**Registration starts
for BTD decorated
bicycle contest**

All youngsters are reminded that registration is open for the Border Town Day Decorated Bicycle contest.

Youths must sign up at the State Line Tribune, 404 3rd St. in Farwell

This year's BTD theme is Careers of Today. It is important to follow the theme since that is a large part of judging.

Also, an anonymous donor has provided funds for cash prizes to be given away in each category.

Everything is ready at the Tribune for kids to register, said Claire and Ginger Anderson, who will honcho the annual bike contest.

The registration deadline for the contest is at 4 p.m. on July 30.

Mrs. Anderson said that youths planning to enter the contest need to register, giving their name an age, to be eligible for all the prizes.

The contest will be held one hour before the Border Town Days parade kicks off on Saturday, July 31. The contest takes place adjacent to the Citizens Bank branch in Texico. Entrants need to be here at 10 a.m. Texas time.

After the bicycle contest ends, all participants will ride in the parade to the Farwell City Park.

God is good

In June, we worked with a church called New Life Fellowship, a church that is going to great measures to spread Kingdom across Cambodia.

When we arrived and they learned that we have a skill set of web design, video production and writing, they asked that instead of going into the provinces and working with local churches if we would stay in Phnom Penh and help them to renovate their website and marketing media.

They especially needed help making their material appropriate for the western culture. We each took an individual ministry area in the church and did a write-up on it.

We also had the opportunity to teach some English classes. This was probably my favorite part. It was insane that in this, the last month of the ministry, we were in an office job.

We would go into the office in the morning; we had normal hours and were able to go to church as congregants twice a week.

My English class met each day at 10 a.m. It

started with one guy, Rith, asking to meet with me to talk about the Bible and practice English. We met the first day and he told me the story of how he moved to Cambodia from Vietnam and became a Christian.

Rith became a Christian less than a year ago and has literally given up his family in his pursuit of our Lord. He is heavily involved with New Life Fellowship.

The first day, we sat down on the roof of the church (where all the English classes met all day), started talking and suddenly we had a crowd around us.

We quickly had a group of 5 guys sitting around talking about their experiences with God and their struggles with their non-Christian families. As we pushed our time together from one hour to two, and noon quickly approached, I closed the meeting by assigning a reading of the story of Jesus walking on the water and Peter's response.

We met the next day and each day thereafter until the end of the month to talk about a specific reading in scripture. Some days we had more advanced English speakers and were able to get into some amazing conversations about the implications of the scripture in our lives.

Other days we had more elementary speakers and would spend time on pronunciation, vocabulary and sentence structure.

Most days I was searching to have enough Bibles for everyone to look on. A few times I lent my Bible to someone to take home until I could get them another one.

One of my favorite moments was the last day when we were talking about when we all met Jesus.

One young man said the first time he heard about Jesus was the second day when we were discussing Jesus walking on water and the first time he had read the Bible was when I had given him my Bible to take home that night.

He asked us how he could be like Peter. Yes!

We walked through some prayers and he entered into a relationship with Jesus. I made sure that he had Rith's e-mail address so they could stay in contact with each other and keep the conversations going.

Who knew that just by agreeing to teach English to a bunch of young Cambodian guys we would see a young

man come to know Christ and another young man step into his anointing as a pastor?

It was an amazing experience.

Prizes will be announced at the beginning of the day in the park activities at 12:30 p.m. Texas time, at the Farwell City Park gazebo.

All participants need to be on hand at that time to receive their prizes. No motorized bikes are allowed in the contests.

All riders must bring their decorated bikes and trikes to the west side of the Citizens Bank building in Texico by 9:45 a.m. Texas time.

Room is available for the contest, and the Texico City Council has approved closing the street next to the bank to traffic during this time. Thus, there will be complete safety for the kids during the judging.

You must be on time or you will not be judged, alerted Mrs. Anderson.

She added, contestants need to be sure to stick to the theme Careers of Today, if they are going to be counted. The judges will be looking for adherence to the theme."

The contest is open to all youths who live in the Texico and Farwell School districts. Also, the BTDC committee allows children and grandchildren of local folks to enter also, even if they live elsewhere.

There are two categories 7 and under, and 8-12 years of age.

Other rules are:
-- All participants ride the parade. Their folks can go along too. The parade ends at Farwell City Park and a bicycle rack will be set up just across the street on the property of First Baptist Church of Farwell.

-- Riding bikes in the park during BTDC is not allowed, for safety reasons.

-- You must be present at the park to receive your cash prizes (or if you win the bicycles!) when the announcements are made during the 12:30 p.m. ceremonies.

Gas Grilling Tips

- Do not use a propane gas cylinder if it shows signs of external damage, such as dents, gouges, bulges, fire damage, corrosion, leakage or excessive rust.
- Before grilling, make sure the propane cylinder is secured to the grill as directed by the manufacturer.
- After grilling, the cylinder must not be stored indoors or within any enclosed space.
- Always open the grill hood before lighting, and light according to the manufacturer's instructions.
- Never use gasoline or kerosene to start the fire.
- Always grill in a well-ventilated area. Do not grill indoors or close to the side of a building.
- Use foil or a drip pan to catch juices and help avoid grease fires.
- To see how much propane is left in your cylinder, run a wet finger down the side. The wet streak will evaporate faster over the empty part of the cylinder.
- To turn the cylinder valve on or off, remember "Righty, tighty/Lefty, loosey."

Basketball began for me when I was still in elementary. I can remember playing teams whose members consisted of both Texico and Farwell girls. At that age, we didn't really care whether or not the ball made it into the hoop, we just thought it was fun running around all over the place.

Junior high came around, and that when the rivalry started to emerge. I still had teammates who played on two teams, our school team and an AAU team. The AAU team also consisted of girls from around the area (including Texico).

The whole awkward junior high stage complicated things, especially sports, because most kids still hadn't grown into themselves, so running and dribbling at the same time was very difficult.

Because of this, losing a game wasn't as big of a deal as it is in high school. Most junior high players' mentalities run more along the line of, "Well, we'll win next time. That was fun."

Don't get me wrong, there's still some competitiveness there, especially when it comes to playing Texico, but the loss doesn't hurt near as bad.

Then comes high school. That's where the big dogs play. I still remember when I made the transition from junior high to high school. Everything and everyone is bigger, faster, and stronger, and honestly, it is a little scary.

By the time in the season when the Farwell/Texico games come around, we've all had a few games under our belts. The whole beginning of the season jitters were practically gone.

Every player on the team knows when the game starts coming near. We all start to talk about it, and I'm sure the same goes for the Texico kids as well.

Of course, we practice to prepare for our games. That's the way things work. So when our preparation for this specific game begins, my heart starts beating a little faster when coach adds a few motivational words here and there about beating Texico.

When game day comes around, everyone tries to act cool, calm, and collected, but we all know that deep down, our competitiveness is starting to boil over.

I can distinctly remember the intensity in my teammates' eyes in the locker room only minutes before the game began. We all knew it was game time.

We walk out onto the court, only to see the gym full and packed with fans. The intensity in the gym is maxed out, and as soon as the ref tosses the ball up in the air for the tip-off, the crowd starts to roar.

Right away the game gets a little more rough than usual, which has happened every time since I began playing on varsity. Those girls on the other team are no longer friends or acquaintances, they're our enemies on the court.

If you look really close from the stands, you'll be able to notice a little pushing, shoving, and elbowing. For some reason, these games always turn out to be nail-biters. The majority of the time, the game is within no more than six or eight points.

For example, this season we played Texico twice. The first time we won by three points and the second time we lost by one point. Those are both games I will remember for a long time.

We go all out for every second of the game. By the time the buzzer sounds, both sides are dripping with sweat and gasping for air. I'm sure I can speak for the both of us when I say we're too stubborn to give up because we don't want to be on the losing side.

Even though it can get pretty crazy on the court, in the end we're still neighbors. One of the coolest moments in my basketball career was after the Texico-Farwell game in the Farwell Tournament.

After it was all said and done, both teams circled around at center court. We held hands and prayed. Then, we all came together in a huddle and broke out to the sound of every single player and coach yelling, Green and Blue!

We may be rivals, and we may push, shove, and talk smack about one another, but in the end, we can always come together as one because that is what we are. One community.

On June 30, Tyler Reed, 17, of Friona, was arrested by Friona police on a charge of possession of marijuana under 2 oz., pending in county court.

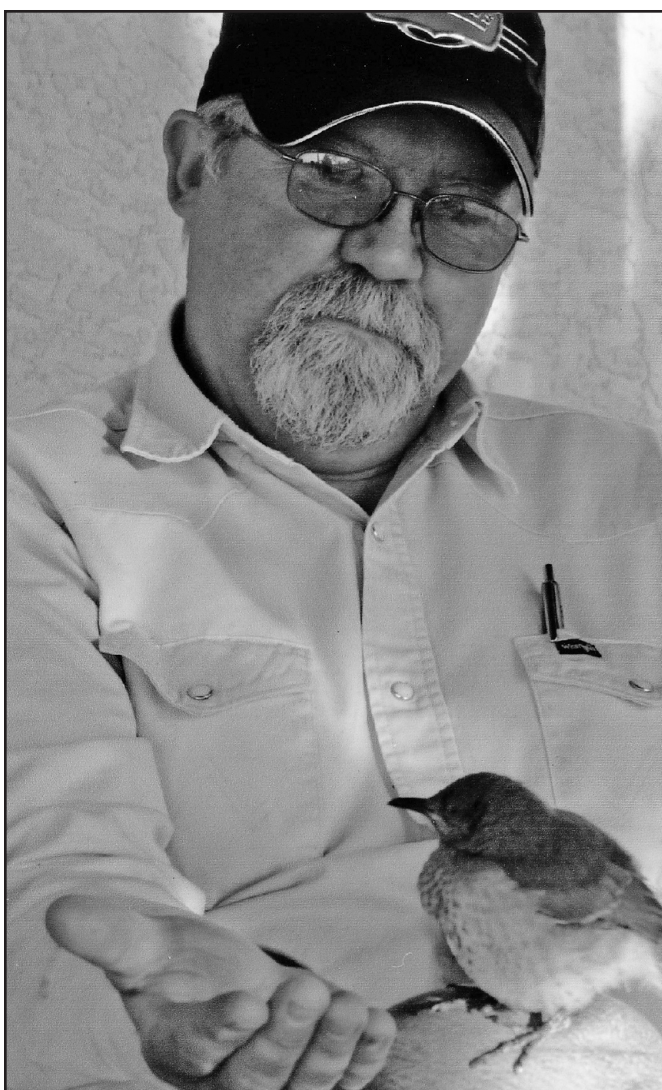
On July 1, Randy Osborn, 45, of Friona, was arrested by the sheriff's office on a Randall County warrant (DWI 3rd), pending in county court.

Wheat yields highly variable

From Monti Vandiver, Parmer County extension agent - IPM:

Reported wheat yields continue to be highly variable and for some disappointing.

The area corn crop is progressing very well. The crop has an extremely wide maturity range but most is between V10 to V15 stage and some earlier planted fields are approaching tassel.

As corn nears the tassel stage, it will reach peak moisture demand which could exceed .4 inch/day depending on temperature.

Area cotton is progressing very well and is readily squaring. Square shed rates have ranged from near 0 to 25%.

The higher shed rates can likely be attributed to a combination of several factors including environmental conditions, insect pests and other crop stressors.

REPEAT DIALING

Tired of wasting time redialing busy signals?
Just dial a two digit code, and repeat dialing will redial the last number you called for up to 30 minutes, and will ring YOU when the line becomes available.

To use Repeat Dialing:

1. After you receive a busy signal, hang up the phone.
2. Pick up the phone and dial *66. If the line is still busy, the number of the last call you dialed will be called back for 30 minutes.
3. As soon as the line becomes available, your telephone will ring with a different ringing pattern to alert you. Simply pick up the phone, and the number that was busy earlier will be ringing.

To turn off repeat dialing: If at any time after you have dialed *66, you decide you don't want to call the busy number back, pick up the phone and dial *86 to cancel your request.

Allied Granite: From Brazil to Bovina

How are countertops made?

Well, Allied Granite can tell you all about it, and they can even make those countertops for you.

This business is located in Bovina along Highway 86. They make granite and solid surface countertops of all kinds, and they will cut, fabricate, and install them for their customers.

There are currently five employees who work there, and the business is locally owned by three of the employees themselves: Josue Gonzales, Jorge Mascareno, and Lance McClaran.

Free estimates are given if you live within approximately a 50 mile radius from where they are located.

For those of you who are curious about how countertops are made, I asked the men how they went about creating them. First, the granite is cut out of a mountain, usually in Brazil and then shipped to the U.S.

Then, Allied Granite purchases large slabs, which are 50-60 square feet and weigh around 1,100 lbs., from a Dallas company. Once they are received, they can go to work.

One of the guys will come out to your house to get all the measurements they need. After that, they begin to cut the granite and make it the right shape. When that is completed, it is then polished and installed.

A typical job usually lasts 2 to 2 1/2 weeks from start to finish. They used to cut all the slabs by hand, which took up to three days, but they recently purchased a saw that can cut the same amount of granite in two hours.

There are over 300 colors for you to choose from, as well as 12 different edges. The price ranges from \$38 to \$120 per square foot when

you want it installed.

They also wanted to let everyone know that they have leftover pieces of granite from past projects that can still be used if you have a very small job that needs to be done.

These men have 12 years of experience, and have been based in Bovina for two years. They are also sub-contracted under Home Depot, Sears, and Lowe's.

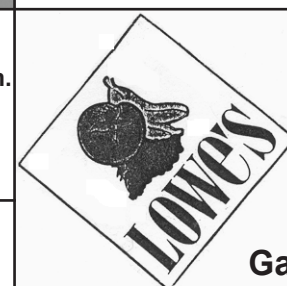
