

Timing is important for flower growth

By Parmer County extension agent Benji Henderson:

Spring is just around the corner and many people are getting out and getting their flower beds ready.

In Parmer County the average frost date is April 15. But that is just the average last frost date and does not mean that we cannot have a freeze after this date however. This does not preclude that preparation of these beds does not need to begin.

Many people still have not cleaned out last year's flowers or even begun to worry about these beds. It will soon be time to get started on these beds to have a pristine flowerbed. Timing can be very important and many nurseries are beginning to obtain and sell items which will help in getting that flowerbed off to a good start.

Soil preparation is one of many important aspects of flower gardening. Always remember, summer annuals are different from perennial beds and they must be treated differently. Organic matter needs to be added to most soils. Organic matter is one of the important factors in contributing to the well being of your bed.

LIVE CATTLE: Live Cattle prices were able to recover bout 50% of their Tuesday break going into Friday. The narket is technically trying to turn down, but at this ime, it will take a close below last weeks low in order to turn long term trends back down. Weekly charts took a turn down, but we still need more confirmation on the daily charts. Supplies are expected to grow as we move nto the May/June time frame.

FEEDER CATTLE: Feeder prices are similar to the Live Cattle with the exception that prices did not drop as severe on Tuesday as did the rest of the commodity market. The Cash Feeder Index has also begun to show signs of softening, but not to any large degree. The most mportant support level will lie around \$114 level basis the August contract. Last weeks lows will be short term support.

CORN: Corn prices have remained directionless over the last month with prices breaking down below support last week for one day and then trading back up above resistance for one day. The 4 week trading range will provide support/resistance over the coming weeks with most the focus on weather and planting progress. A close above last weeks highs could actually turn long erm trends back higher for the time being.

SOYBEANS: Soybean prices have turned long term rends back higher for the time being. Fundamentally reports indicate that world stocks have seen an increase of 44% over year ago levels which would make some trader question the turn back higher. Once planting is complete, there could be some changes in market direction. For now, most of the focus will remain on weather and overall trend direction.

WHEAT: Wheat prices have continued to trade inside ast Tuesday's high and low. This should be short term support/resistance as we move forward. Wheat is most likely going to take it's lead from the rest of the grain complex as we move forward. This is not the normal seasonal trend for wheat, but the close link between wheat prices and the rest of the grain complex is likely to continue for a while.

COTTON: Cotton prices moved down off their highs ate last week in the absence of any significant news. The U.S. Dollar also declined which proves to a point that cotton prices have continued to ignore the direction of the Dollar and any impact this may have on exports. The rationale has been if China wants cotton, China will pay the price? Long term trends remain higher while short term trends are now lower.
