

Sheriff Optimistic For Crime Program

Although there are quite a few more details to be worked out before it actually gets polling, Parmer County Sheriff Bill Morgan is quite optimistic about the county's new Crime Stoppers program.

The initial \$1,000 reward fund money was given to the program by the Parmer County Commissioners Court in October, and Morgan explains that the money was a "one time deal.
