

What the redistricting likely will do is remove that part of the Friona area from the Bovina area precinct (Pct. 2).

Also to be taken into are federal account guidelines that mandate that at least one precinct in Parmer County contain a majority of minority (Hispanic) voters.

For the past decade, this has been Pct. 4 -- the Lazbuddie area precinct. It's likely that will continue.

The redistricting of the county commissioner and justice of the peace precincts must be completed at least three months before the 2002 primary election in Texas.





Federal legislation allows senior citizens to earn as much money as they like without sacrificing Social Security benefits. Previously, workers age 65-69 lost \$1 in Social Security benefits for every \$3 in wages above an annual limit of \$17,000.

This new law may affect your retirement-funding plans. For example, if you can expect more income from employment during your so-called retirement years, you may be able to get by with less income from your investments. Previously, you may have thought it necessary to weight your portfolio more heavily toward incomeproducing investments, such as Treasury certificates, bonds or bond-based mutual funds. But now you may want to consider adding more growth elements, such as stock or stock-based mutual funds.



Hail, high winds and blowing sand from four severe storms dealt a hard blow to South Plains crop producers from mid-May to early June, reports the Texas Ag Extension Service. As a result, the region may lose more than half a million acres of its irrigated cotton crop and several thousand acres of other crops.

Warm temperatures and good soil moisture potential spurred many cotton producers to begin planting in late April and early May. By May 25, they had planted almost 95 percent of the region's irrigated cotton crop. A 20county area surrounding Lubbock comprises the South Plains, and annually produces about one-half the state's five- to six-million acre cotton crop.

High winds and blowing sand damaged several thousand acres of young cotton in eight counties on May 20, and a May 26 storm hailed out several thousand additional acres in western Dawson County. The largest storm occurred May 30 -- rolling northwest to southeast, and leaving crops, livestock, barns, houses and equipment in nine counties damaged in its wake. A June 1 storm then caused considerable damage in three counties north and west of Lubbock.

Preliminary estimates from county agents, extension specialists and agribusiness point to a projected loss of
