But I don't know how else to approach this subject. So I figured I'd just straight-away put it down on paper and see what happens.

In looking at one of the last columns in the Tribune which appeared last winter, the list of sponsors had dropped to the point where it wasn't feasible to carry it anymore. That's why it hasn't been in the Tribune for awhile.

I can understand some of the reason for the decline in sponsorship. Our Twin Cities' businesses do a real fine job in sponsoring many, many special pages and ads promoting Texico and Farwell.

Witness, for example, their sponsorships of the "Welcome, Dr. Green" page and the Homecoming for Farwell and Parents Night for Texico pages. I sincerely hope that our readers look carefully at these sponsors' names and appreciate their community involvement.

But it's not fair to ask these businesses to do more than they are capable of. And that's the reason for this column.

Here's my question:

Would individual families in the Twin Cities area (plus subscribers who have moved away) be interested in co-sponsoring a weekly Bible column, plus list of our area churches and their times of service?

I figure I would need 20 sponsors at \$3.25 a week to be able to publish the column, church list and the names of the sponsors. If we get more than 20, the cost would go



St. John Lutheran seeks the honor and glory of God

Early in 1921, a Lutheran service was held about 5 miles northwest of Lariat. Later that year, St. John Lutheran Congregation was organ-

Services were held in a home until 1924 when a schoolhouse was purchased and later that year moved to just beyond the north edge of Lariat. This served as a house of worship until July 1953 when the present church building was dedicated. In July 1956 a parish hall was built as an addition to the church providing Sunday School rooms, an auditorium and church office.

Editor's note: This is one article in a periodic series featuring a review of the area churches.

St. John congregation was served by pastors from Immanuel Lutheran Church of (Rhea) Rt. 2, Friona and Immanuel Lutheran Church of Hereford until 1924 when one pastor served Immanuel Rhea and St. John, Lariat.

In 1941 a parsonage was built which served as a home for pastors until the present parsonage was built in 1975.

During the past 63 years St. John Congregation has been served by about 15 pastors and about 7 pastors of neighboring congregations who served during the interim or vacancy when the congregation was without a pastor.

The present pastor is Herman J. Schelter, a native of Minnesota and graduate of Concordia Theological Seminary, Springfield, Illinois in 1944. He received a Master of

White: Fire Dep't not pushing petition

Farwell Volunteer Fire Department Chief Joel White said Monday the fire department was not involved in pushing the petition drive for a special city election.

Last week, David Kube brought a petition to the City Council with the names of more than 100 people requesting a special election next,

For it to be held, at least 60 valid signatures are required. City Clerk Janie Bowery is checking the list.

If a valid total is reached, an election would be held to determine if the city government should be changed to five councilmen. Currently, there are two councilmen -Jerry Monk and Fred Chandler.

When Kube presented the petition to the City Council, he was quizzed as to whose idea it was to push the petition. Kube mentioned the fire department in his answer.

But White stressed this week that Kube is not a member of the Farwell Fire Department "and we are not a political organization. We are not pro or con the special election and Kube has no authority to speak for the fire department.

White noted that the fire department has 19 volunteers, some of whom live outside the city limits.

White said he believed some of the firefighters signed the petition "but as taxpayers, not as firemen."

Asked to comment about the indication that the firefighters were somewhat unhappy about funds they have gotten from the city council, Robert White, fire department secretary, replied, "Sure, we're unhappy when we don't get funds we ask for, but we are not going to complain. We see a need and most of the time the city council meets

When he presented his petition to the city council, Kube stressed that he thought Chandler and Monk had done a fine job but he felt more involvement was needed -- "three more aldermen to discuss the

"We need 15,000 UPC symbols to get the systems," Warmuth said. We can get one for 7,500 codes. The systems would be used for all students, both in the elementary school and in the high schools."

He added that the project, cosponsored by IBM and Proctor & Gamble, is available in only certain areas and he did not believe Farwell Schools could participate. So he is hoping all residents of the Twin Cities area will help in this effort. The deadline for the UPC collec-



Farwell's Edwards honored

Frank Edwards of Farwell was recently honored for 32 years of active service as a deacon in the Oklahoma Lane Baptist Church. The deacons of the church honor-

ed Edwards with refreshments and presented him with a plaque after services on Oct. 7.

Edwards was born in Union, Miss., in 1896. He came to Whiteflat, Texas, where he met and married Maybelle Donaldson on April 19, 1930. The Edwards farmed there for the next 25 years, raising "cotton mostly," he said.

Edwards said, "I remember back in those days, raising cotton was a little tougher than it is now. We used to get cousins, neighbors or anyone passing by to help pick cotton. Nobody liked to pick it but it was an honest day's work. Nowadays, you have all this fine machinery to help get in the crops.

"Picking cotton wasn't all there was to it either. We had to chop, hoe, and pull bolls among other stuff," he said.

After leaving Whiteflat, the Edwards came to Parmer County around Christmas 1966, settling in Bovina where they farmed for approximately 15 more years and then retired. They moved to Farwell in

He said, "An old boy told me that you could go to Texas, get six mules and start farming and you could ride all day. That sounded a whole whole lot easier way to make a living than building roads. And it was, too."

This year the Edwards took a trip back to Mississippi with the Christian and Corn families of Farwell. They traveled over some of the same roads Edwards helped build.

Ed Corn asked him, "How in the world do you remember these roads?"

Edwards replied, "If you'd work- comes."

In recent years, many tragic incidents have occurred involving cotton module builders and power lines. The extended portion of the cotton module builder can come into contact with overhead electric lines if the operator is not very careful.

The same problem exists with overhead baskets on cotton strippers.

We urge farmers and their employees to be alert to these potential hazards and to take every possible precaution to avoid serious injury... or even death! When you are moving a module builder, be sure the packer arm is lowed as far as it will go. When using a stripper with an overhead basket, be sure to check for overhead lines before dumping.


If some piece of equipment DOES contact these 7200 volt lines, it is important that you or the operator not try to simply back away. The line could break, or if it's already broken, it could tangle in the equipment and break again, compounding the problem and increasing the danger. Jump clear of the machine, being sure NOT to touch the ground and the machine at the same time. Move quickly away at a right angle to the power line. Then call the Cooperative office whether or not the line is broken so they can help you.

Turner backs Educational Bond Act

Dr. James Turner, director of business affairs at Eastern New Mexico University, spoke at the Texico-Farwell Rotary Club meeting last week and urged support of the Educational Bond Act on the November election ballot in New Mexico.

The act, established by the state Legislature, would provide more than \$6 million for ENMU projects.

On the Clovis campus, \$1,696,800 would be for the construction of Phase IV, a new facility that would centralize the instructional and

operational functions of computing services. A portion of the funds would be used for alterations of the areas that are currently occupied by computer and other programs.

The act also includes a formula for the four-year institutions to purchase science and engineering equipment for instructional purposes. Four percent, or a maximum of \$160,000 of the available \$4 million for this activity, would be for Eastern.
