

He continued by saying, "The Bell System (previous telephone service owners in Farwell) may have had more people to pull in to do repair work, but right now what we've got is a bad situation in a state of improvement."

The main objective of the ENMR general manager was to convince the Farwell city fathers that he is up on top of all problems in the Farwell area, and he did.

"There have been problems," he said. "We are aware of the problems, we are responding to the problems."

"I can supply resumes to you. Farwell has one relatively new employee. Also, Buddy Mullinex, an installation repairman," who Harris pointed out had been with ENMR for two and a half years combined service, with four months in the Farwell area.

Later Harris told the council that ENMR employs 62 employees, "And we can call on any one of them. Some are young and a bit green, but we feel in the long run we'll come out ahead because they are all local people."
