



Anyway, I watched a TV show last week that used the health insurance crisis as a topic. It was an episode of "Judging Amy."

And it was the first time I saw the health insurance mess surface on a popular TV series.

Here was the crux:

The Tyne Daley character (Amy's mother) is a social service worker.

The mother of a foster child comes to her, saying the child has a serious illness that can be corrected by surgery -- but they have no health insurance. And the only hospital in town that will do surgery for folks who don't have insurance has put the child on a waiting list -- a year down the road.

Since it doesn't appear that the child can survive that long, the mother wants to have the child returned to Child Services -because the state can mandate the surgery immediately.

So Tyne Daly obliges. She comes to the home and sweeps a finger over a table, saying something like to the mother:

"Look at all this dust! What a mess! The state cannot allow a child to live in such wretched conditions. I am taking the child away from you!"

And, of course, this is what the mother wanted.

So there's a happy ending. The state takes back the child so she can have the needed surgery.

And during the show, the mother asks Tyne Daly what the answer is to prevent such madness.

And Tyne Daly responds, "Universal health care."

And here is how I view this message (and this is no laughing matter):

The day is coming (because our politicians are comatose to the nation's ills) when working mothers and fathers will abandon their children to the state if illness dictates.

If a family has a child who has a serious illness, than the only way to solve the problem is turn the child over to the state --

He was elected Texico Municipal Judge and served for eight years,



Texico council hires swimming pool manager; search still on for city clerk

The Texico City Council on Tuesday heard councilman Oran Jay Autrey report that repairs are continuing on the swimming pool, and it's hoped that it will open about June 10.

The council received one application for a pool manager, from Darlene Brown. It was accepted, with Autrey abstaining from the vote because she is his niece.

In other business, the council:

-- Autrey reported that the chip sealing project on Avenue F is still waiting on word from Curry County.

-- Assistant city clerk Carolyn Johnson said no bids were received for constructing the basketball court at KKR Park. Autrey got permission from the council to bid on the project, and he will abstain on a vote when the council decides whether or not to accept his bid.

-- Autrey reported that Michael Johnson has been hired as summer help for public works Supt. Darrell Stanton. Also, Josh Scioli has been hired fulltime as Stanton's assistant. Stanton became superintendent earlier this month following the resignation of Clarence Smith.

-- Gave Stanton the go-ahead to buy a push mower as long as it's not higher than the price quoted earlier.

-- Approved the annual Eastern Plains Council of Governments membership renewal, at \$494.

-- Approved the prisoner housing agreement with Curry County, as it has been.

-- Is seeking a new accountant to handle the city's audit. Every few years, the state mandates cities to change auditors, and this is the year for Texico. Previously, the city had been paying \$3,000 to \$3,500 a year for the audit. But the state requires a lot more paperwork now -- resulting in higher costs.

So, two bids were received from accountants -- Gary custodian needed at Far- Bender, Clovis, \$10,638; and Dan Austin, Ruidoso, \$6.431.






