Polls Open 7 to 7 - -

Parmer Primary Voting Takes Place Saturday

Parmer County voters will join others from throughout the state of Texas tomorrow (Saturday) in Democratic and Republican primary elections.

The polls will be open from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. CDT, with voters deciding the fate of four contested positions on the Parmer County ballots, in addition to choosing Republican and Democratic candidates for governor and other state offices.

Parmer County Clerk Bonnie Warren advises that voters may cast ballots in either the Republican Primary or the Democratic Primary, but not in both.

There are no statewide referendums on the Democratic ballot, but those who vote on the Republican ballot will vote on five issues.

Candidates who are contested on the Democratic ballot in their bid for a Parmer County office include:

Cynthia Thigpen and Mar-

jorie Watkins, seeking the office of District Clerk; Anne Norton and incumbent Benna Felts, seeking the office of County Treasurer;

Radford Venable, Tommy Williams, and incumbent Jack Patterson, candidates for County Commissioner, precinct 2;

Raymond Treider, Jr., and incumbent Raymond McGehee, candidate for County Commissioner, precinct 4.

Others who will seek election as unopposed Democratic can-

didates include incumbent Bonnie Warren, County Clerk; incumbent Porter Roberts, County Judge; incumbent Charles Aycock, County Attorney; incumbent Jack Young, District Judge; Albert Smith, Justice of the Peace, precinct 1; Frances Euler, Justice of the Peace, precinct 2; and Wayne Spears, Justice of the Peace, precinct 3. All three JPs are incumbents.

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Democratic, Republican Polling Spots Designated

Parmer County voting in tomorrow's (Saturday) Democratic and Republican primary elections will take place at the newly-designated polling spots, according to Parmer County Judge Roberts. He said that voters with any question as to where they should vote, should call their party chairman.

Republican party chairman for Parmer County is Martin Kube of Farwell, and Democratic party chairman is Richard Collard of Friona. Kube may be reached at 481-3441, and Collard's number is 247-2716.

Republican voting places and times for precinct conventions for tomorrow are as follows:

Friona, precinct 2, vote in the northwest corner of the high school. Precinct convention will be at 2 p.m. Ron

Awtry is precinct chairman.

Bovina, precinct 3, vote in Bovina school cafeteria. Precinct convention is at 3 p.m. Ellen Estes is precinct chairman.

Farwell, precinct 4, vote in back of Farwell City Hall. Precinct convention is at 3 p.m. Delbert Lingnau is precinct chairman.

Lazbuddie, precinct 5, vote at Lazbuddie school cafeteria. Precinct convention is at 4:30 p.m. Glenn Lust is precinct chairman.

In the Democratic primary, voting will take place at the following locations:

Precinct One, polling spot No. 1, old Tri-County elevator office; No. 8, J. Dee Willard residence; and No. 2-1, Calvary Baptist Church in Friona;

Precinct Two, polling spot No. 3, Bovina American Legion Hall; No. 7, the Lutheran Church Parish Hall in Rhea; and No. 2-2, the Community Center Show Barn in Friona;

Precinct Three, No. 4, Parmer County Courthouse; and No. 6, Oklahoma Lane Community Center;

Precinct Four, voting place No. 2, Friona Fire Station; and No. 5, Lazbuddie School.

The only change in the precinct spots from previous voting years are the two additional ones now in Friona, at the Calvary Baptist Church and the Community Center Show Barn.

The redistricting of the precincts came about because of the 1965 Federal Voting Rights Act.

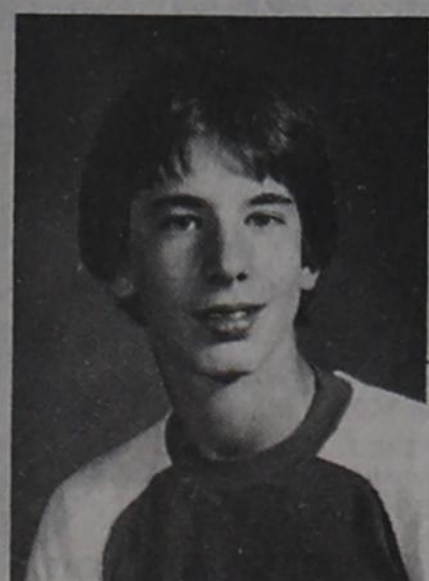
Texico's other two honor students, Coy Jo Burk and

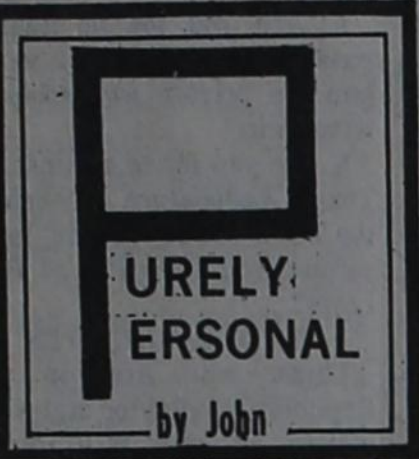

Last week the nation was treated to mass idiocy labeled "Ground Zero." It was an attempt to tell the people of the horrible effects of a nuclear bomb burst.

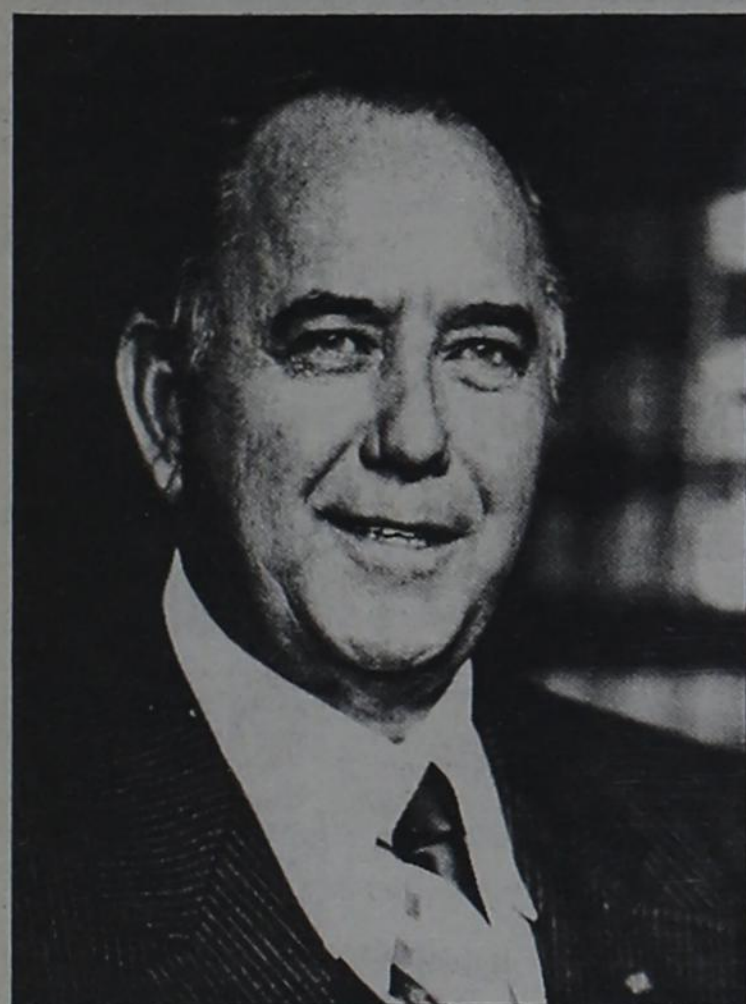

Texico Water Project Moving On Schedule

Texico City Council members learned Tuesday night at their regular bi-monthly session that the paper work for the water improvement project has been completed, and the Farmer's Home Administration has ordered the money for the project.

Bids for the \$266,000 project will be opened at a special meeting of the council at 4 p.m. MDT May 11. Following that session, the regular meeting of the trustees will take place at 6:30 p.m. when members of MSM Engineers will meet with the city fathers.

The project is expected to get underway in early May, and once completed, which will be approximately 4-5 months from the start of construction, the City of Texico will be operating its water system from three water tanks with more efficient and wider piping.

The project will include the erection of a new 320,000 gallon overhead storage tank, to be installed at the north end of KKR park.

The project is completely funded and will not cost the Texico taxpayers a dime, according to city officials.

In other action at the council meeting, Vicky Chumley was hired for the city's swimming pool manager for the summer.

It was voted that Mrs. Chumley pay all electric and phone bills for the pool, and the city will pay for pool maintenance.

The council received a variance request for a mobile home to be placed on lots 11 and 12 in Block 18. The request was granted, provided that the home will grade into the sewer.

The volunteer fire depart-

ment's budget was approved, and it was decided to purchase new tires for the police car.

Members of Parmer County Commissioners Court met Monday and conducted a regular business session, including the payment of bills, the re-investment of county monies, and approval for soil conservation work.

A 1929 graduate of WTSU, Forrest is a resident of Lake Tanglewood, Tex.

He was hired as a teacher, principal and coach at Moore School near Big Spring after one year of college at WTSU. He then returned to WT in 1927 to complete his education, and during that time served as business manager of "The Prairie," the campus newspaper, and as manager of "Le Mirage," the campus yearbook.

Forrest earned a bachelor of science degree in history, and following graduation married Elizabeth Cherry, a student from Childress.

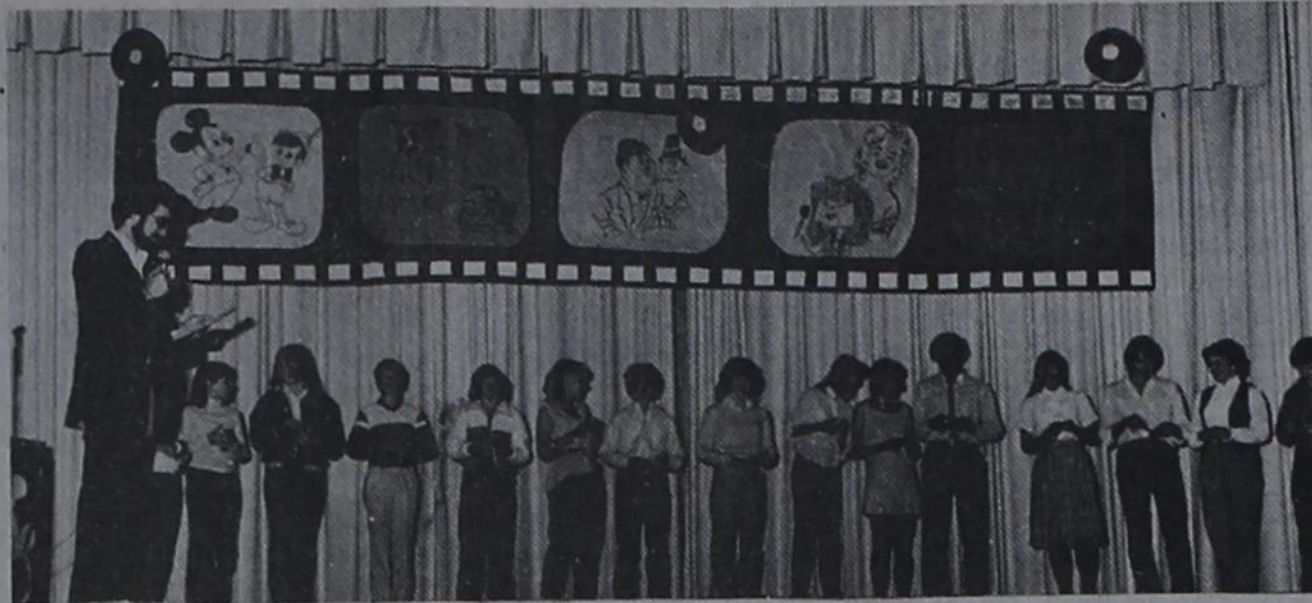
Forrest taught for 11 years in schools at Texico and Fort Sumner, and served as superintendent of schools at Farwell for six years. He earned a master of arts degree from the University of New Mexico.

In 1940, he began a second career when he bought a farm southeast of Hereford and grew the first commercial onion crop in Deaf Smith County the following year. In 1945, he became manager of Deaf Smith Electric Cooperative where he worked for 25 years before he retired in 1970. He also served as president of

Texas Electric Cooperatives and owned and operated farms and ranches in Missouri, Colorado, and Texas. In addition, he helped sponsor, build, and manage a telephone cooperative to serve Deaf Smith, Parmer, and Castro counties.

He was chosen to develop a pilot project in Colombia, South America, through a contract with the National Rural Electric Cooperative Association and the Agency of International Development, and he also taught management courses for four years at Chile.

He served as president of the alumni board at WTSU in 1947, and has been a member of the board of directors for 13 years. Scholarships of \$200 each will be awarded to 10 students to honor Forrest, said Kirby Sunderman, executive director of the WTSU Alumni Association.

H. S. students lack interest in consumer issues

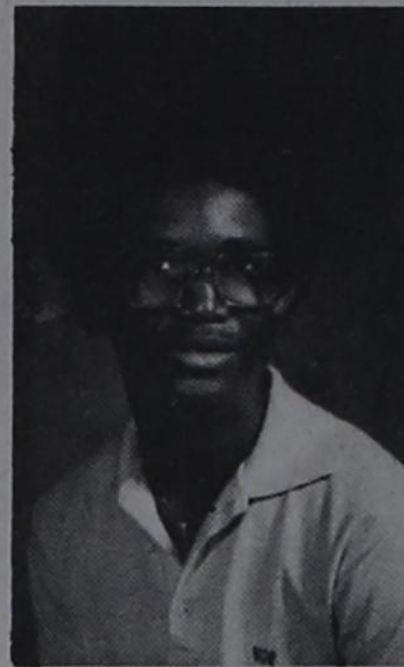
COLLEGE STATION — A lack of interest in consumer issues by high school students is the biggest obstacle in establishing a consumer education program in Texas Schools, says a university marketing professor.

In a study comparing 1970 and 1981 state high school consumer education programs, Dr. James McNeal of Texas A&M University said a lack of student interest and already-crowded curriculums keep them from doing well.

"Half of our high schools don't offer a separate course and more than 10 percent of the high schools offer no consumer education at all," said McNeal, a specialist in consumer research.



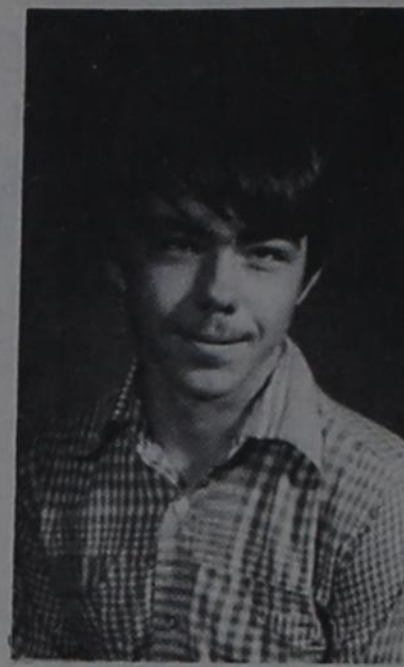

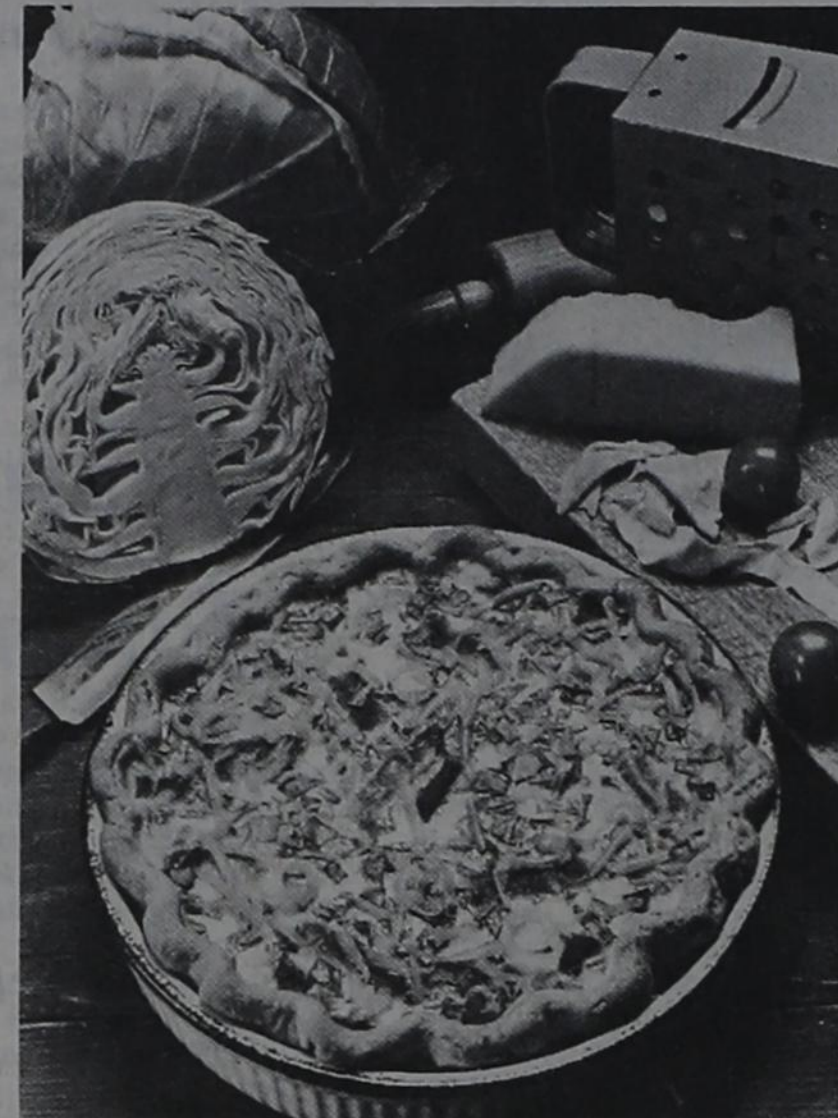

CABBAGE QUICHE, a very unusual way to prepare cabbage, is a nutritious dish to serve lunch or supper, notes the Texas Department of Agriculture's home economist.

CABBAGE QUICHE

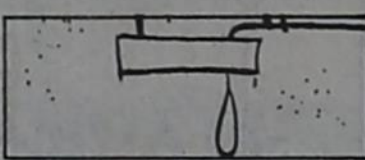
- 1 9-in. pastry shell
- 1/2 C. grated Monterey Jack cheese
- 1 C. shredded ham
- 1 1/2 C. grated cabbage
- 3/4 C. very finely grated green onion
- 1 1/2 C. light cream
- 1 T. white wine
- 1 T. brown sugar
- 3 eggs
- 1 tsp. salt
- 1/4 tsp. pepper

Prebake pastry shell for 5 minutes at 400 degrees F. Sprinkle cheese in bottom of pastry when pie shell is cooled. Pour in ham, cabbage and onion. In a bowl, mix cream, wine, sugar, eggs, salt, and pepper. Pour cream mixture over the ingredients in pastry shell. Bake quiche in 350 degree oven for 10 minutes. Lower heat to 325 degrees F. for 20 to 30 minutes or until a knife inserted in center comes out clean. Serves 4 for an entree.

The heating values of common firewoods vary greatly, with hickory at the top of the list, followed by white oak, beech, sugar maple, red oak, birch, and yellow pine in that descending order. Aspen and white pine provide poorest heat.

Ceiling fans have become popular heating and cooling energy savers because they really work, in winter pushing down the warm air that has naturally risen and reversing in summer to lift and circulate the cooler air at floor level.

According to the makers of Nicholson files, one should never be used without a tight-fitting handle to cover the sharp point of the tang. They package 60° to the work with an unbreakable handle with three adapters, available at hardware centers.

The U.S. Department of Energy suggests these four simple ways to save 15¢ on every gallon of gas bought—slowing down from 70 to 55mph saves 6¢; keeping a car tuned saves 4¢; radial tires kept properly inflated save 5¢ a gallon.

A tool kit of fixed-jaw box and open-end wrenches can become costly when working with both standard and metric nuts. The economical solution is a three-size set of Crescent adjustable wrenches.

Sawing is much easier when the saw is held correctly. Use a cutting angle of 60° to the work with a rip saw, 45° with a crosscut.

For nearly 70 years, the Texas Agricultural Extension Service has been engaged in providing Texas consumers with information useful to their daily lives through work of County Extension Agents.

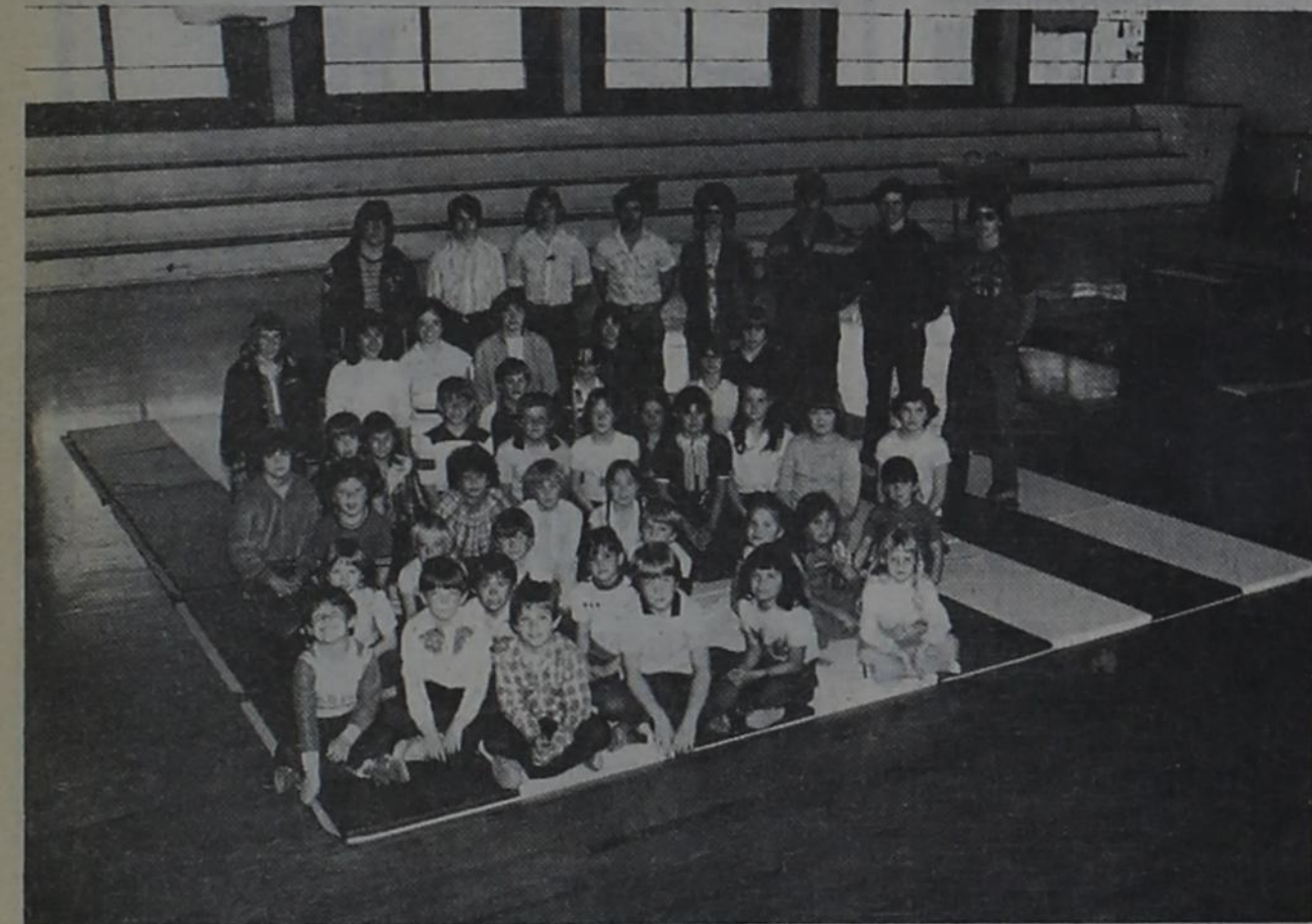
In 1914, the Smith-Lever Act established the Extension Service and laid the groundwork for a cooperative partnership between county, state and federal governments that pro-

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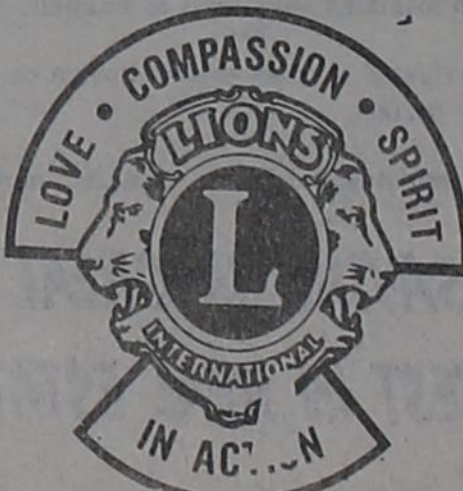

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LIGHT OUT OF DARKNESS

"For God, who commanded the light to shine out of darkness, hath shined in our hearts, to give the light of the knowledge of the glory of God in the face of Jesus Christ.

Elections Update

Election Year 1982 will be a very interesting and important time. Texas' primary elections will be hotly contested and more head-on confrontations in the general election will be seen than ever before. The debates among the various candidates are healthy and productive as the more dialogue and conversation among the candidates only serves to better inform the electorate—and a better informed electorate will make wiser and more intelligent voting decisions.

The Secretary of State's Office is engaged in several elections projects which directly impact Texas voters. As the State's Chief Election Officer, my Office is fully committed to ensuring that each person eligible to register and vote be afforded full opportunity to exercise this most sacred right. We have a long way to go—as of November, 1981, there were approximately 6.6 million registered voters in Texas out of an eligible 9.9 million. That means only two-thirds of those who could be registered are in fact registered. My Office recently concluded a massive voter registration drive on April 1, 1982—the deadline for Texans to register and vote in the May 1 primary elections. We received widespread support statewide and while we are currently in the process of determining the impact of our voter registration effort, I have no doubt we were successful in registering a significant portion of the State's eligible voters. The voter registration drive will be repeated in the Fall of 1982 prior to the November General Election.

Hand in hand with a voter registration drive must be a ballot integrity program. The right to vote must be protected throughout the election process and safeguarding the integrity of the election ballot rests with the Secretary of State. The program designed by my Office for use in the upcoming elections will assist political parties, candidates, and election officials by ensuring that qualified voters vote and their votes are properly counted and reported.

Based on the facts that only 12.2 percent of the State's eligible voters participated in the November 3, 1981 Constitutional Amendment Election, at an estimated cost of 2.5 million to state and local governments, or some \$3.00 per vote cast, a study was commissioned following the election to provide insight as to why an alarming 87.8 percent of the electorate were not motivated to vote. The study's findings suggest that: (1) additional efforts to educate Texas citizens on proposed amendments may be needed; (2) amendments should be incorporated on the general election ballot only when issues of "state" and "local" interest are present; and (3) the number of amendments presented in an election should be limited. Similar election analyses will be conducted following the 1982 primary and general election.

A recent survey by my Office projects that an unusually low percentage of registered voters will vote in the May 1 primary elections. The statewide voter turnout is expected to be 29 percent of the State's registered voters or some 1.9 million voters—24 percent in the Democratic Primary and five percent in the Republican Primary. The low voter turnout projection indicates that voters are waiting until the November General Election to vote because voting in our primaries no longer determines the outcome of the general election.

1982 will no doubt be a high water mark for Texas politics and I encourage each eligible voter to exercise his most precious right to vote in the upcoming elections.

Animal Vaccination Urged For Brucellosis

Commissioners of the Texas Animal Health Commission are launching a statewide program aimed at encouraging livestock

producers to vaccinate their animals for brucellosis control. "Vaccination is a key element of the Texas brucellosis

control program. We can build up immunity in the Texas cattle population by vaccination of all eligible heifers,"

John Armstrong, Kingsville, chairman, Texas Animal Health Commission, explained. He noted these are other advantages for vaccination:

1. Vaccinated cattle can move more freely in accordance with brucellosis regulations;

2. Vaccinated cattle have more value.

"Financial assistance is available. You should contact your veterinarian or area Texas Animal Health Commission office for details," Armstrong said.

nursery catalogues for variety selection. These catalogs base their recommendations on winter-hardiness zones, and they ignore summer conditions, disease and insect problems," he said.

For example, the Bartlett pear shouldn't be grown here where fire blight disease is a problem, although this variety is recommended for New Mexico's hardiness zones.

Always buy fruit trees that are healthy and disease free. If possible, check the root system. "A smaller tree with a healthy root system is a better buy than a larger tree with a poor root system," Herrera said.

Time To Start Planning For Home Fruit Tree Planting

Almost any kind of fruit can be grown and enjoyed in New Mexico by the backyard gardener.

To get the best results, it helps to do some careful planning before actually planting, according to Esteban Herrera, Extension horticulturist at New Mexico State University.

"We can't even guess how much money is wasted every year by people who buy fruit trees—and bushes and without considering all the factors involved in producing quality fruit," Herrera said.

Fruits, unlike vegetables, are perennials and involve a long term commitment of planting space, time and effort. The prime consideration for the home gardener is how much time he is willing to devote to growing fruit.

Tree fruits like apples, peaches and plums require much more maintenance and care than other fruits. Grapes and raspberries are easier to grow and maintain.

"Anyone who isn't sure that they are willing or able to care for fruit trees probably shouldn't plant them," Herrera said.

Once the decision is made to plant, the next step is to evaluate the site. Some homeowners have enough room to plant just about anything they want, and others may have room for only a few vines or strawberry plants.

An 8-foot by 30-foot area will provide the average family with all the strawberries they can eat, but fruit trees require much more space, Herrera said. For instance, it's necessary to plant two apple tree varieties to ensure fruit set.

All fruit crops require full sunlight to produce the best yields. The early morning sun is particularly important to dry dew off the plants and

reduce the incidence of disease. Areas that have extremely sandy or heavy clay soils should be avoided, too.

"Since most of New Mexico soils tend to be alkaline, it's usually necessary to add iron chelates later on in the tree's life to prevent yellowing of leaves," Herrera said. "The county Extension office has information on taking soil tests, and the soil test lets you correct any problems in soil pH or fertility."

Success in growing fruit at home also depends on the selection of varieties for a given area, Herrera said. "Don't rely on national


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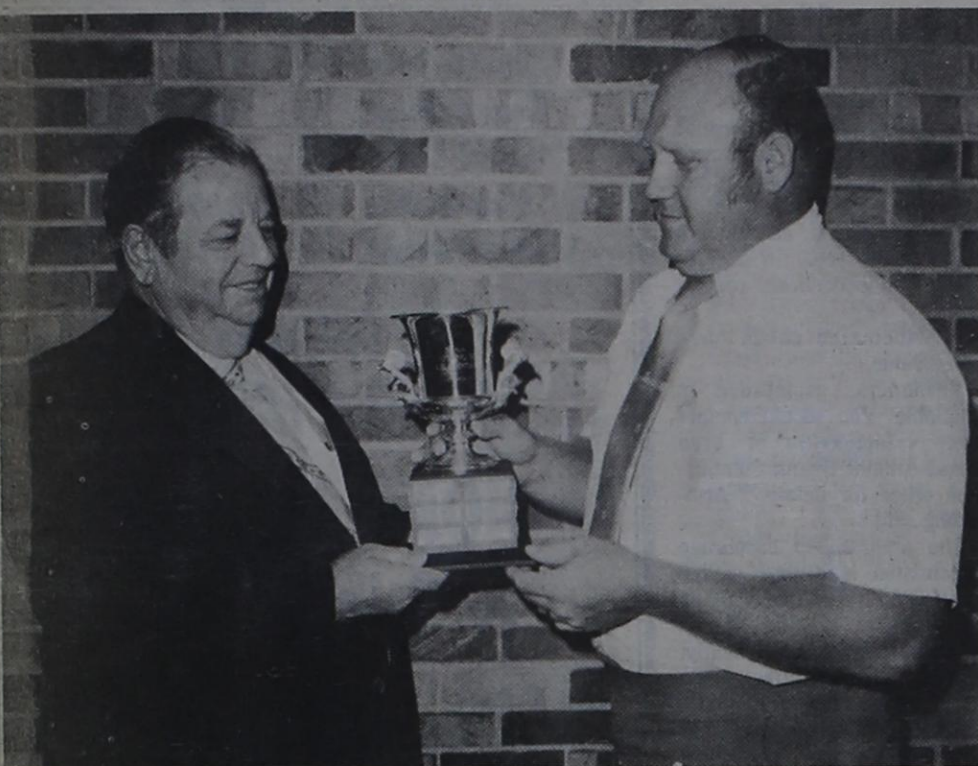
