## Storms damage about 2,800 acres of crops in Parmer County

Hail, high winds and blowing sand from four severe storms dealt a hard blow to South Plains crop producers from mid-May to early June, reports the Texas Ag Extension Service. As a result, the region may lose more than half a miliion acres of its irrigated cotton crop and several thousand acres of other crops.
Warm temperatures and good soil moisture potential April and marly May. By May 25, they had planted in late April and early May. By May 25 , they had planted aimos 95 percent of the region's irrigated cotton crop. A 20 county area surrounding Lubbock comprises the South five- to six-million acre cotton crop.
High winds and blowing sand damaged several thou sand acres of young cotton in eight counties on May 20 and a May 26 storm hailed out several thousand additional acres in western Dawson County. The largest storm occurred May 30 -- rolling northwest to southeast, and leaving crops, livestock, barns, houses and equipment in nine counties damaged in its wake. A June storm then caused considerable damage in three counties north and west of Lubbock.
