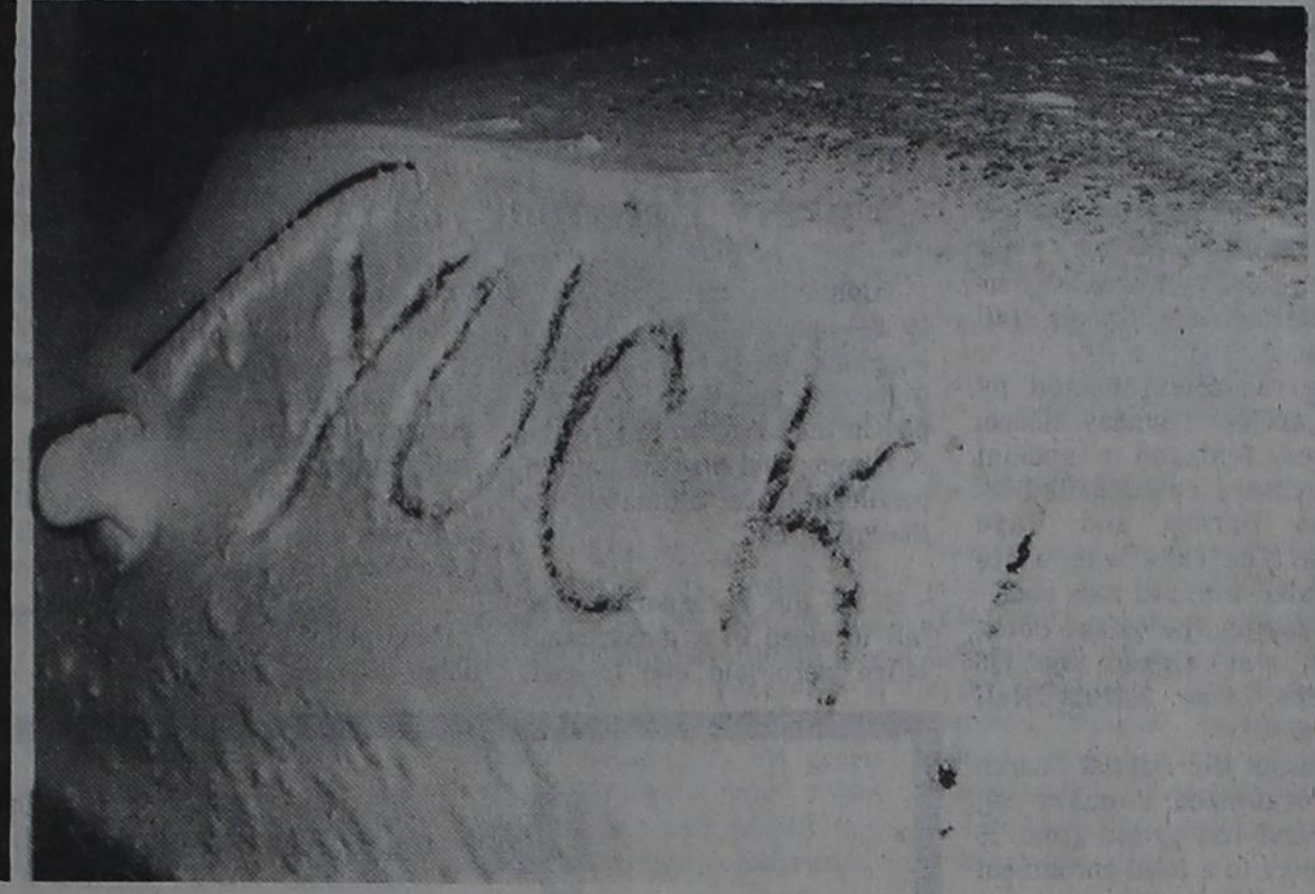

Many of the drivers found themselves stranded while returning from work or school Monday night and were forced to leave their vehicles along the roadways during the night, only to find them encased in snow on Tuesday.

But when the sun emerged Tuesday afternoon, the frosty white cover turned to dirty slush on the highways, which, of course, was then transformed into an icy crusty mess Wednesday morning.

140 Emergency Calls Keep Twin Cities Firemen Busy

Twin Cities volunteer firemen were kept busy in 1981, spending many volunteer hours helping to save lives and property in the Texico and Farwell area.

In addition to being on call 24 hours per day, the volunteer firemen also took in over 200 hours of training and schooling to retain and update their fire fighting and life saving knowledge.

In Texico, the men responded to 18 fire calls and 31 ambulance calls, traveling 1182 miles during the year.

Their training consisted of 82 hours of Emergency Medical Technician schooling, with 11 members and their wives becoming certified as EMT's; 150 hours of weekly sessions; 16 hours of State Fire School, with classes conducted in Texico; and three firemen attended the State Fire School in Albuquerque for intensive fire fighting training.

Fire Chief Vane Doshier says he currently has 13 volunteers on his roll. His officers include Bryan Kube, assistant fire chief; Bob Spears, captain number one; Lewis Cooper, captain number two; Steve Chancey, training officer; and David Kube, fire marshal.

While the Texico department received no new equipment during the past year, it was lucky enough to obtain a brand new facility in which to house their old equipment.

The year 1981 was a bit more hectic for Farwell volunteer fire department, with the men responding to 35 fire calls and 56 ambulance runs.

Fire Chief Joel White says because of the department's new paging system, as opposed to the old siren system, response time has been as short as one minute. "The pagers are the best thing that has happened to us. It cut our response time in half," White remarked.

Farwell City Council assisted the volunteer department in purchasing several new items of equipment this past year, including new air packs, coats,

boots, pants and radios.

Several hours of training were undertaken by members of the department, including: four members being certified as emergency care attendants; six weeks of instruction locally from Texas A&M; nine members attending Lubbock Fire Fighting School; one attending fire fighting school at Texas A&M, and three hours of training weekly at the fire house 39 weeks per year.

Both the Farwell and Texico volunteer departments conduct

training in proper and efficient use of equipment, proper record keeping, and lifesaving techniques.

Chief White says he has 28 volunteers on the roll of the Farwell department. His officers include Mike Camp as assistant fire chief, Robert White as secretary, Lee Hutchins as training officer, and Smokey Gast as fire marshal.

One thing is for sure, the Twin Cities volunteer fire departments should not be taken for granted.

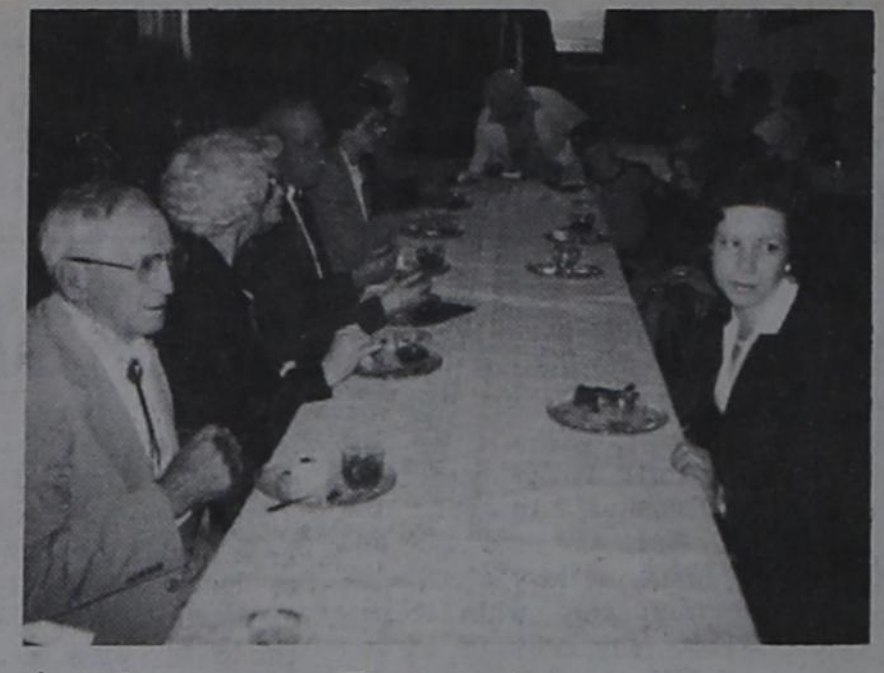
Rev. Bob Reid was very

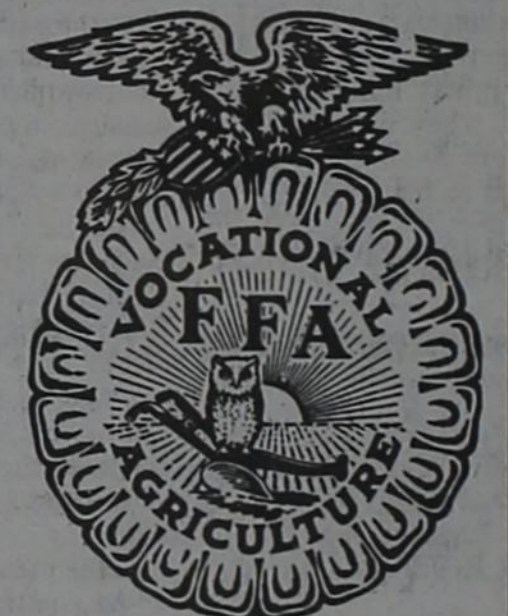

Superintendent Sam Barnes was extended through the 1982-83 school year.

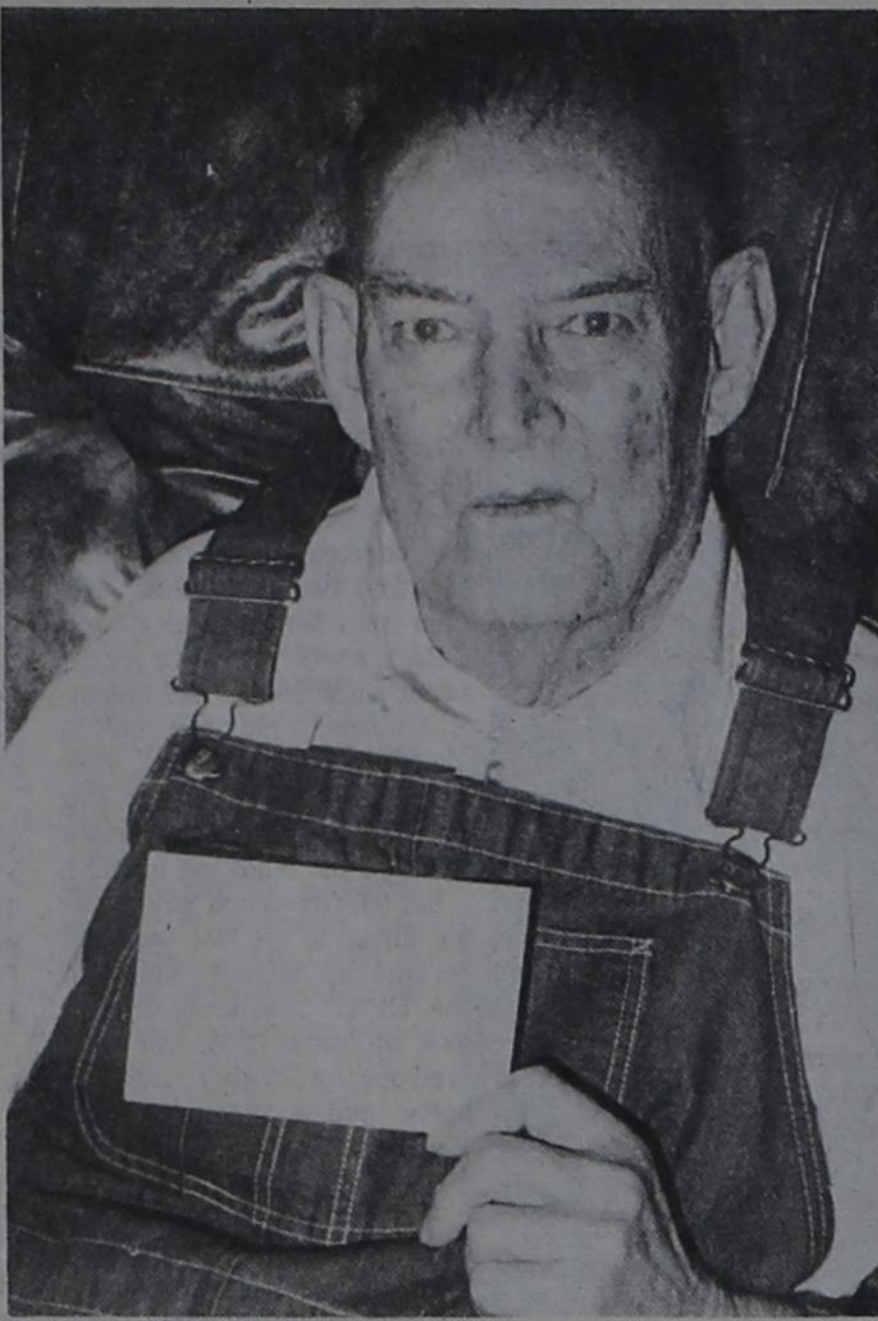
Also, the following substitute teacher policy was adopted, to be implemented beginning with the 1982-83 school year:

Substitute teachers are always employed and paid by the school system, never by the teacher who is absent. Substitutes are paid one-half the state minimum salary schedule per day for beginning teachers, for each day of substitute teaching.

After ten consecutive days of substituting for any one teacher, the substitute pay will be increased to three-fourths of the daily minimum pay rate for a beginning teacher.

After 20 consecutive days of substituting, qualified (certified) substitutes would be paid according to a beginning teacher's salary.

A non-degreed substitute would remain at the three-fourths of the minimum daily pay rate for a beginning teacher.

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Housing Market Told To Farwell Students

Students in Martha Wheeler's Housing and Home Furnishings Class at Farwell High heard Jack Williams of Tri-County Savings and Loan Association in Farwell speak about the depressed housing market and the various types of loans available.

Williams pointed out to the class, comprised of juniors and seniors, that his organization has made no home loans from the Farwell office in the last one and one-half years due to the high interest rates.

He also showed a loan application packet to the students, explaining the reason and need for the various forms attached.

Williams told the group that no one person approves or denies a housing loan application, that the decision is done by a loan committee of the lending institution.

The students learned that the average time a loan stays with the original borrower is 13 years. They were told by Williams that the monthly payment on the loan is not only

for principal and interest, but it will also include amounts to go into escrow to cover yearly payments of property tax and insurance. "Many home owners also purchase mortgage insurance, which is term insurance on the life of the wage earner," Williams said.

According to Williams, the picture for young families beginning their housing investments has changed very drastically in the last two years, and he told his audience "start small and utilize backing of family" when seeking a home.

The students were told of the various types of housing loans available, and were shown an amortization schedule which explained the comparisons of the different interest rates, the different length of loans and total monies spent over a period of years.

Williams closed by cautioning the young people to "begin at the low diving board" when becoming home purchasers, and not to bite off such a big chunk that they "might choke on it."

Texico Lady Wolverines captured two more victories last weekend, pushing their district tally to 6-0, but the wins did not come easy for the reigning state champions.

On Friday night, the lady roundballers captured their "biggest win of the year," according to Coach Roy King, on their home court against Melrose, but it wasn't until all-stater Ruth Scott burned the nets for 25 explosive points in the second half that the score was in their favor, the girls winning 44-38.

On Saturday night at Floyd, Coach King remarked that

while Texico may have defeated the Lady Broncos by a hefty 25 points earlier this season, they were "lucky to get out of Floyd alive," (last week) squeaking by with a one-point win, 43-42.

Against Melrose, before a capacity hometown crowd Friday, the girls fell behind some strong Buffalo scoring and didn't take command until the final quarter.

"I was really proud of the girls. We were down by 11 points in the second quarter. We could have given up, but we didn't," said Coach King.

Upping their district tally to 3-3, Farwell Steers defeated the visiting Hart Longhorns before a home crowd last Friday night, 65-35.

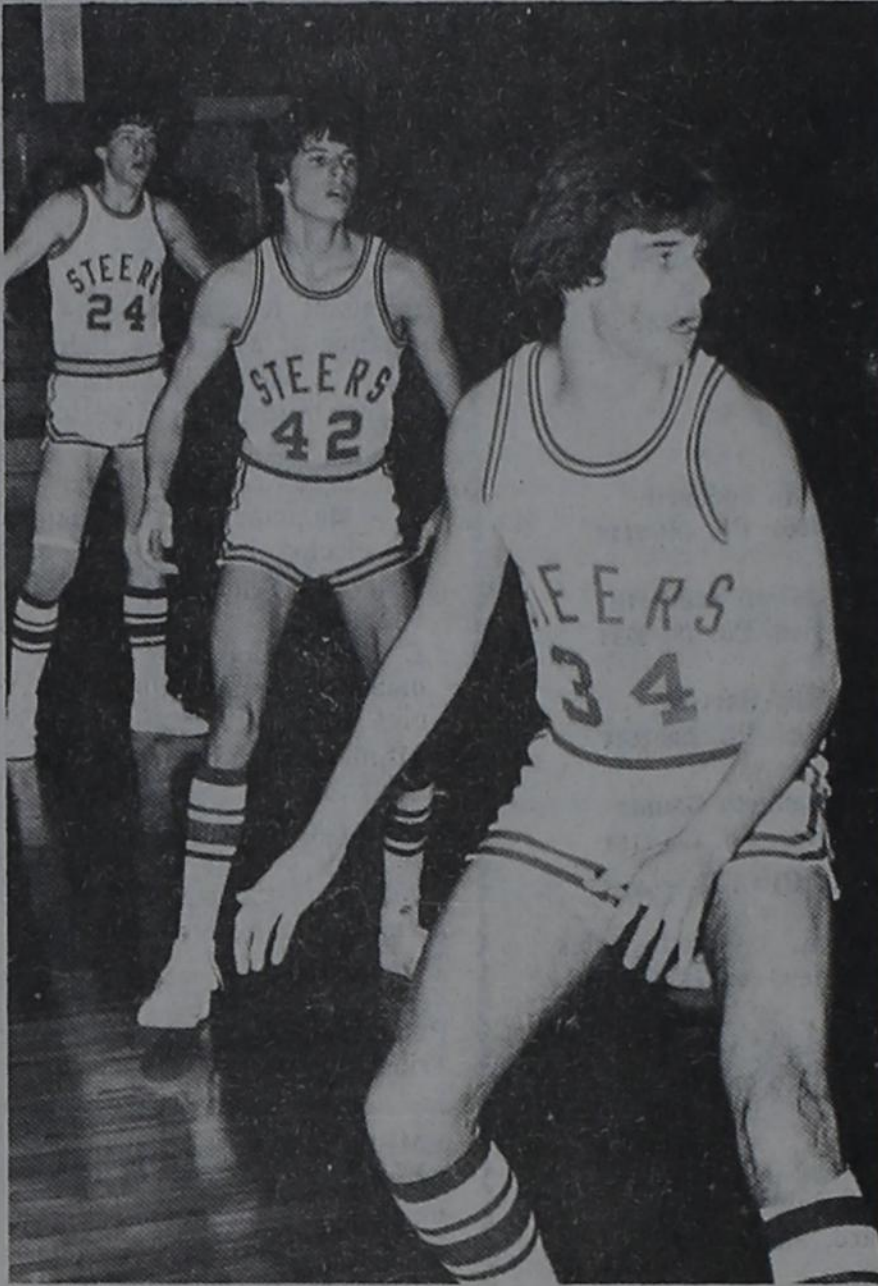

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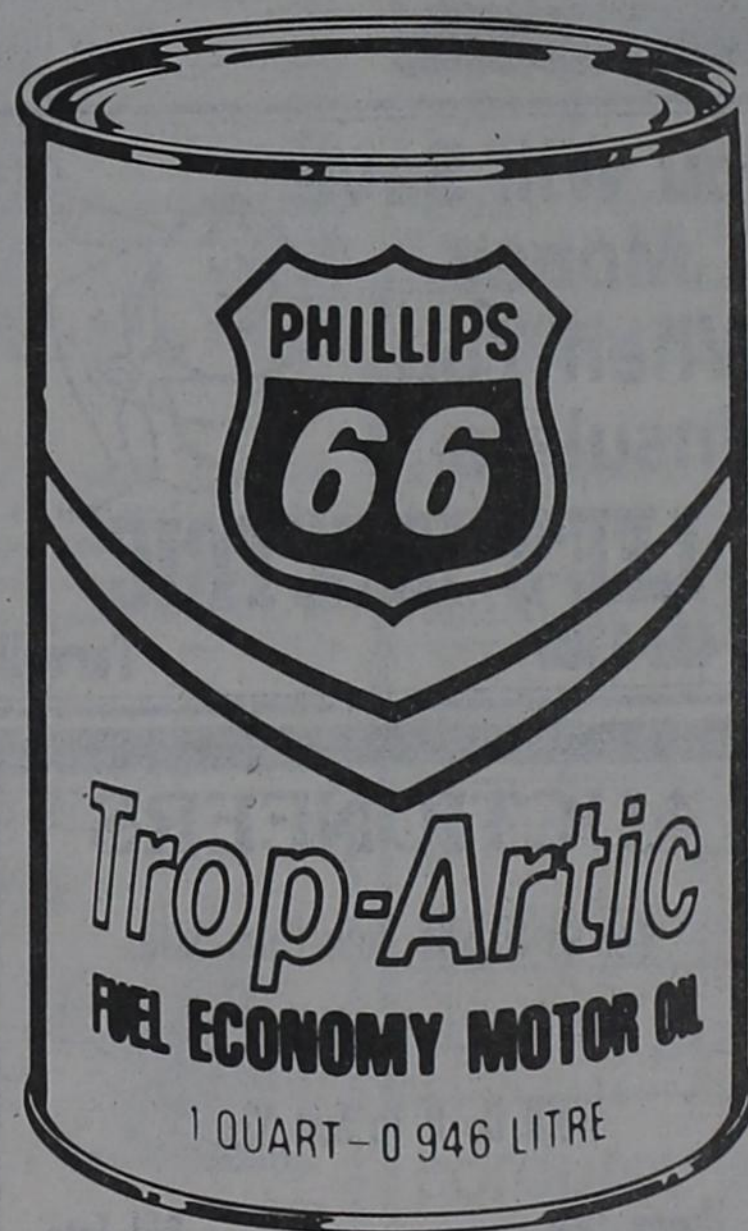


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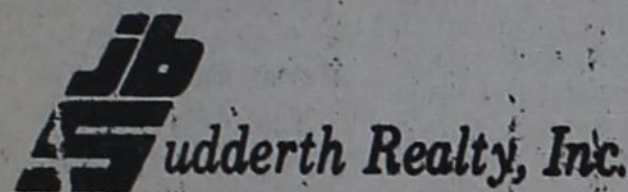

School Nurse Reports Scarlet Fever Cases

Farwell School Nurse Sarah Owen advises that several children at Farwell Schools have had strep throat and scarlet fever and warns that it is "very important to see a doctor for diagnosis and treatment" should a child develop a very sore, very red throat and

a fever, or a body rash. "Since we don't know of all the cases, we can't determine which children have been exposed," Mrs. Owen said. "Most doctors will not give preventive treatment, so there is nothing to do except to make sure the parents are aware the disease is around."

The nurse stressed that strep throat and scarlet fever are "serious diseases" that are effectively cured by penicillin. "Untreated, they can have serious complications," she warned.

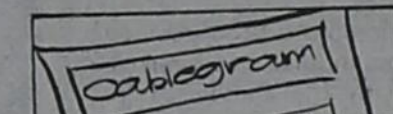

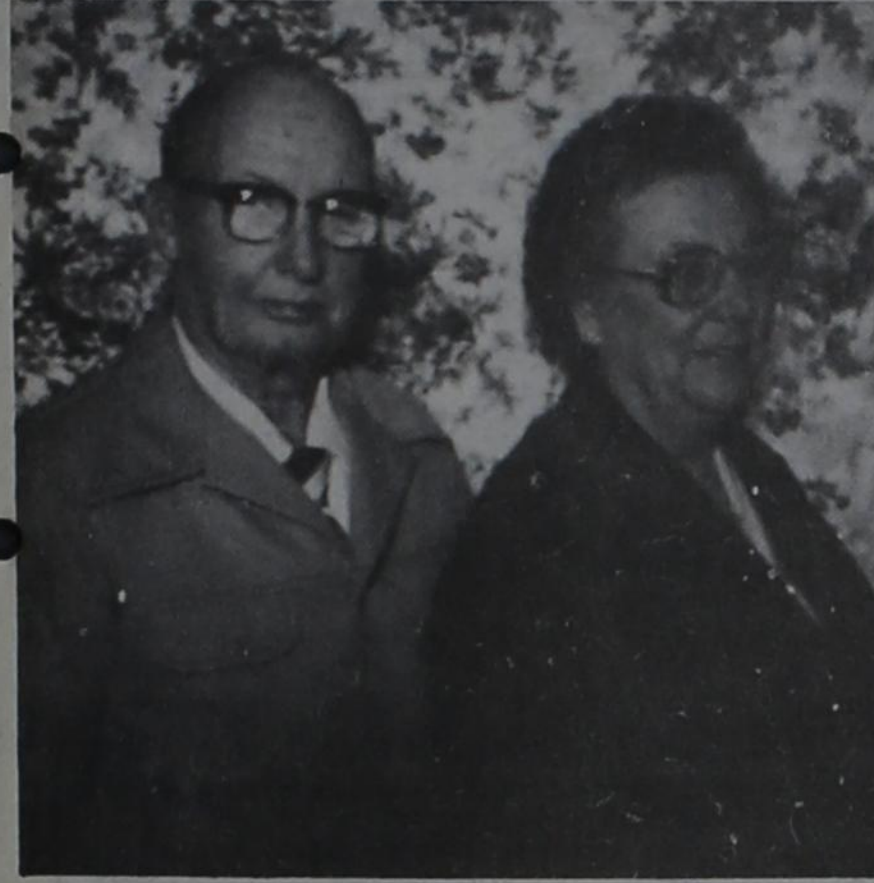

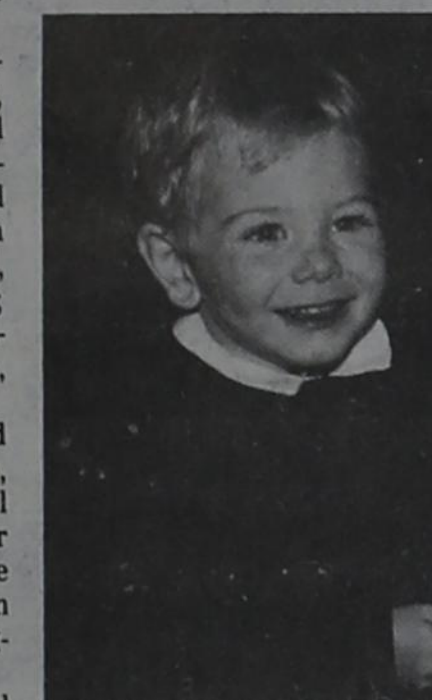
