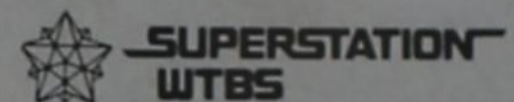

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## PUBLIC NOTICE

On April 16, 1981, Bailey County Electric Cooperative Association filed with the Public Utility Commission of Texas an application for tariff changes as follows:

In the Collection Policy the disconnect date for non-payment is changed to read twenty-two (22) days from the date the bill is issued, and to give seven (7) days' notice prior to stated date of disconnection. In this same policy, we have requested that the mileage charge for collection trips be removed. This revision is applicable to all classes of service.

In our Outdoor Lighting Service Tariff we have requested the addition of the wording, "This monthly minimum shall not include any billing adjustment charges." This revision is applicable only to the Outdoor Lighting Service Tariff.

Applicant serves in all or portions of Bailey, Castro, Cochran, Lamb and Parmer counties. Protests to or motions to intervene may be filed with the Public Utility Commission of Texas. On April 27, 1981, the Public Utility Commission of Texas ordered the Cooperative to suspend these changes for 120 days, and further ordered that the substance of the Cooperative's application be published as required by P U R A, Section 43 [a].

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# Jack Young To Preside Over New Judicial District

Sworn in May 1 as the new District Judge for the newly-created 287th Judicial District was Jack Young of Muleshoe. Young is former District of Attorney of district 154, and received his appointment to the newly formed 287th Judicial District from Texas governor Bill Clements.

The new judge was sworn in last Friday, along with the new district attorney, Johnny Actkinson, who is the former Parmer County attorney.

Young is a graduate of Muleshoe High School and received his bachelor's degree in government from Texas Tech in January 1951. He earned his law degree from the University of Texas and later he was conferred a doctor of jurisprudence degree.

He began his first service in elected office as county attorney for Bailey County where he served until December 1960. In January 1961 the judge took office as district attorney

for the 154th Judicial District and has served in that capacity until last month.

The judge began his professional experience with a license to practice law in the state of Texas in 1955. He was licensed in the Federal Court for the Northern District of Texas on June 2, 1961; and in the U.S. Court of Appeals, Fifth Circuit, April, 1979.

He was licensed in the Supreme Court of the United States in August, 1971.

While serving as prosecutor for Bailey County, Young filed and disposed of 504 misdemeanor cases. As District Attorney from 1961-1981, he indicted and disposed of 2,091 cases.

Young's private practice has been sold to the firm of Thompson, Thomas and Brown of Muleshoe.

The new judicial district was created by Gov. Clements when he signed into law the Omnibus Court Act which

divided District 154, which included Lamb, Parmer and Bailey counties, into two separate judicial districts.

Parmer and Bailey counties are now in Judicial District 287 and District 154 is a one-county judicial district comprised of Lamb County.

Judge Pat Boone, Jr., will remain Judicial District Judge for District 154, serving Lamb County. Expected to serve as district attorney in District 154 is Lamb County attorney Curtis Wilkinson, who will continue to serve as county attorney.

Actkinson submitted his letter of resignation as Parmer County Attorney to the Parmer County Commissioners late last month and was replaced by Charles Aycock in that elected position.

Other district "splits" took place in the larger towns of Houston, Dallas, and San Antonio.

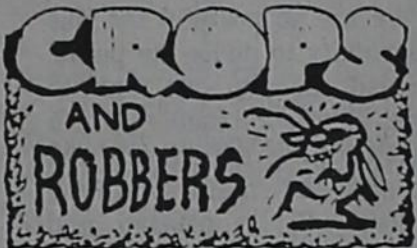
## Information Needed For History Book

# Lisa Coffey Accepts ENMU Athletic Scholarship

Texico athlete Lisa Coffey has signed to play volleyball and basketball at Eastern New Mexico University, receiving a combined scholarship for both sports.

ENMU head basketball coach Wayne Moore and head volleyball coach Gayle Reeves recruited the Lady Wolverine athlete for next year's Zia season based on her outstanding record in the Texico athletic program.

Coffey has been winning athletic awards at Texico since 1977 with participation in volleyball, basketball and track. She is currently in her fifth year with the lady trackers and has qualified for the state meet each year.

She is a familiar name in the All-Star rosters of volleyball

and basketball. On the roundball courts Coffey was on the All-State second team in 1979 and 1980, and this year she was named to the first team on the elite honorary team.

The Lady Wolverine was named to the High School All-American team in '78-79 and was named in the American High School Athlete selections for 1980-81.

This year's basketball team, of which she was captain, captured the state title, gathering district and regional titles on its way to the state championship game on the ENMU courts. Named to the EPAC All-Tournament team for three years, she was also named to the All-Tournament team for state competition this year,

and has played in three consecutive state basketball tournaments.

"She's going to do just fine at college ball," said Texico coach Roy King. "It'll be a big transition from high school ball to college, but she'll do fine because she's a hard worker and has quite a few qualities that it takes to be a good ball player."

King has coached Coffey since her 8th grade year. "She jumps well, she shoots a good jump shot and she gets up and down the floor," he said.

King remarked that "this is an excellent opportunity for Texico. This makes two girls who are from Texico on the ENMU basketball team."

The young athlete was also captain of the state championship volleyball team last fall, and was named to the All-District team in volleyball.

Coffey has been under the coaching direction of Mike Littlejohn for two years in volleyball. "I think Lisa will do real well with college level ball," said Littlejohn. "She works hard at sports with a lot of intensity. And, she's a good student as well as a good athlete."

In track Lisa has placed in state competition since 1977. This year's Lady Wolverine track team is to compete at state May 8-9 in Hobbs. The team took the District 6-A championship last weekend, and have won six consecutive meets this season.

Coffey was named Texico's Best All-Around Girl Athlete in 1977-78 and 1979-80 in addition to receiving many other awards and honors.

She is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. O.B. Coffey of Texico.

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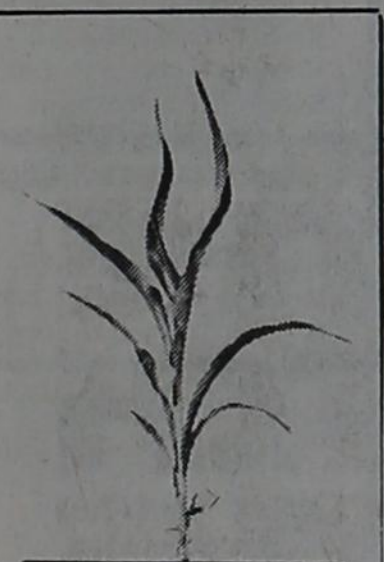
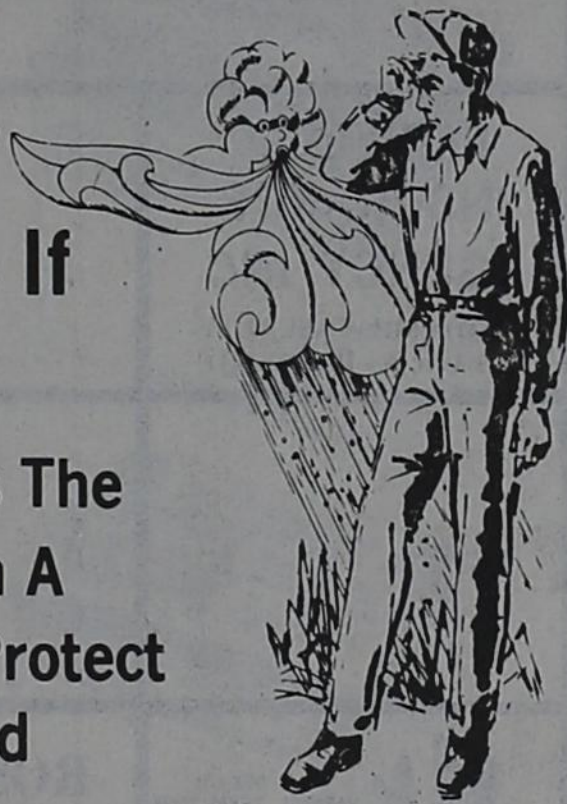

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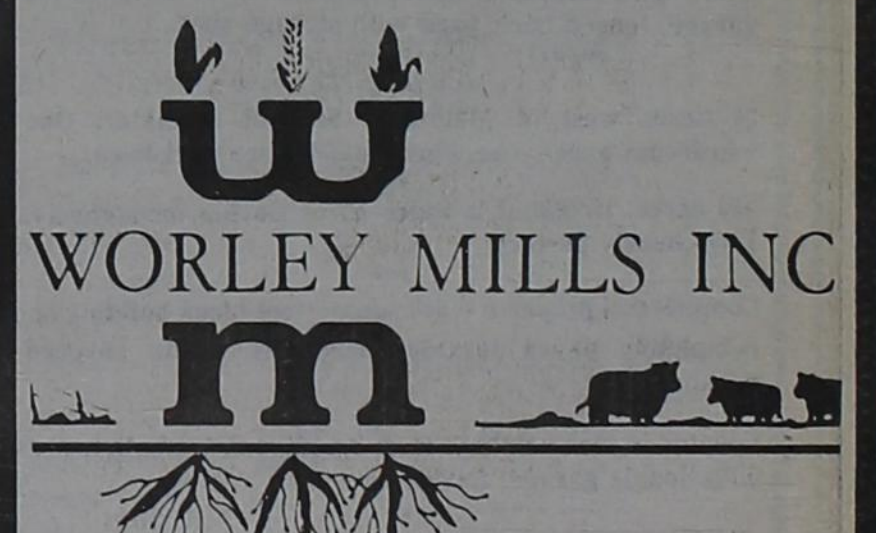


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## Gymnastics Members Win Ribbons At Plains

The City of Farwell will conduct a Public Hearing at 5:00 P.M. on June 29, 1981 at the Farwell City Hall located at 101 Ave. A. The purpose of the hearing is to afford interested persons an opportunity for written and/or oral comments on the proposed wastewater treatment facility plan and associated environmental information document. **"WHAT IS OUR FUTURE?"**

Rural telephone subscribers, like most Americans, want to do our share in meeting the serious economic problems facing our nation. We want to support President Reagan's program for economic recovery.

You may not be aware of how the program will affect us directly. Despite the President's best efforts to spread the necessary sacrifices among all Americans, his proposals to eliminate the Rural Electrification Administration [REA] insured telephone loan program next year asks rural telephone subscribers to shoulder an unfair burden in the battle to whip inflation.

Some of us remember the history of how small telephone companies and cooperatives were established. After World War II, there was a great need for rural telephone service. Large companies had all they could do to provide service in towns and cities due to the post war boom. Very few companies would, or could afford to construct facilities to rural America. Through the Department of Agriculture, the Rural Electrification Administration was formed to provide electric and telephone facilities to the rural areas. Many of you were instrumental in organizing our cooperative as were many other rural families across the nation. Due to the cost of establishing telephone facilities, the REA made it possible to borrow funds at a low rate of interest. The interest rates available to different cooperatives were set on the amount of revenue they generated within the year. Telephony has changed drastically in the past 35 years. We began with magneto (crank type) phones with 20 people to line, common battery (operator says number please) phones with 4 and 8 people to the line, dial phones with up to 8 to the line, and now we have buried lines with one party dial and push button phones. Communications are very important in our life style today. It's true that we still have phone trouble and our bills are too high, but so is the dependability and cost of a tractor, house or vehicle. We began 35 years ago with a \$.50 telephone service to the present day \$18.00 telephone service. The same increase can be found in almost anything we want to see. Our cooperative has progressed through the years by being able to borrow funds from the REA bank which is now almost self supporting. To keep up with the changing times and provide our members with the best possible service, we now borrow funds which are really the interest and loans paid back to REA by hundreds of telephone companies and cooperatives throughout America since the program began. I believe that we as members, employees, officers, directors, and managers have done quite well in tying our homes and businesses in with the international network of communications. We hope to continue to prosper with the new electronic field of telephony and upgrade our facilities as needed.

It's hard to believe that our government finances telecommunications to foreign countries with the latest equipment through the so called Foreign Aid Program, and at the same time wants to discontinue a program that is not a burden to our taxpayers and ask for very little, if any, appropriations from our government. The elimination of the REA insured telephone loan program, whose 2 and 5% insured loans have provided rural America with facilities for 35 years, comes when hundreds of thousands of people [8% of the country] have no telephone service at all.

Twenty-three percent [23%] of the REA telephone subscribers remain on inadequate multi-party lines. The national average cost to the Cooperative per new subscriber is now \$2,398.00. At a time when the rural areas are growing at a rate 15.7% faster than urban centers, it will be difficult to provide the service needed at an affordable rate.

We would like you all to know that we will operate Five Area Telephone Cooperative, Inc. at a rate affordable to us all as long as possible. A few things to remember are that President Reagan's budget cut or elimination of the REA program, WILL NOT CUT FEDERAL SPENDING because loans are made from a separate fund that consists of repayments on existing loans and government borrowings. Members of Congress are under terrific pressure from the Reagan administration to go along with his economic program without any objections, without a chance to make any changes in the proposals. The administration has told Congress that the people fully support its economic program.

We realize that we have some members that feel that our cooperative could do a better job. We also have some members that are very encouraging to us all. We would, at this time, like to call on you to act now and let the members of Congress know if you disagree with the Reagan administration plan to eliminate the REA insured telephone loan program. WE NEED YOUR HELP.
