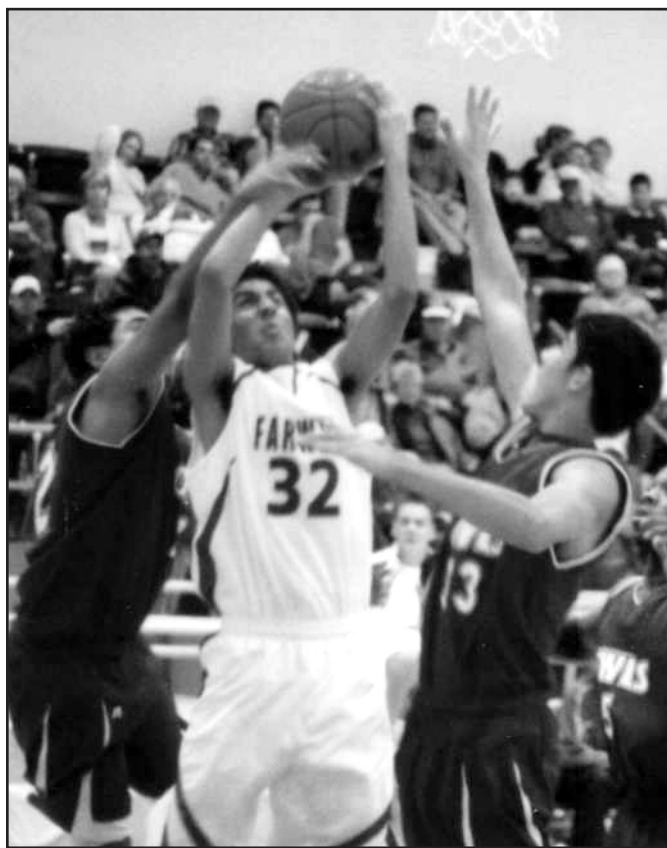

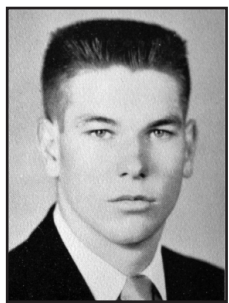
In a battle last Friday of two teams who entered the clash with 3-0 district records, Nazareth topped the Lady Longhorns in overtime, 56-53.

LIVE CATTLE: Cattle prices broke long term support levels last week and futures prices along with cash took a fairly hard hit. The February contract broke down out of a 24 week sideways range and fell about \$5.00 before catching around the \$89.00 level. Prices were very quick to rebound after moving below the \$90.00 level, but need to maintain above this level. It may take a while to build a base, but most of the long term technical indicators are pointing towards a low around these levels. Trends remain down and it will take time to confirm whether or not these lows will hold.

FEEDER CATTLE: Feeder prices have been able to hold up much better than the Live Cattle price even with higher corn prices. Feeders dropped hard on Monday after corn traded up the 20 cent limit for the second day in a row, but were quick to rebound. Monday's lows were tested once again late in the week and held. The next direction will depend heavily on the next direction in corn.

CORN: Corn prices have stalled which has been very typical after a big move up like the two day 20 cent limit move seen after the USDA Crop Production report. The market has had a tendency to trade sideways for 4-5 days and then make a move up. There were long term projections based on the weekly charts which stopped the March Corn around the \$5.20 level. Prices must close above this level in order to continue to move higher?

SOYBEANS: Soybean prices seem to be struggling around the \$13.00 level. The prices can trade above this level, but can rarely close above \$13.00. Traders and analysts alike are beginning to question just how much higher beans can move.

WHEAT: New Crop wheat prices have also seen a sharp advance over the last few days. The USDA indicated that planted acres are lower than last year's crop. This shocked the market and moved the new crop up the 30 cent limit 3 days in a row. Prices continued to move higher on Friday and closed at new contract highs. The world rejected \$10 wheat last September and again in December. Export cancellations are massive at \$10. Will this stop the wheat or not? Still a very strong market.

COTTON: New crop cotton prices were able to get a 2 day 3 cent limit move up after the USDA report. Prices have since consolidated after hitting a long term target area around \$80.00 basis the December contract. Fundamentally, this is one market which could be set-up for higher prices this year as production is expected to reach a 25 year low and world consumption is expected to outstrip world production. If Funds take hold like the grains, then any prices will be possible!

Futures and Options Trading involves risk of loss and may not be suitable for everyone.

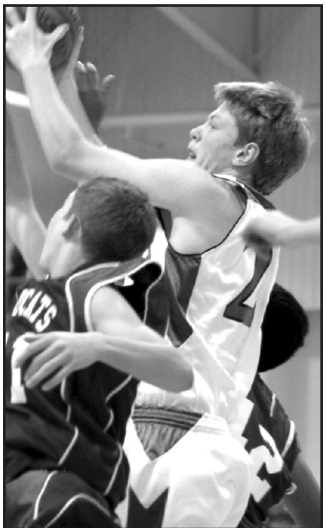

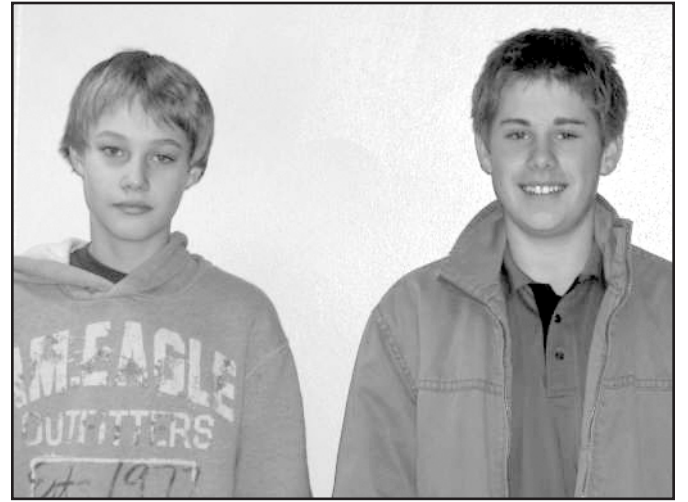

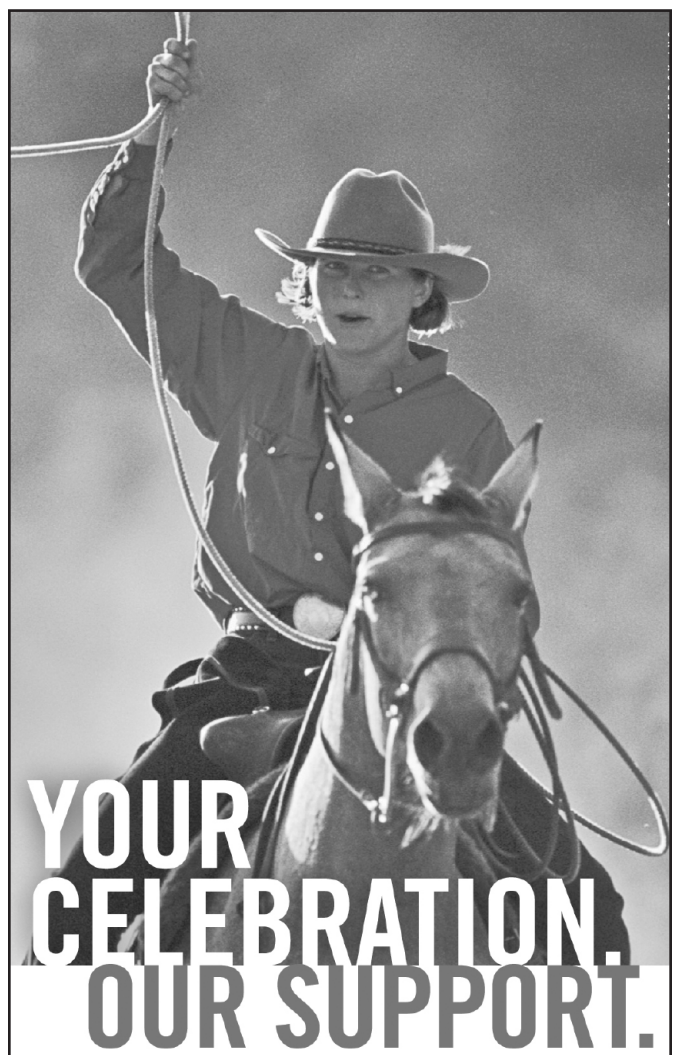

His last assignment at Monterey involved working at the Defense Language Institute, helping troops about to deploy to foreign countries.

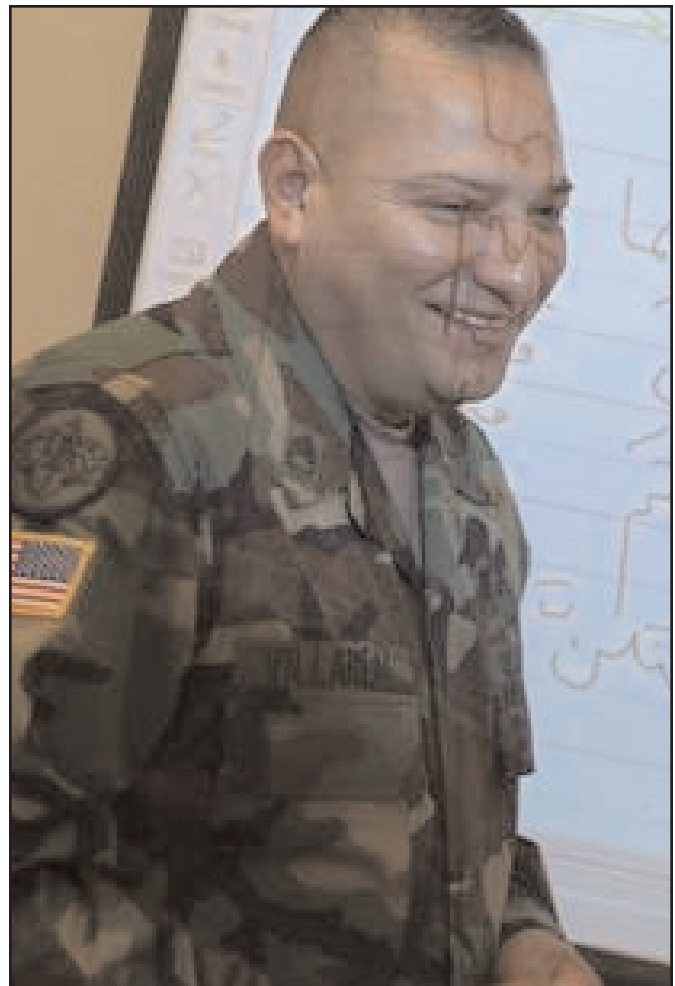
He had enlisted in the Army in 1988 after attending West Texas State University.

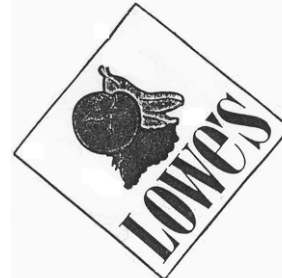
