

Main Street, Ave A, otherwise known as Highways 70 & 84 in Farwell, will receive an extensive face lifting. The highway from Seventh Street to the state line will all be taken up and relaid during the next ten weeks.

First you may have already noticed that the even numbered streets are closed to the highway. Later they will get to the odd numbered ones. However, the biggest problem is that all parking on the highway is banned at this time.

Jim Bishop, our local DPS man has been instructed to issue tickets for the "no parking" violators; however, with only two lanes of traffic to carry the load it would appear to be only prudent to keep out of the way of a fast moving eighteen wheeler. Remember no parking on Main Street.

Everybody wants the budget balanced. But the general consensus seems to favor cutting the other fellow's intact. In order to really achieve a balanced and reduced budget, some worthwhile items must be pruned along with the blatant social boondoggles. To reduce some of the more Monday night at the Texico beneficial expenditures, maybe we ought to look at what causes these budget items in the first place. One example comes to mind with the cry about cutting the federal assistance to law enforcement agencies. Here again a different approach to law enforcement may well allow termination of this federal assistance. Our answer to a budget cut in law enforcement assistance is to force the courts to jail the law breakers for extended periods. In reality, our lawmen do an excellent job of apprehending the large majority of criminals Our courts and lawyers teamed with addlepated psychologists keep right on freeing the hardened and repeated criminal. An example is the Amarillo police department which announced that they have a prime suspect in one of the brutal knife slayings there recently. The suspect is described as a repeated offender. That killing could have been avoided by a "keep'em in the jug" attitude in our courts. When we finally do get a criminal put away for life it often seems we have the wrong individual locked up. A lifer in the Texas system has just lost a Supreme Court decision on his life sentence. This one is in small con scams, nothing violent. In fact we have a former area person in the same fix, locked up for life on confidence and swindle games. Again no violence, just suckering folks who were too greedy in the first place. How come we never hear about the murderer or rapist getting salted away? Practically every major violent crime of murder, rape, muggery or armed theft and assault is finally traced to a next ten weeks. repeated offender in the violent crime catagory.
