

Texico Voters Say Yes To School Bond Issue

Texico Municipal School District voters approved the \$320,000 school bond issue and two-mill tax levy overwhelmingly Tuesday, with 147 persons turning out in the ice and snow for the voting.

"I certainly appreciate everyone who turned out and gave their approval," said

school superintendent James Pierce. "With conditions the way they are and prices continually going up, I really appreciate the people buying our school," the superintendent

added. The local funds will be used towards the construction costs of a million dollar multi-

purpose facility which will now apply to the state for include three classrooms and capital outlay funding and a added space for other educational programs.

Only 31 people voted against the bond issue, while 114 said yes. For the two-mill tax levy, 109 approved it and 34 said no. Texico school officials will cision will be made in June

Pierce said that a representative from the state will come to Texico in April to "look the situation over" and the de-



The superintendent has stressed previously that the bonds will not be sold until the state funds have been received. If all goes as planned, the new tax rate will appear in the November 1982 tax notices. There will be no change in

taxes during this school year.

Construction of the new facility, designed by Kilmer and Associates, architects from Clovis, is hoped to begin later this summer.

The local funds will be a little less than one-third of the total construction costs, the state providing the remainder.

Anyone who had to travel even a short distance on Tuesday couldn't have been and lawns. very happy about it as the Twin Cities and Clovis area sleds and 3-wheelers came out, was socked in with up to seven and the yards, streets and parks were filled with kids and inches of snow. Light rain which fell ahead of the snow dogs romping and playing in plus the heavy white stuff, caused slick roadways, forcing

traffic to come to a standstill. Those who were happy about the Monday night snowfall were wheat farmers and school kids, as the added moisture, as little as it was, will certainly be beneficial to the wheat crop, and students were allowed to skip a day of schooling on Tuesday.

Reports indicate that this week's cold wind and snowfall was easily the most severe winter storm of the season in this area.

In the Twin Cities, reports are that the area received up to six inches of the white stuff, with drifts three to four feet high in some areas.

But when the sun emerged Tuesday afternoon, the frosty white cover turned to dirty slush on the highways, which, of course, was then transformed into an icy crusty mess Wednesday morning.






Housing Market Told To Farwell Students


Texico took an early first quarter lead, retaining it until the final stanza of play, leading at the end of the third quarter 33-27.
