

# 61 Twin City firms participate in giveaway

Sixty-one Twin City firms are participating in the fourth annual Border Town Days Merchants Giveaway program held in conjunction with the annual LTD celebration's park activities July 27.

The giveaway will be held throughout the afternoon at the Farwell City Park.

Eighteen entries have signed up so far for the Border Town Days arts and crafts show, which will be on the front lawn of the courthouse July 27.

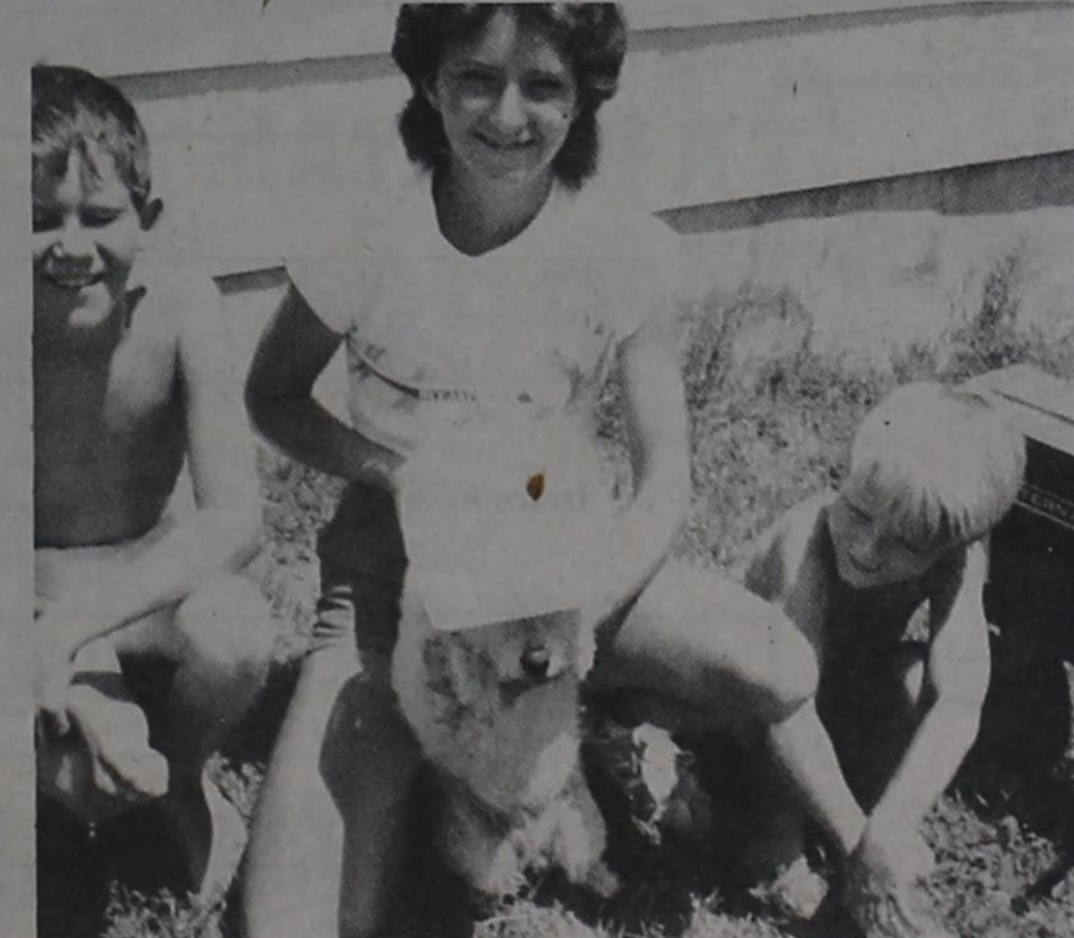

## BTD queen to get scholarship

# BTD celebration only a week away

The annual Twin Cities' Border Town Days celebration is now only one week away, and deadlines for registering for some of the special events are rapidly approaching.

### PARADE

Kicking off the big day on Saturday, July 27, is the annual LTD parade, starting at 11 a.m. CDT. The deadline for registering for the parade, to get a place in the lineup and qualify for prizes, is Monday, July 22. Persons should call parade marshal Weldon Smith at 482-3839, Joann Getz at 481-9123 or the State Line Tribune at 481-3681.

Entries will be accepted into the parade after Monday but they will be placed at its end and won't be able to qualify for prizes.

Some of the parade highlights will be: floats from the senior citizens, Farwell Study Club, Youth of Lariat and Farwell Baptist Church Youth; antique cars; a tank; honorary parade marshals -- the former mayors of Texico and Farwell; Cannon Air Force Base color guard; Shrine cycle units; Kitchen Band; breakdancers, etc.

Parade entrants are to form at 10 a.m. CDT north on Griffin Street in Texico. Parade sponsors, the Texico-Farwell Lions Club, will be on hand to line up the entries, and parade participants are asked to look for the men in yellow Lions vests and/or caps to help them get into the proper spaces.

### QUEEN CONTEST

At its Monday night meeting, the Border Town Days Committee agreed to set up a \$100 scholarship for the girl winning the queen contest.

Today, July 19, is the deadline for entering this contest. There is a sign-up form in today's Tribune and it can be brought to the State Line Tribune, 404 Third St., Farwell. Or contestants can call the Tribune, 481-3681, or contest chairman Joann Getz at 481-9123.

The scholarship has been set up to further the queen's education after high school. It will be placed in the bank, drawing interest for her, until she is ready to use it.

### PROGRAM

The complete schedule of events will be carried in next week's Tribune. Some highlights include (all times are CDT -- Texas time): parade, 11 a.m.; opening ceremonies, 1 p.m.; queen contest, 1:30 p.m.; outhouse race, 2 p.m.; beard contest, 2:45 p.m.; fire department drawing, 4:15 p.m.

Among the performers during the day in the park will be Ed and Juanita Hardage, the Kitchen Band, Friends of the Bluegrass, the Cinderella Girls and Jerilyn Irby.

### BICYCLES

Youngsters planning to enter decorated bicycles in the parade must register them at Texico City Hall by 5 p.m. Thursday, July 25, giving their name and age, to be eligible for cash prizes to be awarded. No motorized bikes will be allowed in the parade, says Ann Cooper, who is in charge of the bike contest.

drink included. Any Rotarian will be glad to provide you with your tickets now, so you don't have to stand in line for tickets at the park. The big feed is July 27, starting at noon.

All riders must have their bikes at K.K. Runnels Park in Texico at 10 a.m. CDT and line up for judging. "You must be on time or you will not be judged," says Mrs. Cooper.

In the parade, bike riders must stay between the three-wheelers, and will not be allowed to double back. "This is for your safety," says Mrs. Cooper. Participants must continue to Farwell City Park, where the parade ends, and then park their bikes.

No riding will be allowed in the park area. Riders must be present at the park to receive the prizes, which will be awarded about 1:15 p.m. following the opening ceremonies.

# Food drying program planned

Janette Pierce, Farmer County Extension Agent and Connie Moyers, Southwestern Public Service Marketing Representative, will be demonstrating the latest techniques in drying and using dried food July 24 at 2 p.m. in the Farwell Community Center.

Recently, drying food has regained popularity because it is easy, inexpensive, nutritious, requires less storage space than foods preserved by other methods, and has a reasonably long shelf life. There are also a variety of methods which can be used, one of which will suit anyone's situation. Try sun drying, solar drying, oven drying, convection oven drying, microwave oven drying or use commercial dehydrators.

Fruit leather is a nutritious snack,

as well as a good way to use overripe fruit. Try this easy method.

**Fruit Leather** - suggested fruit: apples, apricots, blueberries, cherries, plums, peaches, raspberries, strawberries, or a combination of fruits.

**Directions:** Place 2 cups of fruit in a blender or food processor. (You may add a sweetener for tart fruit) Puree fruit mixture and pour onto a plastic wrap lined drying rack or cookie sheet. Tape plastic down on corners. Dry at 140-150 degrees for 6 to 8 hours. When dry, the mixture should be bright, translucent and chewy. While still warm, peel away from plastic and store by rolling and wrapping in plastic. Leathers will keep at least 1 month at room temperature, 4 months in the refrigerator and 1 year in the freezer.

**Variations:** add cinnamon, nutmeg, lemon or orange peel, raisins, coconut or chopped dates.

Drying food was in the olden days and still is a good way to preserve surplus food. Especially if the freezer is crowded, or when canning

jars are full or if this method appeals to you.

For more information, the Texas A&M Agricultural Extension Service has a publication called, "Dry-

ing Fruits & Vegetables at Home." This can be obtained at the Farmer County Extension Office located on the second floor of the courthouse in Farwell or by calling 481-3619.

"Not only is it an honor to represent the Twin Cities as Border Town Days Queen throughout the year, but we want it to be a fun time too," the chairman said.

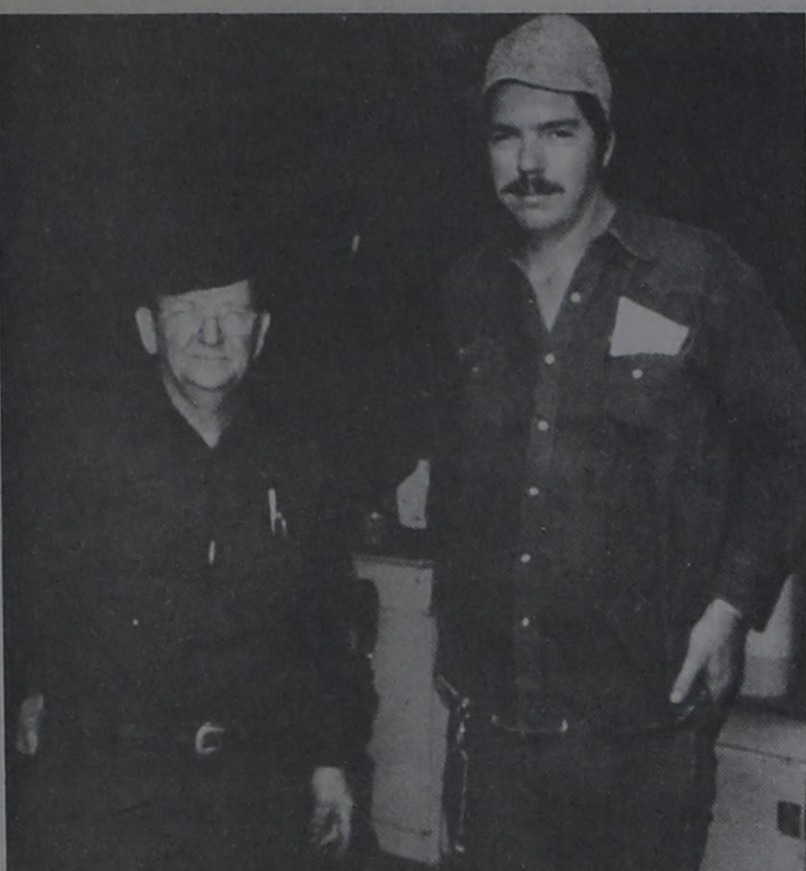
BTD Queens in past years have appeared and ridden in area parades, and they have been invited to special functions in Texico and Farwell during the year.

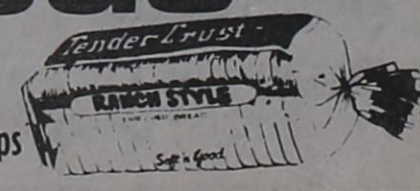
