We came across a report of the Texas DP's Uniform Crime Reporting Bureau covering the period from January through June 1981. You are a tad safer in the country, but on the other hand, fewer of the rural crimes are cleared.

On a statewide basis, 75 percent of all the murders are solved while only 15 percent of the burglaries and 20 percent of the car thefts are cleared. This says that robbing homes and heisting cars is safer than knocking somebody in the head.

During this period there were approximately 8,500 murders solved. If we had hung 8,000 of them the next six months' report would show a drastic decrease in that department and life would be safer for all concerned.

The Declaration of Independence speaks of life, liberty and the pursuit of happiness. The Preamble of our Constitution says, "and secure the blessings of liberty to ourselves and our posterity."

Tax Appraisal District To Start Collections

The Parmer County Appraisal District will start collecting delinquent taxes February 1, 1982 for the following Taxing Units: County of Parmer, City of Farwell, Farwell Hospital District, City of Bovina, Bovina I.S.D., City of Friona, Friona I.S.D., Lazbuddie I.S.D., and High Plains Underground Water District.

The date to start collecting for the Farwell I.S.D. will be July 1, 1982.

Effective January 1, 1982, taxes which become delinquent will incur a penalty of up to 12% and interest at a rate of 12% per annum. This change

will affect 1981 taxes which become delinquent on February 1, 1982. As a result, 1981 taxes will accrue penalty and interest at the following rates:

Filing for exemptions and renditions for all Taxing Units are to be made at the Appraisal District Office. These forms will be mailed out within the next ten days, to all taxpayers in Parmer County.

ONE TIME application requirements are: Residential Homestead Exemptions; Charitable Organization Exemptions; Youth, Spiritual, Mental and Physical Development Exemption; Association Exemption; Religious Organization Exemption; Private Owned Schools Exemption; 1-D-1 Agricultural Land Exemption; 1-D-1 Timber Land Exemption; 1-D-1 Ecological Laboratory Land Exemption; Appraisal of Public Access Airport Property Exemption; Appraisal of Recreation Park or Scenic Land Exemption.

ANNUAL Application Requirements: Disabled Veterans and Survivors Exemption; Implements of Farming & Ranching Exemption; Solar & Wind Powered Energy Devices Exemptions; Cemeteries Exemptions; (Continued on Page 2)

Businesses Hurt? - -

Concern Expressed At Highway Meet

Although the crowd was trimmed down from the last public hearing conducted in May of last year, approximately 35-40 persons gathered Monday night at Texico Community Center to hear state highway representatives from both Texas and New Mexico present refined proposals for the Highway 60-70 construction improvement project.

Most of those attending were businessmen from the Twin Cities, all of whom expressed concern for their businesses for either during the one- to two-year construction period when the work begins, or after the improvements are completed, because if the proposals are accepted, curb parking will be eliminated on Texico's main street.

But those attending the Location Public Hearing were told by New Mexico Highway Representative Kenneth Bowers, Jr., that the Twin Cities portion of the highway project is "at least 10 years away," and he assured the audience that "New Mexico Highway Department will support the concept supported by the local people."

"I think the whole project will hurt us," said Roy Snodgrass of Rip's Western Wear in Texico, "I say either go around the town (with a highway by-pass) or leave it just like it is. You are going through and cutting every business off. There are not many businesses left and there sure won't be if you do this," he said to Bowers.

When asked which of the three alternates offered he preferred, Snodgrass quipped, "My alternate is to leave it like it is."

Of the alternates offered, one (2A) would displace two businesses and one residence; another (2B) would displace eight businesses, two residences and Texico City Hall.

Existing curb parking would be removed in Texico and 11 acres of prime farmland as well as mixed grasses would be removed in Texas.

A hand vote taken during the meeting indicated that Alternate 2A, calling for painted medians rather than raised concrete medians, would be the alternate preferred by the local people.

Both construction alternates presented would call for a signalized intersection where Highway 60 joins 70-84, directly across from the Bordertown Playorama. The intersection would be complete with concrete islands and with what Fred Pearson of Gruen Associates, Inc., described as "a channelized intersection."

Alternate 2A, the one preferred by the Monday night audience, would provide two-way left turn painted median along the existing route with four travel lanes as well as an improved configuration of the U.S. 60-70 intersection.

The group was told that reconstruction of alternate 2A would result in some delays and disruptions to local businesses during the one- to two-year construction period.

Cost of this alternate is estimated at \$1.4 million, almost half of the cost for alternate 2B, the alternate calling for raised concrete medians.

Businessman Red Prather, owner of Playorama on the state line, asked, "Why is New Mexico even considering putting in concrete medians when all the West Texas towns are now busy taking them out?" Prather was told that the

raised medians would control left turns.

Alternate 2B is described as having "raised medians with limited crossing and left turn pockets, to greatly reduce local traffic conflicts."

To accomplish this, however, both U.S. 70 and U.S. 60 rights-of-way would be expanded by 16 feet. A widening of this nature would displace several buildings, including Texico City Hall.

Long-term effects would include adverse impacts on the Texico economy, due to the removal of businesses as well as from restricted access to the remaining businesses resulting from the elimination of on-street parking and limited breaks in the raised roadway divider median, a highway department report indicates.

For the Texas portion of the highway construction work, which is to run 2.5 miles east

of the state line, access to farm residences adjoining the route would be slightly impaired during construction.

In the long term, increased travel along the route would result in noise levels in excess of federal standards at the Farwell cemetery, a highway department report indicates, but explains that the change compared to existing high noise levels in this area would be imperceptible.

Total cost of the Texas portion of this alternate would be approximately \$1.7 million.

Alternate one for both the Texas and New Mexico portions of the roadwork is being called a "do nothing" alternate. Gary Cook of Texico asked highway man Bowers, "Is alternate one really an alternate?" He was assured by the representative that it was.

Expresses Concern

Roy Snodgrass [standing], a Texico business owner, told New Mexico Highway representatives at Monday night's public hearing that he feels any highway construction work will damage what little business is left in Texico. "I say either go around the town, or

leave it like it is," Snodgrass stated. Approximately 35-40 Twin Cities residents attended the second US 60-70 public hearing, most of whom were business owners in Texico. The highway representatives presented two proposals to the group, one calling for painted

medians on the improved slab of roadway, the other calling for raised medians with left turn pockets. The highway construction work is at least 10 years away, according to Ken Bowers of the New Mexico Highway Department.

In Twin Cities - -

Average Daily Traffic To Gain By Year 2000

Those attending Monday night's Location Public Hearing for U.S. Highway 60-70 improvement and construction were told that by the year 2000, the average daily traffic through the Twin Cities would grow from 9,000 vehicles to

16,300 per day, an increase of 7,300 vehicles per day.

Fred Pearson of Gruen Associates, Inc., the design engineers for the proposed project, said that the expanded projected figures are based on past area growth rates, community growth rates along the U.S. 60-70 corridor, and the increase in car registrations in Texas and New Mexico.

In a report issued by the Texas and New Mexico state highway departments, it is believed that increased traffic along the corridor will aggravate "existing route deficiencies," but that improvements within the existing right-of-way (Alternate 2A) would reduce some conflicts along the route by eliminating curb parking.

However, the report says, some traffic conflicts would continue with Alternate 2A due to left-turning movements across the highway at many

locations. The report also indicates that Alternate 2B would provide raised median and left-turn pockets which would relieve predicted left-turn conflicts, and would also eliminate curb parking.

The 1980 average daily traffic volumes along U.S. 60-70-84 through Texico ranged from approximately 7,500 to 9,000 vehicles per day. Traffic projections for the year 2000 predict an increase to 14,500 average daily traffic along the unimproved route and to 16,300 along the improved route.

Traffic volumes for 1980 on the Farwell portion of the U.S. highway (to Amarillo) were approximately 3,660 vehicles per day. In the year 2000, daily traffic on this portion of the route without improvements will increase to an estimated 5,520 vehicles. With improvements, traffic is projected to rise to 6,200 vehicles per day.

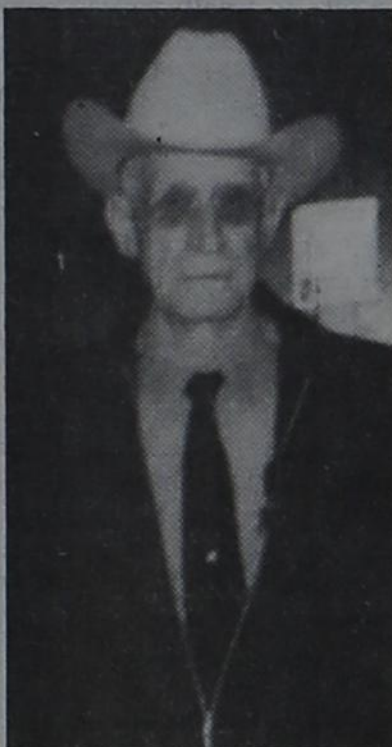

Guilty Pleas Entered In Court

Three persons entered guilty pleas to various charges at District Court hearings conducted January 6 at Parmer County Courthouse.

James Dennis Boles, Friona, pleaded guilty to a charge of felony theft, and received four years probation.

Fernando Tovar, Bovina, pleaded guilty to a charge of felony theft and was sentenced to three years in the Texas Department of Corrections, the Texas state penitentiary.

Alfredo Alonzo, Bovina, pleaded guilty to theft of a motor vehicle and received three years' probation.

Texico Board Reduces School Cafeteria Staff

In a cost saving effort, Texico School Board voted to reduce the school's cafeteria staff by one part-time worker at the regular board meeting Tuesday night.

In addition, funds are to be taken from the school's operational fund and placed into the cafeteria fund "to make ends meet", said school superintendent James Pierce.

"We're feeding 35 fewer students than we were last year, prices are up on our costs of groceries, and our reimbursement was reduced by six cents a meal," he said in explaining the reduction of staff and transferring of funds.

Also at the meeting, the board voted to conduct a special meeting February 2 to canvass votes from that day's bond election and to discuss a budget increase.

"The budget increase is mainly because we have an increase in students," Pierce

said, adding, "We have 11 more students this year than we had last year at this same time, which is more than we had projected. We originally projected a loss," he said.

A lengthy discussion took place on the upcoming bond election and the proposed multi-purpose room.

The board also renewed Pierce's contract as superintendent for two more years.

Jerry Sadberry, Texico band director, met with the board and told of a proposed trip to Six Flags Over Texas for band members during spring break. The board voted to pay for transportation for the trip, with the remaining expenses coming from band funds.

Those attending the session were board members Arlye Crooks, Herman Gerles, Mike Spearman, Greg Martin and Roy Thornton; and James Pierce, Marcia Leavell and Jerry Sadberry.

Farwell Superintendent Has Contract Renewed

Farwell School Board met in regular session Monday night and renewed the contract of school superintendent W.M. Roberts for the 1982-83 school year. In addition, the contract of James Craig as administrative assistant was also renewed for the next school year.

In other action taken at the meeting, athletic director Bruce Dollar spoke to the board concerning the addition of a woman to the athletic staff to help with girls athletics and physical education. No decision could be made at this time.

The board adopted a resolution adding the cost of attorney fees to the collection of delinquent taxes.

Financial reports were approved and principals Don Malone and David Gobble reported on activities at their respective schools.

Attending the meeting were board members Wilbert Kalbas, Joe Hughes, Richard Haseloff, Bill Martin, Edward Corn and Billy Mayfield. Absent was Caroline Anderson.

Also present were W.M. Roberts, James Craig, Don Malone, David Gobble, Johanna Mesman, Jerry Owen and Bruce Dollar.

Commissioners Court Has Special Session

Parmer County Commissioners Court met in special session December 31, passing a resolution to continue with the selection of Parmer County jurors by jury wheel, renewing the list of prospective jurors annually, rather than waiting until the list has been exhausted.

In August of each year, or such other time as may be designated by law as the time for reconstituting the jury wheel, the cards bearing the names and addresses of each registered voter in Parmer County shall be deposited in the jury wheel.

The Parmer County clerk shall be the official in charge of jury selection, the resolution said, the names being obtained from a list of registered voters.

The clerk is to store and keep the names and addresses of all Parmer voters from all precincts together in a safe place until the time provided by law for reconstituting the jury wheel.

Names of those voters who will be summoned for jury duty will be drawn from the

wheel prior to specific court dates by the county clerk.

The specially called meeting of the Commissioners Court came following an order received from the Texas legislature saying that the list of names used for selection of persons on jury duty be reconstituted annually and used for a period of one year only, rather than being used until each such list is exhausted.

Precinct Proposals Discussed By Court

Parmer County Commissioners Court conducted a lengthy meeting Monday at the Parmer County Courthouse, with many items concerning county business on the agenda.

One of the main topics of discussion was the second precinct proposal submitted by Bickerstaff, Heath and Smiley of Austin.

Their proposal for re-appointment of commissioner precincts in Parmer County according to population, as ordered by the Federal Voting Rights Act, brought the population figures closer together than their original proposal had done.

The new proposal shows a projected population division as follows:

Precinct 1, 2749; Precinct 2, 2720; Precinct 3, 2810; and Precinct 4, 2759.

"These figures will fit if the projected population is actu-

ally present in the area to be counted," said Parmer County Judge Porter Roberts. "Following a prolonged discussion of this proposed plan, it was approved unanimously to accept this proposal," reports Judge Roberts.

In other action taken at the meeting, the 1982 terms of court were set as follows: January, from January 1st to June 30th, and July, from July 1st to December 31st.

It was decided to pay each of the county's volunteer fire departments an annual subsidy of \$3,500.

In other matters concerning money, the court voted to pay \$1,597.42 to Bickerstaff, Heath and Smiley for their work through December 14, 1981, on the commissioner precinct re-appointment. Also, the court voted to pay one month's gas bill for a county citizen in the amount of \$47.28.

The holiday schedule for 1982 was approved showing county holidays as New Year's Day, Memorial Day, Independence Day, Labor Day, Veteran's Day, Thanksgiving and Christmas.

County Treasurer Benna Felts presented the quarterly report of county accounts to the court. The report will be published in the three county newspapers.

It was decided to advertise for a new car for the Parmer County Sheriff's department, with bids to be opened on March 8. Also, bids are to be accepted for a new county agent's pickup truck on January 25.

The court appointed Charles Turner of the Oklahoma Lane community as a member of the Board of Directors of the Central Plains MH/MR Center, filling the vacancy created by the resignation of Baker Duggins.

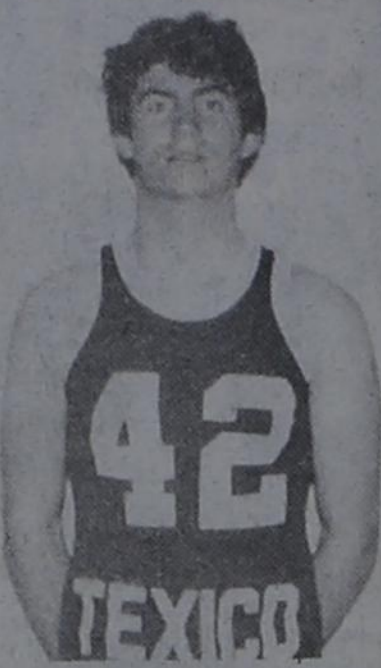

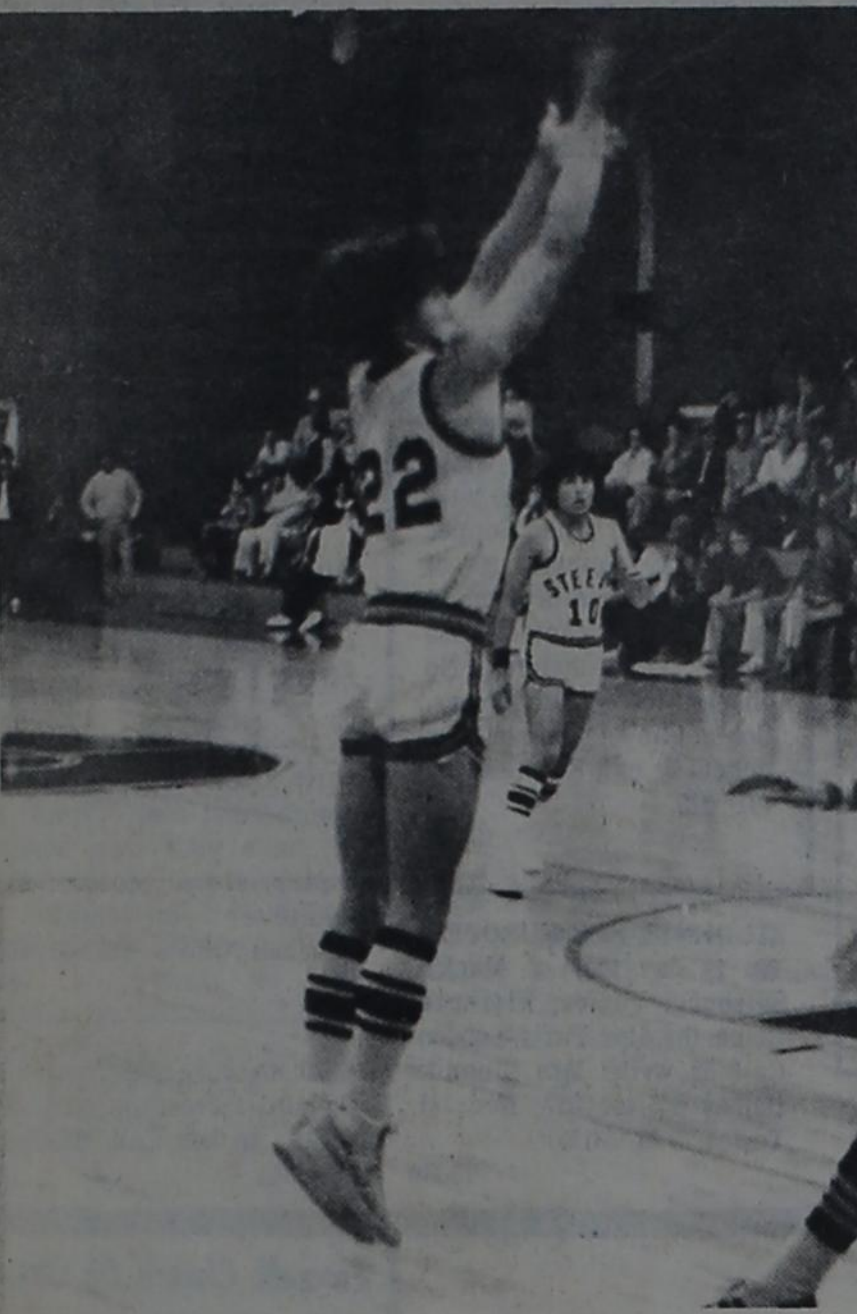

TWO MINUTES WITH THE BIBLE

THREE TIMES WHEN THE LORD WOULDN'T ANSWER

In the various accounts of our Lord's earthly ministry we find three occasions when He declined to answer those who appealed to Him or questioned Him.

First there is the Gentile woman of Matt. 15:21-28. Her daughter was possessed of a demon and in her trouble she appealed to the Lord to help her, "but He answered her not a word." Finally, in His grace He did help her, but not until He had taught her the lesson that as a Gentile she had no claim on Him. As Romans 1:28 tells us, the Gentiles had been "given up" because "they did not wish to retain God in their knowledge." In this connection we Gentiles should read carefully Eph. 2:11,12 and see how utterly without hope we are apart from the grace of God.

Next there was a Jewess, in trouble of a different kind. She had been caught in adultery and was brought to Him for judgment (John 8:1-11). Unlike the Gentile woman, she belonged to the chosen race and possessed God's holy law, a distinct advantage -- unless you are a law-breaker. Our Lord also helped her in grace, but not until He had demonstrated that the law is the great leveler of mankind, bringing all in guilty before God (Rom. 3:19).

But finally we find how it was that our Lord could show grace -- and do it justly -- to both Jew and Gentile, for in the third instance we find the Lord Himself in trouble. On trial for His life before the representatives of Hebrew and Roman law, He is accused of all sorts of wicked crimes. But on this occasion too, he declines to answer.

First Caiaphas, the High Priest said to Him: "Answerest Thou nothing? What is it which these witness against Thee? But Jesus held His peace..." (Matt. 26:62,63).

Next Pilate, the Gentile judge, said: "Hearst thou not how many things they witness against Thee? And He answered him too never a word; inasmuch that the governor marvelled greatly" (Matt. 27:12-14).

Why did our Lord not answer and defend Himself? Because He had come into the world especially to die for man's sins. Had the sinners of all ages been there to accuse Him of their sins, He would still have remained speechless for He stood there as man's representative, so that we might be "justified freely by God's grace, through the redemption that is in Christ Jesus" (Rom. 3:24).

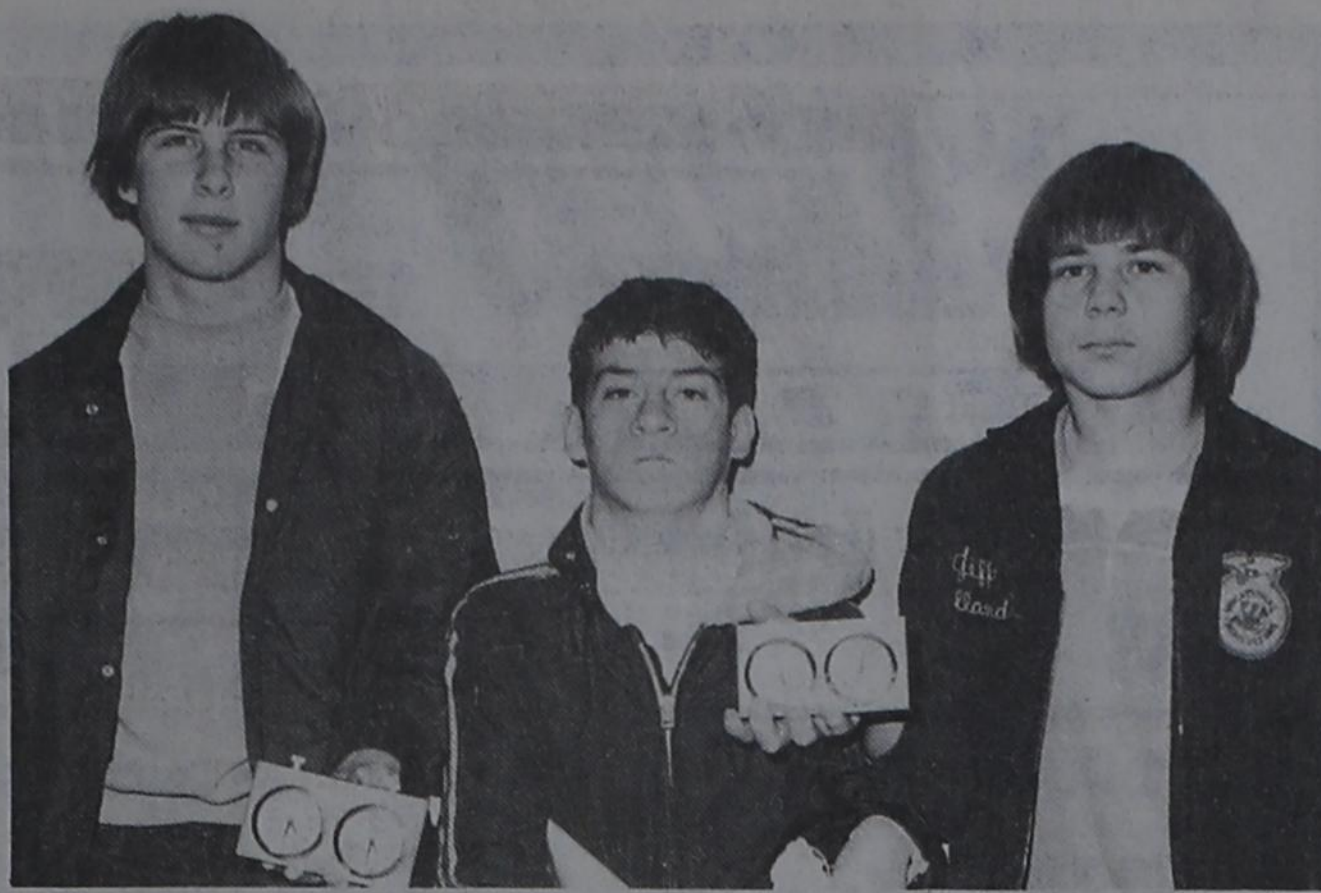
