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Robin Gregory's journey with art

An undeniable passion for art combined with the leadership of God resulted in Robin Gregory's employment as the first art teacher in Farwell High School.

She was a little nervous her first day of instructing a bunch of teenagers, but Farwell soon realized that she was a natural. Her life, up to this point, had unknowingly prepared her for this uncertain task.

Mrs. Gregory was born in Beaver, Okla. She got a business degree from Oklahoma State University in 1971. She worked in Dallas, then married Larry Gregory in 1976, moving to the tiny, welcoming town of Farwell.

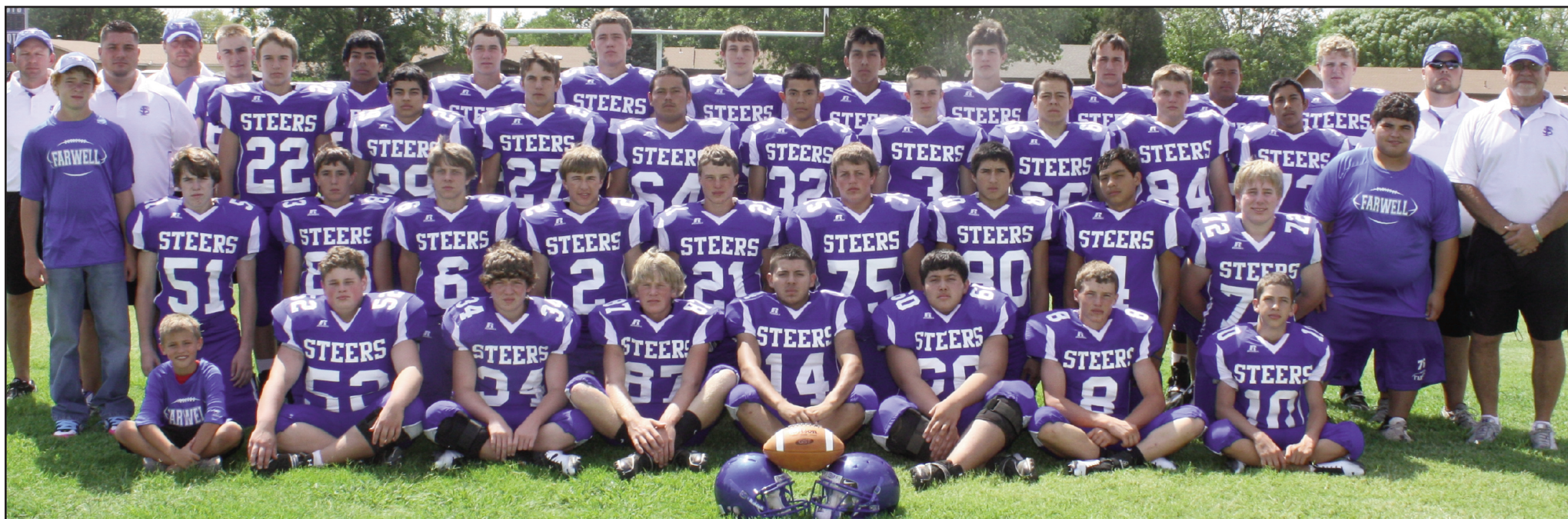

She had always enjoyed drawing and painting so she decided to take some art lessons at Muleshoe, Sudan, and Clovis. Her husband was farming and coaching.

He encouraged her to go into education, so in 1989, she started driving to West Texas State University (now WT A&M). She received her teaching degree in one year and a summer after cramming in 18 hours for the fall semester, 21 hours during the spring semester, and 12 hours of summer school. Meanwhile, she and her husband were raising two sons, Gage and Grant.

Mrs. Gregory finished her schooling on a Thursday and started teaching 4th grade on the following Monday.

"I never intended to be a teacher, but it gave me time with my sons," she said.

School back then was a little different than it is now. Students didn't go to other teachers for certain subjects. This circumstance gave Mrs. Gregory the chance to share what she enjoyed.

"When I started, I taught every subject," she recalled. "Because I loved art, I taught a lot of it. We did many art projects. We even sang! I'd play on my piano and they would sing along. It was a way to ease into the day."

The high school art program wasn't started until 2000. The school handed her the reins.

"To start, the school gave me a budget to order supplies," she said. "I was able to begin the art program complete with individual drawing tables and an abundance

of art supplies." The Home Economics class building was turned into the art building. Robin said it became so crowded with her students that something had to be done.

"They knocked out the wall that used to be in the front where my classroom is now," she said. "We were very fortunate to have tremendous support from the administration and school board."

She said she is lucky her art class is not text-driven. She has the freedom to teach the kids what art really is instead of what somebody else far off thinks. She obtains art projects through many other sources.

Haing been a student in her class, I am very glad that we didn't have to sit and read boring words that are trying to describe something that can only be experienced.

"I don't want it to be a place of stress," Mrs. Gregory said. "I want a relaxed atmosphere. Kind of a place of escape from difficult work required in other subjects."

The caring teacher also said that her goal is for all the art students to be successful, especially the children who aren't as involved as others in athletics or academics.

"I love to see how the students grow and gain confidence in their artistic abilities," she said. "Art helps teach students to be patient and persistent. You just have to keep growing."

She believes that everyone has artistic abilities, but some students who enter her class are already very gifted artists. Some

draw as if they had professional training.

Mrs. Gregory named many of her students who surpassed her in their abilities. Even though they might already draw as easy as eating, she still teaches them a very important thing.

"Kids that already draw have to be pushed out of their comfort zone," she explained. "Some kids may only draw with a pencil, so I have to get them to use other mediums. Some may only draw portraits or landscapes; I have to get them to broaden their artistic world. Working with students at all levels is fun and challenging."

Most teachers have papers piled on them to grade every night or weekend. Mrs. Gregory has to do this, but it's not as tiresome as her other responsibilities.

Art class requires paper, paints, pencils,

erasers, pastels, crayons, and many other things. Y could probably guess by your teenager's room how messy paints and paper can be in one classroom.

Her class did some successful projects this year, in addition to their usual projects. Several students were involved with the ENMU painting that was a digital photo of the school hallway transferred onto canvas. It was incredibly realistic and carefully done.

Mrs. Gregory also took on the painting of Farwell's new obelisk that sits at the southwestern corner of the city park. She recalls that she didn't anticipate the hours that it would take.

"Just the templates for the letters took forever," she said. "Thankfully, the students in Farwell are always willing to help when projects are

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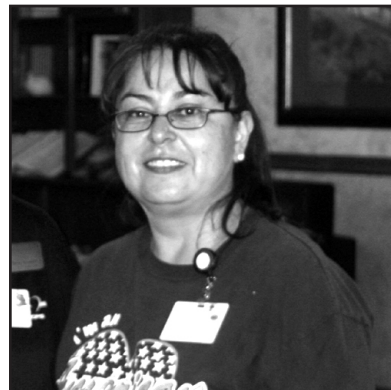

Texico finalizes plans to begin construction projects

The Texico City Council on Aug. 9 selected AMD Engineering, of Lubbock, to work on the new sewer plant for the city.

The engineering firm that had done the work in the past but lost their engineer, Karen Perez, and the state asked Texico to go out for re-bid.

Not only did AMD rate the highest, they also recently hired Perez so she will continue to oversee the project.

Councilman Oran Jay Autrey abstained from voting as his son, Brandon, works for AMD.

In other news, the council:

- Heard that several city employees will join Autrey at the groundbreaking of the Ute Water Project.
- Discussed the Esparza property on Lamar Street. The city had a survey done, and the survey had an incorrect address on it, so the property owners will be re-notified before the city moves forward.
- Voted to raise business registration fees to \$35 per year, up from \$25, and will now charge \$50 for temporary vendors.
- Signed a contract with Mark's Plumbing, of Clovis, to start work on the Phase 2 water project to connect wells to the city water supply.
- Discussed reports that kids were getting into a boarded-up house at 730 Turner St. City Inspector Terry Martin said he would contact the owner and have them secure the property.
- Looked at increasing garbage rates by \$2 to cover the cost of the city dump, garbage truck fuel and environmental recovery fees. The council also looked at charging folks for each use of the dump. No actions were taken at this time.

Water board lowers tax rate

The High Plains Underground Water Conservation District Board on Aug. 16 approved a resolution adopting a 2011 tax rate of \$0.00776 per \$100 property valuation for operation and maintenance of the district.

This is the second year in a row that the tax rate has been lowered by the Water District Board. The 2010 tax rate was \$0.00785.

A person with \$100,000 in property value pays \$7.76 in taxes per year to the Water District under the newly-adopted 2011 effective tax rate.

Although the tax rate has been lowered, some may see a slight increase in their water district taxes due to increased property valuations.

Read gives update on new Texas tests

A message from Farwell School Supt. Mike Read: Farwell School staff members have been diligently preparing for an exciting beginning of the 2011-2012 school year.

Our district -- as well as many other school districts in Texas -- will see some changes in state funding as well as a new student assessment called STAAR (State of Texas Assessments of Academic Readiness), which will replace TAKS. Despite these changes, our overall focus at Farwell will continue to be on student learning and success.

Farwell School board members and administrators have reduced the district's budget by 5.2 percent for the 2011-12 school year to reflect the loss of state-provided revenue. The 82nd state legislature reduced Farwell School's funding by 5.2 percent this school year and also 6.1 percent for 2012-13.

We are certainly blessed to have our values go up \$13 million and our enrollment continues to maintain the 570 mark. I can assure you we have been very good stewards with the money we have to work with on a day-to-day basis.

On this note, we are proposed to lower our I&S rate to .06 cents, which is down 2.68 cents from the prior year. Our bond payment will be paid off in August 2013. We will be preparing for our next biennium at that time, so I will be anxious to see how the state will address school finance.

The new STAAR, according to the Texas Education Agency, begins with Grade 3 and will represent a more unified, comprehensive assessment program that will incorporate more rigorous college and career readiness standards.

Students in the graduating Class of 2015 (this year's 9th graders) will be the first group who must meet the end-of-the-course testing requirements in the four core areas of English language arts (ELA), social studies, math and science -- as well as pass their classes in order to earn a diploma.

Also, the STAAR testing significantly increases the number of testing days at the high school level. Currently, there are 25 TAKS testing days, including exit level retesting; the STAAR end-of-course testing will require up to 45 testing days when it is fully deployed.

I am thankful and blessed to work in a community that values education. I know that Farwell ISD will continue its push to the top because of the strong leadership from the board of trustees, administrators, teachers, support staff and parents.

Please encourage your child to do his or her best as our commitment will continue to be improvements in our students' learning and well-being.

I look forward to a safe and productive 2011-12 school year -- and I wish all our area schools the best!

The 1939 review of important events of the year showed that the Rural Electric Administration that brought electric power to rural areas was given the top rating.

The REA project passed for this county was the top story; followed by dial telephones installed in Texico-Farwell, and the Christmas snow that blanketed our area.

Probably the most shocking death that occurred in the entire county was the passing of R.H. Kinsley, of Friona, on Nov. 1 after he was severely burned at his home that morning. Kinsley was one of the foremost pioneers of the county and his death was felt over this entire section.

Other key highlights were:

The Oklahoma Lane gymnasium fire on Jan. 9 was put out by a bucket brigade by students and the building was saved.

Mary Lou Baker was named 1938 4-H Gold Star Girl.

The annual stock show in Friona drew more than 1,200 visitors and 200 exhibits.

Vivian Hadley, Texico 4-H girl, won a trip to Washington, D.C., and Gilbert Watkins, an Oklahoma Lane Club boy, won a Santa Fe trip to Chicago.

Farwell High School and Bovina Grade School were county interscholastic league winners.

Julian Thornton made a trip to Washington, D.C., with a group of A&M boys.

Frank Thompson and John Taylor were named New Mexico State Farmers.

Glen Williams, president of the Farwell FFA, attended the national convention in Kansas City.

The loop connecting Texas Hwy. 60 with the New Mexico 60 through Texico was paved; the road between Farwell and the Bailey County line was resurfaced; and the contract for the construction of an underpass out of Bovina connecting Hwy. 60 and 86 was recently let.

A small tornado struck in the Pleasant Hill community and completely demolished a house but killed nobody.

Alta Lou McDaniel, Texico school girl, graduated with a perfect attendance record.

A calf without a tail was born on the E. E. Booth farm.

The Fairfield School pupils were transferred to Texico.

Liquor was voted out in Texico.

Mrs. Ludie Matthews, Texico postmaster, was voted the New Mexico delegate to the national convention in Washington, D.C., and attended during the summer.

Oklahoma Lane Senior Club won the 4-H Club plaque for outstanding work.

1,378 carloads of wheat were shipped over the county.

A medical cooperative was set up for indigent families sponsored by the FSA.

Parmer County farmers bought a large amount of wheat seed.

The Texico fire department and City Hall were installed in their new buildings as was the Texico Port of Entry.

Three people were violently killed in the county with J.B. Gleaton, of Littlefield, being struck and killed by a car on Feb. 19; Claude Parrish, of Lariat, met his death in a truck-train crash on Feb. 24, and Lawson Herrington died after a truck-tractor crash on Nov. 26.

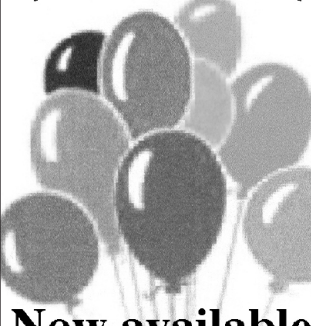

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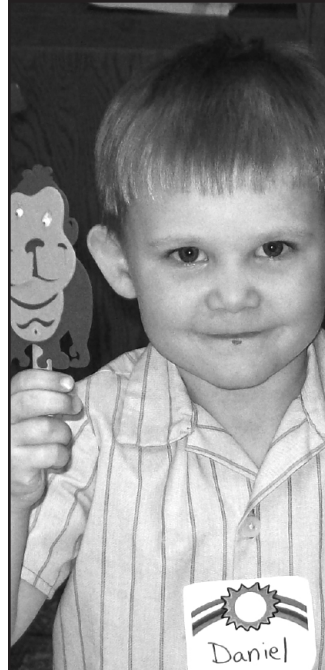

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100 Years

Farwell Texico Lazbuddie Bovina

Of the State Line Tribune

Farwell was home to one of the nation's first serial killers

From a 1986 Tribune article:

Herbert Ellison, of Farwell, was one of the original members of the grand jury that convicted George Hassell back in the 1920s.

Hassell, who farmed near Farwell and was convicted of slaying his family, was one of the first serial killers in the history of the U.S.

Ellison says that when he went to get the \$2 a day paid them then for serving on the jury, the county treasurer, Minnie Aldridge, said, "You're just about the youngest man I ever saw sitting on the grand jury."

And so it was. He was the youngest man to sit on the jury, at age 25.

Ellison says that at that time women were not allowed to sit on any jury, whether it be petty or grand jury.

He said in Hassell's confession, it came out

that Hassell and his second wife started arguing about the fact that Hassell had gotten the oldest daughter pregnant. Mrs. Hassell had taken the girl to see a doctor in Clovis and had her condition confirmed.

So the quarrel began that started the mad rush of killings. Hassell confessed that he had noticed a hammer sitting on the window sill and had picked it up and knocked his wife in the head.

He confessed to having killed the smaller children in their sleep and told of the battle he had with his older boys before gaining advantage over them and killing them. He also told of a gruesome burial and how he plotted Alton's death.

Ellison said they tried Hassell on Alton's murder but he remembered the District Attorney who

had just taken office saying that he wanted nine separate indictments on each victim so they could send him to the electric chair on any count of murder.

There were nine indictments returned in that one day. The trial went on and was in session for 3 to 4 hours and no postponements or stays were taken.

During the trial, Hassell's California confessions were added to the rest. The jury had

only one copy of Hassell's confession and they passed it from one to the other to read and study its gruesome details.

The grand jury indicted, tried and convicted

the man, and the District Attorney got signed affidavits from each juror. Ellison said that the D.A. wanted no loop holes left in the case.

Ellison said in conversations with Hugh

Moseley, county tax assessor, the confessions of Hassell used to be stored at the courthouse but due to water damage they were disposed of.

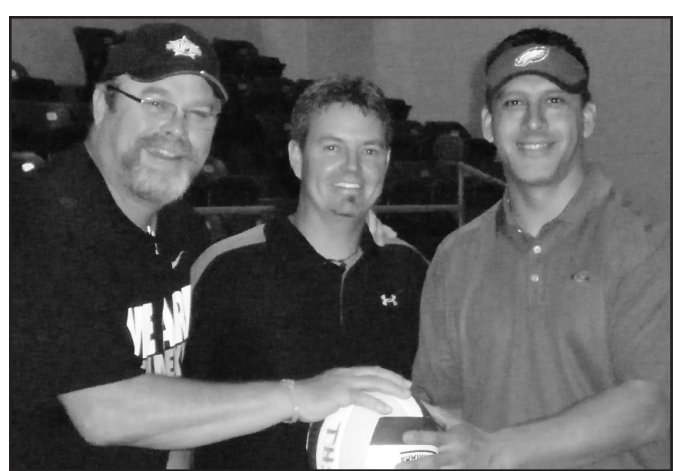

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Live Cattle prices broke out above a two week resistance level last week and the market almost advanced up into the early July highs. Odds favor a test of the \$122.00 level basis the October contract at some point this week. Cash trade was also sharply higher which may help to support one more leg up. The drop in the stock market had very little negative impact on cattle prices which was a first.

Feeder prices followed the Live Cattle up last week and also took out several levels of resistance. The nearby October contract stopped around one level of resistance at the \$139.80 level, but should make one more attempt at the early August highs around the \$141.80 level? The market is in position to test these old highs over the near term, but any failure may quickly turn the market back down.

Corn prices are now in position to retest their old highs around the \$7.22 level basis the December contract. There will be analysts and traders alike watching closely to see if prices can convincingly break above this level or fail. Fundamentally, the yield predictions at this time are so far apart that it's only a guessing game at this time. A break to new highs would logically lead to another leg up.


Soybean prices have also moved up into a short term resistance level around the \$13.50 level basis the November contract. A close above the \$13.60 level should also lead to another retest of the contract highs which has been done and failed on several occasions this year. The big picture continues to project a long term sideways market into the end of the year aside from any major changes in production estimates.

Wheat prices move up into their two week resistance level last week, but failed to close above that level. The \$8.35 range basis the December KC wheat contract has stopped the advance on several occasions. It will take a solid move above this level to turn charts higher. Last weeks low turned out to be a one day close below support before prices rebounded back up. Just sideways action over the last three weeks.


Cotton prices did little last week, but did turn up towards the end of trading on Friday. Prices moved all the way back down to test their most recent lows just above \$94 basis the December contract before turning back higher. Long term trends are still down, but the market should make another attempt at the \$1.08 or \$1.09 level over the near term. A close above this level should be positive for prices over the long haul?

A tough time for corn

From Monti Vandiver, county extension IPM agent: Some corn fields have begun to shut down prematurely. It appears that the plants are simply giving up, likely due to cumulative effects of this summer's heat and drought stress.

Corn can tolerate a limited number of extreme temperature days without significant impact but continual very high temperatures may eventually cause plants to begin to prematurely desiccate.

I consider the area irrigated cotton crop to be fair at best. Broad crop condition descriptions many times are the average of extremes. irrigated cotton crop conditions range from very poor to pretty good.

Some later planted fields with good irrigation capacity look good but are late developing a good fruit load.

Application forms are being distributed to all households with a letter informing households of the availability of free and reduced price meals for their children. Applications also are available at the principal's office in each school. **To apply for free and reduced price meals, households must fill out the application and return it to the school.** Applications may be submitted anytime during the school year. The information households provide on the application will be used for the purpose of determining eligibility and verification of data. Applications may be verified by school officials at any time during the school year.

For school officials to determine eligibility for free and reduced price benefits, households receiving Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) benefits (formerly food stamps) or Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF) only have to list their child's name, SNAP or TANF case number. An adult household member must sign the application.

Parents or guardians dissatisfied with the ruling of the official may wish to discuss the decision with the reviewing official on an informal basis. 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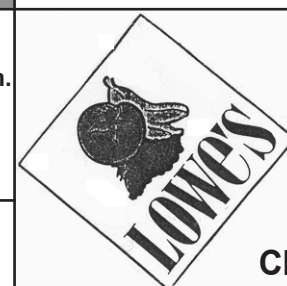
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
