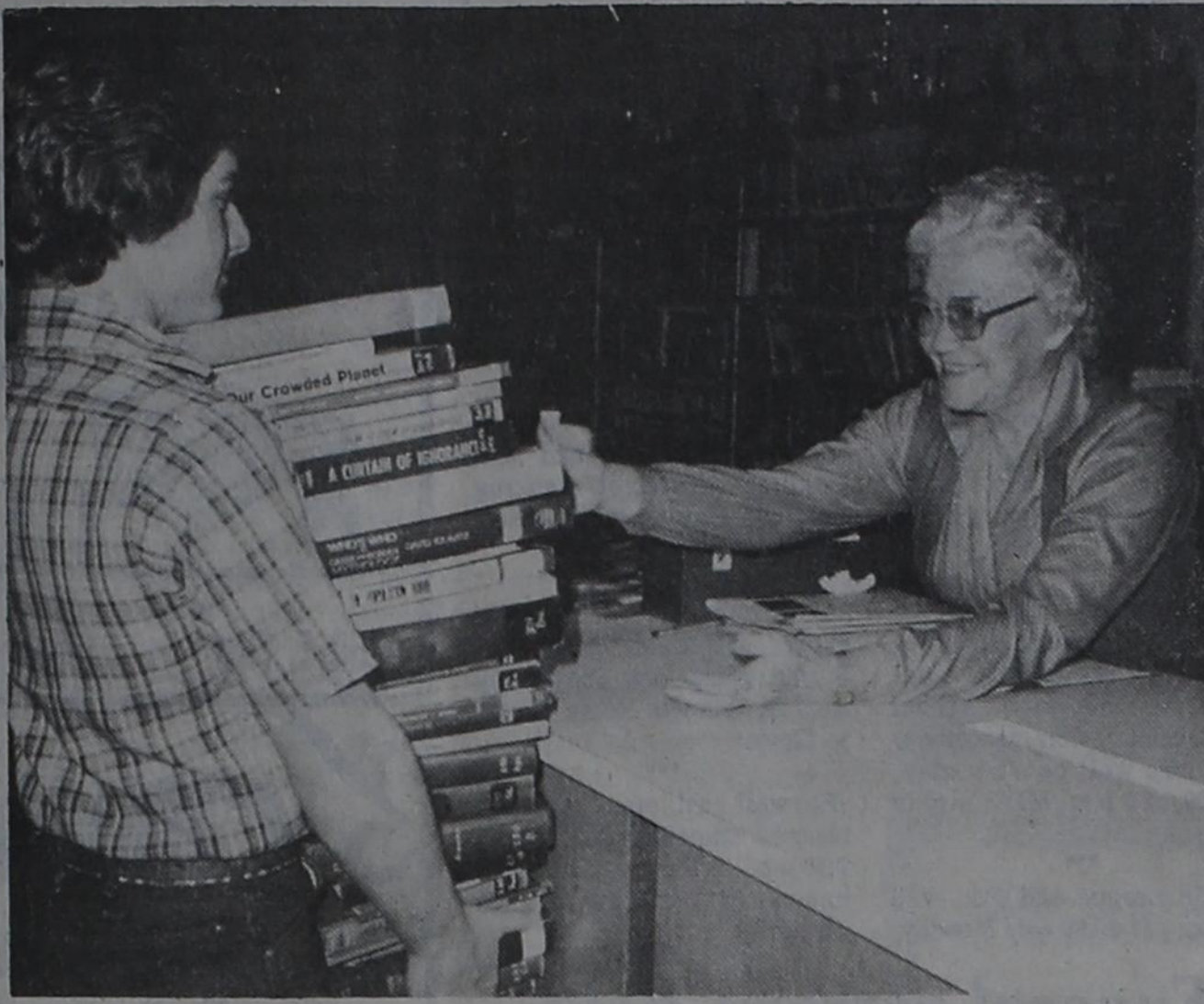

School, City Discuss Water Line Proposal

Farwell school administrative assistant, James Craig, and Lee Hutchins met with Farwell City commissioners Monday night for discussion on a proposed water line at the Farwell Cotton Gin and Farwell FFA Ag Barn.

According to commissioner Fred Chandler, Farwell Cotton Gin has requested the line for fire protection at the gin. Farwell FFA would like to hook into the proposed line for water at the FFA pasture and barn.

"It has always been our policy never to build any water lines outside city limits," Chandler told Craig at the meeting. But he added that the city will try to cooperate with the school and the gin in installing the proposed line.

Craig was to meet with the

Farwell School Board later Monday night, and get back to the city fathers with a possible proposal from the school system to the city.

In other action taken at the regular monthly meeting, bid proposals on the upcoming street paving project were declared invalid, as it was discovered during the session that the specifications given to the prospective bidders were incorrect. The city will recall for bids on the annual paving project.

City employee Doug Landrum met with the council and proposed that city employee Tim Lane be hired as a full-time worker. The council approved this, effective June 1, and voted to set Lane's salary at that time.

Landrum also told the council that Don McDonald at the Farwell City had requested that he be able to haul "dirt and burrs" to the city dump. Landrum told the city fathers that he estimated the trash to total "200 loads." Mayor Walter Kaltwasser will negotiate a money deal with the gin management on a cost per load basis.

It was also pointed out that Landrum will work with the gin on the exact disposal areas.

Those attending the meeting included Mayor Walter Kaltwasser; councilmen Fred Chandler and Jerry Monk; employees Dee Hammit and Doug Landrum; and guests James Craig and Lee Hutchins.

Texico City Council Rejects Water Bids

Texico City Council met in special session Tuesday at 4 p.m. MDT, prior to its regularly scheduled meeting, to open bids on the city water improvement project.

Two bids were submitted, one from Panhandle Construction of Lubbock in the amount of \$296,400, and one from Corrisson Service, Inc., from Las Cruces in the amount of \$305,594. Both bids were rejected by the city trustees.

The water improvement project will be rebid in two bid packages. The council authorized MSM Consultants, Inc., to prepare the bid documents, according to the City Clerk, Marie Christian.

Present for the special meeting were mayor John R. Hadley, trustees Vane Doshier, Donnie Morris and Lewis Cooper, city clerk Marie Christian, city attorney Harry Patton;

Also, Frank Glover, District Director of Farmers Home Administration, and representatives of the two companies submitting the bids.

The council met in regular session at 6:30 p.m. MDT following the special meeting, and heard a problem of intersection drainage, request for moving a building, and decided to purchase a new diving board for the swimming pool.

Several residents of Texico were present for the meeting to complain about a drainage problem at the intersection of Lamar and Hereford streets in Texico. The city fathers agreed to have a survey run at the

intersection in order to determine this drainage problem.

Joe Caywood of Texico met with the council to request the moving of a building from Turner Street to Garwood Street. He was informed of the permits he must obtain, and that the state building inspector must be notified before

action can be taken.

The council decided to purchase a new diving board for the Texico swimming pool, and announced that Vicky Chumley will be manager of the pool. Mrs. Chumley advised the council that she will try to have the pool ready

Parmar Recount Confirms Williams

A recount of the votes in the May 1 Parmar County Democratic Primary has confirmed that Bovina farmer Tommy Williams is the party nominee for the commissioner, precinct 2, seat.

Three members of the Parmar County Democratic Party tallied the results of the votes in the three boxes in precinct 2, plus the absentee ballots, Friday morning at the courthouse in Farwell, with County Clerk Bonnie Warren supervising the recount. The three voting boxes recounted are Friona Precinct 2-2, Bovina Precinct 3, and Rhea Precinct 7.

The tally confirmed that Williams received 236 votes, while incumbent commissioner Jack Patterson received 185, and Radford Venable received 48.

In a three-way contest, the top vote-getter must receive 50 percent of the total votes cast in the race to avoid a run-off. Patterson's and Venable's combined total was only two votes shy of the 50 percent mark.

Patterson, a grain farmer in the Bovina area, had requested the recount.

The County Democratic Executive Committee appointed Tonya Gober, Vernon Willard, and Leon Schilling to conduct the recount.

Mrs. Warren said she was glad the recount confirmed the original results. "Our election process was accurate," she said, "I'm happy for that. I'm proud of our election people who work so hard."

Williams will face Republican nominee Dale Hart for the commissioner seat.

Texico School Board Accepts Resignations

Texico School Board met Tuesday night, May 11, at the school for a short business session. The group met early, at 6 p.m., so that members would be able to attend the FHA banquet.

The board accepted the resignation of Gem Palmer, speech pathologist, and Mrs. Zonah Crooks, custodian, who is retiring after 28 years of service.

It was decided that the school will offer Drivers Education, both driving and observation, this summer at a charge of \$10 per student. The student must have already taken the classroom instruction, and must be 14 by June 1, 1982.

Also, the student must have a learner's permit which may be obtained from the license bureau at the Bruce King office building in Clovis, and pay the \$10 fee, before he or she may enroll.

In other business, the board discussed construction of new runways for the broad jump and pole vault pits.

School Board Hires Two New Teachers

Two new teacher-coaches and two custodians were hired by the Farwell School Board at the regular meeting Monday night.

Lupe Valdez and Rex Compton will be joining the staff as teachers and coaches, and Freddie Chavez and Frank Ancira will be custodians, replacing Arthur Crabb and Carl Schnibbe whose resignations were accepted at the meeting. The resignations will be effective May 28.

In other business the board voted to employ only five workers in the cafeteria for the coming school term. The board also voted to pay for one-half the cost of 710 feet of six-inch water line to the school ag farm.

It was also agreed to pay \$2600 golf course rental fees to Farwell Country Club.

School principals Don Malone, Jerry Owen, and David Gobble reported on activities in their schools; Howard Carlyle reported on the TABS tests, and Pat Owen and Kay Ray gave a report on results of the ICRT tests.

Pat Graham was granted permission to organize a library committee and to adopt the School Library Bill of Rights. Mrs. Graham was also authorized to teach a section on censorship, using materials approved by the library committee.

The teachers contract presented by Superintendent W.M. Roberts, and designed by the Texas Association of School Boards, was adopted for teachers for the 1982-83 school year.

Heritage Insurance Managers of San Antonio will be used for the Student Accident Insurance program for the coming year.

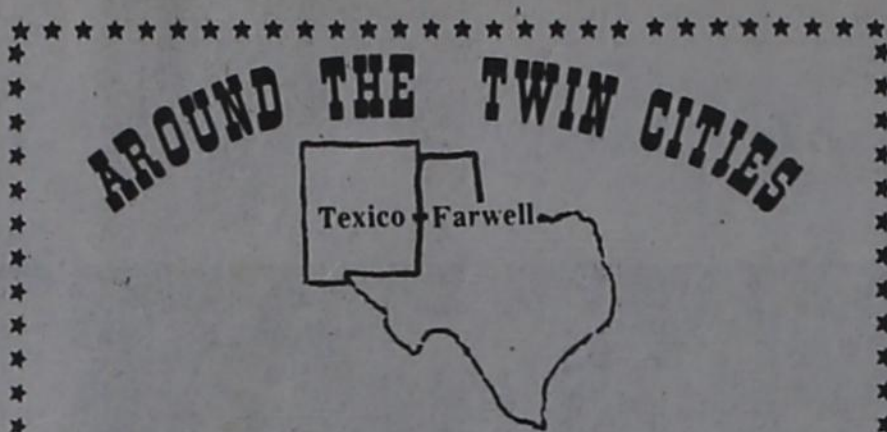

Committee Of Texas Cities Recommends 9% Rate Hike

Southwestern Public Service Company this week announced that it would accept a nine percent rate increase recommended by the steering committee which represents 66 Texas municipalities served by the electric utility.

The agreement was reached following a study by the cities' rate study committee, and represents 71 percent of the 12.7 percent Texas retail rate increase requested by the company.

If approved by the Public

Utility Commission of Texas (PUCT) the new rate would be effective July 1, 1982, and would be expected to provide additional revenue of approximately \$13.6 million annually from customers inside the cities. The agreement only covers the rate for service supplied within the city jurisdiction. Rates outside the cities, which are regulated by the PUCT, would generate approximately an additional \$15.8 million annually at the 71 percent figure.

Company president, Bert Ballengee, said, "Southwestern Public Service agreed reluctantly because the combined revenues of \$29.4 million from city and rural customers is less than had been requested, less than is needed, and less than is justified by today's high money cost and the commitment the company has made to its customers to change to coal as a fuel source in new power plants."

Ballengee said that, "Southwestern Public Service would go along with the reduced increase because of the current economic situation which is effecting everyone. I guess we'll hurt just like everyone else," he added.

Southwestern Public Service primarily provides electric utility service to a population of more than one million in a 45,000 square mile area of the Panhandle, and South plains of Texas, Eastern and Southeastern New Mexico, and the Oklahoma Panhandle and Southwestern Kansas.

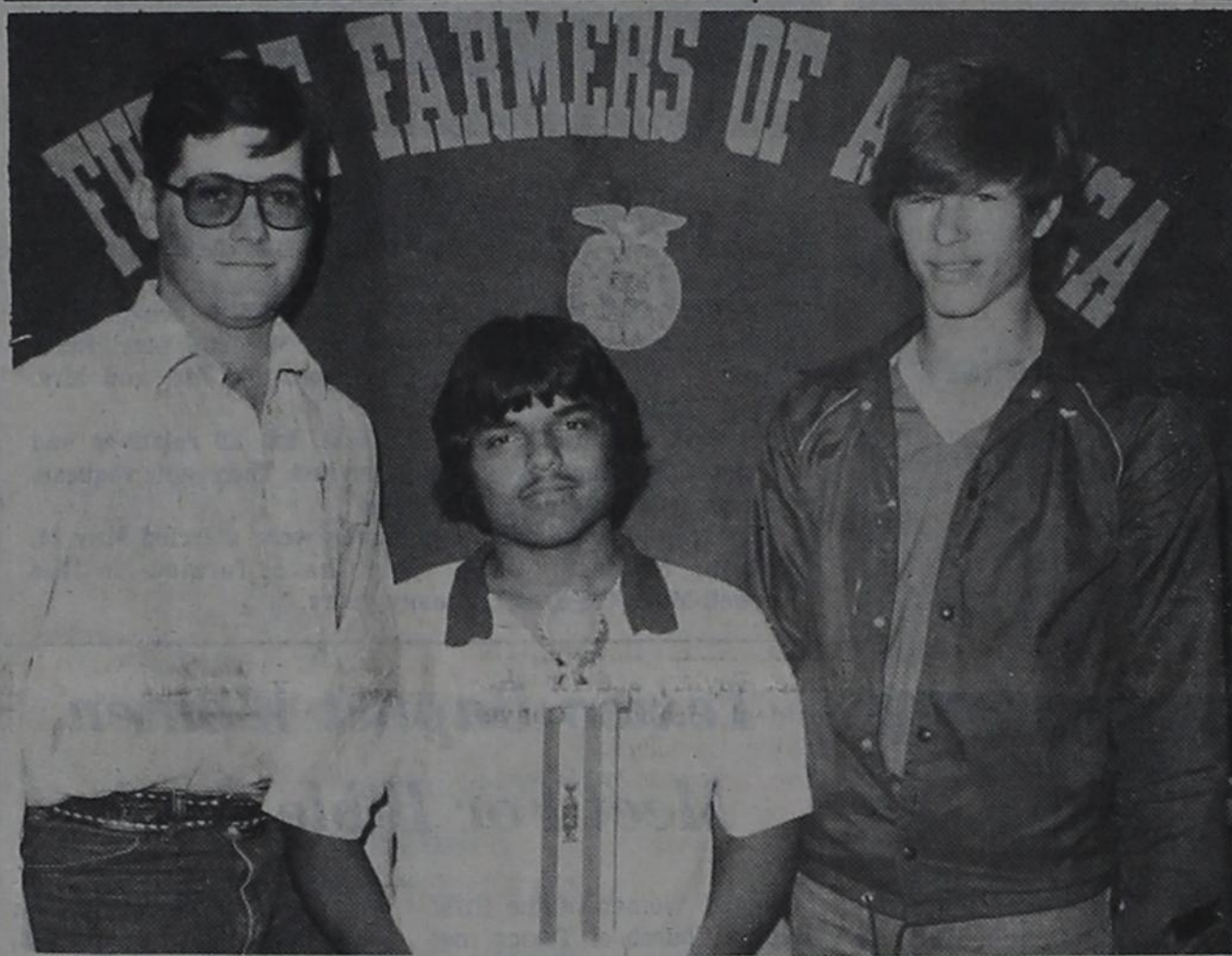

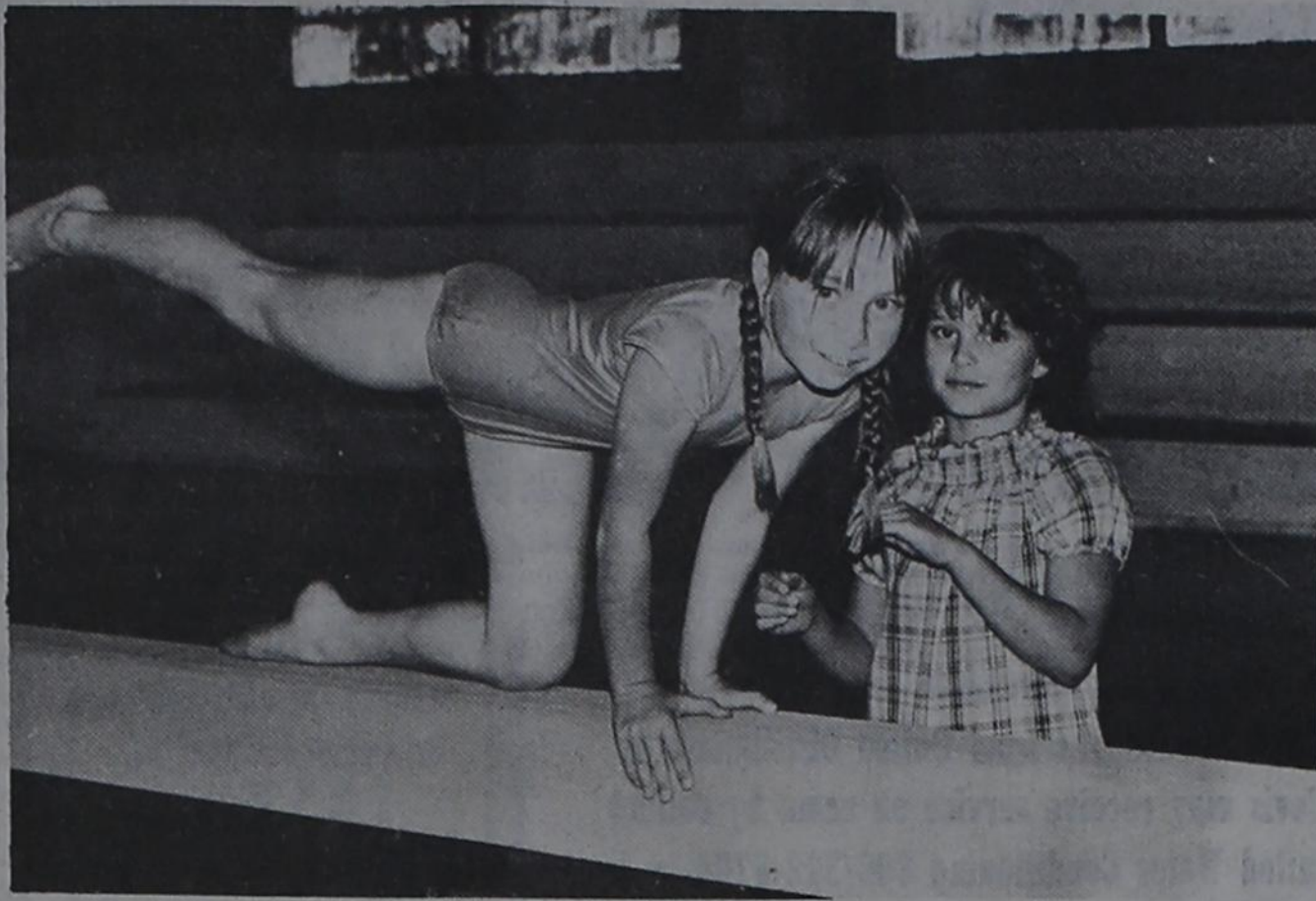

Brad Steward grabbed a third place finish in the 165 meter low hurdles with a time of 22.15.

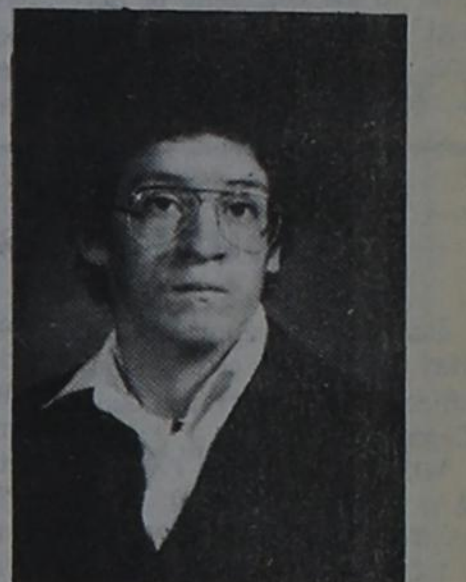

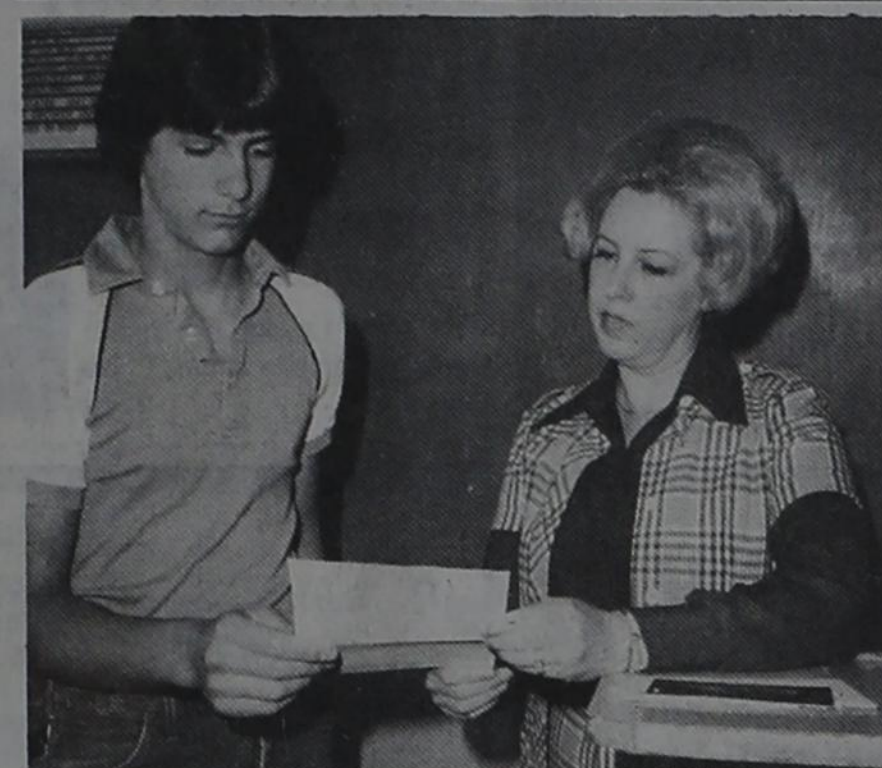

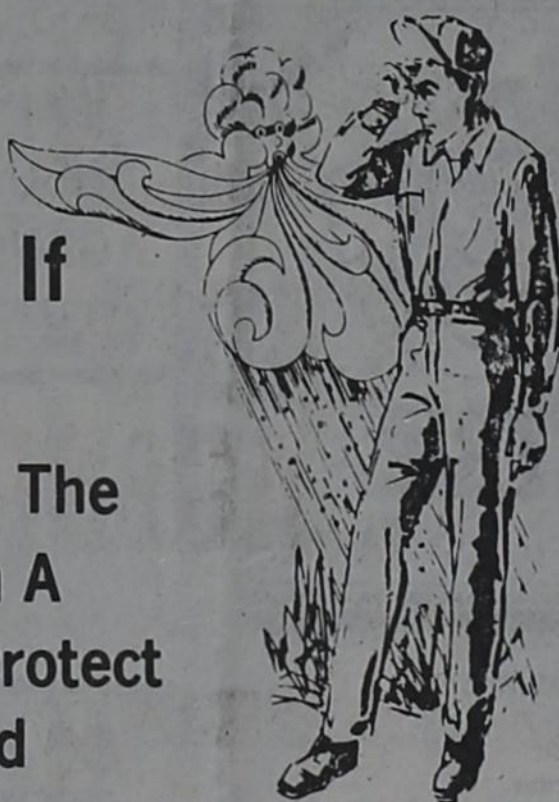

Changes Made In 1982 Reporting Requirements

"The dramatic increase in participation in All-Risk or Multi-Peril Crop Insurance mandates a change in notice of damage procedure," according to F.W. Crouch, Jr., Field Operations Director of the Federal Crop Insurance Corporation. "New regulations in effect in 1982 will give rapid, responsive, accurate service to the producer, and increase the efficiency of the loss adjustment process," Crouch added.

Current requirements for prompt written notice of damage during the growing season will remain in effect. In addition, the producer is asked to provide written notice of probable damage at least 15 days prior to the beginning of harvest. If damage is not discovered until harvest, the grower is required to file a notice of damage report immediately, and to reserve a representative sample of the unharvested crop at least 10 feet wide and extending the full length of the field.

The crop residue must be left undisturbed for 15 days from the date of the notice, or until written authority is given by the Corporation to do otherwise.

Notices of damage are to include policy and unit number, estimated yield per acre, and estimated amount of indemnity.

"The increased volume of business and farmer reliance upon the All-Risk Crop Insurance program make it imperative that loss adjustment procedures reflect the realities of the added work load," Crouch stated.

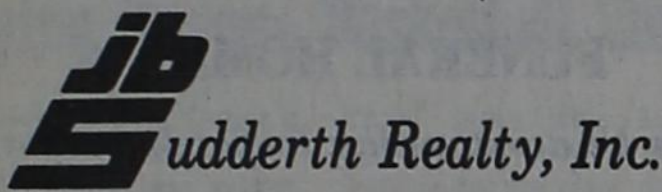

TWO MINUTES WITH THE BIBLE

"HE SHALL PRAY FOR THEE"

Abimelech, king of Gerar, had taken Abraham's wife as his own, but had done so innocently.

Sarah was a beautiful woman and Abraham, fearful for his life, had said to Abimelech: "She is my sister." Indeed, Sarah, also fearful, had vouched for Abraham's lie, telling the king: "He is my brother."

But to save the failing couple from the consequences of their own cowardice and sin, God had appeared to Abimelech, warning him that if he valued his life he would immediately return Sarah to her husband—"and he shall pray for thee, and thou shalt live" (Gen. 20:7).

Can this be a correct account of what actually took place? Will God hear the prayers of guilty Abraham for innocent Abimelech? Yes, for Abimelech was a pagan who served other gods, while Abraham, with all his failure and sin, was God's own child.

Abraham's prayer would, of course, be a confession of his sin and a plea that it might not be laid to the charge of innocent Abimelech, but nevertheless it was Abraham, not Abimelech, who had access to God.

This is an important lesson to learn, for many unsaved people point to the failures of believers and say: "I wouldn't be guilty of that. If he goes to heaven, I certainly will get there." Nevertheless, such "good" people are lost while poor sinners who have trusted Christ for salvation are saved and "made accepted in the Beloved One" (Eph. 1:6).

There is only one way to find acceptance with God; this is by faith in His Son. Our Lord said: "I am the way, the truth, and the life; no man cometh unto the Father but by Me" (John 14:6), and in John 3:35,36 we read: "The Father loveth the Son and hath given all things into His hand. He that believeth on the Son hath everlasting life: He that believeth not the Son shall not see life, but the wrath of God abideth on him."

"Believe on the Lord Jesus Christ, and thou shalt be saved" (Acts 16:31).

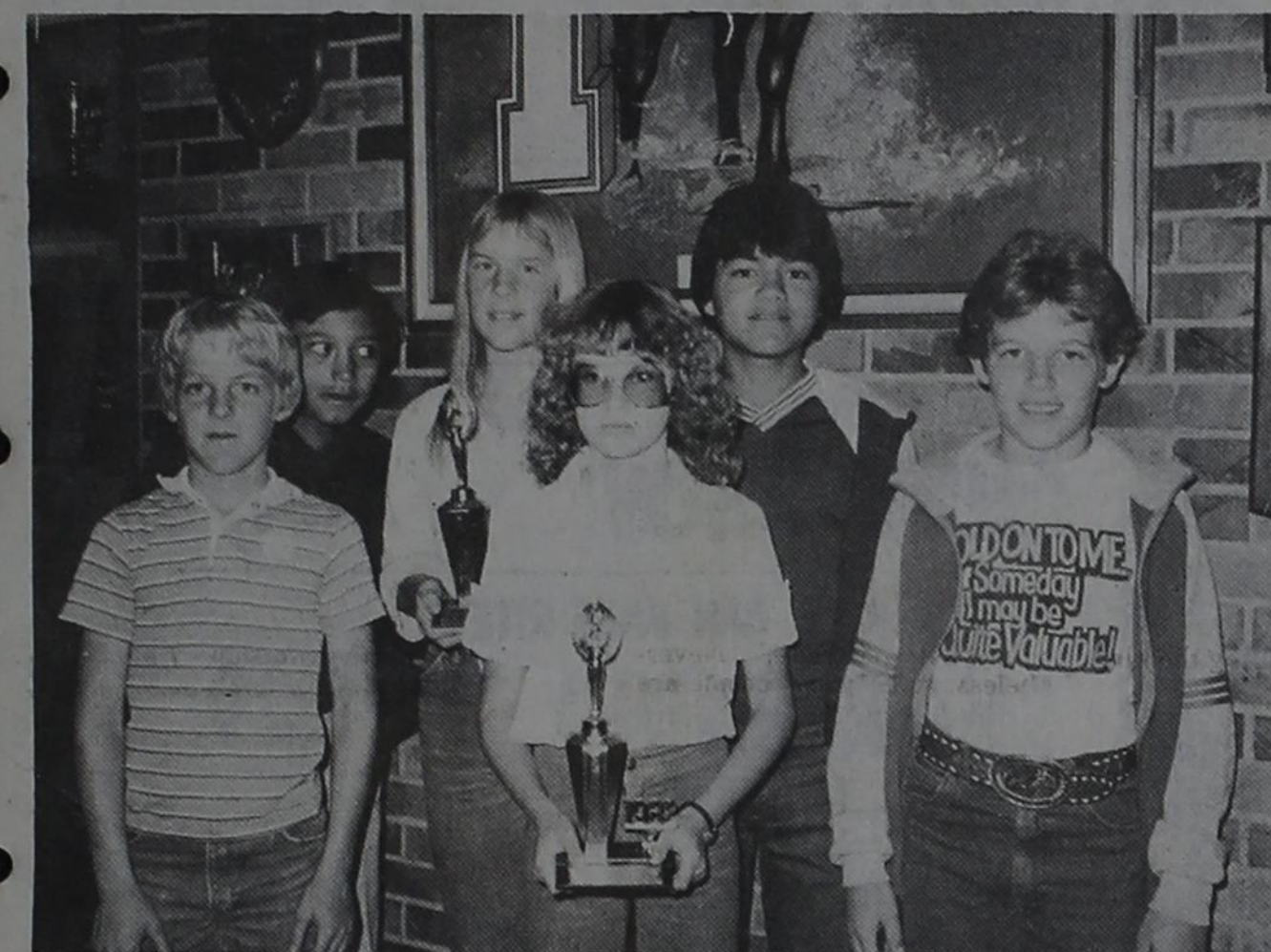


All Was Not Work

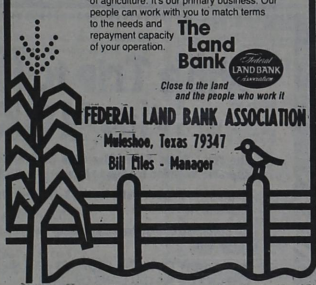
