## Annual BTJ Jubilee Attracts Big Crowd

It was a weekend of fun and relaxation, the reunion of friends, competitive spirit and lots of color. It was a weekend of smiles, laughs, memorable moments and community friendship. It was Border Town Days 1981, and the annual Twin Cities celebration is being hailed as one of the best ever. "This was our 15th annual celebration," said BTJ chairman John Getz, who added, "some have been better than others, but this year's event has to be the best ever."

Both the Parmer County Courthouse lawn and the Farwell City Park were crammed full of lawn chairs, blankets and people as an estimated 1500 friends, neighbors and visitors gathered to celebrate the Texico-Farwell annual community event.

Kicking off the BTJ jubilee was the High Plains Junior Rodeo Association's performance Friday night, which included an appearance by 1980 Border Town Days queen, Tracy Williams. The rodeo also took place Saturday night and was attended by 1981 Border Town Days queen Polly Turner as well as special guest, Miss Rodeo New Mexico, Tamra Ridley.

The streets were lined on Saturday morning as many gathered to view the traditional parade which featured riding groups, many floats, bicycles, antique cars, beauty queens, BTJ contestants, an Honor Guard, fire trucks, law enforcement vehicles and marching musicians moving down the "main streets" in Farwell and Texico.

Special attractions in the parade included Miss New Mexico, Lynn Lawson of Portales, and Miss Rodeo New Mexico, Tamra Ridley of Santa Fe.

Much work went into the decorated and colorful floats that were seen in the parade, and those chosen as winners were, Farwell Study Club, 1st place, winning \$50; Farwell Baptist Young People, 2nd place, winning \$30; and Farwell Young Homemakers, 3rd place, \$20.

Winners of the Kids' Decorated Bike contest were announced as follows:

Category I, best decorated bike and costumed rider, 1st place, Cody Monk, \$8; 2nd place, William Rogers, \$5. Category II, age 6 and under with best decorated bike, 1st place, Fabian Garcia, \$8; 2nd place, Eric Delgado, \$5. Category III, ages 7-12 with best decorated bike, 1st place, Aron Scott, \$8; 2nd place, Janell Lovvorn, \$5; 3rd place, Brian Rogers, \$4; 4th place, Johnny Rivas, \$2; 5th place tie to Priscilla Galvan and Michael Arce, \$2 each; and 6th place, Monte Delgado, \$2.

Over in the park, local clubs and organizations had concession booths offering cool drinks and everything from homemade ice cream, to corn-on-the-cob, tamales, and snow cones to cure those snacking appetites and parched throats.

And while all of this was going on, high school class reunions were forming; and games of water polo, the dunking booth and the "Pepsi Challenge" were all taking place.

The air waves were filled with music provided by Ed and Juanita Hardage, and BTJ emcee Fred Chandler kept everyone advised of upcoming events and contests.

Following the opening ceremonies, which included introductions by John Getz; opening remarks by mayors Walter Kaltwasser of Farwell and John R. Hadley of Texico; and the invocation by Rev. Don Holladay, the parade awards were announced.

Presenting awards to the winning floats and riding groups were parade marshal Don Gerles; to the winning antique cars was Jim Pierce;

and to the kids' decorated bike winners, Ann Cooper.

Next the "contest of strings" took place as fiddlers from around the area competed in the annual "Old Fiddlers Contest." Those chosen as the contest's top fiddlers were senior division, Dee Walton, Clovis, 1st place; Dink Essary, Portales, 2nd place; and Alva J. Parker, Portales, 3rd place. Claude Gobble of Farwell was

1st place winner in the junior division. Each of the winners was awarded a trophy, donated by the Border Town Days committee and presented by Chandler.

## Vets Report More Encephalitis Cases

Area veterinarians are still reporting cases of encephalitis, a disease causing inflammation of the brain, in horses, and are advising local horse owners not to "let down their guard" and to continue to take precautions against the "sleeping sickness" disease.

Dr. Gary Cash, Friona veterinarian, says, "Since I talked with you recently I've probably seen three or four more horses with the disease," adding that the horses inflicted were located "over by Hereford and south of Hereford," and they did not die.

"The epidemic of a few weeks ago has kind of calmed down a little," Cash said, but added, "but since we've had more rain it may pick back up again."

Dr. Cash painted a gloomy forecast of the encephalitis outbreak, saying that July is a bit early for the disease to appear and that September is the prime month for disease. "Classically, it's a bit early to see encephalitis, and if this is any indication, the worst may be yet to come," he said. Cash said the first case he saw was July 1.

Clovis veterinarian Dr. Glenn W. Keim said he, too, has seen "three or four" more cases since he last spoke with the Tribune and adds that a

couple of the cases "were fatal." The additional cases were found in Clovis horses.

"If they don't vaccinate their horses, people are just foolish," said the Clovis vet, "especially the younger horses, two or three years old." Keim said he has had several horse owners bring their animals in for the vaccination, but encourages everyone to do so.

Mosquito spraying and dusting continues to be done by area towns and cities, but Keim points out that the rain "increases our vector," referring to the flies and mosquitoes that spread the disease.

Dr. Keim had previously reported that the disease is transmitted from mosquitoes and other blood sucking insects, and that even birds can be carriers, but that the horse is a "dead-end host."

The New Mexico Health and Environmental Department reports that the primary link with western mosquito-borne encephalitis, which is the type being reported in this area, is associated with irrigated farmland, and the virus is reportedly favored by a long, cool, wet spring.

While most local residents and farmers are praising the wetness that has been falling over the area, the local veterinarians are a bit gloomy. "If it stays wet, we may really be in for it," said Cash.

## Texico Registration To Begin Next Week

Texico school registration for the 1981-82 school term is to begin Monday, August 3, with students in different grades registering on different days throughout the next two weeks.

For high school registration, freshmen (9th grade) are to register Monday; seniors, Tuesday, Aug. 4; juniors, Wednesday, Aug. 5 and sophomores, Thursday, Aug. 6. The respective registrations are to take place at the high school from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. MDT each day.

Students who will be in grades 6-8 are to register at Texico Junior High, August 5-6, at the junior high school office

from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. MDT. Those who will be attending Texico Elementary School for the first time are to register August 11, 12 and 13 at the school from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m.

Elementary school registration is only for those new students in grades 1-5. Those who have attended Texico Elementary School previously need not register, according to James Harding, high school principal.

Classes at Texico school will begin August 17 at 9 a.m. MDT. Teachers will report back August 14 for an in-service day.

## Hydrologic Atlas Available For Parmer County Residents

A Parmer County Hydrologic Atlas is now available to area irrigators, landowners, and residents of the High Plains Underground Water District service area.

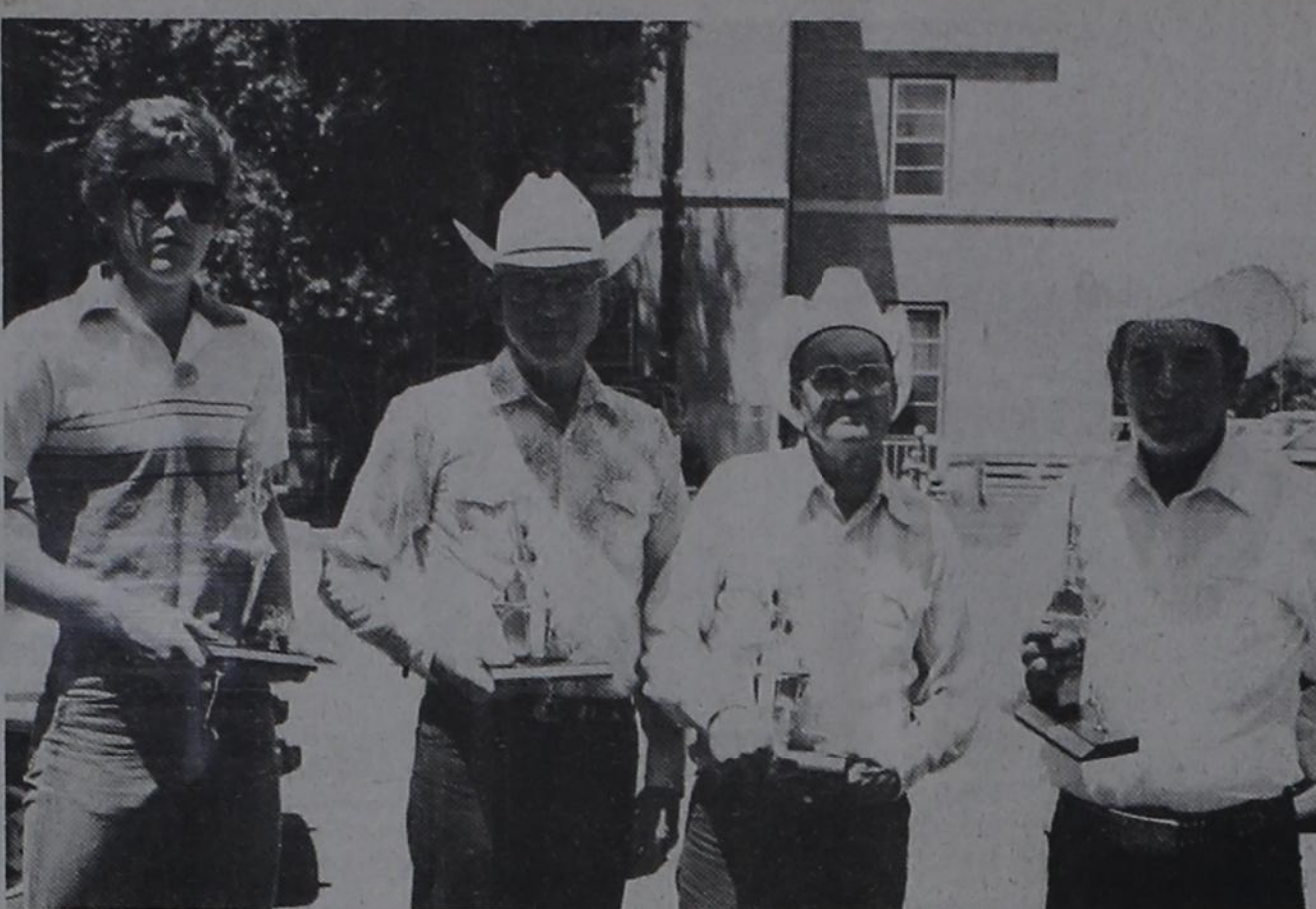
The atlas is the most detailed and complete ground water mapping investigation ever made in Parmer County, and consists of a packet containing a text describing the county's hydrologic conditions and a set of four maps covering Parmer County, according to a release sent by the HPUWD.

The four maps illustrate the elevation of the land surface; the elevation of the water table in the Ogallala Formation in 1980; the elevation of the base

of the Ogallala Formation; and the saturated thickness of the Ogallala in 1980.

The maps were developed using 20-foot contour intervals with the date for each map describing this information printed on a county highway base map, at a scale of two miles per inch. Legal descriptions are also illustrated on the maps to assist landowners in proper identification of their property, the release said.

The text is short, concise, illustrated, and includes an explanation of how to read and

# Tax Roll Approved At Council Meeting

A discussion of the striping of the school's cross walks, the Farwell tax roll, and repairs to the Farwell fire station roof took place at Monday's Farwell City Council meeting, conducted at the Farwell city hall.

The council met in regular session and approved and signed the 1981 tax roll, presented by City Clerk Janie Bowery. The clerk pointed out to council members that last year's roll totalled \$56,978.91 and the 1981 roll totals \$65,172.04 for an approximate \$8100 gain.

City employee Dee Hammit reported to the council that the roof on the fire station had been patched and spread with new gravel. "It looks like he (the contractor) did a good job of it to me," said Hammit, who

told the city fathers that new gravel had been spread "on every spot that needed it."

The council voted to accept a bid of \$55 from B&B Sweeping and Striping for the striping of school crosswalks and curbs in Farwell. There was some question over whether the bid was for the total job of striping or if it was quoted "per cross." Fred Chandler made a motion to accept the bid only if it was for the total job, and if not, the city will undertake the job itself.

It was pointed out that the striping and painting needs to be done this month, as school begins August 24 in Farwell.

Mayor Walter Kaltwasser had praise for city employee Hammit and thanked him for cleaning up the litter from Farwell City Park following the recent Border Town Days celebration. The council also expressed praise for the citizens of the Twin Cities who did their part in keeping the litter to a minimum. "People try their best to help," said Hammit, "they were stacking up the trash beside the cans once the cans became full."

Before closing the meeting, it was pointed out to the council by Mrs. Bowery that each mosquito dusting procedure done in the city costs the city \$100 per dusting. She explained to the members that the dust is costing \$.15 per pound.

Attending Monday night's meeting were mayor Kaltwasser and councilmen Fred

Chandler and Johnny Curtis and city employees Janie Bowery and Dee Hammit.

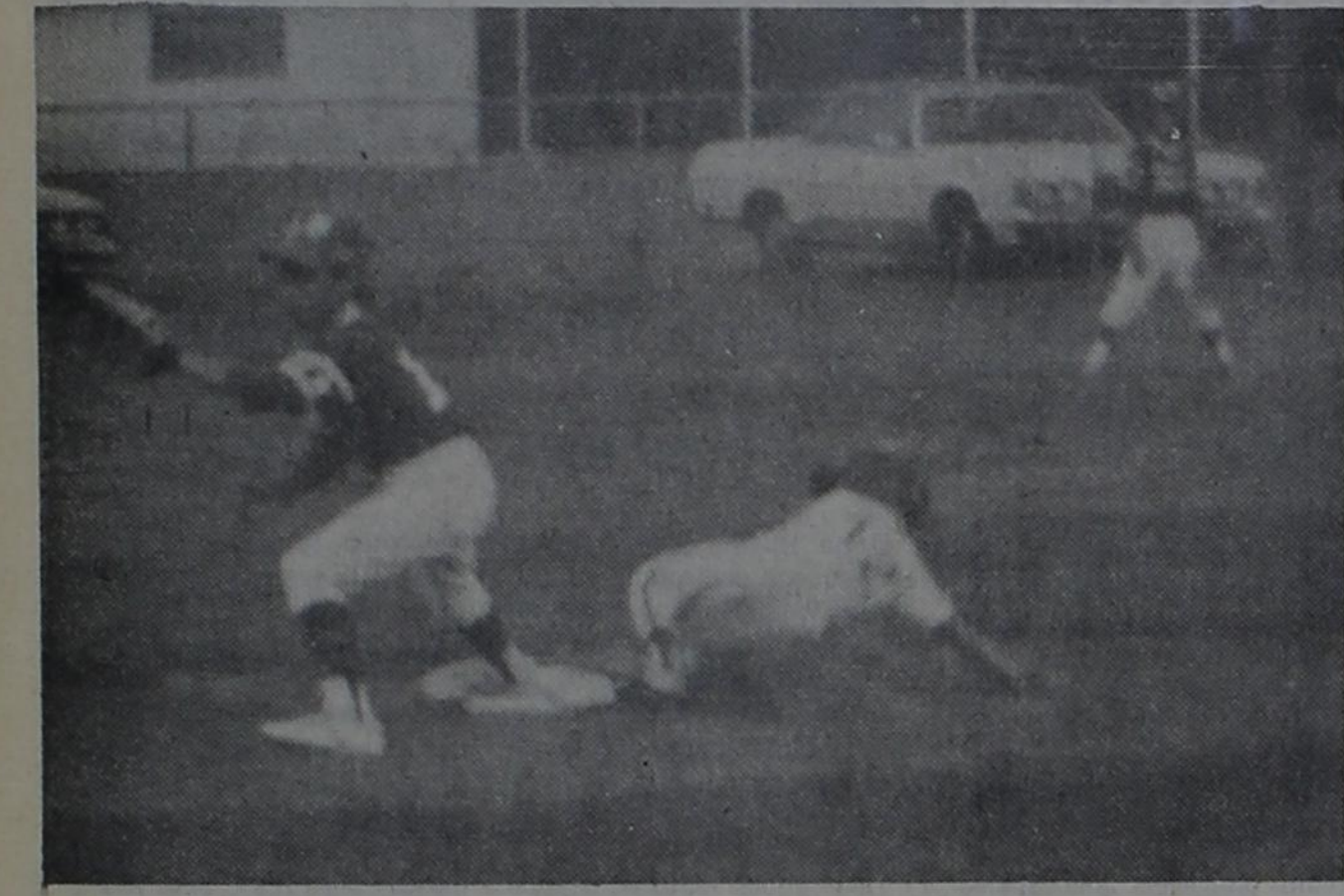
In their final game, the boys played on the Cannon Air Force Base field, losing to

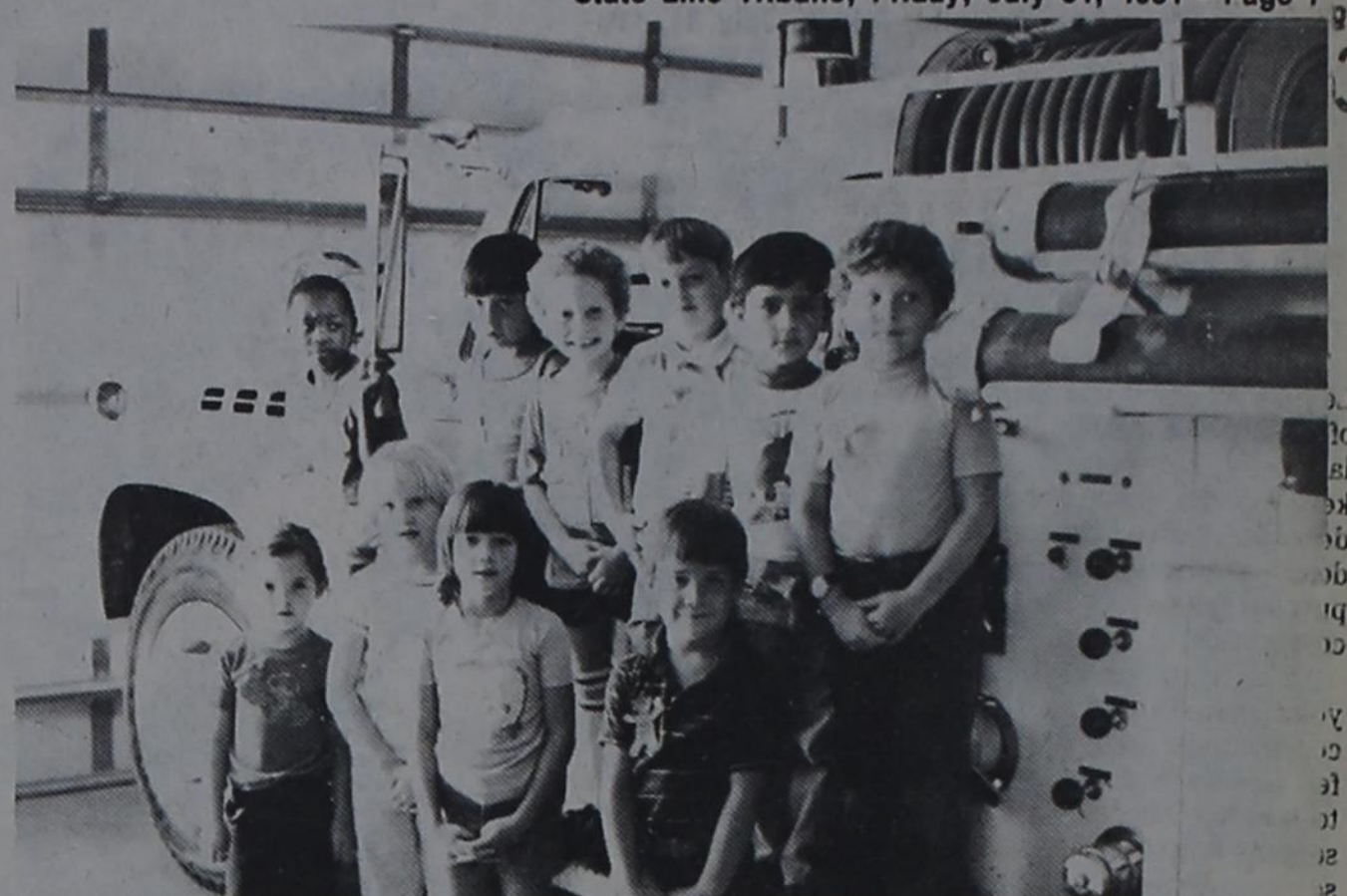

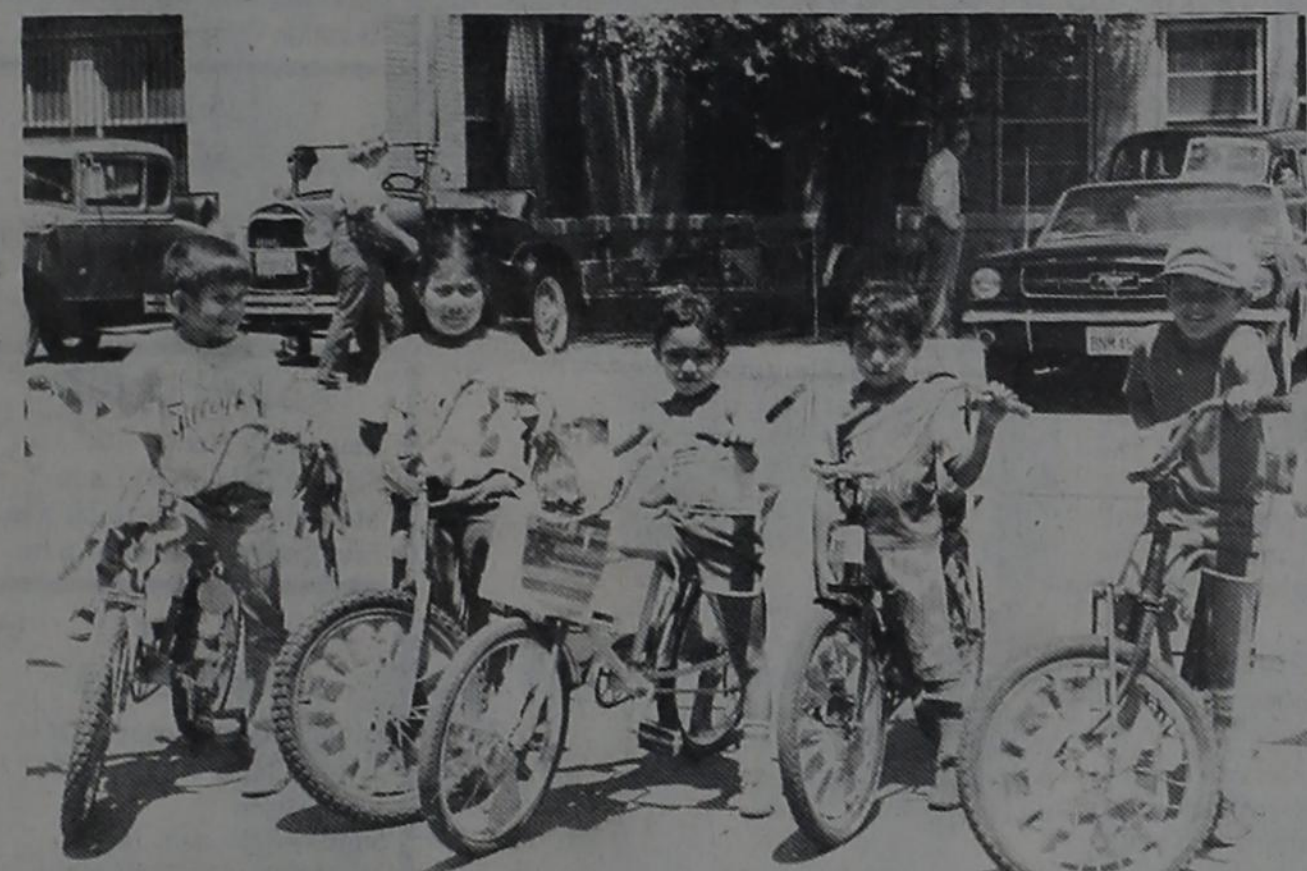

Families of yesteryear can teach today's families how to cope -- successfully -- with today's economy. Their "lessons" focus on cooperation, positive attitude and a bright look to the future. History tells us that when the economic conditions of a given population begin to deteriorate, family behavior changes to meet economic needs.

Many families return to the "extended family system" because it becomes more difficult for individual family members to maintain separate households.

This means other family members come to live with "Mom and Dad and the kids." Aunt Suzy may come to share housekeeping and childcare responsibilities in return for lodging, or Cousin Bill may join the family while he attends the local university, or a grandparent may come to stay during the winter months to avoid the high cost of heating a separate dwelling.

Not only do family members tend to "pull together" during times of economic hardship, so, too, do friends and communities.

In fact, it's not unusual for non-family members to become part of one's family.

During the "depression era" single individuals would "hire on" to a family. They would help with the field work, gardening and other household

tasks in return for room and board and sometimes a nominal wage.

Because these individuals lived with the family, they often became unofficial "adopted" family members.

In addition to the creation of "extended families," hard times often create "extended communities."

As resources become scarce, it becomes more difficult to employ individuals who can provide services needed by the community. So community members form their own committees, task forces and work teams to do the work -- road repairs, traffic control for special events, roadside mowing, maintenance of community buildings and local child care, for example.

Examples given today's families by yesteryear families who managed well in times of economic decline should give us faith and confidence in ourselves and our families.

The heritage of our earlier families has already proven that a poor economy need not be our downfall.

A positive attitude and a bright look to the future -- the coping tools of yesteryear families -- are still the most valid tools for coping with hard times today.

**FACING UP TO FACTS**

Paul's Epistle to the Romans, Chapters 1 and 2, present a dark picture of the human race, but acknowledge the facts they record and you have taken the first step to salvation. By nature we shrink from facing up to our sins, but we are better off if we do.

If a man has early indications of cancer, and his physician keeps the truth from him, the patient will die of cancer. A good and wise physician will say: "You have cancer and we should do something about it without delay."

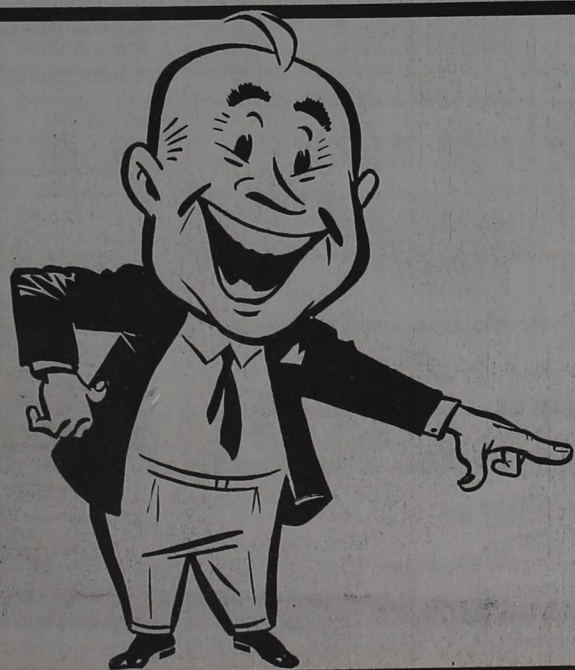

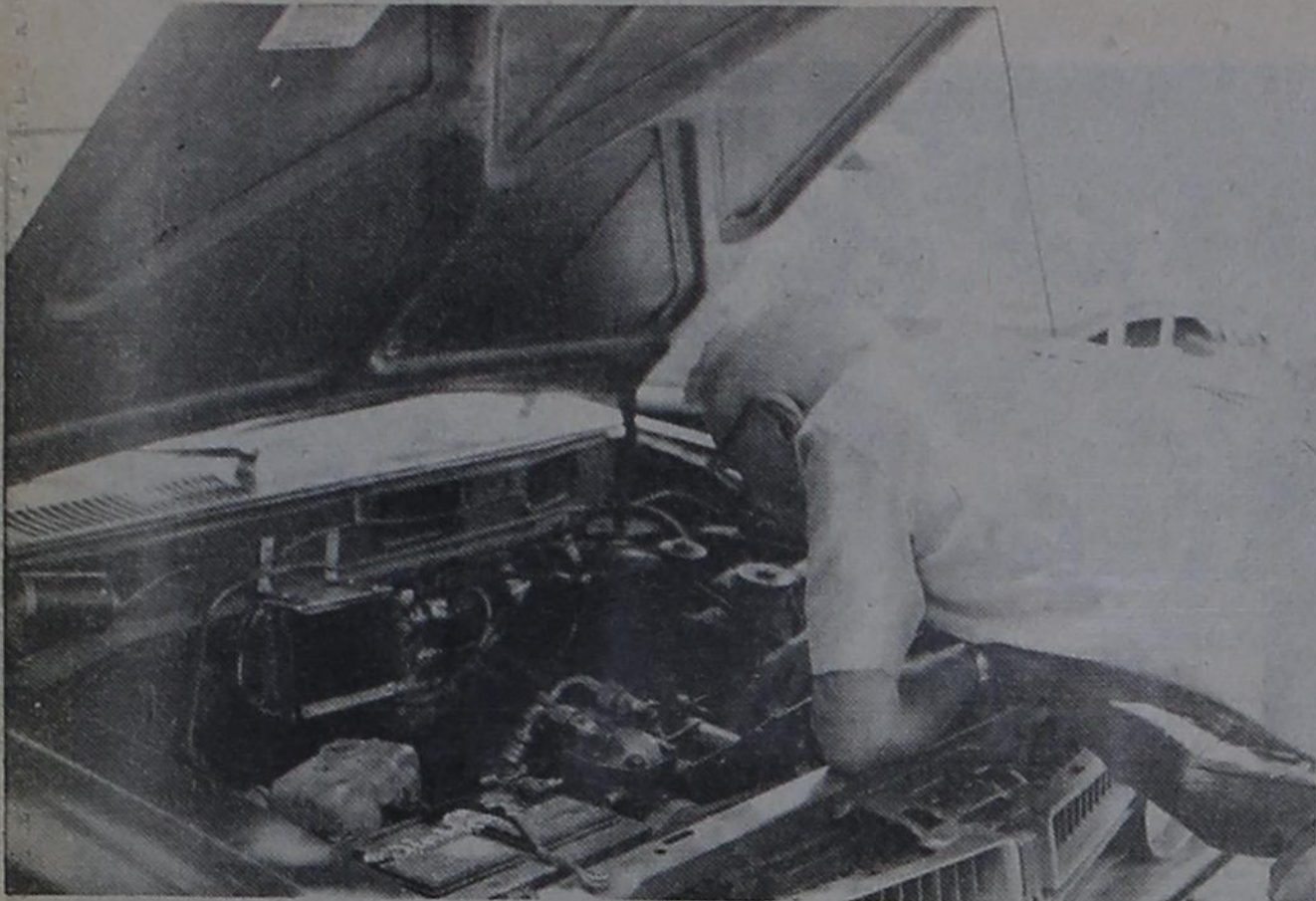

### Checking Things Out

Paul Beck of Farwell has spent many an hour stooped over the engine of his new invention, an electric car that never requires charging. Beck transformed a Toyota station wagon into the

non-gasoline powered vehicle and says now he can smile whenever he drives by a gas station. Beck and his wife of 50 years have lived in Farwell for five years, the last year being

spent totally on building and creating his electric car. "You know, if gasoline had never gone over 75 cents a gallon, I would have never thought of this," he says.

### His Own Invention - -

## Paul Beck Smiles At Gas Stations As He Drives By In Electric Car

In an "electrifying" year-long operation that included a lot of guess work, hit and miss mechanics, and using the process of elimination in choosing the exact design, a rusting Toyota was transformed from a worn out "gas saving" vehicle into a scientific marvel. And it was all done by a Farwell man, Paul Beck.

"I'm kind of old fashioned," says the retired surgical tool sharpener, "but the damn oil companies weren't satisfied with gas at 50 cents a gallon. They had to keep going up." And when they reached what Beck considered to be the peak of high gasoline costs, he began scheming for a way to "get even" and now he can smile everytime I pass a gas station."

The reason for Beck's smug attitude is his own invention, an electric car. And the unique part of his electric car, which he says will travel 55 miles per hour as far as he wants it to go, is that his inventive and mechanical mind has created an electric car that never needs to be re-charged. The vehicle, made from a used Toyota (you got it now Toyota!), charges itself as it drives.

"Everyone else who has made an electric car has to have a battery charger, so they're (the cars) no good except to use around town. But mine will drive forever, as far as I want to go. It NEVER has to be re-charged," he says with pride.

Working with mechanical parts dealers from throughout the country, Beck says he has spent a lot of money just in long distance calls alone, but that the vehicle cost him approximately \$3,000 totally, including the cost of the used Toyota, purchased in February, 1981.

"Listen, this country was pioneered by poor people. If they had to have something and couldn't buy it, they built it, he says, and that's exactly what Beck did.

His final product, which I can truly say runs just like a regular gasoline-powered vehicle, is the culmination of three ideas, all of which he put together, but it was the last one that finally "took."

His first two plans, both for which he purchased the needed parts and pieces, "just didn't produce enough horsepower," he said. "They ran real beautiful, but didn't have enough speed."

There were many stumbling blocks along the way to his final product. But Beck, who has cataracts in both eyes,

didn't let anything slow him from his goal of "teaching those oil companies a lesson."

"Hey, it takes two or three days of puttering," he said, "but I always work it out," referring to any problem that may crop up with his accumulation of batteries and belts. "It was all trial and error. I used no formal set of plans," said Beck.

One of the California firms he dealt with in ordering parts needed for the electric vehicle told him that this car is the first they had heard of with a normal transmission, saying that all the others on the streets today have only a "forward and back" capability, both at the same speed.

There are still wrinkles to be ironed out with his car, but he does have it running. "Once it is perfect though I plan to run ads in all the big newspapers, 'Are You Tired of OPEC Ripoffs,' and I'll sell the complete plans to the car for around \$20," he said.

Beck says it was "persistence" that kept him going, even though on some days during the year-long process, "I'd get so disgusted and wouldn't even go out to the garage," he remembers.

The car, with automatic transmission, has air conditioning and will have an electric-powered heater, as Beck has plans to mount heating elements from a regular hand-held hair dryer into the system.

Beck explains that he believes foreign made cars are better to use in transforming into electric cars. "American power steering is not good. It requires another motor, but the foreign rack and pinion steering is perfect," he said.

The Farwell man began dreaming about his electric car "about a year ago" and says that he's a pisces and that should explain his insatiable thirst for knowledge.

"I'm curious, I like to know about things, and if something won't do something, why won't it?" His electric car invention is not his first either. Beck also had something to do with the design of the diesel fuel-injection system and he and his wife of 50 years developed a permanent hair wave process for which they sold the patent at a four figure price.

Beck said he spent approximately three hours a day, 20 hours a week working on this new invention, "depending on the weather. I don't go out if it's too hot or too cold," he said, jabbing once again, "you know if gas had never gone over 75 cents a gallon, I would have never thought about this."

And Beck knows he's not the only one who is mad about high gas prices. "We have lived here for five years, and I swear to you that in the past year we have seen people walking past our house everyday with their arms loaded with groceries because they can't afford the gas to go shopping!"

The only maintenance his car will require is the adding of water to his batteries, "about once a month," and the adding of oil to the rear transmission. "But I'm going to use synthetic oil, I want everything to be man-made. I don't want to give the oil companies a dime."

When he's not inventing, Beck and his wife still sharpen surgical tools and instruments. "I used to travel, visiting doctors' and veterinarians' offices and sharpening their tools for them," Beck says, "But then we decided to retire." Mrs. Beck chimes in saying, "But our customers won't let us quit! Every day there are more packages in the mail with tools to be sharpened."

They moved to Farwell five years ago from Albuquerque where they had lived since 1938. "But when it came time to retire, we wanted a little town where it was quiet, and we could raise a small garden," said Mrs. Beck, adding, "We're crazy about Farwell."

Beck agreed, adding, "I used to travel this area, and we have many friends in Clovis."

They belong to the Clovis Senior Citizens Center and are very active with that group, spending two nights a week playing games and having suppers. "They never let you get lonesome," Mrs. Beck said.

Plans for the future include "perfecting" the electric car and authenticating its capabilities. "As soon as I can get a hold of someone from AAA I'm going to take him with me on a long trip," said Beck, who said he really couldn't have built the car at all without the help of all the manufacturers he dealt with and Joe Hughes of Farwell. "He helped me quite a bit by selling me all my hardware at a discount," Beck said.

So the next time you're standing at the gas pump watching the digital figures blink higher and higher, and a little blue Toyota station wagon toots at you as it whizzes by, don't get angry at the older man behind the wheel, he's not laughing at you, he's laughing at OPEC and the oil companies.
