County in great financial shape

Just like last year, the Parmer County Commissioners on Monday received an annual audit report from Kirkland, Kirkland & Co., CPA, that shows the county to be in excellent financial shape.

The county's tax rate isn't determined yet because the Appraisal District won't have the certified values until later.

The CPA firm reported that the county's total revenues exceeded expenses by \$335,921 during the past fiscal year, putting the combined fund balances at \$3,267,304.

In the past, the CPA firm has told the commissioners it would be wise to keep a fund balance (surplus) of at least \$1.5 million. Thus, the current surplus is more than twice that.

Last year's tax rate was .4949 cents per \$100 assessed valuation.

The audit was accepted.

JULY 14, 2011

The commissioneers will meet with the county appraiser in August to set the effective tax rate.

In other business, the commissioners:

-- Awarded the contract for the Bovina water and sewer project to West Texas Utility Contractors of Amarillo.

-- Approved the competition of banks in Parmer County for the financing of equipment the county purchases if their rates are competitive.


-- Voted to not accept the public defender's grant that was proffered in the previous meeting of the commissioners.

In other business, the board:






