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
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Steerettes Are Champions! Earn District 3-AA Crown

Farwell Steerettes culminated a season of many wins and few losses by clinching the District 3-AA crown last weekend in Muleshoe, the first with a surprisingly easy 63-41 varsity girls team from Farwell to do so in six years.

Their win of the 3-AA title advanced the girls to bi-district play Tuesday night at Hereford where they were handed their first defeat since mid-season from the Hale Center Owlettes,

the fact that the girls are now the reigning district champions, defeating Hart 46-38 last Thursday night and beating defending district champions Springlake-Earth 63-42 for the title on Friday during the district tournament.

Thursday night at Muleshoe in the opening round of the District 3-AA Tournament, the Steerettes assured themselves of a spot in the finals with a 46-38 whipping of Hart.

Lezlie Castleberry, Janene Berry and Ginger Ellison all added field goals in the final two minutes of the first period to give the Steerettes a 14-8 lead. In the second quarter, Farwell increased the margin to 8 points, 26-18, at the half.

Leading by 12 early in the third stanza, Hart reeled off 10 straight points and trailed by only 2 going into the fourth,

Although Hart tied the score with 3:45 left in the game, the Steerettes outscored the Lady 'Horns 8-0 in the final 3 minutes of the game, and won by 46-38 final.

"We had a bit of trouble against Hart, I think mainly because we were looking ahead to the finals of the tournament. But Hart came out fired up. They always play us tough and this was no exception," said Coach Vester Joiner. "But our girls held their composure and got after it. They played well when they had to.'

The Blue and White took a 10-7 lead after the opening 8 minutes, and increased their advantage to 7 at the half.

In the second half, Farwell repeated the feat as the girls outscored Springlake 16-10 in the third period to take a 43-30 lead into the final stanza.

By outscoring the Wolverettes 20-11 in the fourth quarter the Steerettes claimed top honors in the district as they won the battle by a 63-42 final.

By winning the championship, the girls earned a berth in the bi-district playoff game against Hale Center, and became the first Farwell girls team to do so since 1976.

Janene Berry led all scorers allowed the Wolverettes to get in the championship game by pouring in 23 points, while Jennifer Williams and Ginger Ellison added 10 each.

Other scorers were Lezlie Castleberry, 8; Karen Magness, 6; Sandra Coates, 4; and Suzahn Inman, 2.

Tuesday night in Hereford in a matchup of district champions, the Steerettes were thwarted in their bid to make it to the regional tournament when they dropped a hardfought 53-40 decision to Hale Center Owlettes.

"Hale Center played good defense against us," said Coach Joiner following the game. "Their man-to-man was tough. That is the only man-to-man that we have played against all year."

The coach also said that Hale Center managed to rebound well all night while the Steerettes "just couldn't get on the boards."

Leading by only a 4-3 count early in the contest, the Owlettes reeled off a string of 12 straight points to take a 14-3 advantage at the 1:31 mark of the first quarter, their biggest lead of the first half.

"We just couldn't hit with our shots," said Joiner. "We had the opportunity, they just

Trailing by a 16-8 count going into the second period, the Steerettes pulled to within 4 points of the lead on two separate occasions.

Janene Berry's jumpshot with 6:26 left in the half made the score 18-14, and with 5:39 remaining she trimmed the lead to 4 on a layup.

A late Owlette scoring spree raised the halftime deficit to 29-20.

Immediately following the third-quarter tipoff, Hale Center outscored the Steerettes 12-6 in the first 5:42 of the half to take a 15-point lead, their biggest advantage in the game so far, at 2:58.

Suzahn Inman's field goal with one second left in the period lowered the deficit to 13,

In a low-scoring fourth quarter, the Steerettes matched Hale Center basket for basket, but couldn't overcome the 13-point Owlette lead.

With both squads scoring 8, the final score was Hale Center 53, Farwell 40.

Berry led the Steerettes in scoring by tossing in 19 points, followed by Ginger Ellison with 7; Karen Magness with 6; Lezlie Castleberry, 4; and Jennifer Williams and Suzahn Inman, 2 each.

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
