But unbeknownst to almost everyone, the CD player vanished -- and was found at the last minute in the office of principal Jimmie Mace.

Farwell Schools: We will still honor 1953 pact with Texico

The entire Farwell School Board, plus Supt. Larry Gregory, on Tuesday signed the following statement:

"Be it known that Farwell ISD will continue to honor the agreement between Farwell and Texico schools that was signed in 1953 by the respective school boards. The policy stated: "Pupils shall enroll and attend schools in the districts in which their parents reside, with exception of any senior affected by this policy for the 1953-54 school year only. If residence should be changed from one district to the other during the school year, the pupil shall change schools at the nearest examination term.

"It is our belief that this policy has positively served both school districts for the past 50 years. It would be a loss to the community for the school districts to get into a competition for students. We believe that any change would ultimately cause hard feelings and a sense of divisiveness in the Texico/Farwell communities. Both Farwell and Texico ISD's are very important to the vigor and well being of both cities and communities."

The board passed that resolution in response to recent discussions by the Texico School Board that it may alter the 1953 pact and begin taking out-of-state stu-

The Texico School Board has received advice from its attorney that says Texico can do so as long as it concerns all Texas schools, and not be selective.

At the last Texico School Board meeting, the board asked Supt. R.L. Richards to check with its attorney further to clarify the situation, before voting on whether to, change the 1953 pact.

Each year, the New Mexico Cooperative Extension Service, the Southwest Dairy Association and other area ag businesses sponsor "Kids and Kows," a day at the Curry County Fairgrounds to teach area 4th graders about agriculture.

Each of the 600 participants are asked to write an essay about their experience and compete for a \$100 savings bond and an ice cream party for the 4th graders at

This year's winner was Jaylyn Cooper, of Texico Elementary School. She and her classmates celebrated on May 5. Here's her essay:

When I went to Kids, Kows and More, I had a lot of fun and learned a lot. I think this program is a wonderful program, and I thank them for putting it on for our school this year.

When my class got off the bus, our teacher put a sticker with the numbers 11 and 12 on us. Our group leaders led us to this field and they taught us a new game. The game was kind of like tag. The leaders picked five people to be "it." Those five people would stand out in the middle of the field. They would call out a professional football team. If the team that they called was your team, you would run. If they called NFL, we all had to run. We all got thirsty from running so they gave us a bottle of water.

Then we went to Cotton, where I learned that Eli Whitney invented the cotton gin. He taught us a bale of cotton weighs 500 pounds. We learned how they gin the cotton. We also learned cotton is 7,000 years old.

After that, we went to Dairy Cows. The milk cow's name was Friday. They would milk three times a day for nine months. There are seven breeds of milk cows. The Holstein is the largest of the seven. Before they milk it, they put iodine on all four teets to kill germs. All milk that is drank is Grade A. That means it is never touched

Then, we went to Corn, where we learned the Indians first discovered corn. She said, "Our fruit rollup had corn syrup and dried corn syrup in it." The lady who taught corn was Coach Irwin's wife.

On May 25, the city council will meet to canvass the election, and also to discuss the sewer situation. Terry will make his complete report at this time.

He has put together an outline showing three choices: keeping the status quo, fixing the current plant for re-permitting; and building a new sewer plant.

If the status quo were kept, it would mean the sewer plant would have to be shut. Obviously, the council won't accept this choice.

The 2nd choice is to repair the sewer plant and correct the sewer permit. Terry estimates this would extend the life of the sewer plant 3 to 5 years depending on population growth.

He estimated about \$68,000 would be needed to cover the deficiencies and, even then, it would be a short-term fix. Meanwhile, interest rates and construc-

tion costs would go up. The 3rd choice is to built a new plant east of the Wayne Smith cotton gin, with a lift station at the roll-off boxes. The "pro" is that interest rates are low right now, and he estimated about a 4 percent rate could be gotten on a bond issue. The "con" is that he estimated it would raise sewer rates by at least \$14 a month per connection. The cost for a 20-year bond issue for \$1.3 million would mean annual payments of \$95,656. And this would handle the city's needs into the future.







Decision time nears for city council

The Bovina City Council will have an interesting decision to make soon regarding the future of the sewer system for the community.

As was reported in last week's Tribune, Rich Oller, of Oller Engineering, of Lubock, had some bad news to report -- it didn't appear the state would continue granting the permit for the current city sewer system since it's been outgrown.

It was set up for 1,200, with a maximum of 1,800 users. The census put Bovina's population at 1,874, but a truer statistic is likely over 2,300. So Oller recommended that the city build a new sewer system at an estimated cost of \$1.3 million.

After the meeting, Mayor Galen Hromas asked City Manager Ernest Terry to check with the state on why it appeared the next 5-year permit wouldn't be given. In Oller's report, he listed six items that had to be addressed before the state would issue a new permit.

Well, Terry talked with the state environmental folks and found that all six items could be addressed, meaning that re-permitting might be allowed. These six items

1) Submit copies of ground water monitoring. Current permit requires 3 wells, around the sewer plant, drilled for monitoring ground water. This hasn't been done, but establishing the wells and taking a sample would satisfy this requirement.

2) Provide for a 15-ft. buffer zone around treatment units. Establishing an easement with Pete Davis not to build any homes next to the Imhof Tank would satisfy this requirement.

3) Provide design calculations for the Imhof Tank and sludge drying beds. Terry said an engineer drawing and measurement of the existing system could satisfy this requirements, with certain provisions.

4) A waste water treatment plant may not be located within a 100 year flood plain unless the plant is protected from damage. Terry said a review of the topography and rainfall records for the last 10 years to include any history of flooding, would satisfy this requirement. There is no historical record of a "100 year flood" here.

5) Sewer sludge solids management plan. This is handled by Duncan Disposal and permit numbers have been provided -- satisfying this requirement.

6) Flow data exceeding the 70-90 rule. The current permit dictates a measurement at the outflow, and the statistics indicate they will satisfy the requirement.

Terry summed up that, after talking with the state folks, it was agreed by both parties that it was feasible and possible to obtain a re-permit of the existing plant.

But that's only part of the story. As pointed out, the city's population has jumped and while a re-permit might get by today, that doesn't mean that a new sewer plant still must be built down the road.
