# Twin Cities' Girls Are District Champs!!

Farwell Steerettes, for the first time since 1976, and Texico Lady Wolverines, for

the second consecutive year, did something last weekend only a few teams can boast

about... they triumphed under the nets to win their respective district crowns.

In doing so the two teams advanced to higher level roundball competition, the Farwell girls to bi-district Tuesday night, the Texico girls to regional this weekend.

In taking their first district crown in six years, the Steerettes rolled over defending district champions Springlake-Earth last Friday night at Muleshoe in the final round of district tournament playoffs.

Farwell had an impressive 9-1 district slate entering the district playoffs, seeded number one. They first met Hart under the nets on Thursday night before advancing to the district finals against Springlake. Both squads were defeated by the local girls.

A special pep rally and trophy presentation was held Tuesday for the Steerettes at Farwell gymnasium. Athletic Director Bruce Dollar presented the gold basketball district trophy, which is engraved with each of the player's names, and that of

Coach Vester Joiner, to the coach and his players. That night the girls headed

to Hereford pitted against Hale Center in the bi-district game. Hale Center came out strong,

and sent Farwell's team home with their first loss since (Continued on Page 2)

## Car Caravan Organized To Meet Secretary Block

Departing from Muleshoe State Bank Thursday, Feb. 25, at 6 p.m. will be a car caravan of farmers, businessmen and agricultural family members, traveling to Lubbock for a meeting with U.S. Secretary of Agriculture John Block.

Organized by Johnny St. Clair of Muleshoe, the caravan is to arrive in Lubbock at the Municipal Coliseum at Texas Tech in time for those involved to attend the "Town Hall" meeting with Secretary Block.

The "Town Hall" meeting is slated to begin at 8 p.m., and according to June Saylor, National WIFE President, "The meeting is going to be a chance for us to meet with

Block and talk about our problems. He is coming out here to see if the situation is as bad as we have said it is." She explained further by saying, "What we really desperately need is to meet in a civilized manner and talk to Mr. Block. He is a farmer and understands the way a farmer thinks. We just have to be able to get it across to him," she said, referring to recent agricultural troubles.

"In the near future, we will see Emergency Rural Crises Meetings being called throughout the farm areas, in an effort to unite the farmers," Mrs. Saylor said. "We can either stand together, or we will go

down, one by one. We are not being paid attention to because we are not demanding it. We have to make enough noise out here, out in the grass roots, to make ourselves heard."

Mrs. Saylor continued by saying, "I urge and challenge every farmer, every wife, every business person to attend this meeting in Lubbock. We are getting a chance to be heard and that doesn't come along very often. We need to make the most of it, in an orderly fashion."

## Two Friona Men Arrested On Barn Burglary Charge

Two Friona men were arrested Monday in connection with the burglary of the Jimmy Grimley barn north of Friona, an incident which is believed to have occurred early February 18.

Roque Mendez, 26, and Lewis Vasquez, 25, were arrested by

Parmer County Sheriff's deputies with assistance from the Friona Police Department, according to Sheriff Bill Morgan, who said the two are currently in Parmer County custody awaiting a grand jury hearing.

Morgan said several of the

items believed to have been stolen from the barn were recovered at the time of the arrest, and several more of the missing items were found later at the home of one of the arrested men in Friona.

The sheriff said the first group of missing items recovered had been sold, following the burglary, and his department recovered them from the place to which they were sold.

He explained further that after the arrests were made, his department executed a search warrant, also done with the assistance of the Friona Police Department, and recovered many more of the missing items at the arrested man's residence.

Among the items listed as being stolen from the barn include a welder, two bench grinders, an air compressor, a tool box and tools, a carburetor, and a TV antenna.

Morgan said the exact value of the stolen items was not known at presstime, but said, "I'm sure it will be several hundred dollars."

In other action this week at the sheriff's department, Farwell Fertilizer reported that sometime over the past weekend, four tires and wheels were stolen off of a trailer and some gasoline had been siphoned from a company truck.

Company officials say the missing items are worth approximately \$225.

Twin City Machine Works reports that some junked cast iron was stolen from its premises last weekend, saying the missing iron is worth \$100.

## April Elections - -

# March 3 Is Deadline For Candidate Filing

Wednesday, March 3, is the deadline to file for candidacy in any of the three upcoming April elections, including the Farwell School Board, Lazbuddie School Board and the Farwell Hospital District.

All the elections will be Saturday, April 3, and absentee voting will be March 15-30.

Voter registration deadline is Thursday, March 4, at 5 p.m.

In the Farwell Hospital District election, four two-year terms are up for election. The positions are currently being filled by Gwen Hughes, Ralph Franse, Bert Williams and Troy Christian.

To file for candidacy, an application may be picked up at the Farwell Clinic, and returned with 10 signatures of registered voters by the March 3 deadline.

At presstime this week, no one had declared candidacy for the election.

A nominating committee has been appointed, consisting of board members whose terms are expiring.

Absentee voting for this election will take place at the Parmer County Clerk's office March 15-30, Monday through Friday, from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m.

Regular voting will be from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. April 3 at the Parmer County Courtroom.

The Farwell School Board election, also slated for April 3, will be conducted to fill the vacancies of four trustees.

Nominated to run for the three, three-year board terms are Wilbert Kalbas, incumbent; Floyd Coates and Maxine Williams.

Lee Hutchins, nominated by the committee to be placed on the ballot, withdrew his name this week, citing the fact that his wife Gloria is a first cousin of athletic director Bruce Dollar. A school board member may not be related to a faculty member.

The nominating committee met again Monday night and voted to place the name of Delton Wilhite on the ballot in Hutchins' place.

Nominated to run for the unexpired one-year term of

Billy Mayfield are Lavern Vaughn and Darrell Stephens. Filing for a position on the ballot for a three-year term were Debbie Woodson, and Steve Pierson.

A three-year term were Debbie Woodson and Steve Pierson. School Superintendent W.M. Roberts advises that although a nominating committee has met and proposed the above mentioned persons as candidates for the election, anyone may still file for candidacy, and may do so at his office by the March 3 deadline.

Board members whose terms are expiring are Wilbert Kalbas, Bill Martin and Caroline Anderson. Billy Mayfield submitted his resignation, effective April 2, at the board's last monthly meeting.

Absentee voting in this election will take place March 15-30 at the Parmer County Clerk's office.

Billie Blain will serve as election judge for both the school board and Hospital District election on April 3. (Continued on Page 2)

## Texico JV Boys End Season With Slick 12-0 Record

Chalking up a shiny 12-0 season record isn't easy, but the Texico JV boys basketball team did just that this past season, and their coach, Scott Parker, says it is mainly because "our kids worked hard all year, and did a lot more than what was asked of them. A couple of our competing teams were extremely tough, and I was especially proud of the way our kids hung in there and stayed with it."

Two of the toughest competitors the junior Wolverines encountered during the season were Grady and Bovina. The Grady game was won in overtime play by Texico by six points. Against Bovina, the JV squad pulled off a last-second effort to take the game by a one-point margin.

Parker says another reason that his team was successful

over the opposing squads was that his boys "are pretty aggressive. And they went to the boards well all year."

The coach explained that his team is taught to "react before they think. It will be the person who reacts first who grabs that loose ball or rebound," Parker said. Reaction time is especially important in capitalizing on the other team's mistakes, the coach said.

Texico averaged 54 points per game, compared to 37 for the opponents. The Green and White had an average of 20 fouls per game, stole the ball almost 18 times every game, and grabbed back 45 rebounds per game.

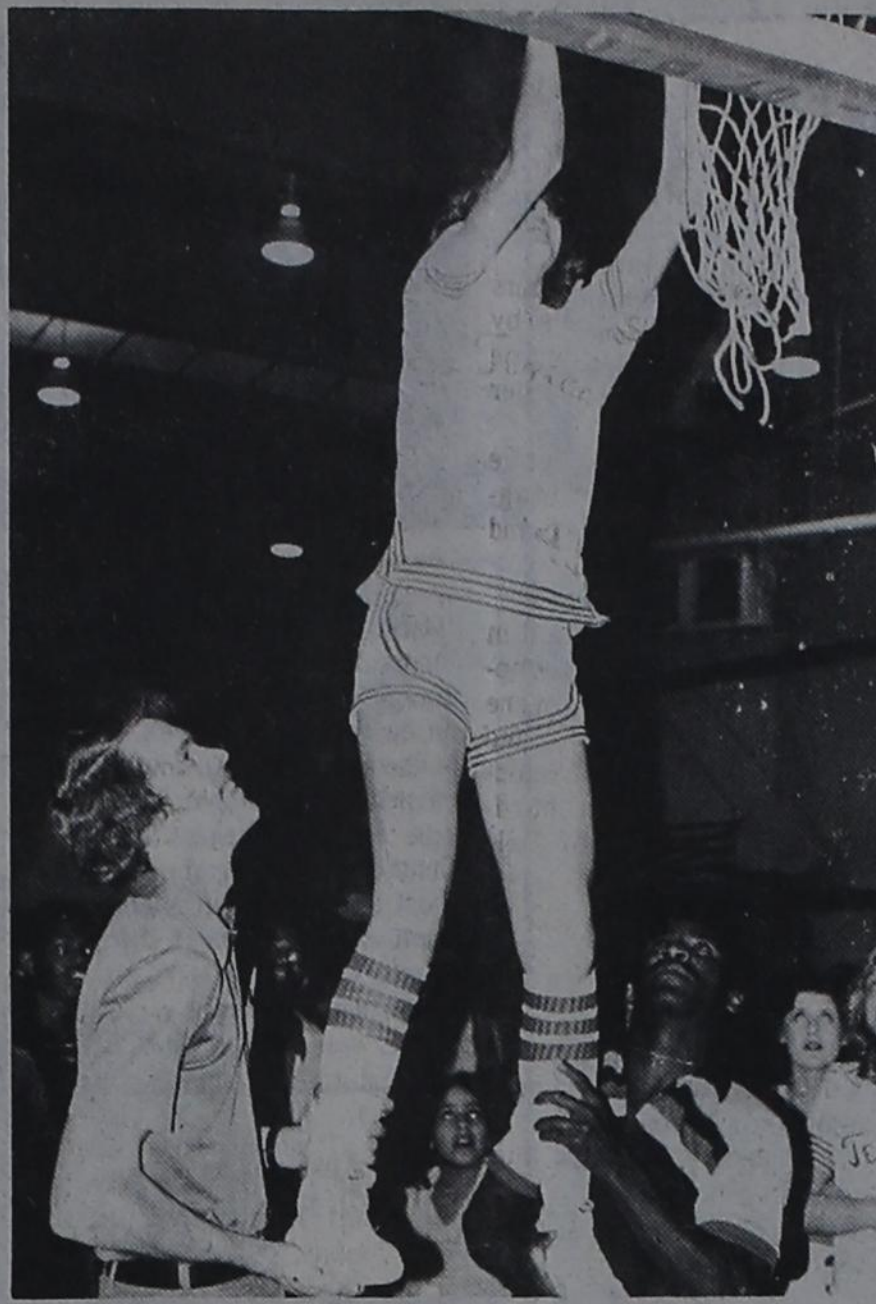
Leading scorer was Terry Tubbs with 113 points for the season, followed by Joe Steward and Dennis Chavez with 108 apiece.

"We started shooting better at the end of the season," Parker said. "Most of the kids came along well all year. If these kids will work off season and this summer, next year's varsity will have a lot of depth and experience."

For the season, the boys shot 35 percent from the field and 49 percent from the charity stripe.

Others who pitched in points during the season include Lloyd Williams, 64; Bobby Johnson, 49; Lynn Tubbs, 37; Jeff Johnson, 32; Tobin Tate, 30; Scott Elliott, 20; Tony Cavallero, 19; Danny Reid, 18; Lynn Tubbs, 17; Ronnie Dunsworth, 14; Rudy Martinez, 13; Dale Autrey, 4; and Arturo Ibarra, 2.

For the overall season, coach Parker says, "I was pleased with everything."

## Texico Girls Humble Melrose, Take District Title Again!

For the fourth time this season Texico Lady Wolverines triumphed over arch-rival Melrose, and in doing so, clinched the District 6-A title for the second consecutive year.

The local girls, reigning state champions, defeated the Lady Buffs 44-28 at the Texico gymnasium last Saturday night.

The game had a scrappy beginning for Texico, but following a halftime pep-talk by Coach Roy King, "The girls came our smokin'." We were a completely different team," King said.

The coach said his girls "Were really up for this game, but we came out the first half and couldn't hit any of our shots, then we got in a hurry and threw the ball away a few times." He added, "But Lisa Crooks probably won the ball game for us. She came out in the second half and hit four straight buckets from the outside. This forced Melrose out and then we took the ball inside to Ruth Scott."

King had high praises for his team's goal defenders, saying the Lady Wolverine defense

"was tremendous. Melrose has been averaging 60 points per game this season. We were able to force them to take a lot of shots they didn't want to take."

Texico fell behind in the first quarter and were stifled during the second stanza to a mere six points, compared to the Lady Buffs' 10. The half-time intermission saw the Green and White facing a 22-16 deficit.

A fast-paced Texico offense and crippling defense limited the Lady Buffs to zero points during the third quarter, while with 7; Dobbs with 4; Taylor with 3; and Crooks with 2.

Melrose did manage to pitch in six points during the fourth quarter, but Texico hit for 12 and took the victory and their second straight district crown 44-28.

Ruth Scott pitched in 26 points, followed by Lisa Crooks with 10.

Also scoring were Tracy Dobbs with 4 and Jill Jesko and Sharlet Taylor with 2 apiece.

"Jill, Ruth and Sharlet did a good job of rebounding and playing good defense on their inside people," said King.

"Lisa and Tracy played a smart game from their guard position. They sagged back and forth a lot of Melrose turnovers."

Scott led at the boards with 16 rebounds, followed by Jesko with 7; Dobbs with 4; Taylor with 3; and Crooks with 2.

Dobbs and Crooks led in assists with 6 apiece and Scott had 1.

Texico will play Logan Friday night at 8 p.m. at San Jon gymnasium beginning their battle for the regional title. Melrose will play San Jon at 6:30 p.m. MST.

## Junior Lady Wolverines Close Season Undefeated

For the first time in the history of Texico girl's JV basketball, the junior Lady Wolverines ended their season undefeated, boasting an impressive 12-0 record.

"This is probably the most aggressive JV team that we have ever had," said Coach Roy King. "We make a lot of mistakes but the girls always hustled."

The young Green and White may have only shot a season total of 25.7 percent from the field, but that doesn't bother their coach one bit.

"The thing I like about this team is that they are not afraid to shoot. A lot of players their age are afraid to shoot the ball, but we averaged 60 shots per game," he said.

King said the girls began playing much better once they started to press full court. "When they start playing on varsity I think we will be able to put on a good press," he said.

For the season, the girls scored 371 total points, compared to 215 from their opponents. Like their male JV

counterparts, the toughest competition came against Bovina and Grady. The JV girls defeated Bovina in the first game of the season by a mere two points, and won over Grady by only three. But for the most part, the girls held on to hefty margins in the remainder of their competition.

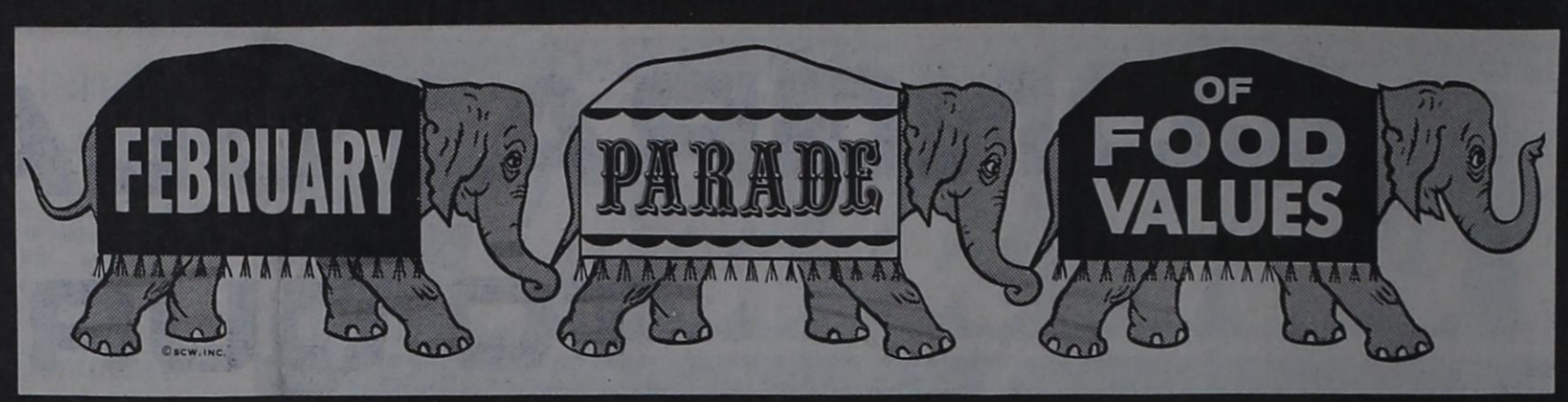
