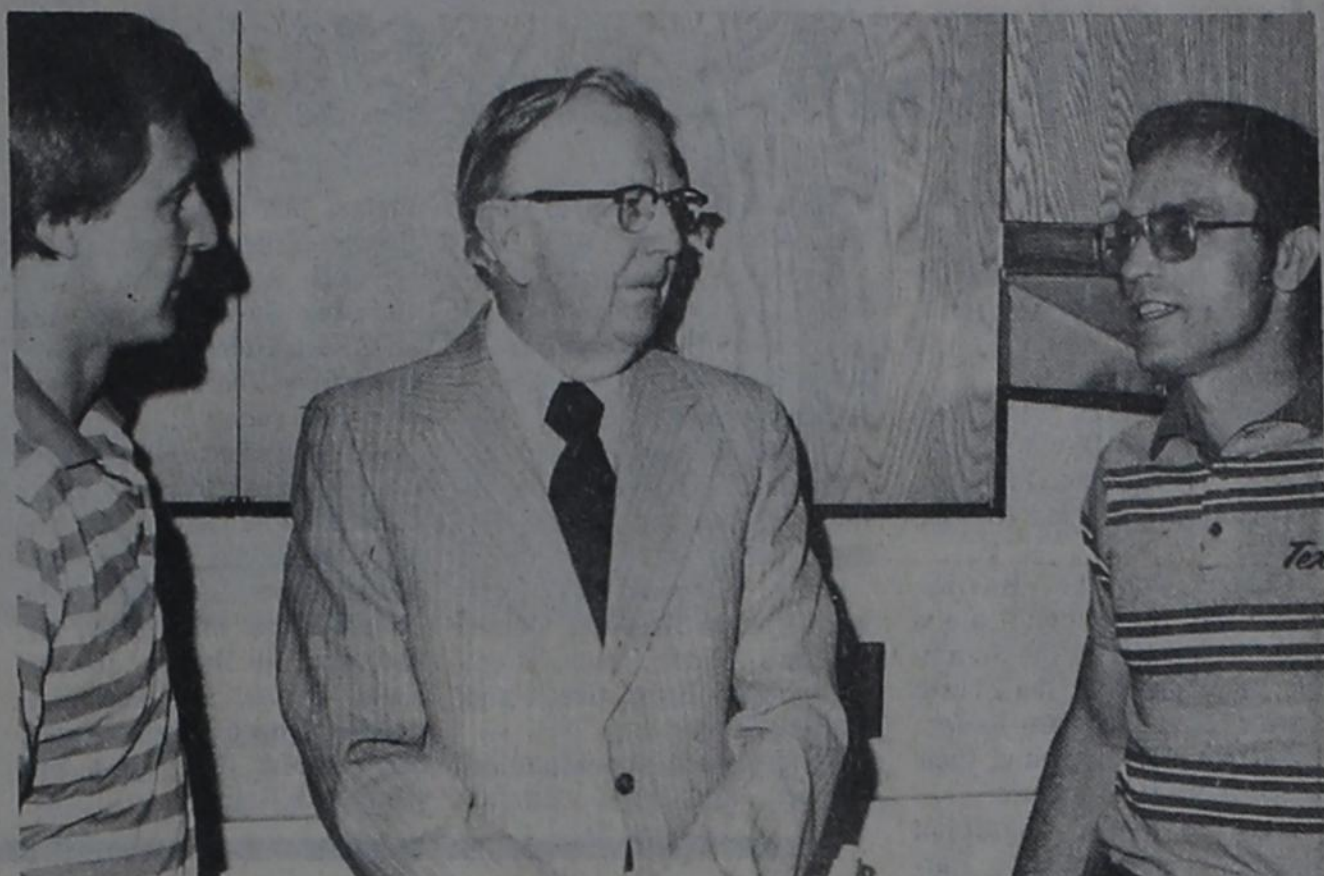

Texico boys squad had ever competed at state level. Then, 20 years later in 1960, the Green and White once again went to state competition. Now, 22 years later, the Wolverines are again competing at the Class A Boys State Basketball Tournament in Albuquerque. At a special

luncheon given for the team by parents and booster club members, McDonald told the 1982 team, "Don't think that it's that last basket or foul shot that wins the game. It's how you play during the entire game that wins it or loses it for you. Remember, the idea is to put the ball in the hole."

Texico Boys To State - -

It's Been A L-O-N-G 22 Years

The last time a Texico boy's basketball team saw action in a state tournament, the current Wolverine squad members hadn't even been born yet. And the time before that, in 1940, the 1960 team members hadn't been born yet.

Now for the first time in 22 years, only two years off of what seems to be a pretty regular cycle for Texico boys, the 1982 Wolverines are in state roundball competition at Albuquerque.

With a 20-5 season record and a 10-0 slate in district, the local squad was to have met Wagon Mound at 8:30 p.m. Wednesday night at Valley High School gymnasium. If victorious over that team, Texico would then see action in "the pit" at the University of New Mexico arena Thursday at 2 p.m. MST pitted against the winner of the Cliff/Encino match on Wednesday.

Coached by Ken Shaw and Scott Parker, Texico boys scored a total of 1,659 points

that season, averaging 66.36 points per game. Their hopes of a district crown were dashed, however, when arch-rival Floyd took that title, as well as the regional crown from them, giving Texico a second place district and regional ranking.

"We only have 5 losses this season and I feel really good about that," said Coach Shaw before heading to Albuquerque. "We lost three times to Floyd, a team who has seen state action many times before, and twice to Ft. Sumner, the team rated number one in Class AA schools this year. Our boys don't need to be ashamed of those losses," Shaw said.

If the boys make it through semi-finals action Thursday they will play in the finals on Saturday at 7 p.m., also at the UNM arena.

The last time a Texico boys squad made it to state level competition, they were defeated in the first round of play by Eunice, 57-31.

Members of the 1960 team, coached by Paul Frederick, Curtis Miller and C.B. Stockton, were, Charles Stockton, Don Johnson, Dwight Turner, Wesley Engram, Kenneth Murdick, Urel Doran, Bobby Walker, Bill Reid, Tommy Standefer, and Leon Kelley. Team manager was Frederick Meier.

In 1940, the boys were coached by A.D. McDonald. When they made it to the State Tournament, they were eliminated after losses to St. Michaels of Santa Fe and Aztec.

Members of the 1940 squad, included Jack Flye, J.C. Boone, John Taylor, Duane Ford, J.D. Thompson, Louis Vaughn, Leonard Flye, Frank Thompson, Murray White, Milton Beck and Paul Skaggs.

An interesting note concerning the 1940 team was that in that particular issue of the State Line Tribune, a page-one plea was made to all Twin

Cities residents asking for help in raising \$100 so the boys could attend the state tourney. One hundred dollars probably won't pay for one boy's expenses this week, let alone for the entire team to go!

Coach Shaw said he scouted the Wagon Mound squad last week and reports that "they are not very tall, but very, very quick." Shaw said he feels "pretty good" about his team's chances at a first round victory, and says the Wagon Mound boys use the same sort of defense used by Texico district opponents, such as Floyd.

It should be noted that Texico junior varsity boys completed an impressive 12-0 season this year under the direction of Scott Parker, so it is probably a safe bet that it won't be another 20 years before the Green and White sees state level competition again.

Assault Attempts Reported

Two separate cases of attempted rape were reported this week by two unidentified women, according to Parmer County Sheriff Bill Morgan.

Morgan said his department is seeking two men in the attempted rapes, saying, "There is no possible way the men could even be connected," as one is described as a 40-50-year-old white male, while the other is described as a Mexican male in his 20's.

The first incident occurred Friday, March 5, at approximately 9 p.m. in a Farwell business. The victim reports that her assailant, armed with a pocket knife, fled the scene before completing the act.

Morgan said the victim does not live in Farwell or Texico, but is from the area, and she said that she did not recognize the man as being from this area.

The assailant is described by the woman as a white male, 45-50 years old, 5'8" to 5'9", "heavy in build with a pot belly." He had light blue eyes and greying brown hair, according to the report.

The second incident occurred Tuesday morning, March 9. Sheriff Morgan said the victim was hitchhiking through Farwell when she was picked up by a Mexican male driving an old white car with black interior. The driver then took the victim to a dirt road south of Lariat and threatened her with a knife.

The victim, who told the sheriff that she had taken a self-defense course, defended herself and the driver forced her out of the car.

The assailant is described by the victim as being a Mexican male in his 20's, 5'5" and 140

pounds. He had a mustache and extremely protruding or "buck" teeth. The victim said his front teeth were spaced and stained.

Morgan said that neither victim required medical treatment.

In other action this week, Gloria Leal, 23, of Bovina was arrested and charged with aggravated assault. Leal was released on \$2,000 bond, Morgan said.

Don Bandy of Bovina reported that a vacant house and barn owned by him was broken into approximately two weeks ago. Bandy said a saddle and bridle were stolen, with a total value of \$225.

Roy Donaldson of Oklahoma Lane reported that a window was broken out of his tractor. The vandalism occurred sometime within the past few weeks.

W.O. Chadwick of Farwell reported that an overhead gas tank was broken into northeast of Farwell the night of March 5. It is unknown how much gas was stolen.

Santa Fe Railroad authorities reported an incident of vandalism which is believed to have occurred around February 20 or 21. Officials say that vandalism to a motor grader, spike setter and signal light took place approximately 10 miles northeast of Farwell, resulting in \$325 worth of damage.

Farwell Fire Department Will 'Rattle' For Funds

In an effort to raise more funding to pay for the Farwell Volunteer Fire Department's pagers, the department is sponsoring a "Rattlesnake Show and Demonstration" Saturday, March 20, and Sunday, March 21.

Local snake hunters and handlers Bobby Vinton, Ted Magness and Doug Sobin will put on the demonstration. Admission to the event, which

is to be at the Farwell Jaycee Hut, will be \$1 per person.

The first demonstration will take place Saturday night at 7 p.m. CST, and the second will be on Sunday at 3 p.m. CST.

All proceeds from the show, which will include the milking of snakes and tips on how to recognize various types of snakes, will go to the Farwell Volunteer Fire Department.

Absentee Voting Set For April 3 Elections

Registered voters who will be unable to make it to their respective polling places April 3 for the School Boards, Hospital Board and City Bingo elections, may make application for an absentee ballot beginning Monday. Absentee voting will be March 15-30 for the April elections.

To vote in the upcoming elections, either by absentee or on election day, a person must have been registered to vote before the March 4 deadline.

To be approved for an absentee ballot, a voter must

show just cause why he or she will not be able to cast a ballot in person on election day.

The City of Farwell is asking voters to decide whether or not the game of bingo should be legalized here. Voting will take place at Farwell City Hall, and city clerk Janie Bowery advises that application for an absentee ballot must be made at City Hall during regular business hours.

"Once their application is approved I will either give them or mail to them an

absentee ballot," she said.

Farwell School Board and Farwell Hospital Board will be conducting a joint election at the Parmer County Courthouse April 3, both seeking to place new members on their respective boards.

Application for an absentee ballot in these two elections must be made at the Parmer County Clerk's office during regular business hours.

Four two-year terms are up for election on the Farwell

Hospital Board. Those seeking election to that post are Tom Nichols, Ralph Franse, Bert Williams and Troy Christian.

Seeking election to the Farwell School Board election for one of the three, three-year terms are Delton Wilhite, Floyd Coates, Eddie B. Smith, Wilbert Kalbas, Steve Pierson, Debbie Woodson and Maxine Williams.

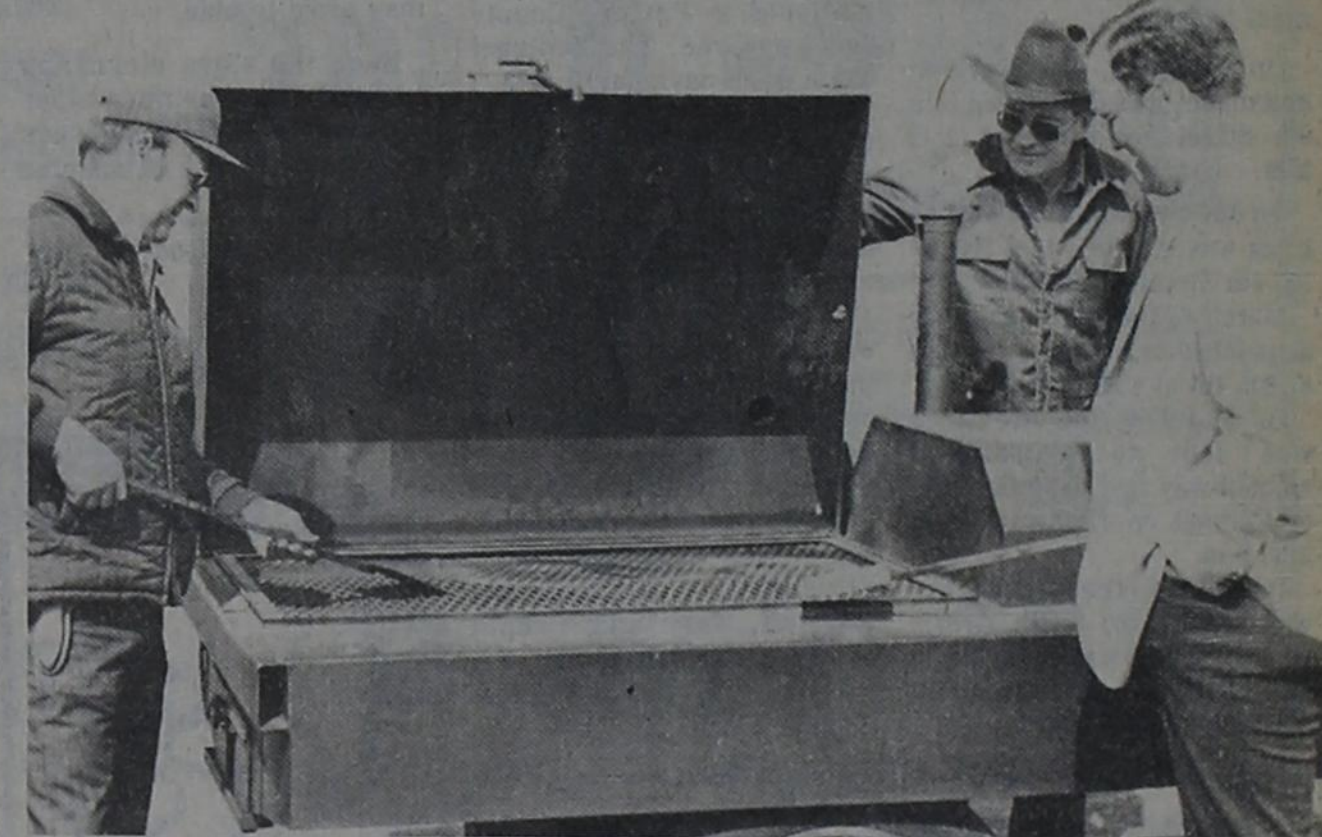
Seeking election to the one-year unexpired term of Billy Mayfield will be LaVerne

Stanton and Sandra Turner, aides.

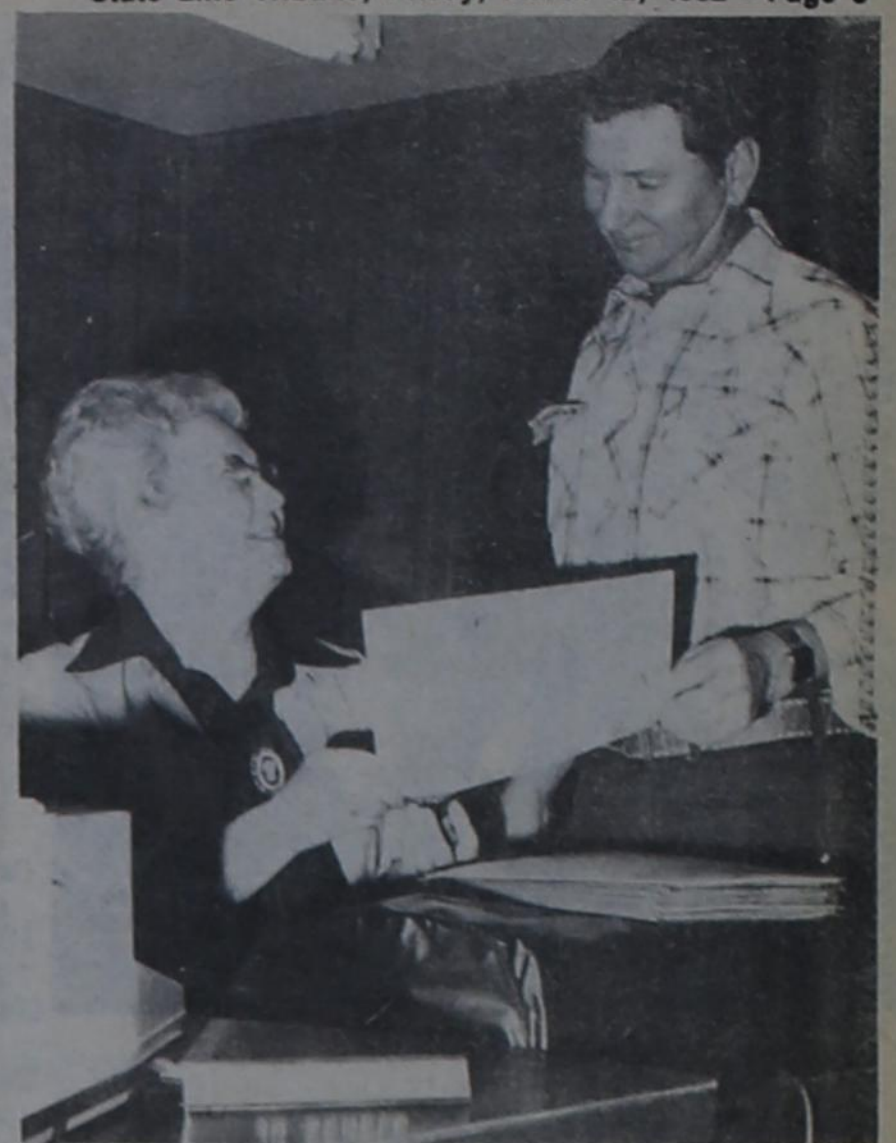
Contracts of the support staff for Plan A Special Education Coop were also renewed.

Farwell Fire Siren To Switch Circuits

Farwell Volunteer Fire Chief Joel White met with the Farwell City Council Monday night and requested that the current fire siren system be changed from telephone circuits to the department's new encoder system.

"The changeover will cost approximately \$1200 to \$1300, but it will save the city \$52.20 each month for the circuits you're paying for now from the telephone company," White explained.

The fire chief said he has been dissatisfied with the telephone company siren hook-up for quite awhile, explaining that "anytime the phone company is working on the lines they set off the siren. Texico had this problem years back with lightning. The new system would go through the sheriff's office through the encoder system. The dispatcher could set off the siren by pressing two or three digits on the encoder," White said.

White told the council that the expense for the change should be a "one-time cost" and added, "I sure would like to see you change it."

The city fathers approved the change of the siren system and the fire chief said his next step will be to meet with a representative from the Motorola Company to request the changeover.

White also told the council that his department is running approximately \$1700 short on donations for the fire department's new pagers, saying that he doesn't know if he'll be receiving more donations from area citizens or not.

In other action with White, the city fathers appointed him as official voting representative with the Panhandle Emergency Medical Services.

The council also discussed

the city's upcoming annual paving project, saying the work will have to begin the latter part of May or middle of June. Advertisements for bids will take place before a contractor is approved for the project.

Pay raises for the full-time city employees were approved by the city fathers, and Frank Ancira was hired as a part-time employee in the sanitation department.

A discussion took place about the possibility of raising garbage collection rates, but Councilman Fred Chandler said, "The garbage department is not losing money. I know we reported that, and it looks like that on paper, but it is not. The entire sanitation department is lumped together, like street work and clean-up and repairs, but garbage collection is not losing money."

Chandler ended the discussion of hiking the rates by saying, "I just don't think we ought to go up on the rates as long as we have money in the bank."

Roberts Hears Cases

Parmer County Judge Porter Roberts heard three cases this week, one involving the theft of railroad cross ties, one for driving while intoxicated, and the third for criminal trespassing.

Joseph Kirkpatrick, 33, of Albuquerque was arrested March 3 for stealing eight cross ties along the railroad right-of-way. Kirkpatrick was fined \$250 plus court costs and sentenced to 30 days in jail. He was given a six-month probation sentence.

Visiene Intaavongsy, 24, of Amarillo, charged with DWI, was fined \$150 plus court costs and sentenced to 20 days in county jail, and given six months deferred adjudication.

Sammy Spring, 18, of Bovina, charged with criminal trespass, was fined \$100 plus court costs and sentenced to 30 days in jail, probated 180 days.

In the court of Justice of the Peace Albert Smith, Somchay Sithirath, 21, of Amarillo, was charged with public intoxication and was fined \$31.

Want to "make a million" in the next 30 years?

You can invest your money in an individual retirement account (IRA).

An IRA is a personal tax-sheltered retirement savings plan for all workers - including those covered by a pension or profit-sharing plan.

You can set aside up to \$2,000 per year and deduct the amount you invested from your gross income.

An IRA is fast becoming a "little guy's" tax shelter since it reduces tax obligations and income. It's an investment that can be deducted.

No taxes need be paid on the IRA until amounts are withdrawn beginning at age 59 1/2 or later.

How does it work? If you save the maximum amount - \$2,000 a year is the highest amount - you set aside about \$38 per week.

In 30 years, at a 12 percent annual interest rate, your investment will have grown to about \$1 million.

Working spouses can double the maximum amount of savings. They can set aside up to \$4,000 a year.

In addition, couples with only one working spouse can have an IRA for a non-working spouse.

Such a couple can contribute

up to \$2,250 a year and divide the amount as they desire.

And you aren't limited to only one IRA so long as the total annual contribution to all accounts doesn't exceed \$2,000.

Equal deposits to two or more accounts could enable you to compare performance so long as service charges don't eat the differences in earnings.

IRA options are offered in a variety of places, including banks, savings and loan associations, credit unions, mutual funds, insurance companies, stock brokers and the U.S. Treasury.

But, remember to study the terms and conditions of the IRA plan before you invest - there is no ceiling on what rate of interest can be paid, so the amount of earnings can vary from place to place.

You should also know what charges, if any, will be made for opening or managing an account as well as transferring funds from one account to another.

You are allowed to switch funds once a year if you are unhappy with the performance of your IRA.

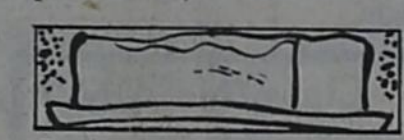

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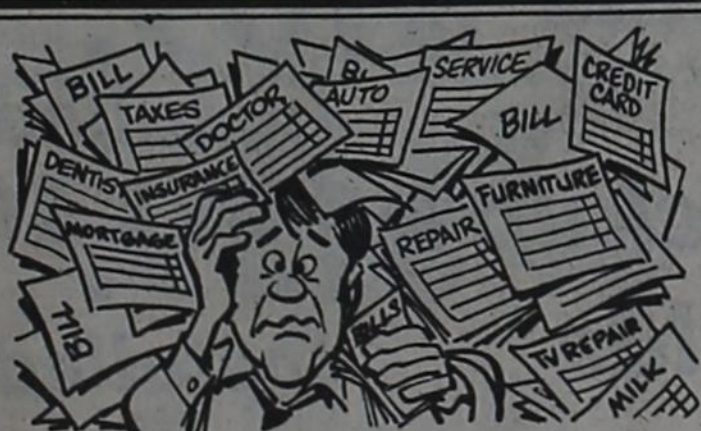

night at Luce's Restaurant and adopted the same schedule for the Little League and Pee Wee teams as last year, the season to begin around the middle of May.

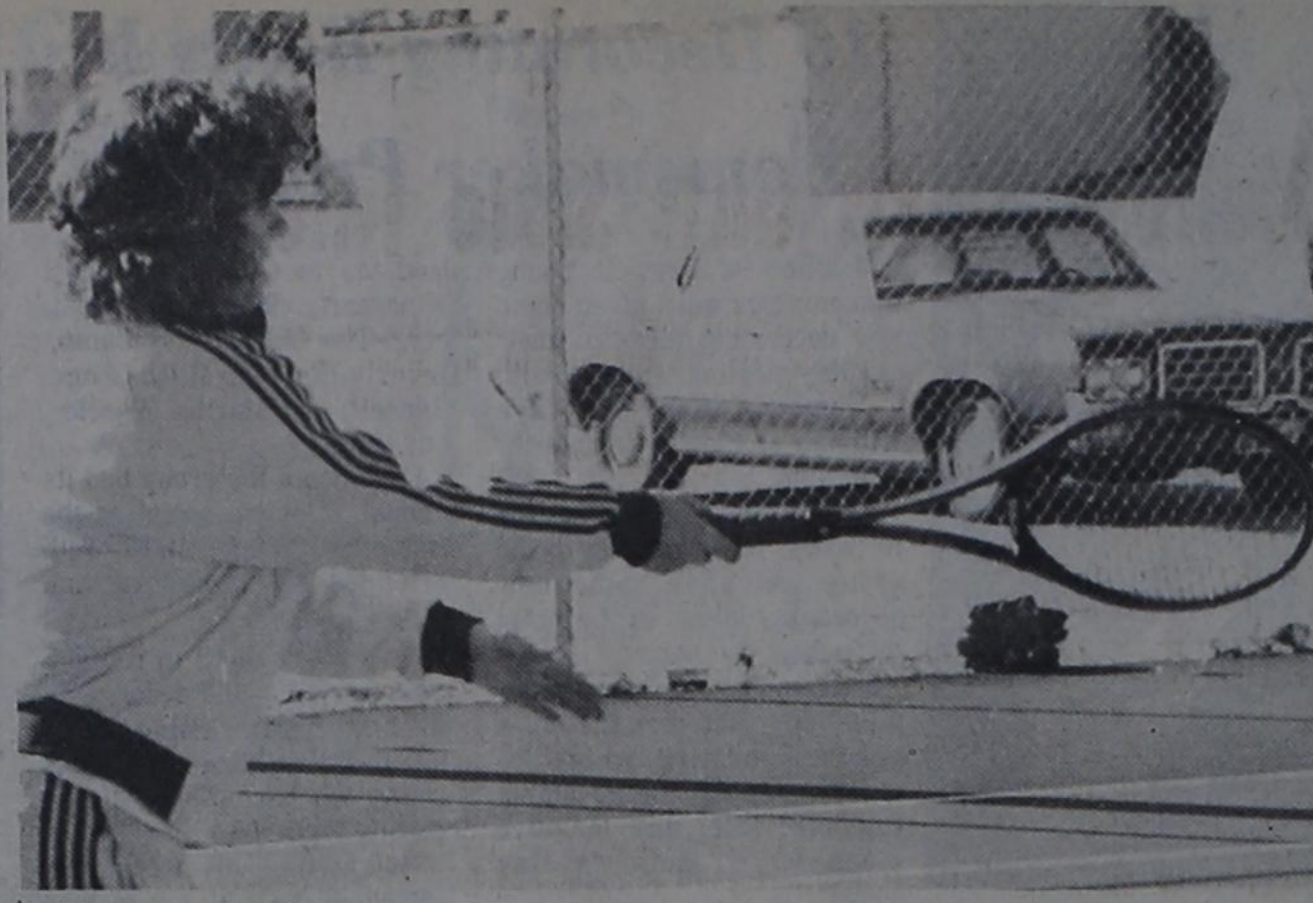

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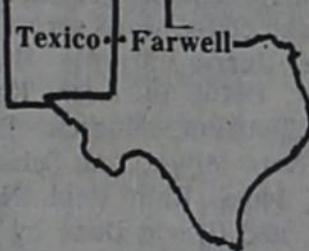

Thorn-In-The-Side Melrose Steals Girls State Title

Just like a bad penny, the Melrose girls basketball team keeps showing up at just the wrong time.

After rolling over two opponents in last week's State Class A Girls Basketball Tournament in Albuquerque, the Texico Lady Wolverines saw their hopes of retaining their 1981 crown another year dashed as district rival Melrose rose to the occasion and grabbed the title away.

The rival teams began on opposite sides of the tournament bracket, only to find themselves facing each other for the sixth time this year under the nets for the championship round of the state tournament.

"Melrose has a good team," said Texico Coach Roy King following his squad's heart-breaking 43-30 loss to the Lady Buffalos. "It's hard playing the same team six times. Both teams know exactly what the other will do. But we got beat, that's all there is to it. We have no excuses," the coach reflected.

This is the second time this school year that neighboring Melrose has snapped up a state

title from the Texico girls. The first time was last fall when they took the girls state title in volleyball.

Then last week the Lady Buffs snatched up Texico's reigning regional title in basketball as well.

"I feel especially bad for our seniors, Tracy Dobbs, Jill Jesko and Lisa Crooks. I would like to have seen them end their senior year season with a state championship," King said.

The local squad began their defense of the Class A title last Thursday with an easy 63-32 win over Cimarron, sending them to semi-final play.

Texico got off to an early start against the Cimarron Rams, leading at the half 28-15.

In the third period the Green and White drilled in 14 points and hit for 21 points in the fourth to take the game by the 31-point margin.

"We threw the ball away a little too much against Cimarron," said King. "We got in a hurry-up game during the second half and made some silly mistakes."

Ruth Scott hit for 31 points during the opening round of the

state tourney, followed by Tracy Dobbs with 8; Jill Jesko and Cheryl Scott, 6 each; Valda Cavallero and Sharlet Taylor, 4 each; Chary Jesko, 2; and Dana Morris and Lisa Crooks, 1 apiece.

R. Scott led at the boards with 17 rebounds, followed by Jesko with 11. Others who rebounded were Dobbs, 7; Taylor and C. Scott, 3 each; Cassie Chavers, 2 and Morris, C. Jesko, Cavallero and Karen Snodgrass, 1 each.

Against Weed in the semi-finals, Texico took a slim 5-point win of 38-33 to advance them to the title round.

"We had trouble handling the ball during this game," the coach said. "We were lucky to win."

The coach also said that the girls only shot 31 times from the field, connecting with 15. King said that the Green and White will usually shoot 50 times a game.

The local girls drilled 14 points during the first quarter, holding Weed to only 6. During the second stanza, both squads hit for 10 points, but Texico still had the advantage and led 24-16 at the intermission.

Five unanswered points from Weed in the third quarter fueled a Lady Bulldog comeback, but the Green and White still held onto its lead. Equal scoring in the final stanza

narrowed the point spread, but Texico was the winner with a 38-33 final.

R. Scott hit for 30 points, followed by Crooks with 4 and Taylor and C. Scott with 2 each.

At the boards were R. Scott with 15; Jesko with 8; Dobbs with 4; Taylor and C. Scott, 3 each; and Crooks, 1.

As Texico was edging its way through the bracket, so was arch-rival Melrose, and once again the two found themselves pitted against each other in a title bout.

It was a slow start for the Green and White, managing only one basket in the first quarter to fall behind an 8-2 tally.

But the Lady Wolverines got warmed up with each play, and outscored the Lady Buffs in the second quarter to trail by only four points at the intermission, 17-13.

Things really got underway for the Wolverine girls in the third quarter, and everyone was doing exactly what they were supposed to be doing, narrowing the gap to only 3 points, when center Ruth Scott was felled with a knee injury.

The injury was severe enough to put the all-stater from last season and state tournament high scorer out of the game.

"Ruth going out hurt us a

lot, but we should have never been in that situation. We should have been ahead of Melrose by that time. They beat us fair and square," King said.

With Texico's inside shooter out of action, Melrose took advantage and pitched in 17 buckets compared to only 7 from the Green and White, giving them the victory with a 13-point edge.

But having Scott taken out of the game wasn't the only thing that hurt the 1981 state champs. Freezing cold shooting from the floor didn't help either.

"We just didn't hit our shots. And I think we were a little timid sometimes in that we didn't go inside more," King said.

For her three quarters of play, R. Scott hit for 12 points, followed by Dobbs with 6; Jesko, 4; C. Scott and Karen Snodgrass, 3 each; and Crooks, 2.

"Karen Snodgrass was a tremendous help in the game. She got in there and made things happen," the coach said about the 5'6" freshman. "Cassie Chavers also did a good job."

"Overall, I was very proud of the way the girls played. Even in defeat, they acted like champions. I think everyone should be proud of them," Coach King said.

THE WAY TO HEAVEN

Perhaps you have heard the story of the man who inquired from a mountaineer the way to a certain destination. The mountaineer stammered and stammered and finally said: "You can't get there from here."

We may smile at this, but the results would be even more amusing and sad - were we to ask the average person on the street the way to heaven.

What is the way to heaven? It is interesting to read in God's Word what many think about this. In Proverbs 14:12 we read: "There is a way that seemeth right unto a man, but the end thereof are the ways of death."

ORDINANCE NO. 218

AN ORDINANCE GRANTING CERTAIN RIGHTS AND PRIVILEGES TO THE MOUNTAIN STATES TELEPHONE AND TELEGRAPH COMPANY, ITS SUCCESSORS AND ASSIGNS

BE IT ORDAINED by the City Commission of the City of Texico, State of New Mexico:

SECTION 1. Grant of Authority. There is hereby granted by the City of Texico, hereinafter called the "City," to The Mountain States Telephone and Telegraph Company, its successors and assigns, hereinafter called the "Company," the non-exclusive right and privilege to construct, erect, operate and maintain, in, upon, along, across, above, over and under the streets, alleys, public ways and public places now in use or dedicated, and all extensions thereof, and additions thereto, in said City, poles, wires, cables, underground conduits, manholes and other communications fixtures necessary or proper for the maintenance and operation in said city of the Company's communications business; provided, however, that no poles or other fixtures shall be placed where the same will interfere with sewers, electric lights, traffic control devices, water hydrants or water mains and shall be placed in such a manner as to cause a minimum interference with the rights or reasonable convenience of property owners who adjoin any of said streets, alleys or public ways and places.

SECTION 2. Use of System by Municipality. The City shall have the privilege, during the life of this franchise, free of charge, where aerial construction exists, of maintaining upon the poles of the Company within the City limits wire and pole fixtures necessary for a police and fire alarm system, such wires and fixtures to be placed and maintained under the supervision of the Company. The City in its use and maintenance of such wires and fixtures shall at all times comply with the rules and regulations of the Company, and the provisions of the latest edition of the National Electrical Safety Code, so that there may be minimum danger of contact or conflict between the wires and fixtures of the Company and the wires and fixtures of the City. It is further agreed, in order to avoid danger to life and property, that said police or fire alarm wires or other fixtures will not be exposed, without the consent of the Company, to the danger of contact with any conductor carrying a voltage greater than the normal telephone voltage. The City shall be solely responsible for all injury to persons or damage to property arising out of the construction or maintenance of said police and fire alarm fixtures, or arising out of the attachment, maintenance or removal of said wires and fixtures to the poles of the Company. In cases of rearrangement of the Company's plant, or removal of poles or fixtures, the City shall care for or remove its own fixtures, and shall save the Company harmless from any damage or injury to persons or property, including property of the City, arising out of the removal or construction of its wires or other fixtures.

It is understood and agreed that if and when the City or the Company design underground facilities, they will consult with each other as to including each other's facilities in proposed underground installation.

SECTION 3. Company Liability. The Company shall, at all times during the life of this franchise, be subject to all lawful exercise of the police power by the City and to such reasonable regulations as the City may, by resolution or ordinance, hereafter provide. It is expressly understood and agreed by and between the Company and the City that the Company shall save the City harmless from all loss sustained by the City on account of any suit, judgment, execution, claim or demand whatsoever, resulting from negligence on the part of the Company in the construction or maintenance of its telephone system in the City. The City shall notify the Company representative within ten days after the presentation of any claim or demand either by suit or

otherwise made against the City on account of any negligence as aforesaid on the part of the Company.

SECTION 4. Housemoving and Other Unusual Use. Any person or corporation desiring to move a building or other structure along, or to make any unusual use of, the streets, alleys and public ways of the City which shall interfere with the poles, wires or fixtures of the Company or the City, shall first give notice to the Company or the City, as the case may be, and shall pay to the Company or the City, as the case may be, a sum sufficient to cover the expense and damage incident to the cutting, altering and moving of the wires or other fixtures of the Company or the City, and before a permit is given by the City therefore, the applicant shall present a receipt from the Company showing the payment. Thereupon the Company, upon presentation of said permit, shall within a reasonable time thereafter provide for and do such cutting, altering and moving of said wires and fixtures as may be necessary to allow such moving or other unusual use of the streets, alleys and public ways of the City.

SECTION 5. Consideration. As a further consideration for this franchise, the Company shall pay to the City an amount equal to two percent (2%) of the gross revenues, exclusive of all federal and state excise taxes, received for local exchange service furnished to subscribers to the Company, not including uncollectable revenues related to that service, within the City of Texico. Payment shall be made in quarterly installments within sixty (60) days after the end of each calendar quarter during the term of this franchise.

SECTION 6. Inspection of Books. The City shall have the right, at all reasonable times, to inspect the books and records of the Company pertaining to the Company's gross revenues for local exchange service received from telephone subscribers located within the limits of the City.

SECTION 7. Services Provided to City. The City agrees to pay to the Company in accordance with standard tariff schedules the rates and charges for all telephone service of any description whatsoever rendered by the Company to the City, except the cost, value or rental of attachments made by the City to the poles of the Company as provided in Section 2 hereof.

SECTION 8. Payment in Lieu of Other Taxes. In consideration of the payments hereinabove provided for, it is expressly understood and agreed by the Company and the City that the payments above specified shall be in lieu of any and all franchise, license, occupation, or any other form of excise or revenue tax (except general ad

valorem property taxes, sales or gross receipts taxes, special assessments for local improvements, standby charges, fees for trench excavation permits, sidewalks permits, and curb and gutter permits) based upon or measured by the revenue, employees, payroll, property, poles, wires, instruments, conduits, pipes, fixtures or other appurtenances of the Company, and all other property or equipment of the Company or any part thereof. Said payments shall continue only so long as the Company is not prohibited from making the same by any lawful authority having jurisdiction in the premises, and so long as the City does not charge, levy or collect, or attempt to charge, levy or collect any of the forms of taxes specified above in this paragraph; and if any lawful authority having jurisdiction in the premises shall hereafter prohibit such payment or payments, or if the City does levy, charge or collect or attempt to levy, charge or collect any of the forms of taxes specified in this paragraph, the obligation to make such payments as hereinabove provided shall be abated to the extent such other forms of taxes are levied, charged or collected by the City.

SECTION 9. Non-waiver of Other Rights. It is expressly understood and agreed by and between the City and the Company that neither the grant nor acceptance of this franchise shall constitute a waiver, either upon the part of the Company or the City, of any rights or claims had or made by either with respect to the occupancy of the streets, alleys, and public places of the City, under the laws of the Territory of New Mexico and under the Constitution and general statutes of the State of New Mexico, nor shall anything herein in anywise prejudice or impair any rights or claims existing independently of this franchise of the City or the Company, or its predecessors or successors, with respect to the construction, operation, and maintenance, either before or after the life of this franchise of a telephone system in the City.

SECTION 10. Term of Franchise. The franchise and rights herein granted shall continue in force and effect for ten years.

SECTION 11. Effective Date. This Ordinance shall become effective thirty (30) days after its enactment; provided the Company, within said thirty (30) days, shall have filed with the City Clerk of the City of Texico an unconditional acceptance thereof. Within ten (10) days after the filing of said acceptance the City Clerk shall acknowledge in writing the receipt of said acceptance.

SECTION 12. Severability Clause. If any section, subsection, sentence, clause, word or phrase of this ordinance is for any reason held to be unconstitutional or otherwise invalid by any court of competent jurisdiction, such decision shall not affect the validity of the remaining portions of this ordinance. The Council, the Governing Body of the City of Texico, hereby declares that it would have passed this ordinance and each section, subsection, sentence, clause, word or phrase thereof irrespective of any one or more sections, subsections, sentences, clauses, words or phrases being declared unconstitutional or otherwise invalid.

Explains H.B. 885

Homeowners who are 65 years of age or older and failed to receive their school district homestead exemptions in 1979 have until April 1 of this year to do so. In this way, elderly homeowners will be able to take advantage of the tax freeze associated with the \$10,000.00 homestead exemption.

According to a law passed by the Special Session of the 67th Legislature, over-65 homeowners who qualified for the school homestead "tax freeze" in 1979, but did not apply for the limitation, may file an application with the chief appraiser of the appraisal district in which the home is located.

Applications must be made with Mrs. Patsy Nance before April 1, 1982.

To qualify for the tax limitation, on January 1, 1979 a homeowner must have satisfied these requirements:

- Be 65 years or older
- Own his home
- Use that home as his principal residence

The chief appraiser will consider all applications and notify each applicant before April 15, 1982. If the application is approved, the chief appraiser will make an entry on the appropriate school district's 1982 appraisal records.

This entry will indicate the amount of tax the over-65 taxpayer should have paid in 1979, had he been granted the \$5,000.00 general homestead exemption and the \$10,000.00 over-65 homestead exemption. No refunds of taxes paid will be given for 1979, 1980, or 1981.

For 1982, the taxpayer's

amount of homestead taxes paid may not exceed the amount of taxes the school district would have imposed on the homestead for 1979, had the taxpayer been granted his homestead exemptions. This frozen tax amount will remain in effect as long as the homestead remains the same.

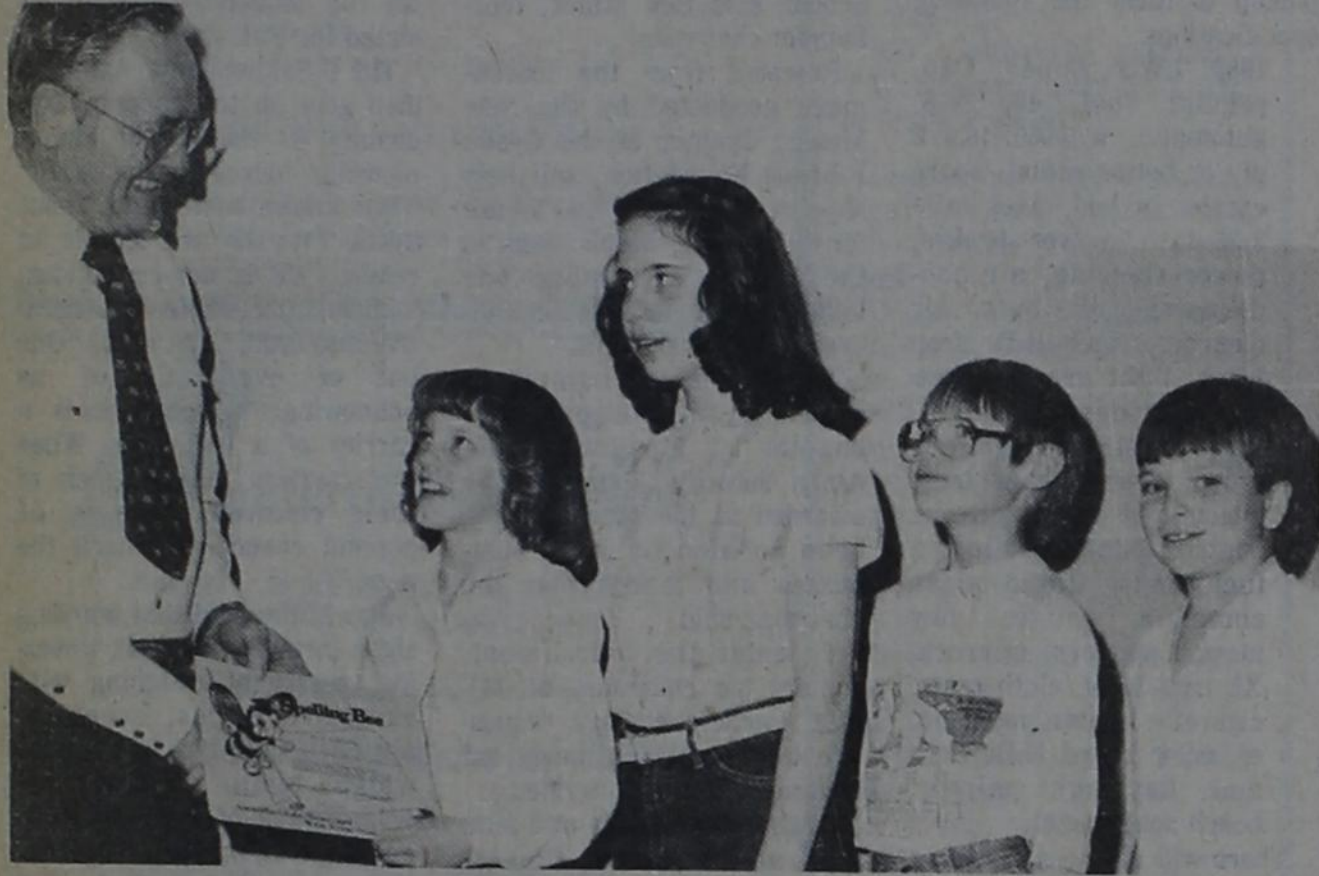
