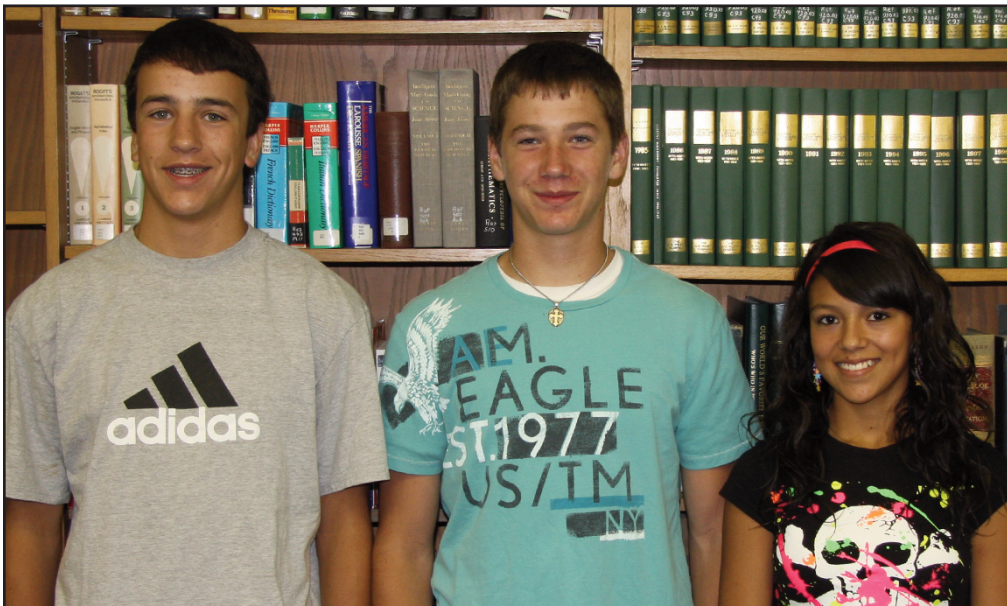

With 10 games picked correctly were:

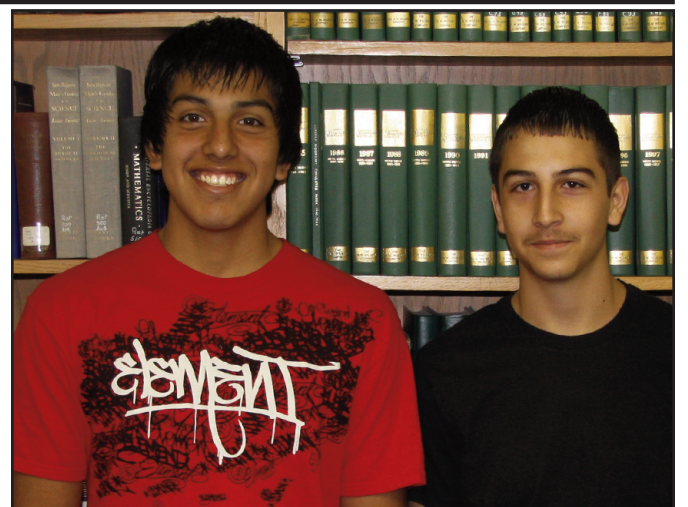

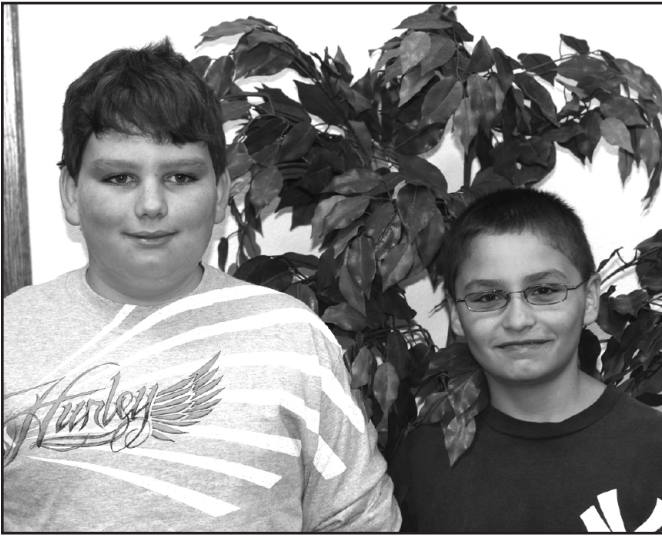

- Remove sludge, deepen, + install lines in existing lagoons
- Construct chlorine disinfection, disposal, + effluent flow meter system.
- Upgrade electrical service to 480v, 3-ph
- Construct irrigation system for treated effluent discharge.

FINDING OF NO SIGNIFICANT IMPACT

An environmental review of the project has been made by the Grantee and is available for public examination and copying at the office noted above. Based on this review, the Grantee has determined that a request for release of project funds will not significantly affect the quality of the human environment and hence, an environmental impact statement will not be undertaken under the National Environmental Policy Act of 1969 (PL 91-910).

The reasons for the decision not to prepare an environmental impact statement are as follows:

No significant adverse impacts are anticipated, and numerous positive impacts are expected (improved efficiency, improved capacity, + updated compliance with State/Federal regulations).

Public Comment on Finding

All interested agencies, groups or persons disagreeing with these decisions are invited to submit written comments for consideration by the Grantee by date 25 September 2009. All comments must clearly specify which decision they object to - The Finding of No Significant Impact or the Request for Release of Funds. All comments so received will be considered by the Grantee prior to its taking any administrative action or requesting release of funds on the date listed immediately above.

RELEASE OF GRANT FUNDS

The Grantee will undertake the project described above with Block Grant funds from the US Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD), under Title I of the Housing and Community Development Act of 1974. The grantee is certifying to HUD that the City of Texico (name of grantee) and

in his/her official capacity, consent to accept the jurisdiction of the federal courts if an action is brought to enforce responsibilities in relation to environmental reviews, decision-making and action, and that these responsibilities have been satisfied. The legal effect of the certification is that upon its approval, the Grantee may use the Block Grant funds, and HUD will have satisfied its responsibilities listed in 24 CFR Part 58. HUD will accept an objection to its approval of the release of funds and acceptance of the certification only if it is on one of the following bases:

- (a) that the certification was not in fact executed by the Chief Executive Officer or other officer of the Grantee (b) that the environmental review record for the project indicated omission of a required decision finding, or step applicable to the project in the environmental review process, or (c) another federal agency has submitted written comments pursuant to Section 309 of the Clear Air Act or Section 102(c) of NEPA. Objections must be prepared and submitted in accordance with the required procedure (24 CFR Part 58), and may be addressed to HUD or LGD/DFA, Room 202 Bataan Memorial Bldg., Santa Fe, NM 87501. Objections to the release of funds on bases other than those stated above will not be considered by HUD or LGD/DFA. No objection received after 15 days from the date of request for funds listed above will be considered by HUD or LGD/DFA.

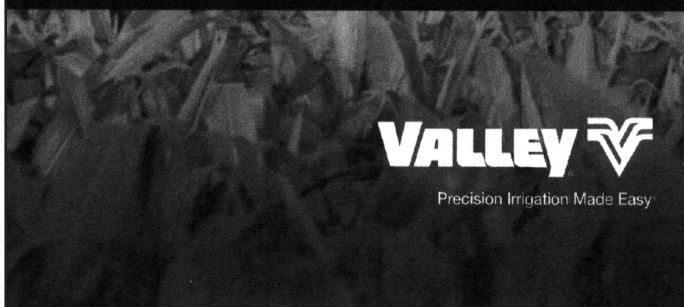

LIVE CATTLE: Prices held up fairly well going into Friday's close, but cash trade was a complete disappointment with trade taking place around \$84. Futures prices and beef prices have held up fairly well over the last couple of weeks, but cash trade just can't seem to get it in gear? The market continues to trade off their lows, but new lows would only lead to another leg down. A close above last weeks high should give the market another leg up into the October time frame which is what the market is expected to do.

FEEDER CATTLE: Feeder prices closed strong on the week and held up very well compared to Live Cattle prices. Both markets will need to move together in order to keep these short term trends pointed higher. Supplies are expected to remain tight as we move forward, but profit margins must be there to support the market.

CORN: Corn prices also came under pressure from reports from two separate crop tours which placed yields between 164-168 bushels. The market tried to shrug off one report on Thursday, but could not avoid the report on Friday which basically confirmed the possibility of extremely high yields this season. Major price support levels around the \$3.11 basis the December contract were taken out on Friday's close.

SOYBEANS: prices broke down late in the week under heavy selling pressure coming mostly from reports of two crop tours which placed yields between 43-44 bushels. Major support levels at \$9.40 basis the November contract were taken out on Friday which turned all trends back down. There will be a USDA Crop Production report released next Friday. The market may attempt to factor this into the market this week.

WHEAT: Wheat prices had no other direction to go other than down with the rest of the grain complex. There has been little news to move this market in either direction. Lower corn and bean prices were about the only influence wheat prices could trade from. The seasonal tendency is still for higher prices into the end of the year, but we may have to be patient until after the USDA Crop Production report is released?

COTTON: Cotton prices were able to recover somewhat after the break seen just a couple weeks ago. Cotton prices have been range bound with no real sense of direction for most of the Summer. The market continues to trade inside a range between \$57-65 basis the December contract. Until there is some sign of demand coming out of China, expect the market to remain sideways.

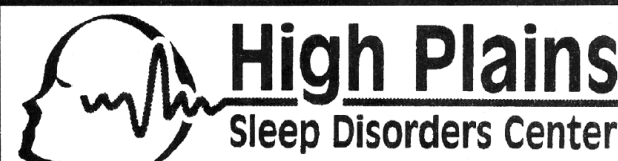

The Steers fought hard Friday night but literally came up inches short as they fell to Plains in the second game of the season there, 15-13.

Plains started at its 27 where Edgar and Julian Cuevas teamed up for the stop. Plains had a very big team and their strategy was to line up and run over Farwell. They were held as the Farwell defense stood up to the challenge with excellent tackles by Zac Stancell, Colby Read and Edgar Cuevas.

Farwell went 3 and out. Plains was held with no yardage by excellent defense from Mason Howard, Aaron Warren and Landry Actkinson.

After Farwell was held again, Plains took over at midfield and two plays later found the end zone with a 37 yard pass. The extra point failed and it was 6-0 with 2:32 left in the first.

Victor Mendoza fielded the kick and returned it to the 37. Actkinson completed a 14 yard pass to Colton Christian but the drive stalled and Farwell punted to the Plains 17.

Plains moved the ball well but was stopped again by big defensive plays including a tackle by Colby Read for a 3 yard loss and a sack by Lincoln Devault for a loss of 11.

After both offenses went 3 and out, Farwell took over at its 37. The Actkinson to Colton Christian combination had 2 straight completions for first downs. Then Plains intercepted.

Three plays later Plains completed a pass for another touchdown with 2:17 to play in the second quarter. The two point conversion run attempt was stuffed by Caleb Christian and the score was 12-0.

Farwell's Mendoza had another nice return to the Farwell 30. The Steer offense gained two first downs. With 34 seconds left in the half, Actkinson unloaded a deep strike to Colton Christian for a 50-yard TD. The Devault

kick was good and the score was 12-7 at the half.

The 2nd half opened with Hunter Black returning the kick to the 30. On the first play, Read took a pitch and followed excellent blocking for a 70-yard TD. The extra point attempt was blocked and Farwell led, 13-12 at 11:40 of the third quarter.

On defense, Julian Cuevas made an excellent open field tackle. Plains gained two first downs but were stopped by good defensive plays from Luke Carpenter, Edgar Cuevas, Howard and Stancell.

Farwell got the ball back and Mendoza had runs of 12 and 15 yards. Pass completions to



Read and Colton Christian gave Farwell another first but the drive was stopped by a penalty and QB sack.

Plains was then stopped on 4th and 5 by a host of steers.

The 3rd quarter ended with a 12 yard pass to Colton Christian. The drive stalled due to a penalty. On 4th and 6 the Steers attempted a fake punt and the pass was just off the fingertips of Black.

Plains started at its 47 and moved the ball to the

Farwell 10 where the defense stood strong with good tackles by Stancell and others. With 4th and goal at the 12, Plains kicked a field goal and took a 15-13 lead with 4:40 left.

Farwell started at its 25. Read busted a run for 12. Actkinson found Colton Morris for 13. Read ran for 8 more, as did Actkinson.

A pass to Morris was good for a first down. The Steers found itself with 4th and 19 at the Plains 20 with 47 seconds left

so they went for a field goal. Devault's kick hit the cross bar on the field goal post and bounced down.

Stats: rushing - Read, 9 for 89; Mendoza, 5 for 24; passing, Actkinson, 14 for 27 and 163 yards; receiving, Christian, 7 for 116; Morris, 3 for 39.

Plains had 270 total yards and Farwell had 295.

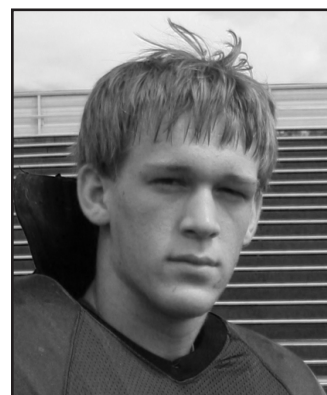

PUBLIC NOTICE

Brief Explanatory Statements of Proposed Constitutional Amendments
Special Election November 3, 2009

PROPOSITION 1

HJR 132 would amend the constitution to authorize the legislature to allow a municipality or a county to issue bonds and notes to finance the purchase of buffer areas or open spaces adjacent to military installations. The buffer areas would be used to prevent encroachment or to construct roadways utilities, or other infrastructure to protect or promote the mission of the military installation. The municipality or county may pledge increases in ad valorem tax revenues for repayment of the bonds or notes.

The proposed amendment would appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the financing, including through tax increment financing, of the acquisition by municipalities and counties of buffer areas or open spaces adjacent to a military installation for the prevention of encroachment or for the construction of roadways, utilities, or other infrastructure to protect or promote the mission of the military installation."

PROPOSITION 2

HJR 36 would amend the constitution to authorize the legislature to provide for the taxation of a residence homestead solely on the basis of the property's value as a residence homestead, regardless of whether the property may have a higher value if it were used for other purposes.

The proposed amendment would appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to provide for the ad valorem taxation of a residence homestead solely on the basis of the property's value as a residence homestead."

PROPOSITION 3

HJR 36 would amend the constitution to require the legislature to provide for the administration and enforcement of uniform standards and procedures for appraisal of property for ad valorem tax purposes.

The proposed amendment would appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment providing for uniform standards and procedures for the appraisal of property for ad valorem tax purposes."

PROPOSITION 4

HJR 14 would amend the constitution to establish the national research university fund to provide a source of funding that will enable emerging research universities in this state to develop into major research universities. The amendment would require the legislature to dedicate state revenue to the fund and to transfer the balance of the existing higher education fund to the national research university fund. This amendment would further require the legislature to establish the criteria by which a state university may become eligible to receive and use distributions from the fund.

The proposed amendment would appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment establishing the national research university fund to enable emerging research universities in this state to achieve national prominence as major research universities and transferring the balance of the higher education fund to the national research university fund."

PROPOSITION 5

HJR 36 would amend the constitution to authorize the legislature to allow for a single appraisal review board for two or more adjoining appraisal entities that elect to provide for consolidated reviews of tax appraisals.

The proposed amendment would appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to authorize a single board of equalization for two or more adjoining appraisal entities that elect to provide for consolidated equalizations."

PROPOSITION 6

HJR 116 would amend the constitu-

tion to authorize the Veterans' Land Board to issue general obligation bonds, subject to certain constitutional limits, for the purpose of selling land and providing home or land mortgage loans to veterans of the state.

The proposed amendment would appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the Veterans' Land Board to issue general obligation bonds in amounts equal to or less than amounts previously authorized."

PROPOSITION 7

HJR 127 would amend the constitution to allow an officer or enlisted member of the Texas State Guard or other state militia or military force to hold other civil offices.

The proposed amendment would appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to allow an officer or enlisted member of the Texas State Guard or other state militia or military force to hold other civil offices."

PROPOSITION 8

HJR 7 would amend the constitution to authorize the state to contribute money, property, and other resources for the establishment, maintenance, and operation of veterans' hospitals in this state.

The proposed amendment would appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment authorizing the state to contribute money, property, and other resources for the establishment, maintenance, and operation of veterans hospitals in this state."

PROPOSITION 9

HJR 102 would define what is a state-owned public beach. The public, individually and collectively, would have an unrestricted right to use and a right of ingress to and egress from a public beach. The amendment would authorize the legislature to enact laws to protect these rights.

The proposed amendment would appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to protect the right of the public, individually and collectively, to access and use

the public beaches bordering the seaward shore of the Gulf of Mexico."

PROPOSITION 10

HJR 85 would amend the constitution to authorize the legislature to provide that members of the governing board of an emergency services district may serve terms not to exceed four years.

The proposed amendment would appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to provide that elected members of the governing boards of emergency services districts may serve terms not to exceed four years."

PROPOSITION 11

HJR 14 would amend the constitution to provide that the taking of private property for public use ("eminent domain") is authorized only if it is for the ownership, use, and enjoyment of the property by the State, its political subdivisions, the public at large, or by entities granted the power of eminent domain, or for the removal of urban blight. The amendment would prohibit the taking of private property for transfer to a private entity for the purpose of economic development or to increase tax revenues. The amendment would also limit the legislature's authority to grant the power of eminent domain in the future unless it is approved by a two-thirds vote of all the members elected to each house.

The proposed amendment would appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to prohibit the taking, damaging, or destroying of private property for public use unless the action is for the ownership, use, and enjoyment of the property by the State, a political subdivision of the State, the public at large, or entities granted the power of eminent domain under law or for the elimination of urban blight on a particular parcel of property, but not for certain economic development or enhancement of tax revenue purposes, and to limit the legislature's authority to grant the power of eminent domain to an entity."

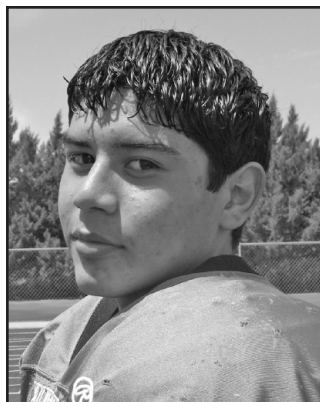
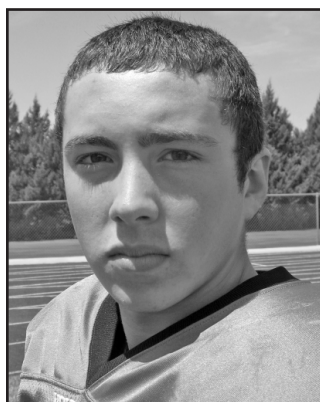

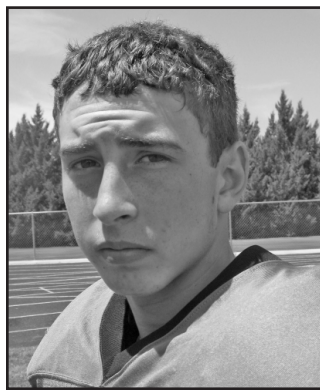

Texico defeats Springlake-Earth

The Texico Wolverines are the defending Class 2A state football champs with a 12-0 season in 2008 while dominating most of their opponents. That was last year.

The 2009 Wolverines understand they have to make their own history. Friday night's home opener was another step up the ladder toward their goal of consecutive state rings.

The Wolverines went 2-0 with a victory at home over a strong Springlake-Earth squad, 20-14.

The tone was set on the first play from scrimmage as Dathan McWhorter and Seth Bailey met in the backfield and dropped the S-E QB for a loss. The defense swarmed over the S-E team and forced a 3 and out.

Texico began a 10 play drive, highlighted by a leaping catch by Marques Pena for 24 yards. Bailey capped off the drive with a sprint right option pass to Jose Posada for the first score. The Posada kick made it 7-0 in the 1st quarter.

The teams traded punts before S-E mounted a drive of their own in the 2nd quarter to tie the game at 7 on a 50-yard pass.

After a Texico turnover, Jonathan Hill and Brandon King pressured S-E's QB into a tight throw that Jesus Rivera picked off to give Texico the ball at its 28.

Then Texico moved the ball on the ground well on runs by Edgardo Meza, Bailey, and Posada behind stellar line play

from McWhorter, Matt Vasquez, Sean Rusk, Jairo Lozano, and Garrett Garrison.

The drive was stopped, though at the S-E 7. S-E came back with a 40-yard TD pass to take a 14-7 lead into halftime.

In the 2nd half, Texico opened up with a 14-play drive that took 5:43 off of the clock. The offensive line again dominated, opening holes as Meza, Bailey, and Posada pounded the defense play after play.

This drive culminated with a Bailey TD keeper for 20 yards. Posada booted the kick through to knot the game again. 14-14.

The spread-option offense of S-E moved the ball effectively into Texico territory, but King broke through on 3rd down for a QB sack, forcing a punt.

The offense went back to work and marched down the field for a 94-yard, 10-play drive that was classic Texico smash-mouth football.

Without throwing one pass, the Wolverines made good use of their dominating offensive line. Bailey plunged into pay dirt from a yard out to give the green and black the lead for good at 20-14. The kick failed.

S-E did not go without a fight. They moved the ball all the way to the Texico 18 where Rusk shredded his blocker and hit the QB as he threw, causing an incompletion as time expired.

Texico rushed for about 400 yards, including 174 by Meza and 141 on runs by Edgardo Meza, Bailey, and Posada caught 4 passes for 28 yards.

One of the problems I have always had deals with celebrities who have "flaws."

Should we admire a person because he/she becomes famous despite the fact he/she is a drug addict or has killed someone?

A lot of it dealt with his crushing of the Homestead Strike in Pennsylvania in the 1880s, where due to his methods, many poor women and children starved to death.

That's correct ... women and children starved to death. And the strike was broken.

But that is forgotten each year when his prizes are announced.

Thus, I have trouble admiring the man.

As for Mr. Kennedy, I admire him for a lot of the work he did on behalf of the American people. And, as a Christian, I have forgiven him for his involvement in the death of Mary Jo Kopechne that night off the Chappaquiddick Bridge.

Kennedy, the driver of the car that went into the water where Miss Kopechne drowned, was only found guilty of leaving the scene of an accident and received a two-

month suspended sentence.

That's less than a slap on the wrist.

He should have been charged with evading police and manslaughter, too. Since he disappeared for 10 hours, it will never be known if DWI should have been tacked on (let's face it, Sen. Kennedy was known for his hard drinking).

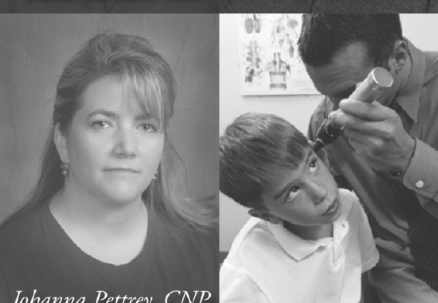

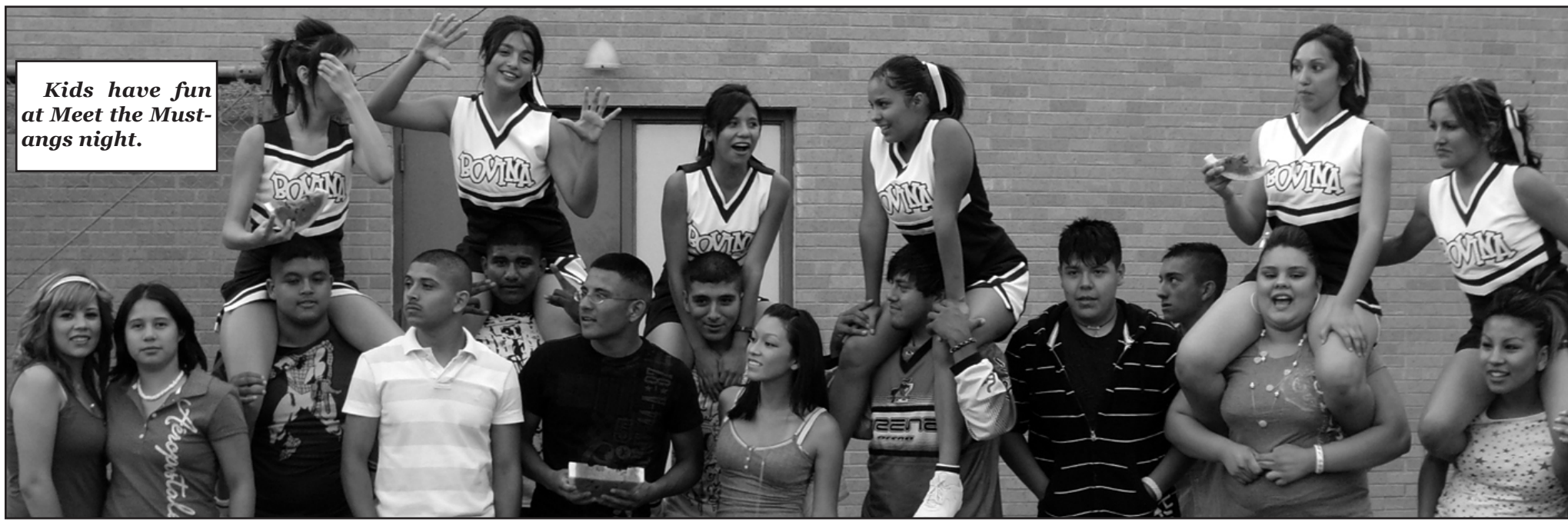

The Bovina Mustangs are 2-0 on the year after a smashing of Sudan, 30-12, at home last Friday.

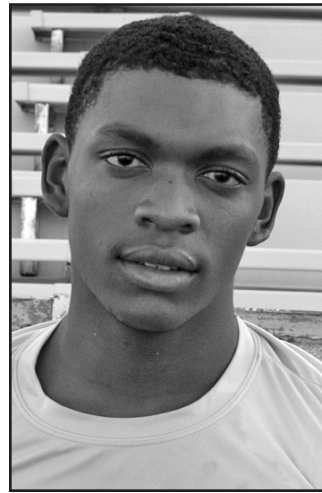
The Mustangs went with their ground game and Sudan had a hard time trying to stop it. Desmond Fox led the attack with 120 rushing yards, behind an offensive line that was playing very well as a team.

The first quarter was mostly Sudan. They got the opening kick and went 3 and out. Then Bovina also went 3 and out. But the Hornets put together a long drive, culminating in a 9-yard TD run and a 6-0 Sudan lead.

But the 2nd and 3rd quarters belonged to Bovina.

In the 2nd quarter, the Mustangs got deep into Sudan territory and got on the scoreboard on a 25-yard Daniel Rivera field goal. Then Bovina put together a good drive and Rolando Perez plunged over from the 1 for a Bovina lead. The Rivera kick made it 10-6 at halftime.

The Mustangs kept

pouring it on in the 3rd quarter, with two more TDs -- Fox ran to pay dirt from 13 and 16 yards out. Rivera added two more kicks.

Both teams scored in the final period. First, Andrew Marrufo took a 5-yard pass from Dorian Vela for a score, putting Bovina ahead, 30-6. And Sudan scored on an 18-yard pass.

Marrufo also had an interception for the

Mustangs in the 2nd quarter.

Individual stats – rushing, Fox, 21 for 120 yards; passing, Vela, 4 for 11 and 26 yards; receiving, Darien Walker, 3 for 12 yards.

Bovina was penalized 7 times for 60 yards, and Sudan 14 times for 118. Sudan lost two fumbles and Bovina didn't lose any.

Sudan is now 1-1 on the year.

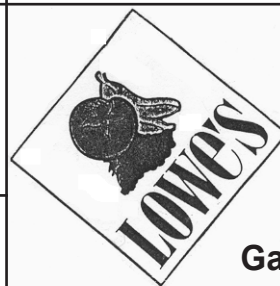
