I'll never forget...

I'll never forget that first conversation I had with John Getz, previous State Line Tribune owner, immediately after we had agreed upon the newspaper's ownership transfer.

We were talking over the phone; I was in Virginia and he was in Farwell. It was the middle of July and we had agreed on the changeover to take effect Sept. 1. Here's how I recall the conversation:

"Oh, by the way, Mike, we have a football contest here," said Getz.

"Uh-huh," I responded, not really knowing what that meant.

"It's kind of an annual thing here," Getz continued. "Do you want to keep it going? I need to know now because by the time you take over in September, it would be too late to make a decision."

Thinking quickly, I went with that old proverb about keeping things the same so I replied, "Oh, yeah, let's continue it."

Wow. Can you imagine what would have happened to me when I arrived here if I had said "No"? I would have been strung up.

But I'm sure that if I would have responded to Getz's question in the

Mason played on Texico's first basketball team

Mason Neely and his parents, Don (D.O.) and Beulah Neely, homesteaded 160 acres south of Texico in 1902. They moved here from Vernon.

For a short ime, they lived in a tent, then a half dugout. Later they built a house with two rooms, followed by a larger house for the growing family.

Mason has four sisters -- Lavage Peterson of Clovis, Zelma Edith Lewis of Arkansas; Stella Sanders, deceased, and Morene Horton of Clovis.


Mason first attended school in Texico. It was located west of Danny's Burger Barn. Mrs. Grady taught there and she was also the postmistress in Texico. Her son was Tom Grady, a cattle inspector.

Mason attended Farwell School, then finished school in Texico. He played on Texico's first basketball team as a forward. "We had a fair team," said Mason.

Mason recalled: "In 1917, my parents sold their farm and I went back and stayed with my granddad. But then I returned in August of 1918. My wife and I met while we attended school. She finished high school and later started to teach school."

Mason and his wife, Elise, married in 1922. They had been school sweethearts. Her parents ran the J.D. Cross grocery in Texico.

The Crosses had moved to Texico in 1906. They also worked on the J.A. Ranch located at Clarendon. Elise taught school in Pleasant Hill in 1920 for a year; at Fairview for a year, then finished the summer of 1923 in Texico teaching the third and fourth grades. After they married, they farmed north of Pleasant Hill. They raised maize, corn and wheat--mainly all dryland. He hauled grain to Penny Anderson in an old Model T truck. Mason said, "After awhile, we built another house and added lights and water. This was back in 1942 and rural electric was coming. "We have two children -- Jimmie, who has worked at the Federal Land Bank for the last 35 years and Buster, a college professor teaching civil engineering." The Masons retired from farming in 1965 and moved to Clovis in 1968. Mason remembers an old boxcar for a post office, several saloons, a candy store and Robinson Mer-

cantile in Texico.

"They would put meat in a windmill tree. Also we put milk at the well in a trough to stay cold," he recalled.

He remembers getting driving licenses by paying a small amount and signing a piece of paper.

"They used to use apple or orange crates for furniture. People didn't have much in those days," he said. Mason enjoys Zane Grey western books and cleaning his own house.

He also likes cornbread and milk. Mason recalled episodes from his

life: "During the summer my wife and

I would watch our grandchildren. "Once, one of the granddaughters, Judy, who was eight or nine, and a cousin from Albuquerque came to visit. They got on a gray mare and started to ride her south of the house. All of a sudden the mare took off galloping. The girls were getting a little concerned because they couldn't stop the horse. The cousin said to drop the reins and the horse would stop. She had seen this done on TV. But it didn't work. The mare did not stop until they got home. "Another time, the same kids were staying with us one summer. They started playing around the chicken house. A pea fowl hen had four or five eggs she was sitting on. The girls saw a bull snake near the eggs and noticed it had an egg in its mouth. They ran to the house and told their grandmother. She got out the .22 rifle and shot the snake." Mrs. Mason died in 1980 at the age




Foreign exchange student arrives

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



Corn harvest underway

The corn harvest is under way in Parmer County.

Martin Chandler, director of the ASCS office of Farwell said, "Corn is looking pretty good. It is at least average, not quite as good as last year.

"The insilage corn has a normal yield of 27 tons per acre. The corn for grain should have a pretty good yield," he said.

Chandler said approximately 50,000 pounds of grain sorghum is expected to be harvested in Parmer County.

The cotton looks good and should have a normal year depending on the fall, he said.

Sherley-Anderson in Lariat reported the corn harvest should be as good as last year, said Lonnie Mc-Farland, manager.

The moisture content on early corn is about 22 percent.

The first load of corn was brought in Aug. 28, by Jay Herington of the West Camp area. He received \$50 for the first load. The moisture content was 27.8.

Sherley Anderson Pitman of Parwell has received some corn, too. According to manager Fred Chandler, Willie Wall, Darrell Stephens and Lonnie Meeks have brought in the first loads of corn.

The corn has tested moisture content as 23 and is getting 55 pounds a bushel. "We should be getting busy in another 10 days," said Chandler.

Sherley-Anderson of Lazbuddie has started about half as fast as last year, according to David Anderson, manager.

The moisture content is about average 25.

The first load was brought in by Kim Gable of Lazbuddie Aug. 24. Worley Mills of Farwell had its first load of corn brought in by Walter Kaltwasser with a moisture content of 19.

WHOLE WHEAT HONEY BREAD

3¾ c. whole wheat flour 21/2 c. Wondra flour 2 pkgs. dry yeast 1/2 c. warm water 13/4 c. lukewarm milk 1/2 c. honey 1T. salt 1/2 c. softened shortening

Combine flours. Soften yeast in warm water. Combine milk. honey and salt, stirring to dissolve. Beat in shortening, yeast mixture and 1 cup flour. Beat until smooth. Gradually add remaining flour. Turn dough out on floured surface and knead 10 minutes.

Place in greased bowl and turn dough to grease top. Cover with damp towel and let rise until double (1 - 11/2 hrs.) Punch down and let rise again for about an hour. Punch down and divide into equal portions. Place in loaf pan, brush with melted butter, let rise and bake at 375° for 40-50 minutes.







No discussion of tax rate

The public hearing last Friday to

Abortion law takes effect

Texas' new abortion law became effective Sept. 1 and with it an experiment that may well determine state abortion policy for years to come.

The law, which will be administered by the Texas Department of Health, requires extensive reporting by all abortion clinics operating in the state and calls for more stringent licensing regulations, which will be promulgated by the health department.

Supporters of the new abortion law, and we include ourselves, believe the reporting requirements will give Texans a much better idea about what types of abortions are being performed in the state. We also believe the tougher licensing requirements will ensure all abortions are performed with minimal risk to the women involved.

There are those, of course, who are bitterly disappointed with the law. Some feel as though the state has absolutely no business regulating abortions while others believe the state should prohibit abortions entirely. For those people, a little history would be instructive.

Texas for more than a century banned most abortions. Then, in 1973, the U.S. Supreme Court overturned Texas' abortion law in its historic Roe vs. Wade decision. The court ruled the Texas law and, thus, all state abortion laws were unconstitutional.

Senator **Bill Sarpalius** Reports

the court said all women have a right to an abortion during the first trimester of their pregnancy. The justices said women have the same right during the second trimester, though states are allowed to establish health and safety regulations to govern those second trimester abortions.

Only in the last three months of pregnancy, the court said, could states prohibit abortions in all but life-threatening pregnancies.

As we all know, the Supreme Court's decision touched off a wave of controversy that remains with us today. Many people maintain women have an inalienable right to/ terminate pregnancy. Others say abortion is tantamount to murder and never should be condoned.

The bottom line, however, is that states are limited in what they can do to prevent abortions. Texas for 12 years had been doing nothing; now, we've exercised some of the rights remaining under Roe vs. Wade and are beginning to regulate health and safety standards.

If, as many of us suspect, abortion clinics report a large number of second-trimester abortions, the Legislature in 1987 may stiffen regulations to the maximum allowable under federal law.

We personally are not comfortable with legalized abortions, but the law is the law. It is important to remember there is nothing we in Austin can do at this stage to change that law.

People who want the abortion law changed must for the time being look to Congress, where a constitutional amendment banning abortions must be introduced. Antiabortion laws were struck down at the federal level, and that is where they must be restored.



"For the first time out, we played well at times. We had good effort and played good defense. We need to improve the offensive play on the line. The whole team needs to work hard on fundamentals. But, overall,

it was a good ball game for us.

"Stanley Cross and Charlie Bibbs played a good offensive game. John Thomas did a good job as the quarterback; it was his first varsity start. "Jody McDonald, our noseguard, made 13 tackles. Mark Meeks had an excellent game and Kyle Snipes was excellent in the Secondary.
