### Christmas Mail - - Postmaster Urges Proper Packaging

Persons planning to send Christmas gifts and cards through the mail are always encouraged to do three things - shop early, mail early, and wrap packages properly.

Louise Engram, postmaster at the Texico Post Office, says that the third item is perhaps the most important of the three suggestions and offers some helpful hints to persons planning to mail packages for this Christmas.

"Be sure your package can hold up under the avalanche of holiday mail," the postmaster says.

With the constant carrying of mail for business and industry and the increased volume of Christmas mail, parcels must be properly wrapped to withstand the pressure. Make sure the parcel can stand the stress of other parcels nudging it, or that it can weather a trip through the machines or through the conveyor belts. And keep in mind that packages also take a jolt while in trucks that traverse the bumpy roads.

Mrs. Engram points out that there is a poster in the lobby of the post office called "Packaging Pointers" that would give lots of helpful hints to holiday mailers and that if persons planning to mail items would read and heed these suggestions they could be assured their parcels would arrive

intact. Another important step is being sure to put a return address on every piece of mail, including Christmas cards. The return address is almost as necessary as the proper addressee, the postmaster says. "A return address might save the sender the 70 cent fee it costs if a letter winds up in the dead letter office and has to be returned," Mrs. Engram pointed out.

So, pay close attention to wrapping those parcels for mailing, be sure to put a return address on all items mailed, and mail the items in ample time for delivery. Following these steps will make for a happier holiday for all, and perhaps less hassle for and fussing at post office personnel.

The council announced at its meeting that unlicensed motor powered vehicles will not be ridden on city streets, in accordance with state statutes.

City Clerk Marie Christian explains that "The City is having quite a problem with dirt bikes and three-wheelers on the city streets. It has become quite a situation. City Marshal Mickey Fenn has spoken to the parents of the children riding these vehicles, but nothing has been done. Now we're pulling out the state statute."

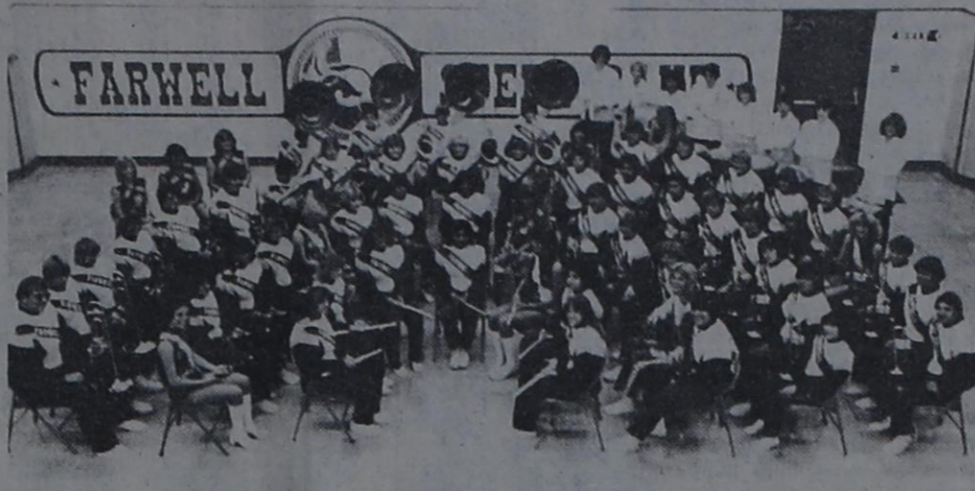
and Twinkle, Twinkle, Little Star.

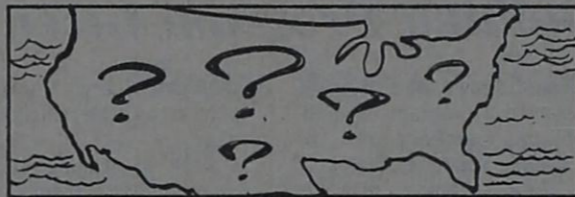

### Texas A&M Corps enrollment increases

COLLEGE STATION — Enrollment in the Corps of Cadets at Texas A&M University for fall 1981 totals 2,374 cadets, a substantial increase for the third consecutive year.

The increase, about 5 percent over last year, means that Texas A&M's uniformed student body is growing at about the same rate as the overall university enrollment.

U.S. Army Col. James R. Woodall, commandant of cadets, attributed the increase to "a lot of intensive recruiting," and "an indication in the change in attitudes of society about the military and national defense."

About 20 percent of all incoming male freshmen students now join the Corps of Cadets, Woodall said, but adds he would like to see Corps strength reach 3,000.

## AROUND THE HOUSE

The American melting pot is serving up brimming helpings of Mexican food these days. Even the White House dining room features Mexican food one day a week.

Tacos, tamales and enchiladas are only a few of the zesty entrees being discovered, and re-discovered daily, by millions of Americans.

Hispanic foods are also making impressive inroads in supermarkets and corner grocery stores. A wide array of seasonings, "taco kits," and sauces are just a few of the items appearing on store shelves.

Other signs of Mexican food's growing popularity can hardly be overlooked. The nation's largest convenience store chain recently draped its 6800 markets with signs proclaiming a new "chunky-style" burrito, hoping to boost sales started by the store's original burrito.

Tacos are leading the way in this culinary revolution. Once dismissed as a junk food, they are now considered fun and nutritious, with ingredients from each of the four food groups. The taco's shell comes from the breads and cereals group, its meaty filling from the meat, poultry, fish and beans group, its lettuce, tomato and onion from vegetable-fruit group, and its cheese from the milk-cheese group.

Schools have quickly picked up on the taco's appeal. Last October, the annual observance of National School Lunch Week featured tacos as the centerpiece of a Mexican-theme menu for the millions of school children participating in the national school lunch program. Other items on the menu included Mexicali corn, gazpacho (a cold Spanish vegetable soup), refried beans, pan dulce (sweet bread) and flan de vanilla (a custard-like dessert).

Some simple food safety rules will help you enjoy good - and safe - eating of Mexican food favorites. In cooking foods with meat, use different utensils for raw meat and the other ingredients - or wash the utensils with hot, soapy water, after they have touched raw meat. Non porous cutting boards are best for use with raw meat - and they should be washed before being used with other ingredients.

Always keep the meat cold until just before you're ready

to cook it. After cooking, eat it immediately or keep it hot until ready to serve. And make sure leftovers are heated thoroughly before eating.

These tips hold true for preparing all meat and poultry foods including such Mexican dishes as enchiladas with a chicken filling.

If you prepare your own sauces, here are some other safety tips. Commercially-prepared tomato-base sauces such as catsup, chili, taco and enchilada, seldom spoil. However, home-prepared sauces may spoil more easily because of less acidity and the numbers of bacteria that may be found in some ingredients. When making sauces at home, cook them thoroughly and refrigerate promptly.

These hints can help you enjoy foods that were first popular with the ancient Aztec Indians of Mexico. They discovered the simple tortilla along the way to developing the most advanced calendar and cultivation system of their day.

Cooked corn was mashed and then shaped into flat, round cakes to be baked on hot stones. These cakes were called tortillas.

Other staples of the Aztec diet were beans, tomatoes and peppers, a legacy that lives with us today in tacos, tostadas and other Mexican foods.

Oddly enough, tomatoes first grew as weeds in Aztec corn fields. Aztecs soon discovered however, that the vegetable was delicious and could be prepared in a variety of ways. Beans, another staple item, were cooked, mashed and fried. They were either eaten plain or used as a filler for tortillas. Green sweet peppers were eaten plain or used as a filler for tortillas. Green sweet peppers were eaten as vegetables. Hot chili peppers were used as seasoning. All four foods still are popular in Mexico today.

The coming of the Spanish Conquistador Cortez to Mexico brought other foods to the Mexican diet, including gazpacho, which drew upon the Mexican favorites of tomatoes and green peppers. Today, the popularity of Mexican food is influencing other ethnic foods, a large pizza chain now offers a "pizzarito," a pizza crust topped with taco meat, cheese and lettuce.

American marketers are finding fast acceptance for their chili con pasta and chili chicken salad creations.

In case you haven't yet experimented with Mexican cooking, here are two zesty recipes for beef tacos and quick-cooking chili.

**BEEF TACOS**  
6 servings, 2 tacos each.  
Calories per serving: 340

12 taco shells, fully cooked  
1 pound ground beef, lean  
1/4 c. onion, chopped

8 ounce can tomato sauce  
2 t. chili powder  
1 c. tomato, chopped  
1 c. lettuce, shredded  
1/2 c. (2 ounces) Natural sharp Cheddar Cheese, shredded  
Brown ground beef and onion in a frying pan. Drain off excess fat. Stir in tomato sauce and chili powder. Bring to a boil. Reduce heat. Cook 10-15 minutes uncovered, stirring occasionally, until mixture is dry and crumbly. Fill taco shells with approximately 2 tablespoons of meat mixture. Mix tomato, lettuce and cheese. Spoon about 3 tablespoons over beef in taco shells. Two tacos (one serving) contribute one serving each of bread, meat and vegetables and 1/2 serving of cheese from the basic four food groups.

### QUICK-COOK CHILI

6 servings, about 3/4 cup each,  
Calories per serving: about 270

1 pound ground beef  
1/2 c. onion, chopped  
16-ounce can pinto beans  
10 3/4 ounce can tomato soup, condensed  
1 T. chili powder, or as desired

Heat beef and onion in a frypan until beef is browned and onion is tender. Drain off excess fat. Stir in remaining ingredients. Cover. Simmer for about 30 minutes, stirring occasionally.

weavings and Christmas decorations. Extension agents, area businesses and local homemakers presented programs each day on homemade holiday decorations, homemade candy, holiday health

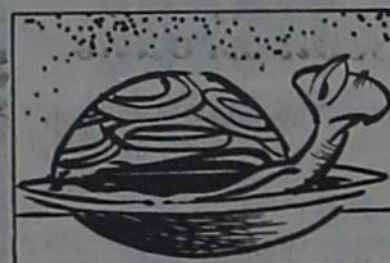

Texico's Lady Wolverines began this year's roundball season the same way they ended the season last year, winning.

The lady roundballers swept over three opponents last weekend to win the Roswell-Goddard tournament in their season debut.

For their winning efforts, three players were named to the all-tournament team, and last year's all-stater, Ruth Scott, was chosen the tournament's Most Valuable Player.

Selected to the all-tournament squad were Scott, Tracy Dobbs and Lisa Crooks.

"Overall I was pleased with the way we played," remarked coach Roy King. "We found out we had some girls that can play, but we also found some things that we need to work on."

In their first game, the reigning state champions defeated Los Alamos 55-42. "I think we met the best team in the tournament right off," said King. "It was good competition, and I think they were as good as anyone we will play all year."

Scott hit for 22 points and snatched 17 rebounds. Also scoring in the Los Alamos competition were Jill Jesko, 10; Tracy Dobbs, 9; Pam Hoyl, 8; and Lisa Crooks, 6.

Grabbing rebounds were Dobbs, 9; Hoyl and Jesko, 6 each. Crooks, 4 and Cheryl Scott, 1.

As a team, the girls hit 21 buckets out of 52 attempts and completed 13 out of 26 free throw attempts.

The varsity squad hit 29 buckets out of 48 attempts and shot 50 percent from the free throw line.

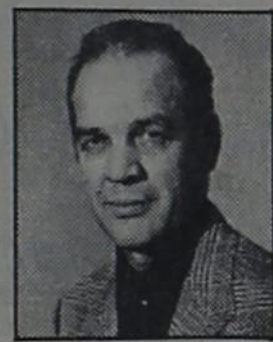

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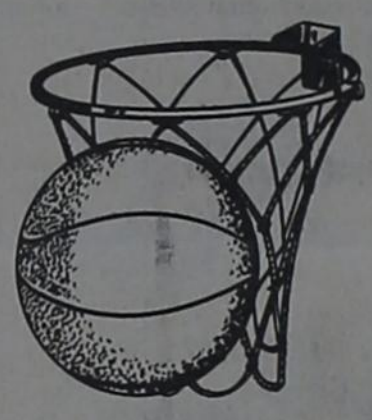
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## Texico Jr. Varsity Basketball Results

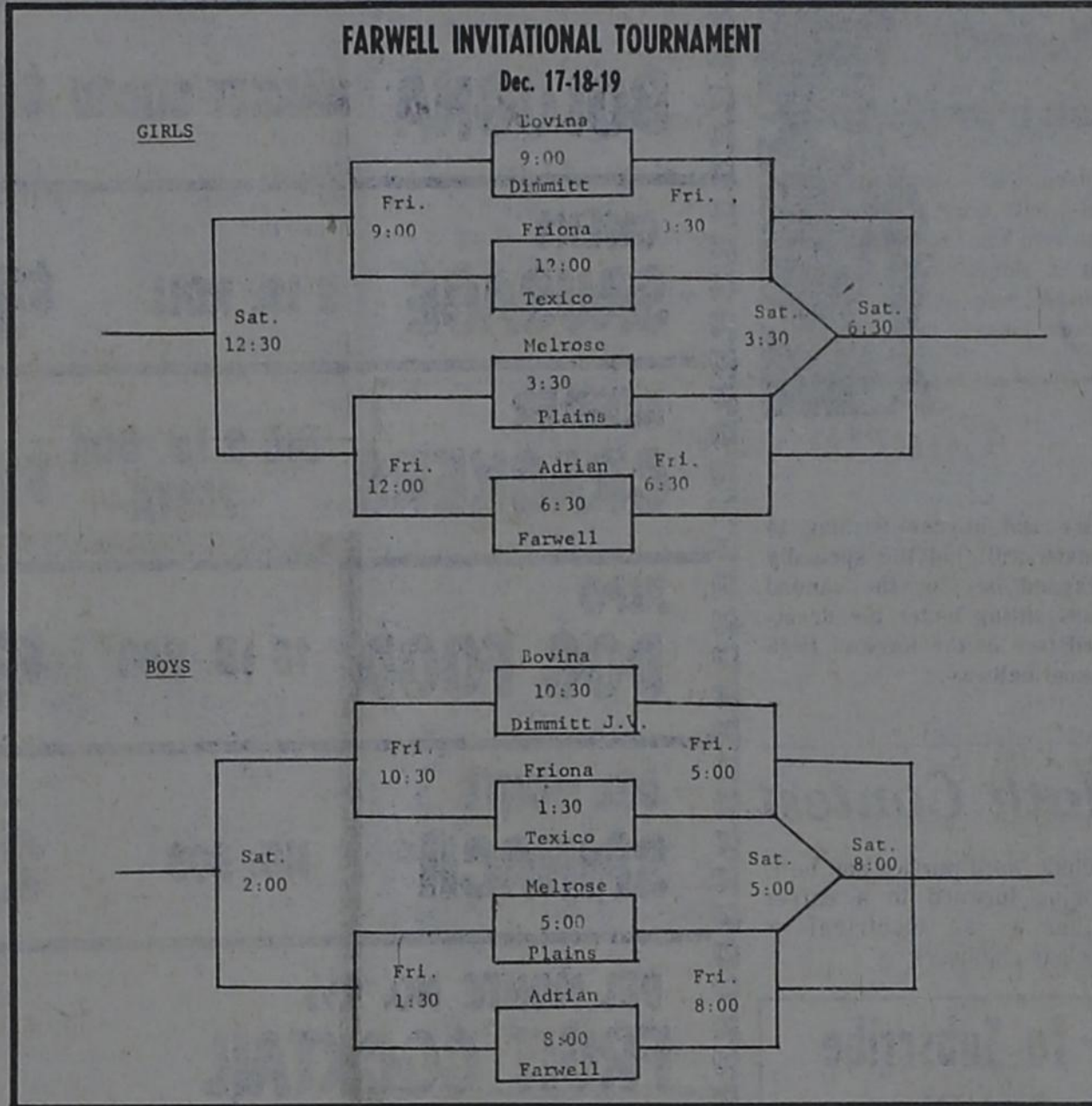

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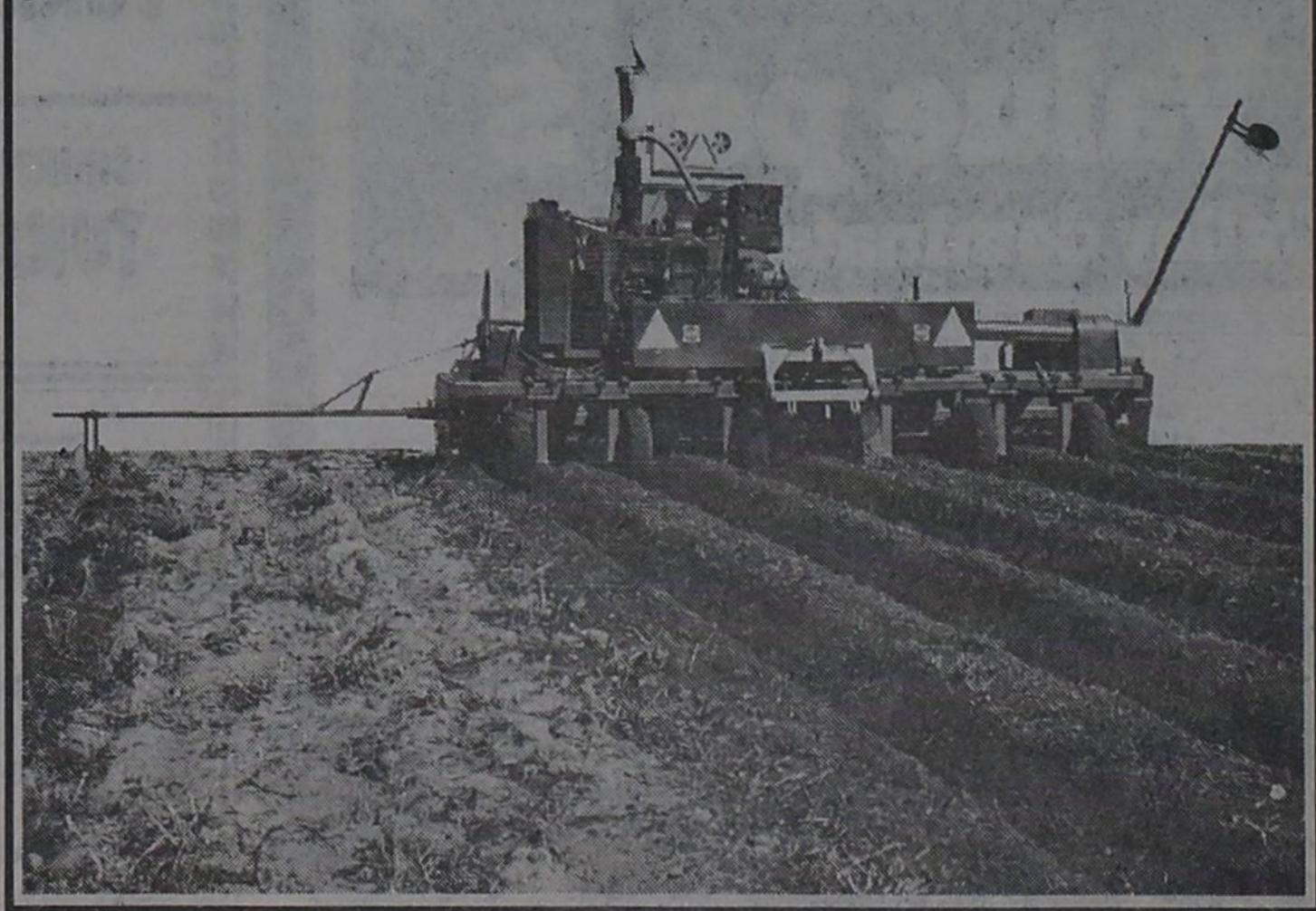
