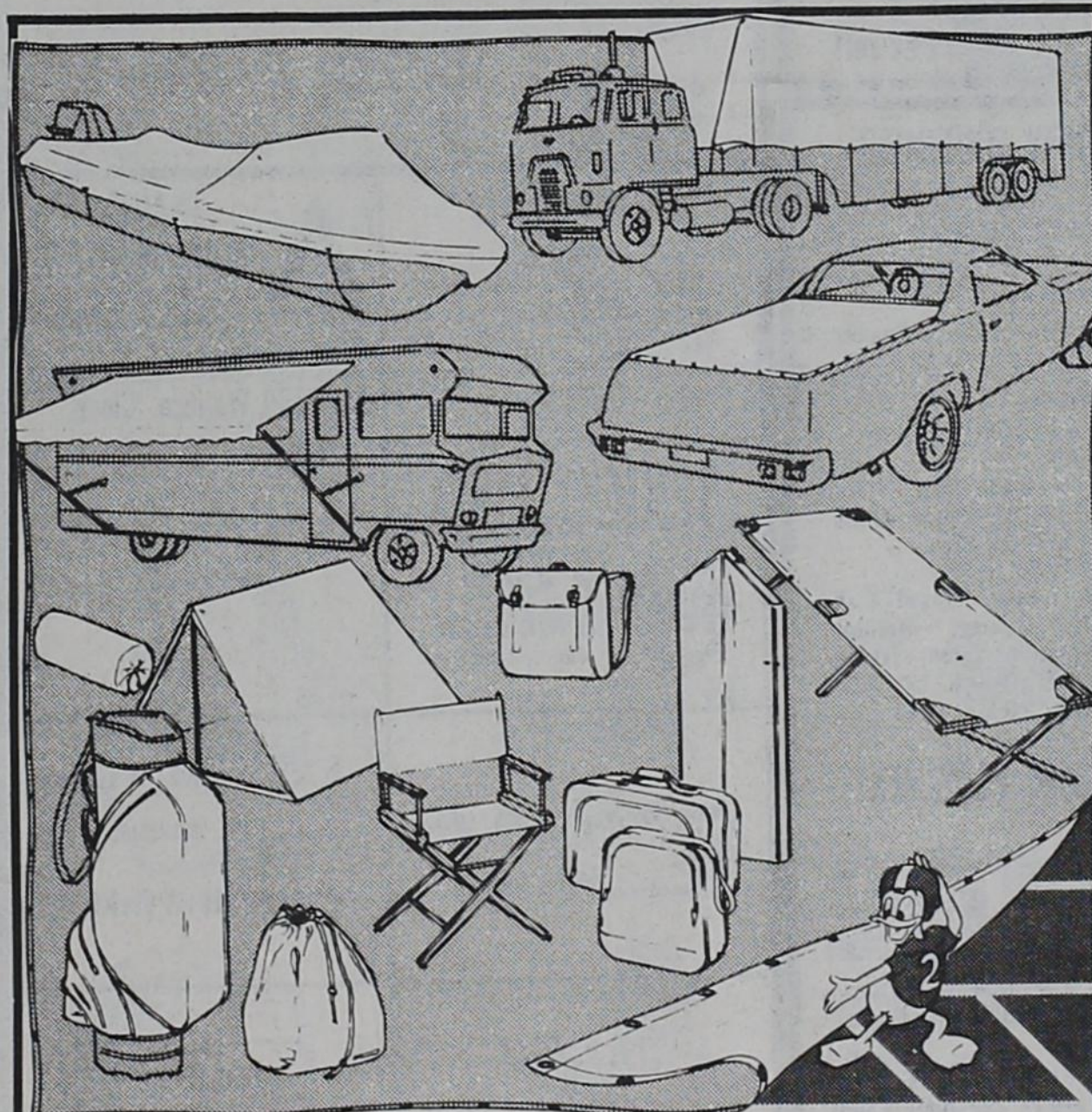
their entire future lives, Dr. Ritchie added.

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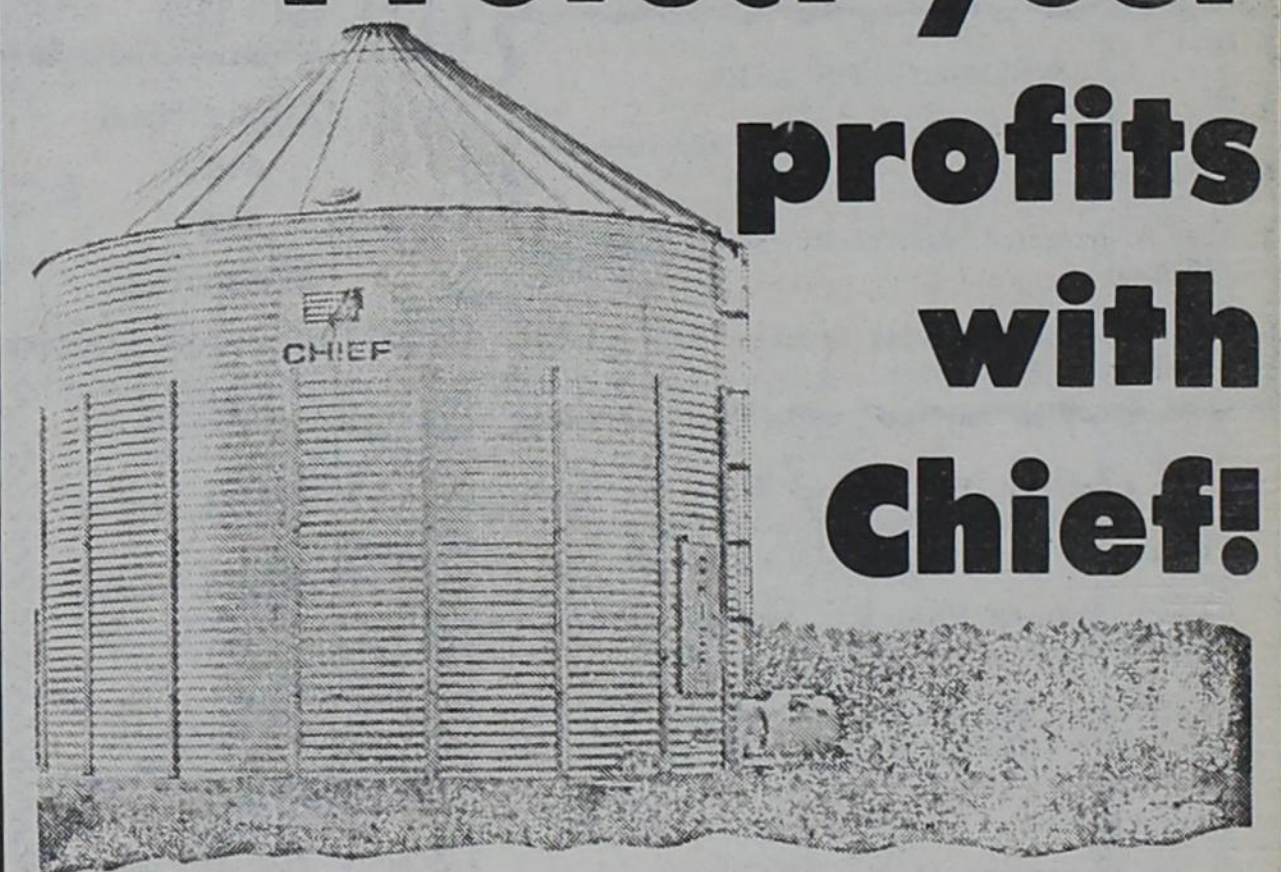
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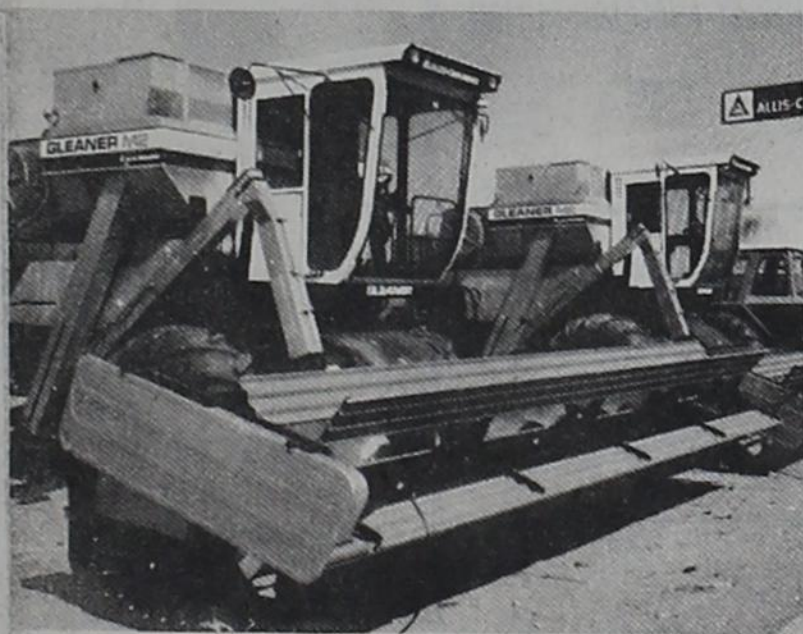

Rather than crush the leader of the world's rebellion, He saved him. Christ broke through the heavens, as it were, to speak words of love and pity to His greatest enemy on earth. As a result Saul's rebellious spirit was broken and in one moment the pitiless persecutor became the docile, indeed the devoted follower of Christ.

More than that, Saul of Tarsus, the persecutor, became Paul the Apostle. To him the glorified Lord committed "the dispensation of the grace of God" (Eph. 3:2) and "the gospel of the grace of God" (Acts 20:24). Now, he went everywhere proclaiming grace, telling men how God loved them, how Christ had come into the world and gone to Calvary to pay for man's sins so that believing sinners might be saved.

The gospel of the grace of God, found in Paul's epistles, does not blame anyone for the death of Christ. Rather it presents the cross as good news. It declares that "we have redemption through His blood, THE FORGIVENESS OF SINS ACCORDING TO THE RICHES OF HIS GRACE" (Eph. 1:7). It says that "God hath concluded all in unbelief THAT HE MIGHT HAVE MERCY UPON ALL" (Rom. 11:32) and that "WHERE SIN ABOUNDED, GRACE DID MUCH MORE ABOUND" (Rom. 5:21).

How wonderful! By grace and through Christ's all-sufficient work of redemption, the vilest sinner may believe and rejoice in the consciousness of sins forgiven. As Paul said to the trembling jailor at Philippi: "Believe on the Lord Jesus Christ and thou shalt be saved" (Acts 16:31).

Others who have helped to coordinate the program besides Mrs. Owen are Mesdames Boling, Fant, Corn and Edith Blair. Mrs. Owen says that several community volunteers will assist with the summer reading program.
