

Parmer Redistricting Causes Two New Polling Places

 Parmer County Commissioners Court, after many months of debate and research, finally approved a new precinct redistricting plan whereby each county commissioner will have an equal amount of constituents to represent.

And not only do two of the county commissioners find themselves with a new amount of people to represent, but the county also finds itself with two new polling places which will make a total of 10. "That happened simply be-

cause it is a law that a polling precinct line cannot cross commissioner precinct lines. Because the redistricting plan divided Friona, the two new polling places had to be created," said Parmer County Judge Porter Roberts.

All of this redistricting of precincts and polling places came about because of the 1965 Federal Voting Rights Act which "tries to break down to one man, one vote," Roberts said. "Trying to get away from one commissioner having more control with votes than another," the judge explained.

It was voting place No. 2, or Friona, that gained the extra polling places, but the three polling places will be represented by three separate commissioners.

Roberts explained that all Friona voters used to vote in polling place No. 2, casting ballots at the Friona Fire Station. "Under the new set-up there will be voting boxes in three locations. Place No. 2 will still be at the fire station. Voting place 2-1 will be at the Senior Citizens Friendship House in Friona and voting place 2-2 will be at the

Community Center Show Barn in Friona," the judge said.

With the new redistricting plan, Precinct One, under Commissioner Ernest Anthony, will have a population of 2700. The polling places in this precinct will be No. 1, old Tri-County elevator office, (next to the Glynn Hamilton residence in Black); No. 8, J. Dee Willard residence; and No. 2-1, the Senior Citizens Friendship House.

Precinct Two, under Commissioner Jack Patterson, shows a population count of 2720. The voting spots will be

No. 3, Bovina American Legion Hall; No. 7, the Lutheran Church Parish Hall in Rhea; and No. 2-2, the Community Center Show Barn in Friona.

Precinct Three, under Commissioner Archie Tarter shows a population of 2810. Voting spots will be No. 4, the Parmer County Courthouse, and No. 6, the Oklahoma Lane Community Center.

Precinct Four, under Commissioner Raymond McGehee, will contain voting places No. 2, Friona Fire Station, and No. 5, Lazbuddie School.

According to Roberts, all the

commissioners are satisfied with the new plan. "They think it's as good as we can come up with," he said, adding, "We tried to keep the county roads a little more equally divided (per commissioner), but that was an impossibility."

An illustrated map showing the new precincts will be printed in upcoming issues of the Tribune, Roberts said.

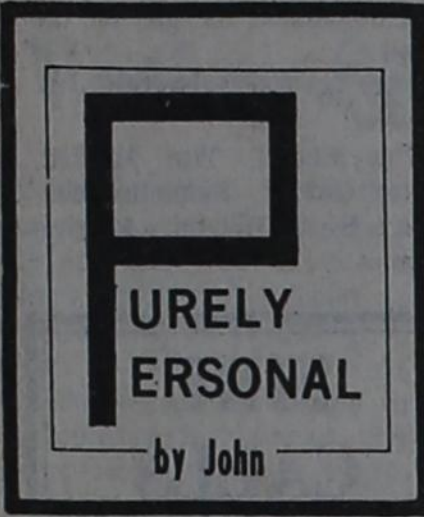
Earlier this year, the county hired the law firm of Bickerstaff, Heath and Smiley from Austin to devise the new precinct plan.

Roberts said the redistricting

attempt was based on an average figure of 2,700 residents, not voters per precinct.

The initial plan was submitted in December of 1981, but a recounting of portions of Bovina and Friona took place to verify 1980 census figures. The plan accepted by the court last Monday shows revised population counts as compared to the plan submitted in December.

"The commissioners will represent their area, but will look out for the good of the county as a whole," Roberts said.

As of this writing nobody has proved loss of life due to a nuclear electric generator accident. Tucked away in the back pages of daily papers is a constant stream of coal mine deaths.

Where are the high-powered television investigative reporters? Of course we know the answer to that, you can't scare a million people nearly as bad with a coal mine roof collapsing as you can with imaginary perils of an electric nuclear generator failure.

It may surprise the general public to learn that at least 20 scientific studies have looked into questions of overall safety and concluded that producing electricity from nuclear reactors is far less risky than producing electricity from burning coal.

This doesn't even take into account the loss of life from the mining of coal. Even a quick glance at scientific studies will show that nuclear generation of power is far safer to the general public than coal burning production of electricity.

Yet probably 80 percent of the average people will state that just the opposite is true. We think this sad state of complete public misinformation is a result of the news policies of the national news media with emphasis of the boob tube operators in particular.

Remember this when you place your trust in Uncle Double Dome as he reads the evening news in mellifluous tones. The face and the voice have very little bearing on the authenticity of what is being purveyed at the moment.

The Republic is in danger. Congress convened and all the political hacks are in full voice. We are at the beginning of what portends to be a very political year. We culled several political jokes that you will probably appreciate but the politicians won't.

I don't really like political jokes, because sometimes they get elected.

The reason a politician won all the outlying districts is because he could outlie everybody else.

Jr. Livestock Show Scheduled For Feb. 6

Approximately 30 Farwell youngsters have entered their hogs, sheep and steers in the annual Farwell Junior Livestock Show set for Saturday, Feb. 6, at the Preston Martin fertilizer barn, located north of France Irrigation on North Ninth Street.

"The show gives the kids the opportunity to work with their animal in a show ring before a large crowd, showing them exactly what their animal will do," explained Richard Montgomery, Farwell FFA advisor. "It also gives the animal a chance to calm down since, for many, it is their first time in the ring. The local show enables the kids to see what their animals will do in the show ring before they compete at the county show or the larger ones like Houston or Dallas," he continued.

This year's livestock event will begin with weigh-ins from 8-11 a.m. CST with the show starting at 1:30 p.m., beginning with steers, then lambs, then swine.

Judging this year's event will be Eddie West of Texico. West is the FFA advisor and

Vo-Ag instructor for Texico Schools.

As in years past, Farwell Jaycees will sponsor the show, with Jaycee President Mike Haseloff serving as show superintendent.

Worley Grain, Sherley-Anderson-Pitman and Security State Bank of Farwell will

furnish the trophies, ribbons and judge's fee.

Trophies will be awarded to grand champion, reserve champion and for showmanship in each division. Presenting the trophies will be Sheran Smallwood, FFA Sweetheart, and Shelly Ford, FFA Plow-girl.

There will also be a pee-wee division for children ages nine years and younger.

The Farwell 4-H Club, under the supervision of leaders Eva Dean Stephens and Anita Ralston, will operate a concession stand, assisted by the Farwell Young Homemakers. (Continued on Page 2)

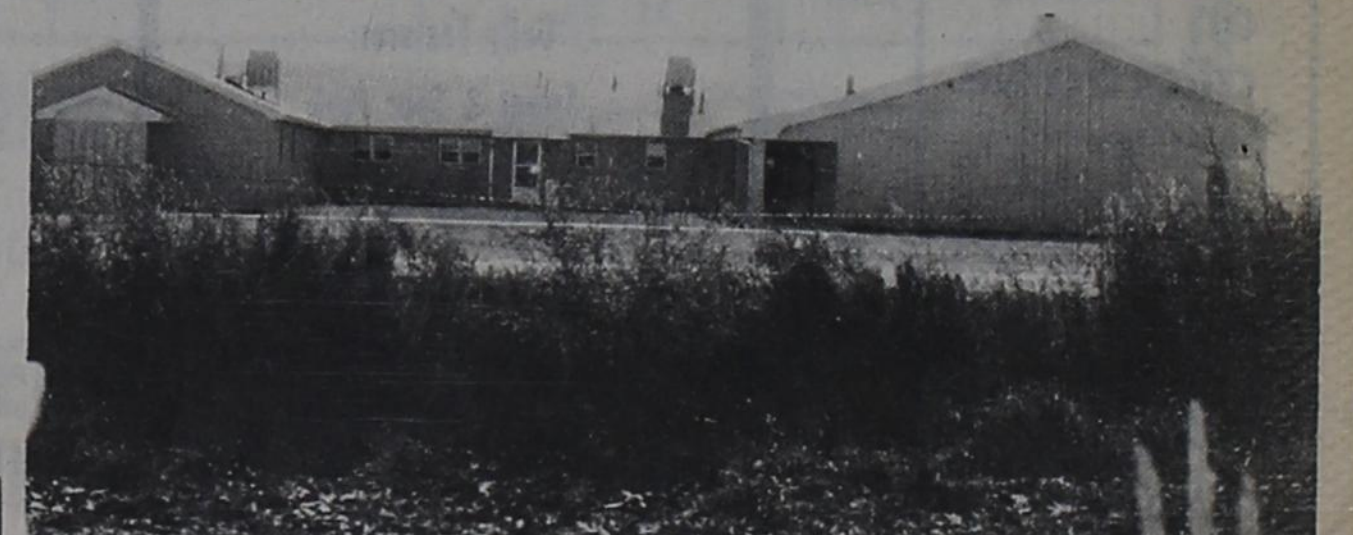

Circuit-rider preachers served the church until 1912, including Rev. L.L. Reeves and Rev. J.L. Bynum.

In 1912 the church called Rev. W.W. Taylor as its first full-time pastor. W.P. Wagner served as the first church moderator, and J.W. Johnson was the first church clerk.

In 1916 land was donated by Mr. C.H. DeLozier for the location of the first church building. The building was constructed in 1918 and that original building remained in use until 1974.

During the early years, baptismal services were conducted in lakes, stock tanks, and in neighboring Baptist churches.

Of the earlier pastors, two preachers, Benjamin Bedford and Tommy Nesbitt, were only 16 years of age when they began their pastorates at Pleasant Hill.

Past pastors of the local church include Walter Taylor, 1912-13; E.H. Harper, 1913-15; O.H. Hullinger, 1915-16; T.M. Blacklock, 1916-17; R.L. Day, 1917-18; Sam Culpepper, 1918-19; and J.F. Nix, 1919-22, who was pastor at Texico Baptist Church in 1919.

Other past pastors include H.P. Garrett, 1922-24; J.M. Rankin, 1924-27; T.J. Gamble, 1927-30; and R.L. Day who served the church for a third time in 1933-37.

From 1930-32, J.C. Banks served the church, and in 1932, A.L. Eaves was pastor. Rev. Harold Russ took Rev. Day's place in 1937, J.L. King came

in 1938, James Thacker in 1940, and R.A. Long in 1941.

Others included Benjamin Bedford, 1942-45; J.L. Carman, 1945-48; Clarence Moore, 1948-49; E.L. Hooker, 1949-51; Gene Hawkins, 1951-54; Charles Jones, 1957-61; Hugh Frazier, 1961-66; Billy Parvin, 1966-68; Tommy Farmer, 1968-75; Robert Roberts, 1975-77; Rick Parker, 1977-78; Phillip Shelton, 1978-79; and David Crow was interim pastor from 1979-80.

Bob Reid is now serving as the church's pastor with 219 enrolled members. Only 103 of those members are resident members.

In 1958 two classrooms and baptistry were built at the front of the auditorium. The original church building was torn down in 1974 and the educational space was completely remodeled. Seven new rooms were added.

An auditorium, constructed to accommodate 250 to 275 persons, was connected to the classrooms to form the present modern U-shaped church plant.

During the year 1981, refrigerated air was installed to replace the evaporative cooler system in the educational and fellowship area.

The first parsonage was a small wood frame house which was moved in on the east side of the church in 1915. Two additional rooms were also added. The house was again remodeled in 1959 with a bath and new kitchen cabinets added, and the front of the house was changed to face the west.

In August 1969, a modern three-bedroom house was moved in west of the church and bricked. Then in 1979 the addition of a new bedroom, utility room and double garage were finished.

According to Bro. Reid, the Pleasant Hill Baptist Church history has been collected and updated periodically by Mrs. Troy Lovett, an active member of the church for many years.

Commissioners Court Meets, Accepts Precinct Changes

Parmer County Commissioner's Court met Monday and voted to accept the latest proposals for changes to equalize the Commissioner Precinct according to popula-

tion, and to make the changes in other precincts to conform to the boundaries of the commissioner precincts as mandated by the Voting Rights Act of 1965.

Those attending the session to discuss the new precinct changes with the county court were Richard Collard, County Democratic Chairman, Bill Ellis, and Forrest Osborn, all of Friona.

In other business, the court approved a bid from Friona Ford Sales, Inc., for a new pickup for the County Extension Agent for Agriculture. The Friona firm offered a trade difference of \$7,803.18. It was also decided to pay W.

Doyle Elliott \$998.50 as attorney ad litem, Gordon G. Green \$250 as special juvenile judge, and Central Plains MH/MR Center for examination and evaluation of a Bovina juvenile for a hearing conducted for certification of the juvenile so he could be tried for crimes as an adult.

Other payments approved for payment by the county court included annual dues to the Panhandle Regional Planning Commission for \$717.47;

dues to the County Judges and Commissioners Association of Texas for \$100; and an annual assessment fee to the Ninth Administrative Judicial District in the amount of \$350.

It was also decided to pay those who counted the population in parts of Friona and a two-mile wide strip between Friona and Hub. The count was conducted in connection with the precinct changes.

The following soil conservation work was approved and

ratified, the work to be performed as soon as the machines are in that area and not demanded for use on the road:

Precinct 2, J.B. Barrett, J.B. Fowler.

Precinct 3, Tim Martin, Jeter Garner, Kenneth Johnson, Bert Wilson, Marlon Inman.

All of the candidates are incumbents with the exception of Max Carter.

Texico City Council conducted a short session Tuesday night, discussing several items of city business.

Among the topics of discussion was the delinquent utility accounts. It was decided that all persons with delinquent accounts are to be contacted and arrangements for payment to be made.

The city's swimming pool was also discussed and City Clerk Marie Christian is to have figures of past expenses at the next council meeting.

Texico-Farwell Senior Citizens were granted permission to paint the organization name on their building door. Repairing of the building's rear entrance was also discussed.

A posted sign was placed at the KK Runnels park lake and it states that absolutely no one

is allowed inside the fenced area, with the exception of city employees.

The water improvement project bond ordinance resolution was approved, and according to Mrs. Christian, the only thing delaying the city's water project is the signing of easements, which is taking place now.

Mrs. Christian said bids for the project will be let in late February or early March if all goes as planned.

Those attending the Tuesday night session at Texico City Hall were mayor John R. Hadley; trustees Vane Doshier, Lewis Cooper and Donnie Morris; employees Mickey Fenn, Marie Christian, Billy Hammit and city attorney Harry Patton.

"The show helps to motivate the kids to get ready for the Parmer County Stock Show," Ralston said. "It also helps to get the animals prepared."

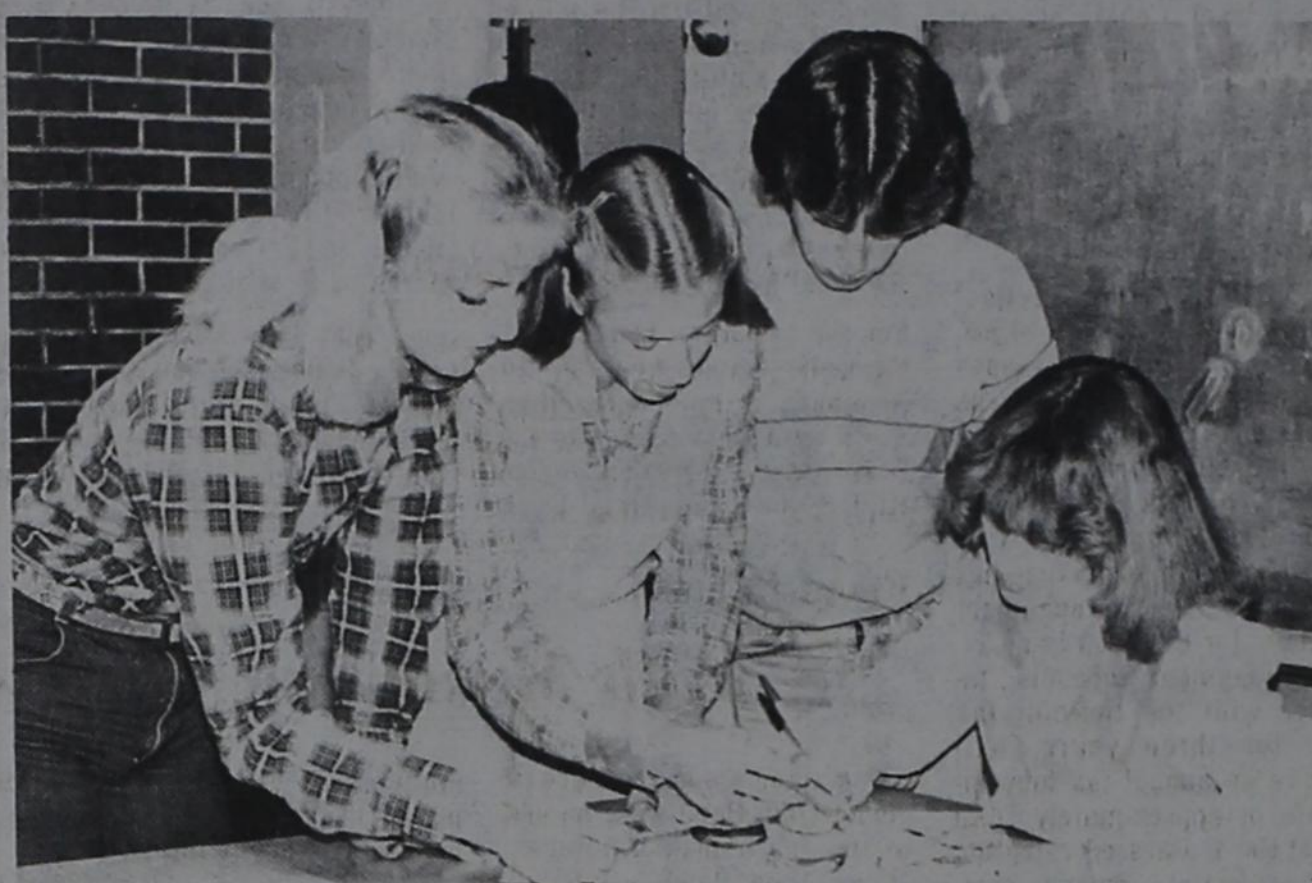
This year's county show is slated to coincide with FFA Week, and will be held February 18-20.

School Bond Issue Voting Set Tuesday

Tuesday, Feb. 2, is the day Texico Municipal School voters will decide whether or not to pass a \$320,000 school bond, as well as a two-mill tax levy, to assist in the funding of a \$1 million educational facility to be constructed across the street from Texico High School.

If approved by the voters, School Superintendent James Pierce will then request capital outlay funding from the State Education Department in New Mexico for the remainder of the building costs for the multi-purpose room and classroom facility.

Voting in the election is not restricted to property owners, but is open to all registered voters in Curry or Roosevelt counties who live within Texico Municipal School District.

Voters in Curry County precincts 1, 2, 3, 11, 16, 17 and 18, and Roosevelt County precinct 1 will vote at Texico City Hall between the hours of 8 a.m. and 7 p.m. MST.

Pierce points out that the tax increase for voters will not be significant when compared to the 1980 school taxes.

Local funds will be a little less than one-third of the total construction costs, the state contributing the rest of the costs if the school's request for state funding is filled.

If Texico voters give the go-ahead, their portion of the bill will amount to \$371,819, then Pierce will request \$701,700 in a capital outlay fund grant, and \$40,527 in a one-year two-mill tax levy match.

During the 1980-81 school year, the tax rates were 16.599. If the two-mill levy passes Tuesday, the tax rate will be 16.520 for the 1982-83 school year. For the current 1981-82 school year, the tax rate is 11.798.

The board of education has proposed a six-year repayment schedule for the bond issue.

This payment schedule, together with the two-mill tax levy for three years, will require an annual tax levy increase of approximately \$6.70 per \$1,000 of assessed valuation for residential property owners.

Designed by Kilmer and Associates, architects from Clovis, the proposed educational facility will mean more space for school programs in addition to providing three extra classrooms for Texico Schools.

If approved, the new tax rate will appear in the November 1982 tax notices, and there will be no change in taxes during this school year. Pierce has stressed that the bonds will not be sold until the state funds have been received.

If all goes as planned, construction of the new facility may begin the latter part of this summer.

For example, if a taxpayer's property has an appraised value of \$15,000 and an assessed valuation of \$5,000, the cost increase will be \$33.50 per year, or \$2.79 per month.

"Voters must approve both the bond issue and the capital improvements tax levy in order for us to qualify for the state monies," Pierce said. "We sure would like to see everyone turn out for the election and show their support," the superintendent added.

Following the incident, Ortiz, who was arrested with another Bovina juvenile, underwent testing to be tried as an adult in the case.

His companion in the incident, a 14-year old female, was released to her parents.

A chimney fire can usually be controlled and possibly extinguished by dumping a large quantity of coarse salt on the fire in the fireplace or stove.

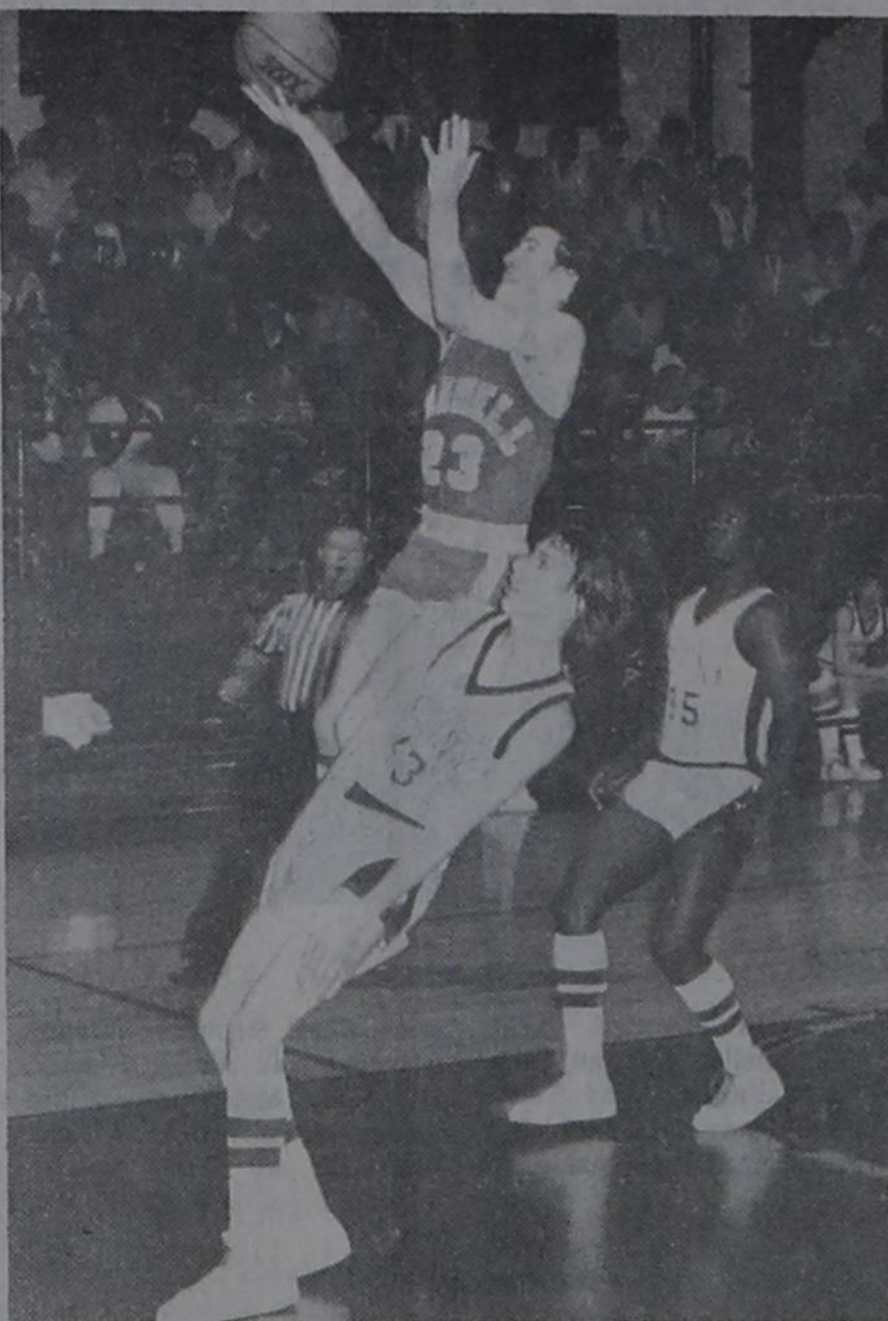
Despite being outscored 21-10 in the second quarter, Farwell was still in the contest at the half, down by only 11, 33-22.

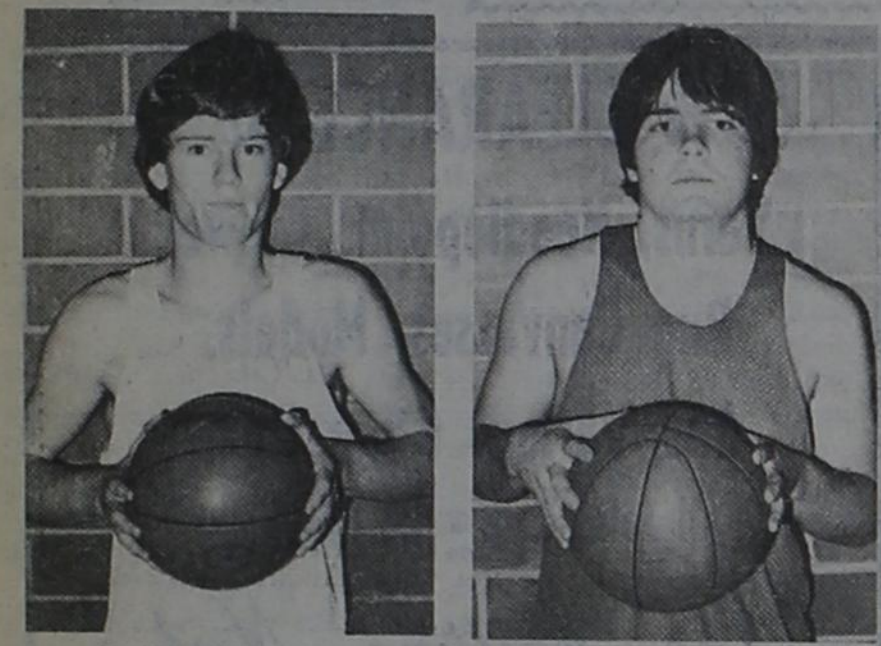
The Steerettes' scoring was shared by only six players, with Janene Berry's 15 points tops in the effort. Close behind was Ginger Ellison's 11 markers.

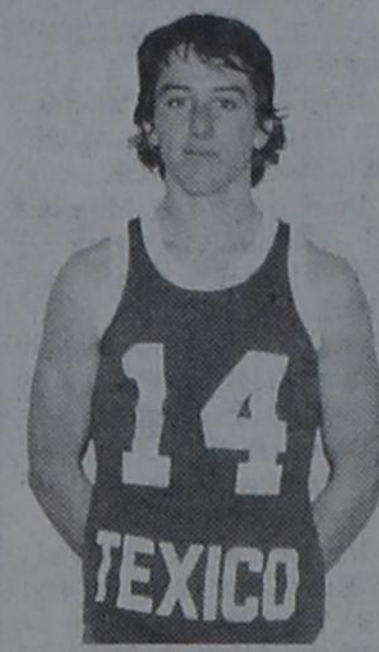

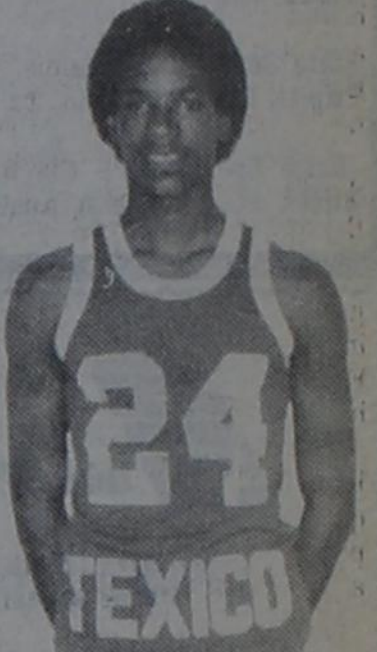
Texico Boys Capture Second, Three Named All-Tournament

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Self Defense Program Given To Texico Girls

"There are things you can do everyday to make it less likely you will become a rape victim," said Becky Vandiver of the Clovis Police Department to several Texico students this week.

Ms. Vandiver, along with Nancy Lockart, presented a self defense and rape prevention program to Texico junior high and high school girls because "anyone can be a victim of rape," she cautioned.

Precautions which should be taken every day according to the officers include: lock your

car, look in the back seat of a car before getting in, stay in groups, don't walk alone and don't accept rides with people you don't know.

"When you answer the door, don't let them know you are alone," she said. "Lie if you have to."

The police officer also explained that "if you are ever in a situation you need to get control of yourself. Establish where you are... look at the assailant and determine his mental state... and determine your chances of getting away."

"Sometimes you can talk your way out of it. It may sound silly, but it works," she said. The officer explained different ways of talking to an assailant and things one can do. "Yell 'Fire!' You are sure to get some help because everyone wants to see a fire."

She also cautioned about using mace. "Mace can be very dangerous because the assailant could take it away from you and you would be helpless. You also don't want to use mace on a crazy person or drunk person or one who is on drugs. It just makes them worse," she explained.

Ms. Vandiver added that Clovis has a Crisis Center where victims of rape or assault can get help, the phone number is 763-5959.

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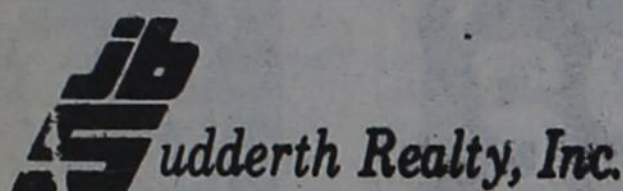

In a few years he was known as a rich man, investing in timber acreage in the far northwest and eventually owning valuable land by the thousands of acres, the very finest timber in the country. 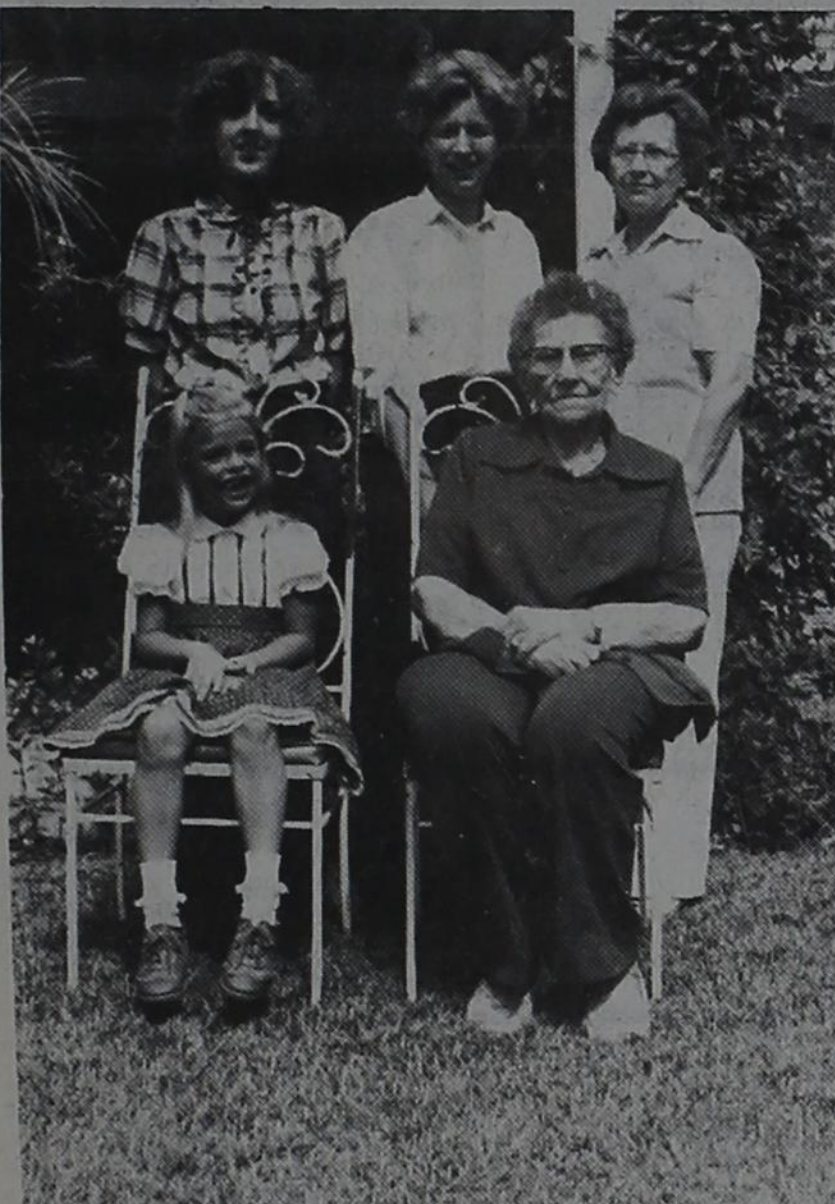
