It seems so obvious as to be hardly worth mentioning, but necessary nonetheless, to point out that few things could be more stultifying to progress ... progress of all kinds . . . than taking the free market out of the economy and replacing it with beaurocratic whim.

When the government decides on how men shall be employed, what they shall produce, what they will receive as pay, and what the goods shall sell for, the feet of progress are mired in the clay of human greed or

This is patently evident in the present day fairy tale realities of jobs that have been preserved by law after they have been outmoded by technology, goods which are produced with the government's encouragement when there is no market for the goods, and prices that are higher than the market would permit were it not for federal programs of various types.

Men are paid for not working (even when they are employable and work is available), conditions are artificially preserved by government edict long after they have become uneconomic, and creativity and industriousness in every sphere is discouraged by grossly inequitable penalties (or favors) distributed through the bureaucracy on the basis of political expediency.

Thus policies that shape and control (rather than police) the affairs of men are the result of the whim of the professional state planners, instead of the free market which accepts or rejects goods and services on an impartial basis. The textbooks have been rewritten so that it is no longer true that "he who serves best profits most." Today profit is often determined by whom you know.

These circumstances preserve static conditions. They snuff out the lifeblood of change and progress.




Farwell Board **Discusses Land** South Of School

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

Old Well Found At Blackwater Draw

A 10,000-year-old well, believed to be the oldest in the New World, is listed as a major find at the Blackwater Draw site near Portales in a report on summer excavations by Dr. George Agogino, head of the Paleo-Indian Institute at Eastern New Mexico University.

The well is one of more than a dozen uncovered at the site, but all others have been estimated to be 4,000 to 5,000 years

Six students assisted Irwin Rovner, field superintendent for the Paleo-Indian Institute, in the summer project. Their work was confined to the south wall of the gravel pit where dozens of pre-historic artifacts have been uncovered. But the site has been "badly neglected for over three decades," Dr. Agogino noted.

Their work revealed that the "Portales Complex," 6,000 to 10,000 years old, represents a series of cultures separated by layers of rock rather than a single complex.

Artifacts found at Blackwater Draw have shown a sequence similar to findings at the Hell Gap site in eastern Wyoming, indicating that a particular point-type is dominant over the High Plains for one time period.

Why I Am a Republican for Goldwater

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

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

screwworms or blowfly larvae. We must collect a sample of worms from each infestation we find so they can be sent to Mission and positively identified. Worms from deep within the center of wounds as well as from the surface must be col-

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
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
