County politics moves to forefront

As the filing deadline approaches for next year's Parmer County elections, there was a whole lot of political news this week.

The filing deadline is Jan. 2, and this article is being written on Dec. 31, but it appears the following will be correct by the time all the smoke clears:

Longtime District Attorney Johnny Actkinson, a Republican, will retire after

Actkinson has served as DA for the 287th District since its formation in 1981. Before then, there was one District Court for Lamb, Parmer and Bailey counties. But in 1981, Parmer and Bailey got a separate district. At that time, Jack Young was District DA. He was appointed 287th District Court judge, and Actkinson became the DA.

It appears that Kathryn Gurley, current Parmer County Attorney, will file on Jan. 2 for the District Attorney's post. She will be unopposed for the post.

There are no attorneys who live in Bailey County that would be interested in the job. The three lawyers who live in Bailey County are Jack Young, a retired judge; Gordon Green, currently 287th District Court judge, and Jeanine Backus, who practices with the Aldridge law firm in Farwell and who just recently passed the Texas bar exam.

Why hasn't Mrs. Gurley already filed? It's because of the state constitution which says that if you file for another attorney's post with more than a year to go in your current county attorney's post, you have to resign. Thus, if she filed on Dec. 30, for example, she must resign as county attorney and a new county attorney would be needed for 2008.

But by waiting to file for District Attorney on Jan. 2, Mrs. Gurley does not have to resign and can continue as County Attorney throughout 2008.

One question does remain -- to see which political party Mrs. Gurley will sign up with. When she ran for county attorney three years ago, it was as a write-in candidate, without party affiliation.

And who will be the new Parmer County Attorney?

Jeff Actkinson has filed to seek the post on the GOP ticket. He sought the job three years ago, but lost to Mrs. Gurley in the general election. It appears he will be unopposed.

Besides all the excitement in the attorney's posts, there will be one contested election in Parmer County -- for the Farwell area county commissioner's job.

Filing for the Pct. 3 post are incumbent Mike Haseloff, a Democrat, and Ronald Byrd, a Republican. They will be unopposed in their respective primaries, then face off in November.

The show is open to all 4-H, FFA and FHA boys an girls under the supervision of the county agent or vocational ag teachers of the county. Entrants must be enrolled in grades 3 through 12 in one of the four public schools in the county or be a county resident attending a home/private school in those grades.

Floor prices will not be set on any animals. All animals will be taken home by exhibitors after the show. Pens will be assigned by community.

Exhibitors may show four animals per species -and seven in total.

Each exhibitors may only sell two animals in the premium auction.

Showmanship: beef and goat will have two age divisions -- junior 8 to 14, and senior, 15 and up. Lamb and barrow will have three age divisions -- junior, 8-11; intermediate, 12-14; and senior, 15 and up.

Other rules include:

Beef heifers -- This will be a jackpot show with the payout being: 1st -- 50 percent; 2nd -- 30 percent; and 3rd -- 20 percent. Beef heifers are not eligible for the sale. Entry fee is \$30 per head.

Lambs -- Classes will be fine wool, fine wool crossbreed, medium wool and southdowns. Lambs must weigh 80 lbs. to show. Ewe lambs may be shown. Entry fee is \$15 per head.

Goats -- Only wether or doe goats are eligible. The show is open to any breed or crossbreed. Entry fee is \$15 per head.

Steers -- Classes will be crosses, British breeds and American. Steers must weigh 900 lbs. to show. Entry fee is \$15 per head.

Barrows -- Classes will be york, chester white, crossbreed, berk, duroc, hamp, poland, spots and landrace. Entry fee is \$15 per head. Barrows must weigh between 170 and 265 lbs. to show. a 5-lb. tolerance will be allowed.

As the military dictatorship continued on and El Salvadorian looked for work in other countries, taking jobs at lower wages that nobody else wanted. When it seemed that they had taken too many jobs in the 1960's, countries like **Mexico and Honduras** began to deport thousands of El Salvadorians back to their own country. The bad blood this caused was the real reason behind the Soccer War of 1969.

In that war, a fight in the stands during a World Cup soccer game didn't end in the stadium. Honduras and eventually Salvador declared war on each other and fought along their common border for months. El Salvador's army pushed almost 20 miles into Honduras before peace was finally negotiated.

The years since were filled with violence and disaster. Major earthquakes hit in 1986 and 2001, and Hurricane Mitch in 1988. Communist guerillas waged a campaign of murder and sabotage, and the government responded with its own death squads. Chapultec Accord of 1992 brought both sides

many of these boys grew into the MS-13 of today. But MS-13 is only a sliver of the population, distracting from the honor and goodness of the country overall.

El Salvador is the only nation in the Americas that has sent its army to fight alongside American soldiers in Iraq. Their force is only about 400 troops at any time, but they send their top combat units. They have lost five soldiers killed in action, and they have been determined to stay with us. El Salvadorian officers frequently say they feel a friendship with a U.S. that tried to help them through the turmoil of their

For my own part, I look forward to working with our El Salvadorian counterparts. Each of the countries in Latin America has its own unique problems and possibilities, and over the next few years, I am going to become familiar with every one of them. El Salvador is my first assignment in this job, through the end of the year. I hope my stories from there have good things to say, just because that would be good for America too.

But even more than that; the El Salvadorians are a good people, hard-working, simply trying to get by, and healing after 20 years of civil war. They have had a hard row to hoe the last few hundred years and they are really overdue for a break.

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
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

'War to end all wars' is over

Here's another in the series of articles from the Texico-Farwell News, which was published in 1917 and 1918.

The Nov. 29, 1918, issue was full of the good news that the War to End All Wars was over -- World War I.

Page 1 was loaded with all sorts of post-war news. Headlines included "Want Pershing for President in 1920", "President Wilson Will Sail For Europe Next Week", "Allies May Demand Delivery of Kaiser", "Plenty of Ships Available to Bring Boys Home" and "U.S. To Have a Great War Fleet."

There were only two local items that got their way onto Page 1.

One was a notice to school patrons: The compulsory School Law will be enforced in the Texico School after Dec. 1st. All children from 7 to 14 years of age must attend school six days out of the week."

The other was about a big snowfall that struck the Twin Cities, about 8 inches. It was the heaviest snowfall here in about 5 or 6 years, old-timers said. Curry County will raise the biggest crop of wheat ever harvested in this section.

Page 2 was also full of national news, with the war the topic of much of it. One interesting column was headlined "What America has Already Gained in This War." This article included:

- -- Such a position that no nation or combination of nations will ever defy the U.S. military power again.
- -- The world leadership of Anglo-Saxon peoples. -- Loss of all fear of the much touted "yellow peril"
- (referring to China and Japan). -- Such respect for us by Latin American that those nations will never again fear we have designs on them. "Mexico, in particular, will cease to be a troublesome neighbor."
- -- The confidence of the plain people that our government is not unduly influenced by the possessors of great wealth. Witness the income tax, the excess profits tax and the inheritance tax.
- -- Recognition by the "kings of capital" and "lords of industry" of their position as servants of the people.
- -- Introduction of the income tax, a new system of raising revenue for public expenses according to folks ability to pay.

As always, Page 3 featured the full page ad for the Cannon Ball Six-60, to be manufactured in Texico (which never came about). The ad said the assembly of such cars would begin in great numbers in early 1919.

Page 4 did have a bunch of local items, in addition to still more post-war news.

A united Thanksgiving service of local churches was held at the Methodist Church in Texico. Its pastor, Rev. L.L. Thurston, was unable to be there, and was feared to have typhoid fever. The services were well attended with all teachers from Texico and Farwell present.

Local items noted:

- -- The Cayce blacksmith shop was for rent.
- -- The Cozy Café served a delicious Thanksgiving meal. The charge was only 50 cents -- "it would have cost at least \$1 in the city."
- -- A number of young people were entertained at the home of Mr. and Mrs. C.H. Haber.


