Only increased destruction and misery can await Iran in the future. When their self-induced holocaust happens we need to stay at arm's length.

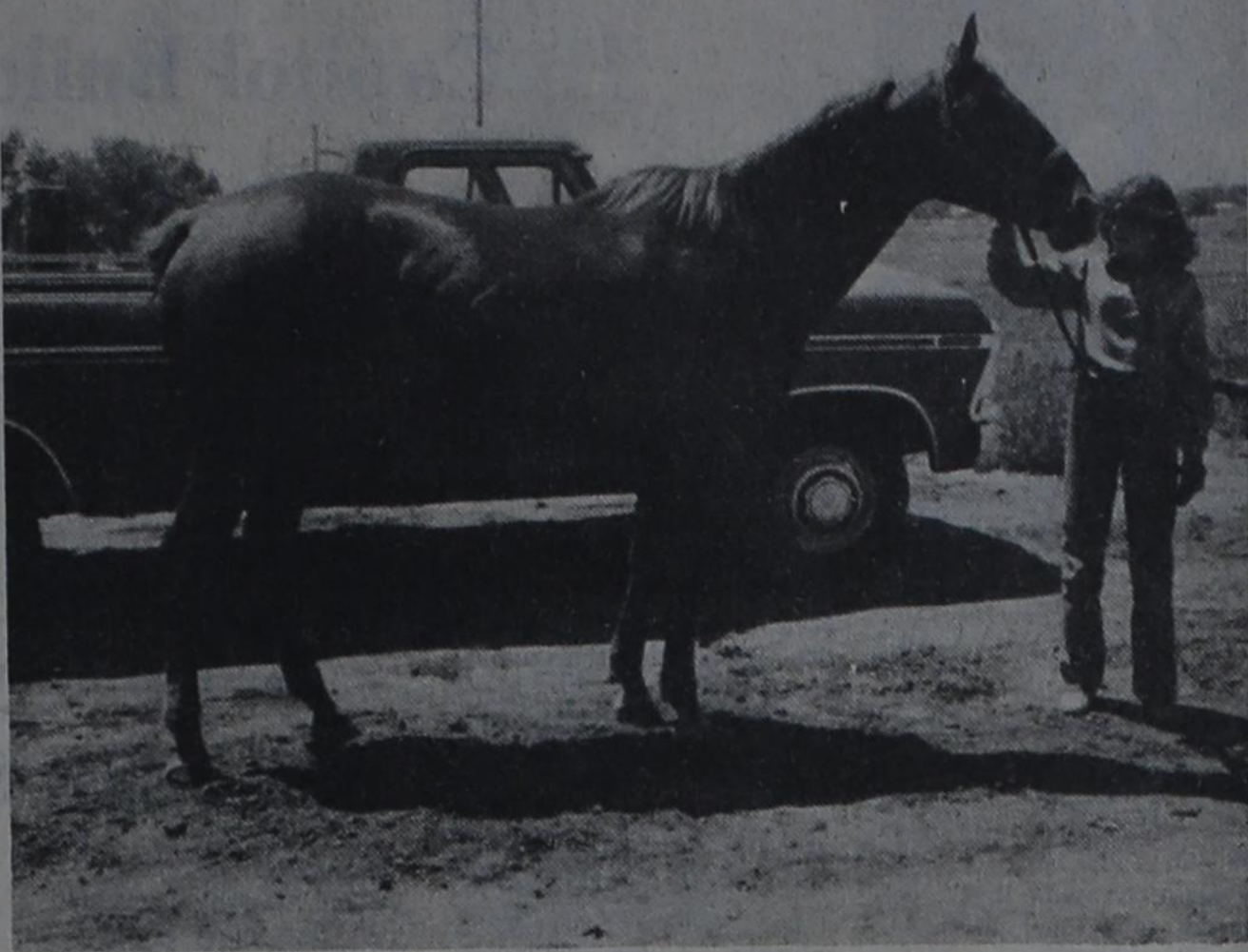

Entries in the parade must have pre-registered in order to be eligible to win any of the prizes to be awarded.

Plans are for the parade to begin forming at 10 a.m. CDT on the south side of Highway 60-70-84 starting at Lamar Street in Texico, which is the street west of the former Texaco service station. The parade line-up will form west from that point, along the highway on the south side.

Over 100 Degrees! - -

Record Setting Heat Scorches Twin Cities

Here we go again . . . same song, second verse. Scorching temperatures have reappeared, raging through the area, just as they did this time last year during June's third week.

The mercury began its climb last weekend with it finally reaching a record-breaking high of 107 degrees on Sunday in the Twin Cities and around the states of New Mexico and Texas.

The three-digit temperatures set a record for the Lubbock area, the previous record high for a June 21 was 106 set in 1969.

Temperatures remained in

the 100's at the beginning of the week, forcing a spurt of thunder showers in some parts of the neighboring states, but at presstime, Texico and Farwell were not lucky enough to receive any cooling moisture.

So, area farmers are pouring water on their growing corn and other in-the-ground crops as fast as they can before the high temps take their toll on the emerging produce.

Meanwhile, the farmers are also toiling away at harvesting their barley and wheat, working in the hot sun until nightfall to get those acres

stripped.

Not many folks are seen out "just walking around" either as most are keeping indoors where the good ole air conditioner is panting away to keep things cooled off.

Little relief is in sight as weather forecasters say the extended outlook is for the temperatures to remain at least in the upper 90's and should peak at 108 degrees by Friday, with no rain in the forecast.

Predictions call for very warm to hot afternoons here with mostly fair skies and "cool" nights in the low 70's.

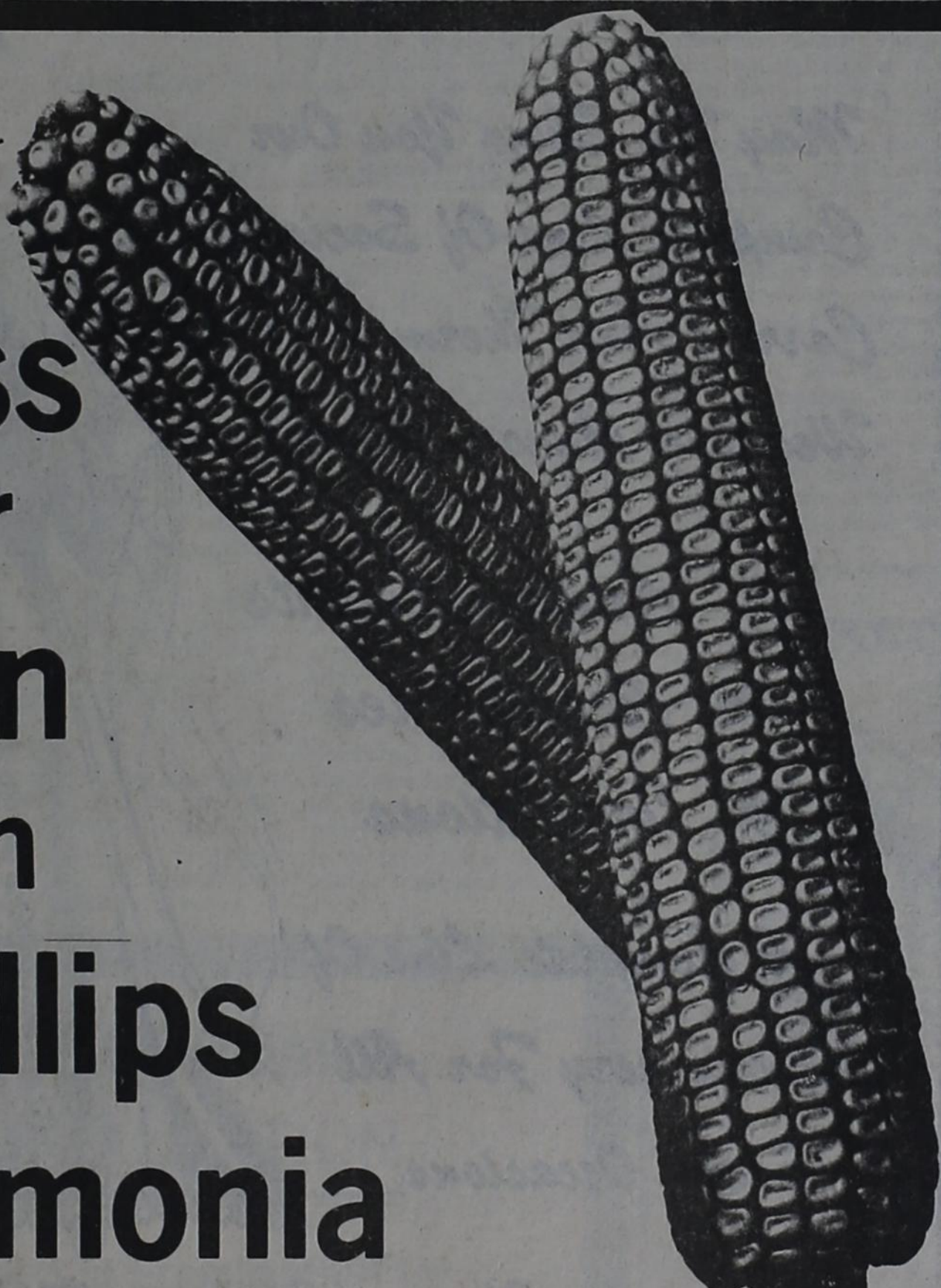

Those interested in taking part in the fair are invited to contact the Bailey County Extension Office for complete details.

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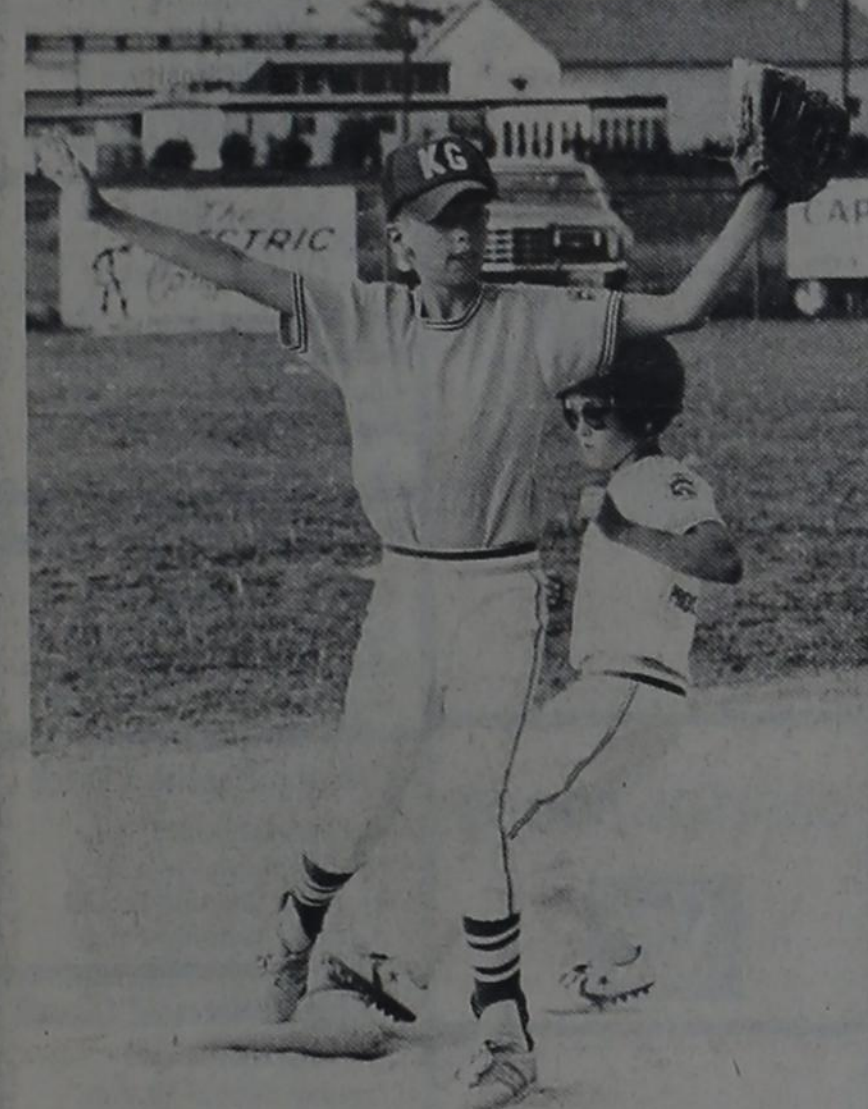

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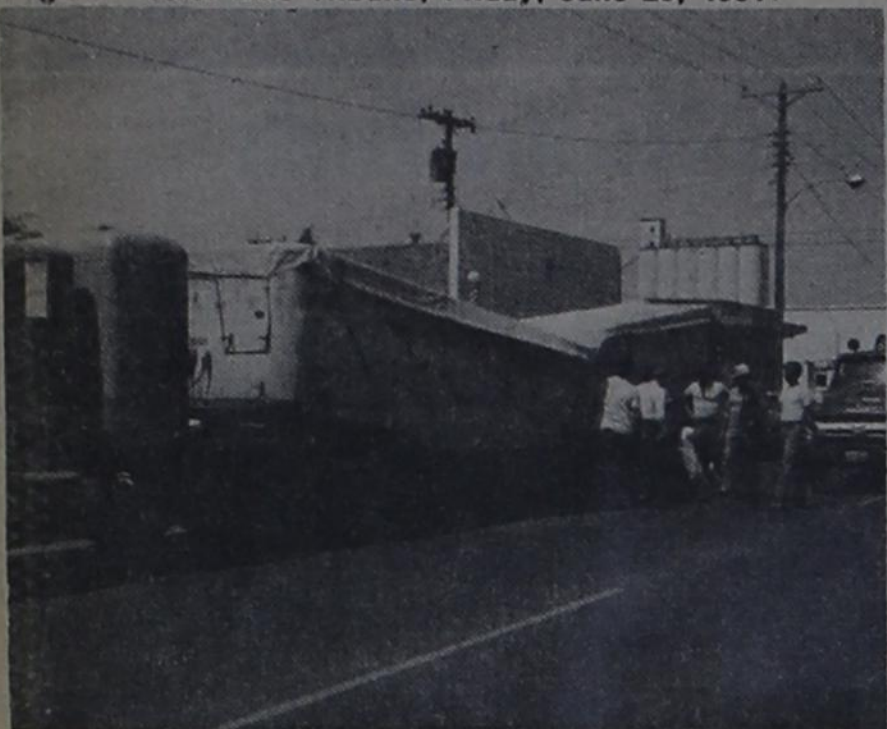

DAVID'S BLESSEDNESS

"Even as David also described the blessedness of the man unto whom God imputeth righteousness without works. "Saying: Blessed are they whose iniquities are forgiven, and whose sins are covered. "Blessed is the man to whom the Lord will not impute sin" (Rom. 4:6-8). Obviously David knew no more about the present "dispensation of the grace of God" than did Abraham, and he certainly did not live under the dispensation of grace. He lived under the dispensation of law, when sacrifices were required for acceptance with God. Had David said that the offering of sacrifices was unnecessary, he would have been stoned according to the law. But David, unlike many today, understood the purpose of the Mosaic law: to bring man in guilty before God. In Psalm 130 he said: "If Thou, Lord, shouldst mark iniquity, who should stand, but there is forgiveness with Thee." He did not know how God could righteously

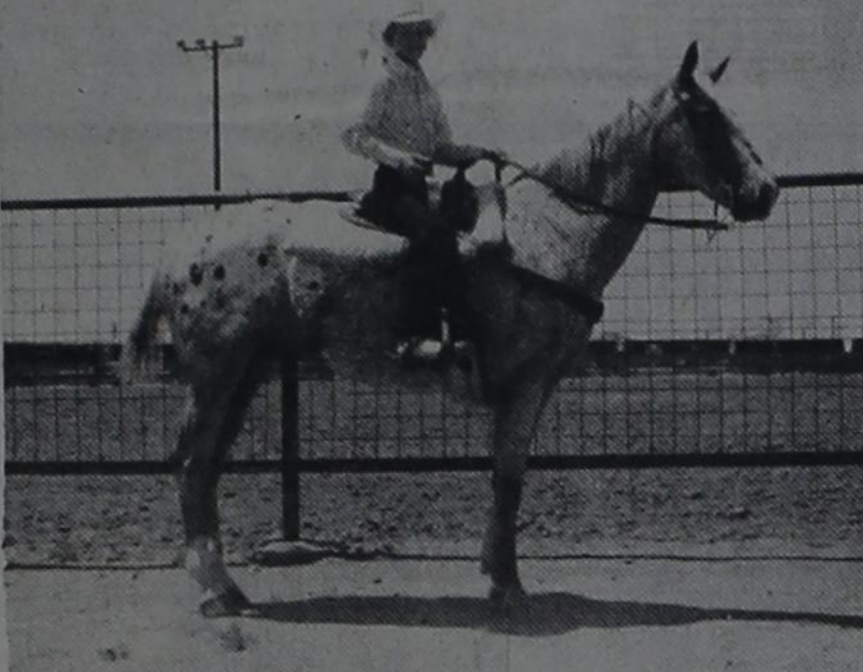

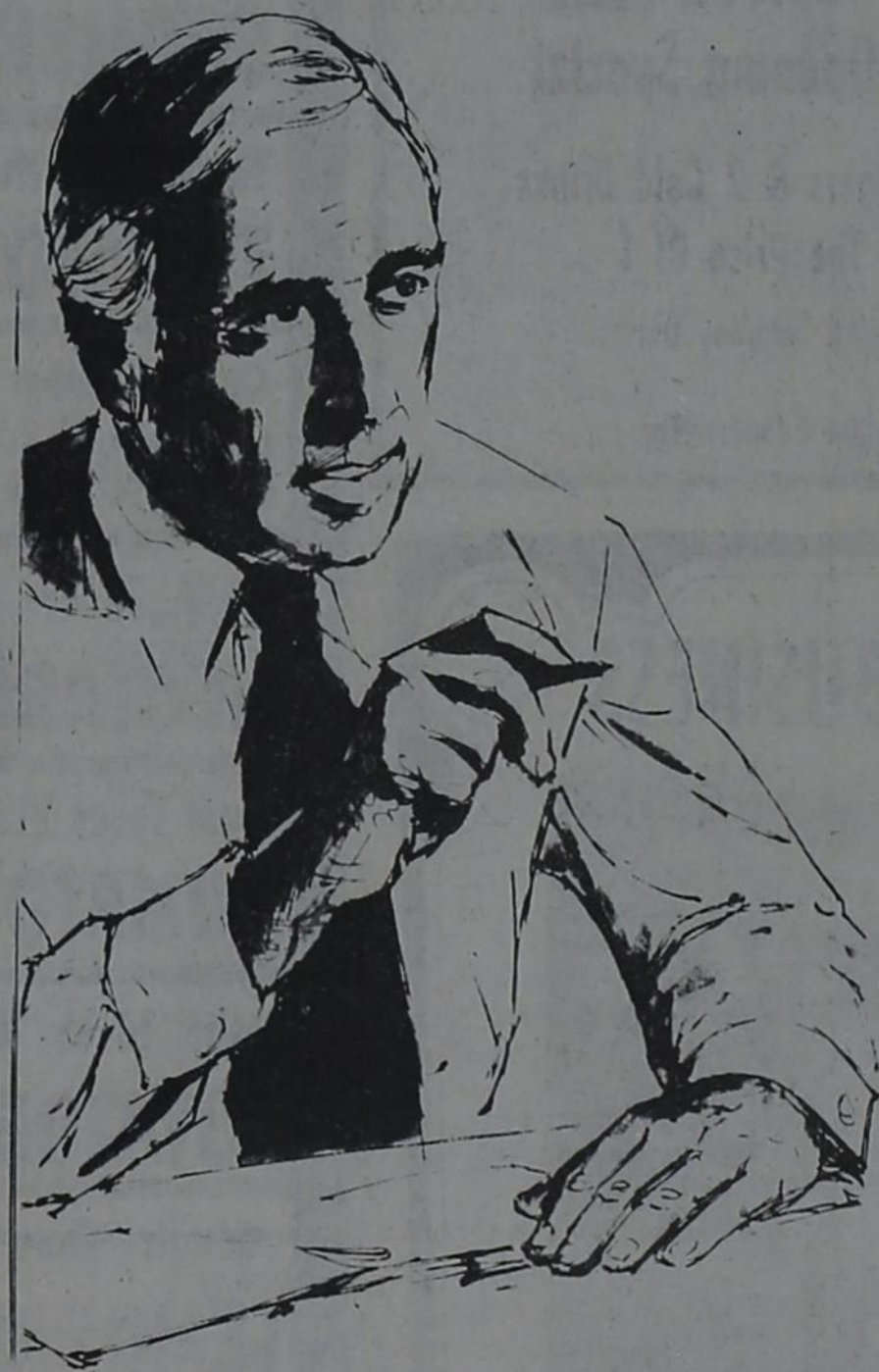

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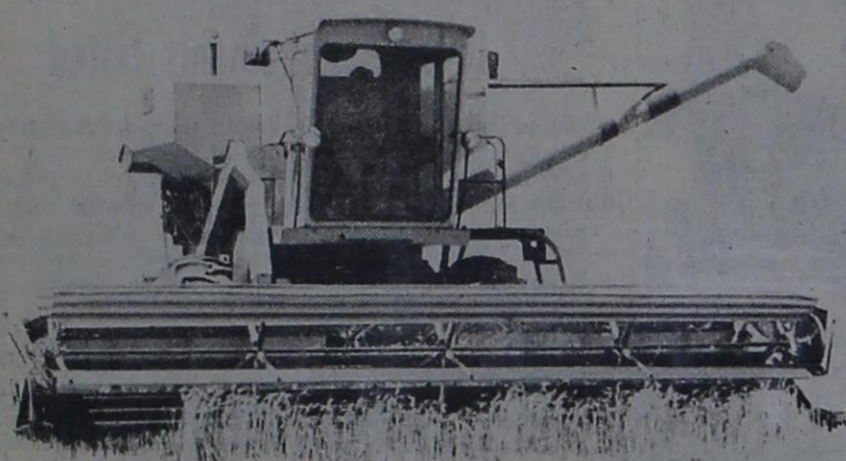
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Harvest Rolling

While sitting inside his air-conditioned cab, this area farmer works away at harvesting his wheat fields and, if like most farmers, he will complete the task by this weekend. Local elevator men are citing good

yields, saying the average could run as high as 40 bushels per acre, which is much better than originally predicted. Test weights are excellent, some as high as 64 pounds per bushel, and all is reported to be good

and dry. The recent hot and dry weather has most irrigation pumps working away as farmers are busily watering their corn and other in-the-ground crops.

Almost Completed - -

Harvest Yields, Weight Better Than Predicted

"It's rolling along pretty good," says Prentice Mills, executive director of ASCS Office in Farwell in reference to this year's wheat harvest.

Mills said the yields are "varying immensely" with some averaging very low yields and some bringing in as much as 75 bushels per acre. "I think when you put it all together we'll be close to a normal production this year," he said, adding, "I feel this year's total will be better than originally predicted."

The ASCS director said "when we take the bitter with the sweet" the average yield will probably be around 38-40 bushels per acre, "throwing dryland in with the irrigated." Fred Chandler at Sherley-Anderson-Pitman elevator gives credit to the heavy rains dumped on the Twin Cities at the end of May. "That capped it off and made it good," he said, adding that this year's crop test weight is "higher than I've seen it," and his elevator has received some as high as 64 pounds per bushel.

"This wheat is as good as I've ever seen," Chandler said. "We've got good farmers."

Chandler said the moisture content is anywhere from 9-12 percent and the yield is anywhere from 30-110 bushels per acre with the biggest part running 65-75 bushels per acre. Sherley - Anderson - Pitman processed 111 loads on Monday

and Chandler says he expects they will be filling a big tank a day at the elevator for the duration of the harvest, but says the big rush will be over by Friday.

Worley Grain of Farwell is processing a million and a half pounds of local wheat a day, according to David Deel, with moisture "running under 10 percent."

Deel said the test wheat is averaging 62-63 pounds and says he feels the harvest will be "summed up by next week."

"We'll be at it until around the first week in July," said Ray Pritchett at Golden West elevator in Texico, adding that he and his crew are "staying pretty busy now."

Pritchett said he's been keeping records of yield av-

erages on some "circles down south," and says the irrigated crop is averaging 40 bushel per acre.

He said his elevator is receiving "all pretty dry" wheat running at 60 pounds test weight.

"I haven't seen any discoloration," he added, "it's all in good shape."

Things are slacking off a bit at Sherley-Anderson elevator in Lariat according to a spokesperson there. It was reported that the moisture content of wheat received by them is "pretty dry" running from 9-11 percent. Test weights have been averaging 58-62 pounds per bushel there.

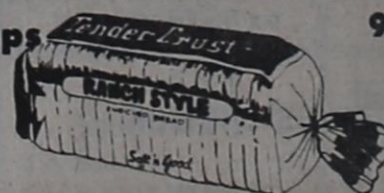


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
