Flag Dedication Set At Texico Fire Dept.

All area residents are invited to take part in special Flag Day ceremonies Sunday afternoon in honor of the Texico Fire Station.

The Clovis-Portales Elks are calling on the local residents to make a special effort to commemorate the Stars and Stripes on Flag Day at a flag presentation and dedication at 4 p.m. MDT at the newly-constructed Texico Fire Station.

Taking part in the ceremonies will be New Mexico Senator Caleb Chandler, the Army, Marine Corps, Navy and Air Force Recruiters, the Cannon AFB Ceremonial Flight, (Honor Guard) the Clovis Shrine Cycle Corps, the Clovis Shrine Drum Corps, and Texico Mayor John Hadley.

The Firemen's Auxiliary Service Team (FAST) plans to serve refreshments to those attending, and invites everyone to be present "especially those who missed the original open house festivities because of the bad weather that day," said Frances Kube, FAST member.

The Fire Station will be open for touring following the dedication ceremonies. Flag Day, celebrated each June 14, honors the creation of the Stars and Stripes as the official flag of the United States. It is on that day that over 1.7 million members of the Benevolent and Protective Order of Elks, including the local members of the Clovis-Portales Elks Lodge, will honor the flag and "renew their faith in America" as part of a special ceremony.

The Elks present a United States Flag to worthy organi-

zations and groups each year on Flag Day, according to Earl Turvaille local lodge member.

Ceremonies will also take place at the VFW Post No. 3280 at 200 West Grand in Clovis on Sunday before the group arrives at Texico.

"The Elks believe it is time for us, for the mad, rushing Twentieth Century American, to stop for a moment and think," said Turvaille. "Let us imbue and rekindle in ourselves and our children the so-called old fashioned way of patriotism, a burning devotion to the principles and ideals upon which our country was founded. Should not every home own and proudly display the colors on holidays and other such occasions?" he said.

Turvaille continued by saying our great republic, the chosen infant destined to be man's last remaining hope for suffering humanity, a shining beacon of light, noble and glorious, the haven for the oppressed and persecuted and truly God's gift to mankind."

The history of Flag Day began during the American Revolution. In the early stages of the war, the young nation had no official standard and many groups had expressed the desire for a flag as a means of identification.

The Continental Congress adopted the design of the Stars and Stripes on June 14, 1777, resolving that "The flag of the United States shall be 13 stripes, alternate red and white, with a union of 13 stars

of white on a blue field, representing a new constellation."

Though the Congress had adopted the basic design, flag-makers were free to add their own artistic touches. The flag flown at the Battle of Bennington on August 16, 1777 featured the number "76" emblazoned on the blue field, with the stars forming an arch over the number.

Throughout the 19th century, American explorers and adventurers, such as Lewis and Clark, flew their own variations of the Stars and Stripes. And though it was the official national flag, U.S. Army land forces did not carry it until 1834. It was not authorized as a cavalry standard until 1887.

The first recorded recognition of the birthday of the Stars and Stripes was in 1885

by a Wisconsin school teacher. Various organizations began celebrating the birthday soon after. Betsy Ross Association, Sons of the Revolution and the Pennsylvania Dames were among the organizations who began celebrations in the 1890's of the flag's birth.

In 1897, the State of New York declared June 14 a state holiday.

June 14 took on national significance in 1907 when the Benevolent and Protective Order of Elks designated the date as Flag Day. The Elks were the first fraternal organization in the nation to mandate observance of Flag Day by its entire national order. A special ceremony was also created that still is conducted.

vehicle missing on June 4. Sheriff Morgan describes the stolen vehicle as two-tone red in color with a New Mexico license number EK 6367.

Two cases of vandalism were reported this week, both believed to have occurred the night of June 4.

Triple S Machine Shop reported that a rock had been thrown through one of their windows, and officials at Farwell High School reported that a full can of beverage had been thrown through a window there.

In arrests this week, Oscar Ollivas, 26, of Clovis was arrested by officials for driving with a suspended license. Ollivas was placed under \$300 bond, and has been released.

FAST Members Learn Fire Fighting Skills

Members of Texico Firemen Auxiliary Service Team (FAST) have proven that fighting fires is not "for men only."

The women, all wives and mothers of Texico's volunteer fire department members, are currently undergoing training in fire fighting, using the fire fighting equipment, and advanced first aid and EMT training.

"First of all it helps to understand what our husbands are doing in their job," said Frances Kube, FAST member, adding, "and secondly, in an extreme emergency we could be of help to them. During the daytime when the men are out of the city in the country we could get to the fire station and get things started for them," she said, explaining that many times, especially during harvest or summer vacation time the volunteer fire fighting men are further away than the wives and mothers are, and consequently the women are able to respond to the fire alarm or ambulance call a lot sooner if need be.

To turn on the pump, the women were instructed on how to pull out the three necessary handles. For holding the hoses with the 200 pounds of pressure, weight distribution was taught. "A few of the local firemen from other areas doubt our capabilities at holding the hoses, but we can do it!" Mrs. Kube said.

Mrs. Kube explained that replacing the hoses back on the truck is another trick. "They have to be folded in just a certain way after they have first been dried out. But our department has enough hose that usually a dry one is put on

while the other dries out." The women were also trained in how to refill the tank on the truck from the fire plug. "First you attach it to the truck, then the plug, then you use a special wrench to turn on the fire plug," Mrs. Kube says.

Another part of the fire fighting training was the use of the "deck gun," which is the stationary nozzle on top of the fire truck, used mostly for shooting water to tall buildings.

Ann Cooper, one of the course participants, said that the firemen have said that a mock fire will be set up soon "where we'll go out and actually do the fire fighting with them there to instruct us."

Mrs. Cooper, wife of the department's fire chief, said that the idea for training the women came up when the FAST organization was formed. "When we organized FAST this was one of our intentions, to learn the working of the fire department, to help during any natural disasters or whenever we were needed."

Learning the fire fighting skills and equipment operation wasn't as hard as I thought it would be," she said, adding that placing the hose back on the truck is the only thing she worries about. "Folding and putting up the hose looks so complicated," she said. "It has to be put on just right because it has to come off the truck in an even line."

Currently the women are undergoing an intensive EMT course to include 81 hours of advanced first aid, how to repair broken bones, how to handle trauma calls, child birth, removing injured people

on an actual emergency call as yet. "Our main purpose was just to help the guys whenever they needed it," said Mrs. Kube, "but if we're ever needed, we can now help."

What if she gets called tomorrow, does she think she can handle it? "I do. I really think I do."

Taking part in the training are FAST members Anne Cooper, Marie Christian, Jerry Sharp, Teddie Spears, Kim Chancy, Frances Kube, Glenda Thigpen, and Dawn Panter.

Hose 'Em Down

FAST member Jerry Sharp proves she can handle the fire hose just as well as any man can, holding and spraying with 200 pounds of pressure coming out of the hose. The women were taught how to balance their weight while using the

fire hose so as not to topple. Members of FAST were also instructed in how to turn on the pumps, how to use the fire plugs, how to replace the equipment and how to drive the trucks. They are currently undergoing EMT training.

Texico Council Discusses Flouride And Sales Tax

Texico City Council conducted an active meeting Tuesday night, discussing water flouride content, a temporary reduction in city sales tax, and business registration annual fees.

The city has been advised by the Environmental Protection Agency in Washington, D.C., that the flouride content in the water is above what the agency allows. Removing excess flouride requires a special plant, according to Marie Christian, Texico City Clerk, so the city is requesting a variance from the State EID. Mrs. Christian explained that area dentists have advised that there is not enough flouride in the water to do damage to teeth.

In other action taken at the meeting, it was learned that the current city sales tax of 4 percent will drop to 3.5 percent as of July 1, but will be raised again to 4 percent as of January 1. The State of New Mexico reduced the municipality sales tax during its last

session, according to Mrs. Christian, and what it means is that the state, not the city, will be receiving less money. This is in an effort to give back more monies to municipalities.

"This will qualify us for the small cities assistance act," she said. "Texico residents will not be paying more in taxes," she commented.

Also during the state's last legislative session, the occupation license was done away with and the creation of business registration is now underway. Mrs. Christian explained that all Texico businesses will be registered at an annual fee of \$15. Texico licenses are due December 1 so business registration will be prorated this year.

The board voted to contact an appraiser on the cemetery land concerning the purchase of additional land.

The working budget was approved and is to be submitted to officials in Santa Fe with some minor changes.

Texico Chamber Meets

Members of the Texico Chamber of Commerce met Monday at the Citizens Bank in Texico and moved ahead with their plans for the upcoming Border Town Days celebration.

Secretary Louise Engram reports that C of C members discussed BTD car placards, town banners and possible sponsorship of a queen contestant. "We do plan on supporting a candidate as soon

as one is available," she said.

In other action taken at the meeting, members discussed the proposed Highway 70 project.

Members also began their initial planning for next year's banquet speaker.

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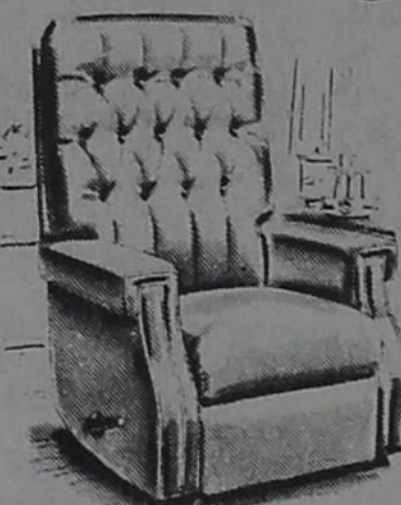
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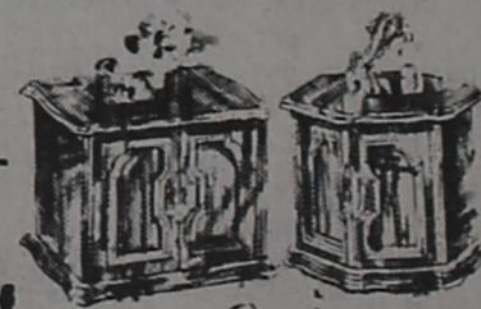

Local Elevators Get First Wheat

Area wheat and barley harvest is getting underway, with both the Sherley-Anderson-Pitman grain elevator in Farwell and the Sherley-Anderson grain elevator in Lariat receiving local crop loads.

Lariat received its first wheat Monday. The 32,000 pound load was received from Steve and E.W. Bass of the West Camp vicinity and the farmers were paid a \$25 premium for bringing the first load to the Lariat facility.

Their load of dryland wheat had a moisture content of 10.6 and a test weight of 56 pounds per bushel.

The Farwell elevator received its first loads of barley and wheat Tuesday afternoon, according to Fred Chandler.

Castor Farms, located south of Farwell, turned in the first

irrigated barley load, with a moisture content of 10 percent and a test weight of 48 pounds.

Gary Bailey, also from south of Farwell, turned in the first load of irrigated wheat which had a moisture content of 10 percent and a test weight of 57 pounds.

Both were paid a \$25 premium for taking their crops to the Farwell elevator.

Worley Mills of Farwell had not reported receiving any local crop at presstime, but say they have received some crop from out of the area.

Prentice Mills, ASCS office executive director, reported last week that this year's wheat harvest yields should be "average to fair" and added that "it won't be a bumper crop, which is what is to be expected following the recent dry winter."

THE PURPOSE OF THE LAW

"Therefore by the deeds of the law there shall no flesh be justified in His sight..." (Rom. 3:20).

It is strange that so many sincere people can so misunderstand God's written Word as to suppose that He gave the law "to help us to be good" or "as a rule of life."

The law was not given to help us to be good, but rather to show us that we are sinners and need a Savior. Romans 3:22,23 says that "there is no difference, for all have sinned and come short of the glory of God." How foolish, then, to look to the law for help. It is not the function of the law to help the criminal, but to condemn him. Thus the Bible teaches that the law was given:

"That every mouth may be stopped, and all the world may be brought in guilty before God" (Romans 3:19).

"For by the law is the knowledge of sin" (Romans 3:20).

"The law entered that the offense might abound" (Romans 5:20).

"That sin by the commandment might become exceeding sinful" (Romans 7:13).

"It was added because of transgressions" (Galatians 3:19).

This leads us to the conclusion:

"Therefore by the deeds of the law there shall no flesh be justified in His sight" (Romans 3:20).

This makes sense, for doing a few good things cannot right the wrongs we have done. Good is what we should do, hence we should not expect additional credit for it.

But, thank God, "Christ died for our sins" (1 Corinthians 15:3) and "by Him all who believe are justified" (Acts 13:39).

"Therefore we conclude that a man is justified by faith without the deeds of the law" (Romans 3:28).

"Therefore being justified by faith, we have peace with God through our Lord Jesus Christ" (Romans 5:1).

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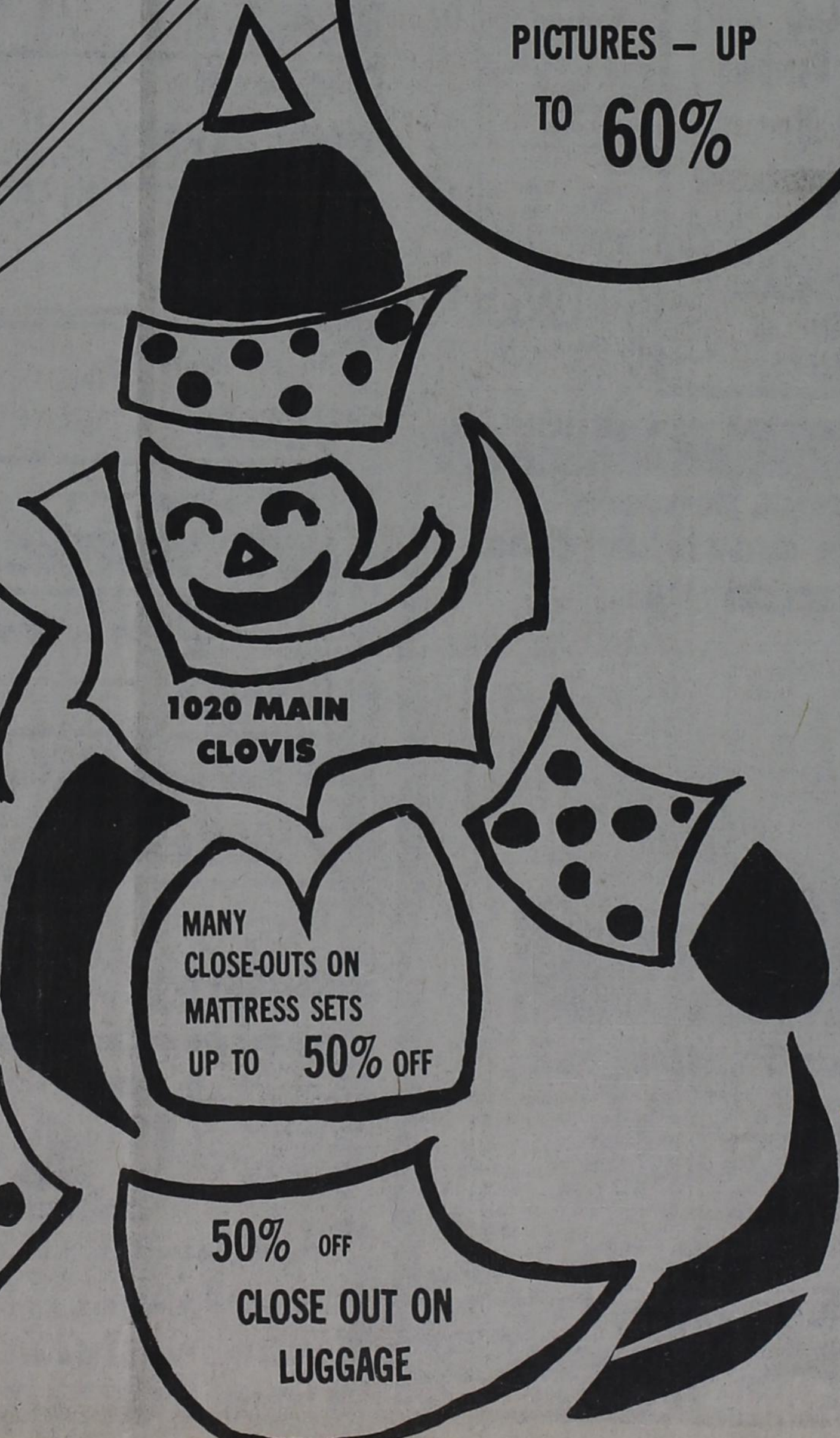

This will be Rev. Holladay's third church, arriving here from Ft. Davis, Tex., where he pastored two Methodist churches, the Methodist Church of Ft. Davis and the Balmorhea, Tex. Methodist Church. "I did a lot of driving," he says with a grin.

The Holladays spent two and a half years in Ft. Davis, going there fresh from seminary school at Perkins School of Theology at SMU in Dallas. Rev. Holladay received his Master of Theology degree from Perkins, graduating from there with honors.

He has a bachelor of arts degree in history from McMurry College in Abilene. Lee Ann also has a bachelor's degree from McMurry in sociology and has worked "off and on"

as a social worker.

The minister says he finds Farwell to be a "very beautiful town, very clean," adding that "it's not always you find a town with paved streets!"

The Holladays have family in Abilene and Hobbs and plan on doing some visiting as soon as possible.

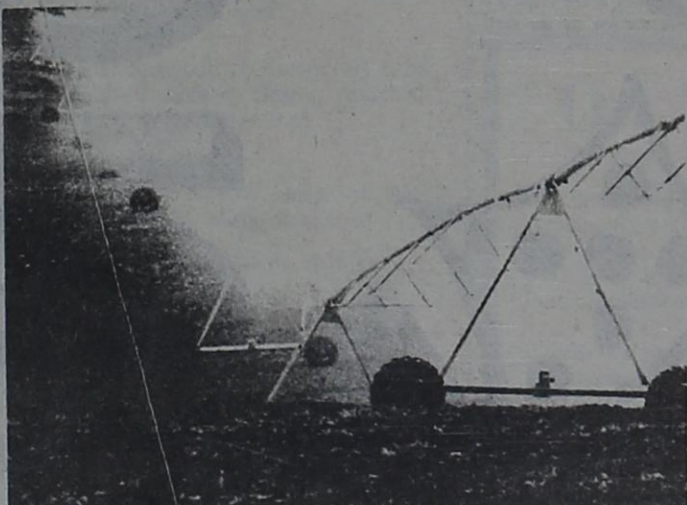
