Local organizations are invited to contact Kube if they wish to have the EMT course taught to them.

Ann Cooper, one of the course participants, said that the firemen have said that a mock fire will be set up soon "where we'll go out and actually do the fire fighting with them there to instruct


Mrs. Cooper, wife of the department's fire chief, said that the idea for training the women came up when the organization was formed. "When we organized FAST this was one of our

Lee Ann has been continuing her education by taking computer science courses and hopes to continue to do so at ENMU in Portales.



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
