Vets Report More Encephalitis Cases

Area veterinarians are still reporting cases of encephalitis, a disease causing inflammation of the brain, in horses, and are advising local horse owners not to "let down their guard" and to continue to take precautions against the "sleeping sickness" disease.

Dr. Gary Cash, Friona veterinarian, says, "Since I talked with you recently I've probably seen three or four more horses with the disease,' adding that the horses inflicted were located "over by Hereford and south of Hereford," and they did not die.

"The epidemic of a few weeks ago has kind of calmed down a little," Cash said, but added, "but since we've had more rain it may pick back up again.'

Dre Cash painted a gloomy forecast of the encephalitis outbreak, saying that July is a bit early for the disease to appear and that September is the prime month for disease. "Classically, it's a bit early to see encephalitis, and if this is any indication, the worst may be yet to come," he said. Cash said the first case he saw was

"If they don't vaccinate their horses, people are just foolish," said the Clovis vet, "especially the younger horses, two or three years old." Keim said he has had several horse owners bring their animals in for the vaccination, but encourages everyone to do

Mosquito spraying and dusting continues to be done by area towns and cities, but Keim points out that the rain "increases our vector," referring to the flies and mosquitoes that spread the disease.

Dr. Keim had previously reported that the disease is transmitted from mosquitoes and other blood sucking insects, and that even birds can be carriers, but that the horse is a "dead-end host."

The New Mexico Health and Environmental Department reports that the primary link with western mosquito-borne encephalitis, which is the type being reported in this area, is associated with irrigated farmland, and the virus is reportedly favored by a long, cool,

CCC Okays Corn Sale

Farmers and other interested persons will be eligible to purchase corn from the Commodity Credit Corporation (CCC) at anytime now, according to David Grimsley, chairman of the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation (ASCS) Committee.

"Actually, the bidding was opened on July 27, 1981, at the start of the business day," Grimsley said. The CCC will offer corn for sale at market prices, "but not less than the formula price which is 115 percent of the county loan rate in which the corn is stored," he said plus 54 cents per bushel carrying charges.

"The minimum quantity that will be considered for acceptance is 1,000 bushels," Grimsley said. Offers will be received and sales will be made on a first come, first serve

A constant and accurate eye on Russian weather conditions and crops is a valuable tool in light of reconvened USA-USSR talks on grain sales. And how does the Russian wheat crop look? 

In an "electrifying" yearlong operation that included a lot of guess work, hit and miss mechanics, and using the process of elimination in choosing the exact design, a rusting Toyota was trans--formed from a worn out "gas saving" vehicle into a scientific marvel. 
Beck agreed, adding, "I used to travel this area, and we have many friends in Clovis."
