Obelisk Fund draws nearer to its goal

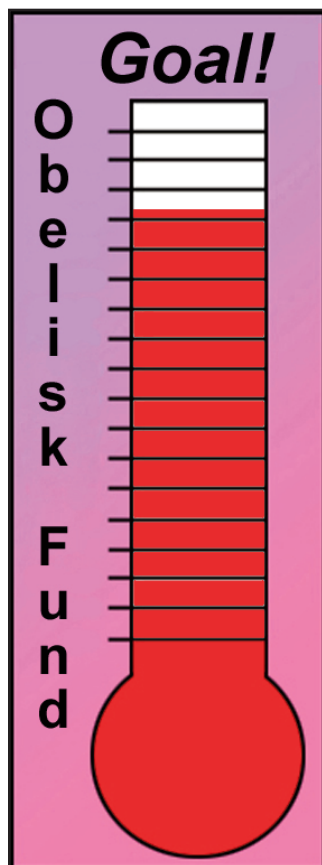
As of Monday, the Farwell Obelisk Fund has reached \$8,135 -- closing in on its goal.

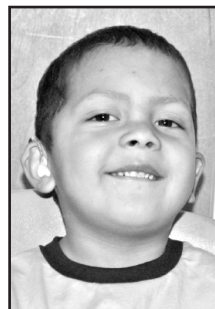
Monique had the new inductees recite the pledge, and then they were each presented with a certificate of membership.

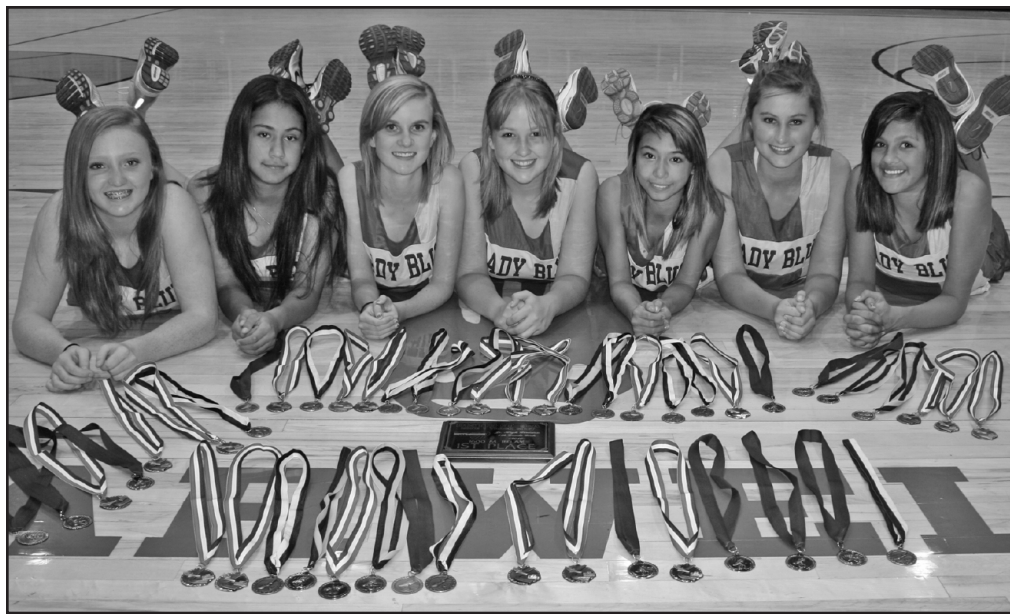

ENMR awarded grant

ENMR•Plateau was awarded an \$11.2 million grant from the Department of Commerce as part of the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act.

It will help to fund a \$16 million project to install high capacity broadband equipment on 1,600 miles of existing fiber that reaches into central and eastern New Mexico and west Texas.

Also, ENMR•Plateau is completing a multi-year, multi-million dollar project to enable higher speed broadband services for rural members in its serving area.

This project, which included construction of 900 miles of new fiber, will be completed at the end of 2010 and will enable DSL speeds up to 20 Mbps, depending on distance from equipment and line conditions.

LEGAL PUBLICATIONS

Ordinance No. 150

An ordinance revising Ordinance No. 1240, regulating the keeping of dogs and/or cats in the City of Farwell, Texas; providing for the number of animals a person may keep; providing for the registration of animals; providing for a pound; providing for the position of Animal Control Officer; providing it unlawful for any person who owns or controls an animal to permit such animal to run at large; providing for the redemption of dogs and/or cats and the disposal thereof if not redeemed; providing for quarantine and testing of animals having rabies; and providing a penalty for the violation of this ordinance.

Section 1: Definitions

- A. "Dog" or "puppy" shall be intended to mean both male and female of the canine family.
- B. "Cat" or kitten" shall be intended to mean both male and female of the feline family.
- C. "Vicious or Dangerous Animal" means:
 - (1) Any animal which because of its physical nature and vicious propensity is capable of inflicting serious physical harm or death to human beings and would constitute a danger to human life or property.
 - (2) Any animal which has behaved in such a manner that the owner thereof knows or should reasonably know that the animal is possessed of tendencies to attack or to bite human beings or other animals;
 - (3) Any animal certified by a doctor of veterinary medicine, after observation thereof, as posing a danger to human life, animal life or property upon the basis of a reasonable medical probability;
 - (4) Any animal that commits an unprovoked attack on a person or animal on public or private property; or
 - (5) Any animal that attacks or threatens to attack a person.
- D. "Wild animal" means any mammal, save and except the common domestic species (dogs, cats, horses, cattle, swine, sheep, and goats) and any amphibian, reptile, or fowl which is not naturally tame or gentle but is of a wild nature or disposition and which, because of its size, vicious nature or other characteristics, would constitute a danger to human life or property including, but not limited to, lions, tigers, leopards, panthers, bears, wolves, alligators, crocodiles, bobcats, coyotes, elephants, rhinoceroses and all forms of poisonous reptiles and other like animals.
- E. "Owner" means any person owning, possessing, harboring, keeping or sheltering any animal.
- F. "Animal Control Officer" means the person, designated by the City of Farwell to represent and act for the city in the impoundment of animals, controlling of animals running at large, and as otherwise provided and required in this chapter.
- G. "Cat Kennel" means any lot, building, structure, enclosure or premises where five or more adult cats are kept.
- H. "Running at Large" means:
 - (1) Off premises: (a) any dog which is not restrained by means of a leash or chain of sufficient strength and not more than twenty (2) feet in length to control the actions of such animal while off premises; (b) any cat which is off the owner's property.
 - (2) On premises: any dog not confined on the premises of owner by a substantial fence of sufficient strength and height to prevent the animal from escaping therefrom. A dog intruding upon the property of another person other than the owner shall be termed "at large." Any animal within an automobile or other vehicle of its owner or owner's agent shall not be deemed "at large." The term shall not include any animal while under the immediate physical or vocal control of a person, so long as the animal demonstrates complete and immediate compliance with all vocal commands of the person.
- I. "Vaccination" means an injection of United States Department of Agriculture-approved rabies vaccine administered by a licensed veterinarian.
- J. "Confined" means as the term is used in this ordinance shall mean that dogs and/or cats must be confined indoors or in a secure pen. In the case of a "vicious" dog it shall mean in a securely enclosed and locked pen or structure upon the premises of the owner or caretaker. Such pen or structure must have secure sides and a secure top. If the pen or structure has no bottom secured to the sides, the sides must be embedded in the ground no less than two feet. At such time as a dog has been declared "vicious," the owner will be given three (3) days to obtain the required structure and during this period the animal must be kept indoors or contained in an enclosed area sufficient to hold the animal (deemed adequate by animal control or law enforcement).

Section 2: Number of animals that may be kept and registration:

A resident of the city may not keep or harbor no more than three (3) animals (dogs and/or cats) over the age of four months; nor 10 puppies or 10 kittens under the age of 4 months unless they operate a licensed kennel, cattery or veterinarian facility. All animals kept within the city limits shall be registered with the City Clerk and shall receive a collar tag evidencing such registration. A one time \$10 fee shall apply to each animal so registered. Any animal found within the city limits without such registration tag shall be impounded and the owner thereof shall be subject to a fee of \$30.00. All animals already kept within the city limits shall have until Sept. 1, 2010, to be registered.

Section 3: Notice to Owner and Redemption:

Not later than two (2) days after the impounding of a dog and/or cat, the owner shall be notified, or, if the owner of the animal is unknown, written notice shall be posted for three (3) days at a conspicuous place at the city hall in Farwell, Texas, describing the animal and the place and the time of the taking up. The owner of the animal so impounded may claim such animal upon the payment of a fee of \$30.00 for the initial occurrence. If the animal is impounded a second time, the fee will be \$60.00. If the animal is impounded a third time, the fee will be \$120.00. If the animal is impounded a fourth time, the animal shall be euthanized at the expense of the owner. Additionally, the owner will be responsible for all costs and charges incurred by the City of Farwell for impounding and maintaining such animal plus all costs of food, shelter and handling.

- (a) Any currently vaccinated animal which has been impounded may be reclaimed by or for its owner upon payment of all fees.
- (b) Any impounded unvaccinated animal may be reclaimed by or for its owner upon payment of all fees and costs for a rabies vaccination in addition to any fine levied by the municipal court for violation of this ordinance.

Section 8: Dangerous and vicious animals and violations of this ordinance:

- (a) Complaint: Should any person, including employees of the City of Farwell, desire to file a complaint concerning an animal which is believed to be a vicious or dangerous animal or an animal which is in violation of any portion of this ordinance, a sworn, written complaint must be filed with the City of Farwell, as follows:
 1. Name, address, and telephone number of complainant and other witnesses.
 2. Date, time and location of any incident involving the animal.
 3. Description of animal. A photograph of the animal shall constitute prima facie evidence of the identity of the animal for prosecutions of violations of this ordinance.
 4. Name, address and telephone number of the animal's owner, if known.
 5. A statement regarding the animal which is believed to be a vicious and dangerous animal, stating the facts upon which such complaint is based.
 6. A statement that the animal has exhibited vicious properties in past conduct, if known.
 7. Other facts or circumstances of the incident which indicate a violation of this ordinance, including but not limited to, roaming at large.

Section 9: Duty of owners and persons in control and protection of animals.

- It shall be unlawful for any owner or person to:
 - (1) Fail to prevent any animal from running at large within the corporate limits of the city.
 - (2) Perform, do or carry out any inhumane treatment against any animal.
 - (3) Keep, possess, own, control, maintain, use or otherwise exercise dominion over any animal which by reason of noise, odor or sanitary conditions, becomes offensive to a reasonable prudent person of ordinary tastes and sensibilities, or which constitutes or becomes a health hazard as determined by the director health.
 - (4) Keep or harbor any dangerous or vicious animal within the corporate limits of the city.
 - (5) Keep, maintain, own or operate a dog kennel or cat kennel in any residential district within the corporate limits of the city.
 - (6) Allow an animal under such person's control or ownership to defecate on any private or public property not owned by the person having control of the animal without the immediate removal of and all feces. Any person aggrieved by such conduct shall file a complaint on a form provided by the city with the Municipal Judge. The complaint shall contain the name and address of the person who is alleged to have violated this provision. The person filing the complaint shall appear as a witness in the municipal court.

Section 12: "Wild Animals" prohibited:

- (a) It shall be unlawful for any person to own, possess, keep or harbor any wild animal within the city.
- (b) It is a defense to prosecution under subsection (a) that the owner or possessor:
 - (1) Is a governmental entity.
 - (2) Operates a zoo open to the public.
 - (3) Is a research institution.
 - (4) Owns or operates an animal exhibition, rodeo or circus in which the animal is an integral part, if the animal is restrained from inflicting injury upon persons, property or other animals, and adequate provision is made for the care and protection of the animal.

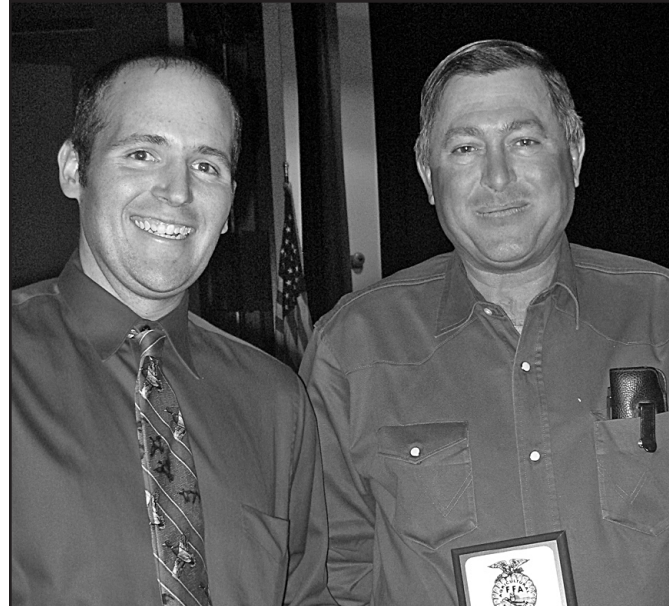

Letter to the Editor

Dear Editor,
 I'm going to step up on my soapbox for a minute to make a couple of observations about the Farwell city park.
 If you don't use the park, then I am not speaking to you. In your case, you already do more for the park than you should since you have your property coercively confiscated to pay for the park's maintenance. For this insult to your rights and property, I sympathize. I am only speaking to those of us who use the park.
 Well, not everyone who uses the park. I am also not talking to the unrepentantly irresponsible individuals who smash glass bottles and drop their waste wherever they happen to be. They wouldn't listen to me, even if they read a newspaper.
 I am speaking about all the trash that winds up on the ground in the park. The trashcans scattered around the park are worse than useless when they are full. I notice that they rarely get emptied, since I see individually distinguishable items sit in the cans for months at a time.

If the can is full, and you stuff some items on top, you may as well toss your trash on the ground. That is where it will soon end up, after all.

The problems, and the only real solutions, lie with each of us individually.

Your choice is to either listen to me, or discount me as a crank. It doesn't matter to me which you choose. Either way, I wish you well.

We got to see several people come to church services who we had met at crusades. That was especially cool for one of our pastors who met a little boy who ended up coming to church the next Sunday and actually brought a crew of several of his friends with him. *** Some of my teammates and I had the opportunity to go on safari. We camped in the Serengeti, and saw lots of lions. We actually saw three of the Big 5. We missed out on rhinos and leopards because they are only in a special part of the park and we did not go there. My personal favorite were giraffes. They were awesome. I also went to a monkey park in Nairobi. It is a city park populated with spider monkeys. 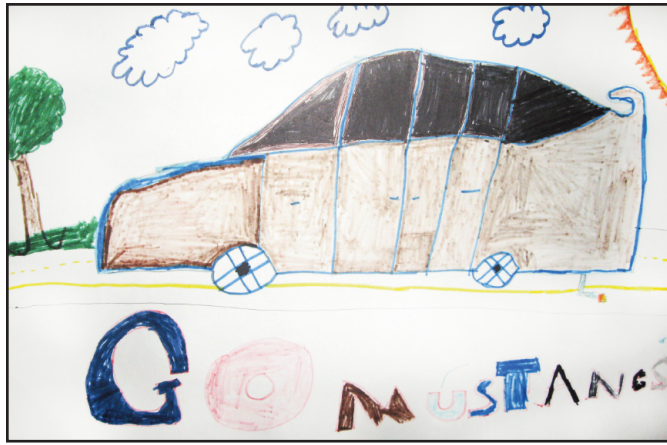

Bovina Council approves variances

The Bovina City Council had a busy meeting on Monday dealing with variances:

Adam Perez had requested a variance to keep chickens on his property on 1st Street. The council gave him 30 days to move them out of the city, but will give him a possible extension of time if needed later.

Jose Cruz got approval for two variances at his property on 9th Street. One is to place a dwelling north of his car lot as long as it faces the alley (to the south). The other was to place a building on the rear property line, as long as it doesn't overhang into the alley.

Vince Terrones, of 9th Street, received approval for his variance request to place a building on his rear property line. This cannot overhang into the alley.

In other business, the council:
-- Set the next meeting for May 17.
-- Appointed Linda Marshall as election judge.
-- Changed the "public dance permit" to "public gathering permit." If more than 30 folks get together at a public place (with alcohol involved), they must get a city permit. A police officer also is required to be there (the number depends on the number of adults present).

The permit is \$1. It must be approved by the police chief or city manager.

If it's at their home, no permit is needed.

-- Approved three police department policy changes: arrest, transport and search prisoners; secondary off duty employment, and mission and value.

-- Approved an amendment to the mobile home occupancy rules to deny mobile homes older than 20 years to be excluded from receiving certificates of occupancy upon location to the city or relocation to the city. They must now have their titles.

-- Approved an ordinance creating a municipal court security fund. A small part of fees for each ticket will now go toward security, such as an alarm system.

Bill Bizzell, who is retiring as Bovina School superintendent, has been hired as Clovis parks and recreation director.

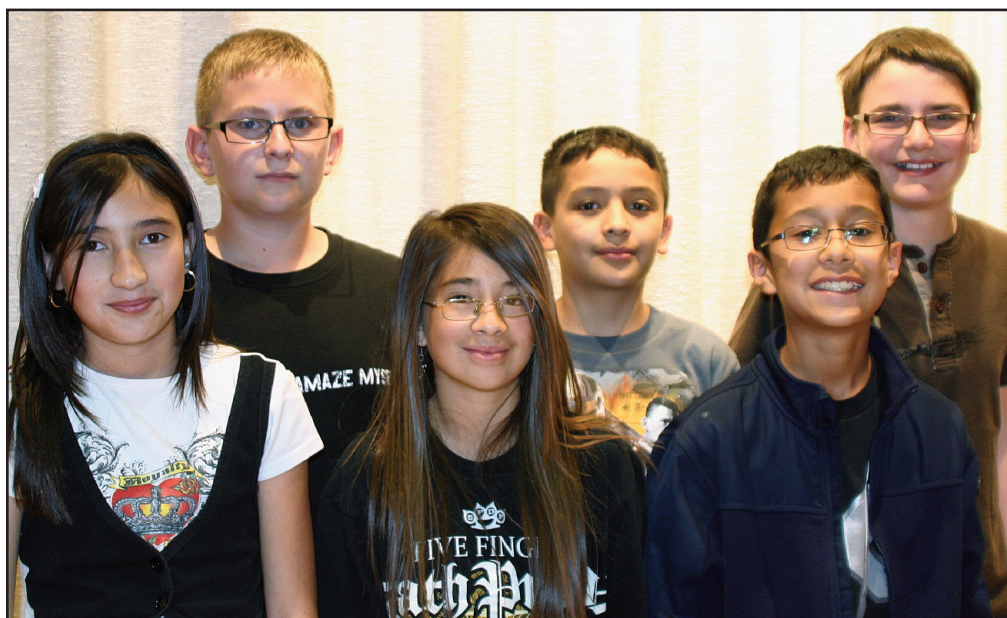
Bizzell, who lives in Clovis, will earn \$63,000 a year. He starts work there on May 17.
