LIVE CATTLE: Although trends remain up, the market has now reached some of their long term targets and a normal seasonal tendency is to expect lower prices into next week. Once a downward correction is complete, expect another move up into a top due in early October. The sharp jump in prices seems to be related to packers filling orders most likely for the government related Katrina programs? A move back below the \$85 level would turn short term trends down for a quick break.

FEEDER CATTLE: Feeder prices have basically remained strong throughout the Summer, but have gained along side the fed cattle market on the most recent ally. Long term resistance lies between \$113-116 over the next 3-4 weeks. Look for a top in early October followed by a sharp break into November. The seasonal tendency is still positive into early October.

CORN: The market broke hard on Monday this week lriving prices down towards the \$2.06 level basis the December contract. Odds favor a retest of this level and a possible rally? The market may find it very difficult to regain losses from this point into the December time frame? The normal seasonal tendency is for an inflated narket from now into the end of the year.

SOYBEANS: Prices also took a hard hit after Monday's JSDA report breaking long term support levels. There is very little support below this market aside from lows made last February around the \$5.20 level basis the November contract. Expect a soft to flat market from now into December.

WHEAT: The market actually broke out above long term resistance levels this week after coming under pressure on Monday's USDA report. Although Friday's trade was soft going into the close, prices eventually project up towards the \$3.85 level basis the December KC Wheat. Wheat has potential to move sharply higher, but lower corn prices may keep a lid on rallies?

COTTON: Still lots up in the air as US trade talks coninue with China. Still looking at large world production, but most of this has been factored into prices. Demand seems to be the driving force supporting the market. There seems to be support at current levels, but it will take a strong close above major resistance at 53 in order o stimulate another strong rally?





PROPOSITION 1 (HJR 54)

HJR 54 would create a Texas rail relocation and improvement fund in the state treasury and would authorize grants of state revenue and issuance of public debt to relocate, rehabilitate, and expand privately and publicly owned passenger and freight rail facilities and to construct railroad underpasses and overpasses.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment creating the Texas rail relocation and improvement fund and authorizing grants of money and issuance of obligations for financing the relocation, rehabilitation, and expansion of rail facilities."

PROPOSITION 2 (HJR 6)

HJR 6 would provide that marriage in Texas is solely the union of a man and woman, and that the state and its political subdivisions could not create or recognize any legal status identical to or similar to marriage, including such legal status relationships created outside of Texas.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment providing that marriage in this state consists only of the union of one man and one woman and prohibiting this state or a political subdivision of this state from creating or recognizing any legal status identical or similar to marriage."

PROPOSITION 3 (HJR 80)

HJR 80 would provide that local economic development program loans or grants (other than debts secured by a pledge of ad valorem taxes or financed by the issuance of any bonds or other obligations payable from ad valorem taxes) do not constitute or create debt. Any provision of state constitutional law that may prohibit or limit the authority of a political subdivision of the state to incur debt does not apply to those loans or grants.

The proposition will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment clarifying that certain economic development programs do not constitute a debt."

PROPOSITION 4 (SJR 17)

SJR 17 would authorize a district judge to deny reinstatement of bail or new bail to a person accused of a felony, if the person's bail had been revoked or forfeited as a result of the person's violation of a condition of release related to the safety of a victim of the alleged offense or to the safety of the communi-

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the denial of bail to a criminal defendant who violates a condition of the defendant's release pending trial."

PROPOSITION 5 (SJR 21)

SJR 21 would authorize the Legislature to exempt commercial loans from state usury laws that set maximum interest rates. "Commercial loans" are loans made primarily for business, commercial, investment, agricultural, or similar purposes and not primarily for personal, family, or household purposes.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment allowing the legislature to define rates of interest for commercial loans."

PROPOSITION 6 (HJR 87)

HJR 87 would increase the size of the State Commission on Judicial Conduct from eleven to thirteen members by increasing from four to five the number of public members and by adding a constitutional county court judge. The additions would ensure that the commission has an odd number of members, which is required by another provision of the state constitution.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to include one additional public member and a constitutional county court judge in the membership of the State Commission on Judicial Conduct."

PROPOSITION 7 (SJR 7)

SJR 7 would authorize new options for reverse mortgage agreements for senior homeowners allowing them to draw advances at unscheduled intervals, if and when needed, and only in the amounts needed, during the loan term. These are in addition to options that would allow a lump sum payment after settlement or regular periodic, predetermined equal amounts over a term of vears or the lifetime of the homeowner. Additionally, SJR 7 would: (1) prohibit the agreement from requiring the use of a credit card, debit card or similar device to obtain an advance; (2) prohibit the charge or collection of a transaction fee solely in connection with any debit or advance, after the time the extension of credit is established; and (3) prohibit the lender or holder from unilaterally amending the extension of

The proposition will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing line-of-credit advances under a reverse mort-

credit.

PROPOSITION 8 (SJR 40)

SJR 40 would clear individual land titles by relinquishing and releasing all claims of state ownership interests, including mineral interests, in two local areas, namely, a roughly 4,600 acre area located roughly 14 miles southeast of Gilmer, Texas, and a separate 900 acre area located north of Tyler, Texas.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment providing for the clearing of land titles by relinquishing and releasing any state claim to sovereign ownership or title to interest in certain land in Upshur County and in Smith County."

PROPOSITION 9 (HJR 79) HJR 79 would authorize the Legislature

to provide staggered six year terms of office for board members serving on regional mobility authorities, with no more than one-third of the board positions being appointed every two years.

The proposition will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to provide for a six-year term for a board member of a regional mobility authority."

Sudderth would bat a pass attempt down in the third quarter to force a punt but the Steers could not move the ball and would punt back.



Southland tops Lazbuddie




he said. "They gave it a good shot."


and one after picking up a fumble and racing about 30 yards to pay dirt.

Both teams went scoreless, in the fourth quarter leaving the scoreboard showing: Bovina 7 and Friona 7.... OVERTIME!


Bovina won the toss and chose to play defense first. I was told that we did this to see exactly what we would need to do to win the game when we got our turn on


