Farwell, Lazbuddie voters go to the polls

April 5 is election time for residents of the Farwell school and hospital districts, plus the Lazbuddie school district area.

Here's a rundown on the elections:

FARWELL CITY COUNCIL

Three Farwell City Council seats are on the ballot. The three incumbents are seeking re-election: Martin Kube, Fred Chandler and Elizabeth Phillips.

The terms are for two years. The trio was elected last year but drew one-year terms after Farwell voters decided in a special election to change the form of government from two councilmen and a mayor to five councilmen and a mayor.

Also, two candidates have filed for mayor: Cecil Rundell and Chris Gikas. The post is being vacated by Walter Kaltwasser, whose resignation takes effect April 5.

The winner will have the post for one year, at which time the regular mayoral election will occur.

Voting will take place from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. at Farwell City Hall.

FARWELL SCHOOL BOARD

Four candidates are seeking the two positions on the Farwell School Board: Mark Williams, Randy Kelley and incumbents Steve Pierson and Richard Haseloff.

The terms are for three years. The polls will be open from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. at the county courtroom in the Parmer County Courthouse.

LAZBUDDIE SCHOOL BOARD

Six candidates have filed for three seats on the Lazbuddie School Board.

One seat is to fill an unexpired term and is for one year. The only candidate seeking that post is Jerry Engelking, who was appointed to it. The other two seats have five candidates vying for them: Ken Mc-Gehee, Kent Winders, John E. Jones, Douglas Rice and incumbent Harold Redwine. The terms are for three years.

Polls will be open from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. at the Lazbuddie School.

FARWELL HOSPITAL DISTRICT

Four posts will be on the ballot for the Farwell Hospital District Board. The only candidates are the four incumbents: Troy Christian, Frances Kube, Bert Williams and Tom Nichols.

The hospital district ballot will be combined with the Farwell School Board ballot. Persons may vote from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. at the county courtroom in the Parmer County Courthouse.

out of England for the British to maintain their worldwide influence. Since the war, the Soviet Union has continually challenged us, due to the dissimilarity of philosophies -capitalism vs. communism.

Krushchev talked of "peaceful coexistence" and Americans hungry for peace jumped on the bandwagon. But the fact is there's no such thing between our nations.

Russia doesn't want to "peacefully co-exist" with us. They want to be the dominant force throughout the world. Communism calls for constant war upon the capitalists and the leaders of Russia are trueblue Communists.

Once, Krushchev slipped during one of his 1950s' ramblings and said that Russia would bury us. Actually, he was being honest in that nation's goal. However, it wasn't politically wise to let us know where they were coming from. So you haven't seen that kind of talk from his successors.

Simply put, we are not at peace today. Just look at the size of our Armed Forces and where they are located -- troops in Korea, in West Germany, throughout Europe, in the Phillipines, in Cuba, etc. And we are moving ahead on improving our nuclear weaponry and the amount of missiles needed to carry them toward our enemies.

Russia is doing likewise. They threaten our allies in Western Europe through their offensive deployments throughout Eastern Europe. And that won't change. Hungary tried to get out from within the Warsaw Pact's thumb in 1956 and failed. Likewise for Poland in 1980. Russia prevented it -- the same truth that held 30 years ago holds today: Communists don't allow democracy to grow where they already have power.

That's a given. Marxist-Lenin theology doesn't permit Communists, once in power, to share it. Remember, they believe that people work FOR the state, not the opposite as in our society. And when the Communists are in power, they ARE the state.

Yet, I keep reading that certain Americans hoped that the Sandinistas will negotiate with the Contras and bring them into the government. That's insane. It will not happen. Never.

And the worst part is that it's so obvious. It sure makes me wonder about the intellectual capabilities of school to help farm until 1933 when the family sold the farm.


Storage units being built here

1836: TUESDAY, APRIL 5. With the fall of the Alamo and the massacre of the Texian prisoners at Goliad, the people of Texas are in a state of utmost alarm and confusion. They are fleeing northward en masse, in what is coming to be known as the "Runaway Scrape." Mexican armies under President Antonio Lopez de Santa Anna and led by at least five Mexican generals are advancing northward steadily, despite heavy rains that have swollen rivers and muddied the roads and the trails. Santa Anna is known to have reached the Colorado River today, and is expected to be in San Felipe de Austin on the Brazos River by tomorrow or Thursday. He will find that town in ashes. It was evacuated by its citizens on March 29, and every building was burnt to the ground.

The panic is aggravated by the policy of retreat adopted by General Sam Houston. His purpose seems to be to gain time for new recruits to join the army and be trained. He presently has between 700 and 800 men. They are encamped on the west side of the Brazos, not far from Groce's ferry, on bottomland that at present is completely surrounded by water, since the river has overflown its banks. Ad interim President David G. Burnet and the entire government are in Harrisburg, near Galveston Island. He is in strong disagreement with Houston's policy of retreat, and has dispatched a sharp note to him: 'Sir: The enemy are laughing you to scorn. You must fight them. You must retreat no farther. The Country expects you to fight. The salvation of the country depends on your doing so." It is reported that Houston was much incensed at receiving such a message from one who, he said, was "luxuriating" in the town of Harrisburg.

Many Texian families, hearing wild rumors that the Mexican army was almost at their doorstep, have fled their homes in such haste that some have left unfinished meals on the table. An eye witness reports that the roads are "literally crowded with wagons, men, women and children, hurrying on with the greatest speed to a place of safety."

This has been going on for more than three weeks. At Washingtonon-the-Brazos on March 17, the day the Convention there adjourned, an observer reported: "A constant stream of women and children, and some men, with wagons, carts and pack mules, are rushing across the Brazos day and night. The families of this place, and storekeepers, are packing up and moving. I had sent some clothes to be washed by a woman who occupied a shed at the end of the town. I went this morning to get them, and found the place deserted. The pots, pans, crockeryware, etc., and some bedding, were left, and only the articles more that he has been overcome with despair. "If Houston has retreated, or been whipped, nothing can save the people from themselves; their own conduct has brought this calamity on them!"

Despite criticism from President Burnet and others, Houston is convinced of the correctness of his strategy. "I consulted none--I held no councils-of-war," he has stated. "If I err, the blame is mine." His scouts report that the Mexican troops have become separated. "My spies return and report the enemy only about 1,000 strong on the Colorado, without pickets, and only a small campground." He believes that after the victories at the Alamo, San Patricio and Coleto Creek, Santa Anna considers the war already won. "The enemy is confident," he says, "and, I hope, so (Continued on Page 3)

Carson, who left Harrisburg to join his family in the Red River area, reported upon reaching the Trinity River that "panic has overcome this place." He says that the river is rising rapidly. "I fear by tonight it will be impassable for any kind of carriage. The slues on this side are belly deep. There must be 300 families -- I know not the number of wagons, carts, carriages, etc. Destruction pervades the whole country." He states quite frankly



much better for us." He urges the government to "tell our people never again to give way to panic; but to do their duty."

This "Runaway Scrape" adds greatly to the difficulties of the Texas cause. It reduces the number of volunteers for the army, since many settlers refuse to abandon their families in their flight to safety. The runaways clog the roads and river crossings, hampering movement of the army. Should Texas eventually emerge as the victor in this war with Mexico, the settlers will then be returning to unworked farms, where little or nothing has been planted. They will be facing a difficult winter.

1838: TUESDAY, APRIL 3. With the organization of Fannin County, authorized by Congress last December 17, the total number of counties in the Republic of Texas has now reached 30. It is on the Red River, west of Red River County. It is named for the hero of Goliad, Colonel James W. Fannin.

Other recent counties include Galveston, Fayette and Robertson. Mina County recently changed its name to Bastrop, which is the name of its major town. It is named for Baron de Bastrop, an early settler and an associate of Stephen F. Austin, and of his father, Moses Austin.

The total list of counties at the present time, naming them from the southeast to the northwest, is as follows: San Patricio, Refugio, Goliad, Bexar, Victoria, Gonzales, Jackson, Matagorda, Colorado, Fayette, Bastrop, Brazoria, Fort Bend, Austin, Washington, Milam, Galveston, Harris, Montgomery, Robertson, Jefferson, Liberty. Houston, Jasper, Sabine, San Augustine, Nacogdoches, Shelby, Red River and Fannin.


1842: SATURDAY, APRIL 2. General Edward Burleson, Vice President of the Republic of Texas, today disbanded an army of 800 volunteers under his command. It was assembled to invade Mexico in order to



Antonio under General Burleson, who advocates a strong ofense as the best defense. By vigorously bringing the war to the enemy, he believes that a lasting peace can be forced upon Mexico.

President Houston is adamant

against an invasion because of the meagre resources currently available to Texas. He believes that several months of preparation will be needed before the Republic can make such a major effort. He therefore ordered General Somervell to





proceed to San Antonio and take over the command. General Burleson relinquished his command as ordered, but the troops under him refused to accept Somervell. As volunteers, they claimed the right to elect their own commander, and voted overwhelmingly for Burleson. President Houston then vigorously demanded that the volunteers recognize General Somervell's authority, stating that the government would withdraw all

support otherwise. He said it would be four months before Texas could undertake a major invasion of Mexico. That would be in August. General Burleson stated, "Whether this plan can be executed under the burning rays of an August sun yet remains to be seen," and dismissed his men, permitting them either to return home or to join General Somervell.

In addressing them, he said: "For you soldiers, I will hear witness that (Continued from Page 1)

if you have not chased the barbarian enemy to his hiding place, and chastised him for his insolence and outrage, it is no fault of mine. If the President has thought fit, by a different course of policy, to disband a force which, by this time, might have been strong enough to have bled the enemy to his heart's core, I beg you to recollect that he is the constitutional Commander-in-Chief of the Army and Navy, and he alone is responsible for it."



counter an expected invasion from that quarter. When President Sam Houston refused to support such an offensive, General Burleson decided to disband the volunteers.

Texas has been in a state of uproar since the invasion of San Antonio on March 5 by General Rafael Vasquez with some 700 troops. Refugio and Goliad were also occupied at that time. Although the Mexicans departed after two days, they distributed a proclamation by General Mariano Arista that a much larger invasion force was on its way. Texas issued a general call to arms on March 10, and Bridgadier General Alexander Somervell was ordered by President Houston to take command of the militia that was being raised. There is no regular army in Texas at present.

In the few weeks that have passed, it has become evident that a Mexican invasion is not imminent, and many of the volunteers have returned home. However, a considerable unit has assembled at San

Throughout Texas, this area is receiving increased attention as more and more local school districts initiate gifted and talented programs. In Farwell, we also are planning a program for gifted and talented students.

I want to emphasize that this program is just now in the planning stage. It hasn't been brought before the School Board yet nor presented for approval by the State.

We are considering starting a program at the elementary level, from kindergarten on up. If approved, then we also plan to take a
