Live Cattle prices have remained strong after cash rade took place around \$104.00 last week. Future prices backed off to some degree late last week, but have been able to regain most of their looses coming into this week. Some analysts believe that cash may trade close to unchanged this week before seeing a decline in beef prices. For now, prices remain steady at historical levels

Feeder prices have remained inside a tight trading range for about the last eight days. Prices were able to spike both a top and bottom last Tuesday when \$104.00 eash fed cattle trade took place and came as somewhat of surprise. The market remains flat waiting for direction from their Live Cattle counterparts.

Soybean prices retraced about 75% of their break seen in early November. This may stop or turn the mar ket back down to test the lows made just a couple of weeks ago. Most of the direction will be determined by he strength in the Dollar. The Dollar bottomed and ral lied while the grain complex moved lower. The grains have been able to rally while the Dollar just finished a correction to the downside.

Corn prices also regained about 50% of their losses seen in the last few weeks while the Dollar was seeing a correction to the downside. The Dollar now looks a little higher which may add some pressure across the grain complex over the next few days? A close back below the \$5.42 level could lead to a retest of the \$5.20 low made just a couple of weeks ago.

Wheat prices have been able to regain 100% of their osses seen in recent weeks with the bulk of the move to the upside taking place just last week. The market is now in position to test the old highs around the \$8.40 level basis the March contract. There is seasonal strength into the December/January time frame, but with nothing being normal, about all we can say is that trends are still strong in the wheat market.

Cotton prices have also been able to see a retracement like most of the grains due mostly to the downward correction seen in the Dollar over the last week. Prices did stop up around the two-thirds retracement level round the \$1.38 level basis the March contract. The market did reverse to the downside early this week, but more confirmation will be needed to see if this changes the trend. Market will continue to watch the action in the U.S. Dollar over the next few days.






