Watson Wires Information To Local Chamber Of Commerce

FUNDS AVAILABLE FOR IMMEDIATE USE

Improvement Include Two New 3,000-Foot Runways

The Department of Commerce Friday approved an application for a grant of \$25,944.67 to be used in effecting improvements on the Big Spring airport.

Announcement of the action which will bring two 3,000 feet hard surfaced runways and other needed improvements to the local port was made from Washington by C. T. Watson, chamber of Commerce, manager.

"This means \$25,944 are available for immediate use," said Watson in a message to the chamber.

Granting of the sum assures local officials that there will be no curtailment in proposed improvements.

Plans for the port project were drawn by City Manager E. V. Spence, who estimated that \$26,000 would be needed to make the improvements of permanent value.

Pat Landman, department of commerce aeronautics engineer, had at first told local officials that little more than \$14,000 would be recommended for the Big Spring port.

Improvements include construction of two runways built on caliche base, 3,000 feet long and 100 feet wide, made of asphalt topping with rock aggregate; fencing of the port properties; repainting of border lights; repainting of the down town sign directing flyers to the port.

Application for the grant was dependent upon action of the city commission in agreeing to lease the port for a period of five years. The city agreed to do this for a consideration of \$1 per year plus net operating revenues.

However, realization of the grant can be largely attributed to the generosity of the American Airways, which maintains a refueling stop here on its transcontinental route.

American Airways, through C. R. Smith, vice-president, agreed to increase the annual lease price from \$900 to \$1,350 provided the improvement.

COLEMAN (AP)—Three men robbed the First Coleman National Bank of about \$24,000 Friday, kidnaped six employes and officers, releasing all but one two blocks away.

Charles Woodruff, assistant cashier, was knocked unconscious and loaded into the robbers' car as they fled.

The men entered the bank half an hour before opening time, made the porter lie down on the floor and waylaid other employes as they entered the bank.

The robbers waited for the time lock to open vault, scooped up the money, herded employes into a car and then fled.

The car was headed toward Brownwood and Cisco when last seen.

Woodruff was released an hour later at Santa Anna.

Nations Owing U. S. Denied Credit In Johnson Bill

WASHINGTON (AP)—The senate Friday passed the Johnson bill, this time with the administration's support, to deny new credits in this country to all nations behind in debts to the American government.

The retaliatory measure, putting debt defaulters on notice anew that the United States expects payment of war and post-war overdues, was sent to the house.

The bill provides for a \$10,000 fine and five years imprisonment to any person or corporation which buy or sell securities or loan money to defaulting countries.

450 Million More For CWA Work Is Asked

WASHINGTON (AP)—Immediate appropriation of \$450,000,000 to carry on the Civil Works program for its four million employes and 2,500,000,000 for direct relief, was recommended to the house Friday by the appropriations committee.

Simultaneously the committee released an account by Harry Hopkins, CWA relief administrator, that even with Civil Works request \$100,000,000 higher than originally intended it was impossible the CWA program would last through May.

Hopkins told the committee that unless immediate action was taken the \$400,000,000 originally allotted for CWA would be exhausted February 9th and there will be no funds to meet the huge payroll.

Hopkins said 9 percent of Texas families were on relief payrolls and 11 percent of families of the entire nation were receiving relief.

Negro Dies In Electric Chair

HUNTSVILLE—Without uttering a word, Frank Flowers, 34-year-old negro, walked stolidly into the death chamber at its state penitentiary here early Friday and was electrocuted for the slaying of Mrs. Reba Carney, a white woman he admitted shooting to death in a robbery at Waco last November 25.

He was strapped in the electric chair at 12:04 a. m. and was pronounced dead at 12:12 p. m.

Student Meets Death On Road Near Roscoe

Accident Occurs When Another Strikes Trailer On Side Of Road

SWEETWATER — A desire to continue his studies for the ministry indirectly proved fatal early Tuesday night to Ertis Robinson, 21, young Plainview graduate of Wayland College, when he succumbed here to injuries received in an automobile crash about a mile and a quarter northwest of Roscoe on State Highway No. 7.

Young Robinson, en route to Abilene to enter Simmons University to continue his Bible studies, was driving a light car which was pulling a trailer in which there were two cows. He planned to sell milk at Abilene to defray his expenses through the Baptist educational institution.

Between Car and Trailer
The trailer became disconnected from the car and he was working between the car and the trailer when another car crashed into the trailer, crushing his body between the two vehicles.

The car which sideswiped the trailer was occupied by R. C. Miller and N. R. Clements, en route from Snyder to Sweetwater.

Was Killed Here
Dr. J. W. Young of Roscoe happened to pass the scene a few minutes after the accident and rushed the youth to the Sweetwater sanitarium for medical attention. Death came shortly after his arrival here, the injuries proving fatal at 12:30 a. m.

Drivers of the car which sideswiped the trailer said there was no tail light on the vehicle, and that they were blinded by lights of an approaching car.

Inquest Underway
Inquest proceedings were under way at 10 o'clock Wednesday morning in Judge I. W. Brashear's justice court, but no charges had been filed in the case at 1 o'clock.

The youth was identified by his name in a new Bible which was found in the car.

His parents, Mr. and Mrs. F. T. Robinson, of Plainview, were notified and arrived here early Wednesday morning. The only other survivor is a sister, Miss Adele Robinson of Plainview. E. M. Hatton and Miss Evelyn Hatton, friends, accompanied the Robinsons here.

The body was prepared for shipment to Plainview for burial by the Dotson-Yates Funeral Home, left here at 11:25 Wednesday morning, it being planned to hold funeral services at Plainview Thursday afternoon.
