


We watched the ABC movie "Inside The Third Reich." That is, in between the

Farwell school administrative assistant, James Craig, and Lee Hutchins met with Farwell City commissioners Monday night for discussion on a proposed water line at the Farwell Cotton Gin and Farwell FFA Ag Barn.

According to commissioner Fred Chandler, Farwell Cotton Gin has requested the line for fire protection at the gin. Farwell FFA would like to hook into the proposed line for water at the FFA pasture and barn.

"It has always been our policy never to build any water lines outside city limits," Chandler told Craig at the meeting. But he added that the city will try to cooperate with the school and the gin in installing the proposed line. Craig was to meet with the

Farwell School Board later Monday night, and get back to the city fathers with a possible proposal from the school system to the city. In other action taken at the
